EDITORIAL

Best use of government

The national news media reported last week that the New Democratic Party (NDP) had reached a tentative deal (called confidence and supply) with the Liberal minority government to keep the Liberals in power through to 2025.

This deal would result in the Liberals acting on national pharmacare and dental care programs, priorities for the NDP.

This alignment has angered the opposition parties, the Bloc Quebecois and the Progressive Conservatives.

The majority of seats in the House of Commons are now made up of Liberal and NDP members, with that number at 189.

The Bloc has 32 seats and the Conservatives have 119.

Interim Conservative leader Candice Bergen issued a statement saying her party was not in favour of the deal, calling it "backdoor socialism."

There's that dreaded word "socialism."

Isn't it time that political parties in Canada and their leaders think about the ordinary citizens of this country and not the ruling elite?

Isn't it time the political parties worked together?

In a democracy, majorities rule and this coalition may anger or may not anger some Canadians.

experience never to be managed within a certain time-frame. I will forever grieve the loss of my mother.


If you get a minute in your busy day, have a listen to Ave Maria because a joy like that song can lift your spirits and make you feel better during these extraordinary times.

Good for You and Your Money!

Eating well is vital to our health but the cost of food can add up quickly! With a little planning, you can incorporate a variety of nutrient dense food, reduce food waste, and save money! Below are a few steps to help you get started.

Step #1. Make a plan. Plans help to reduce decision fatigue and offer a guideline to help you prepare for the meals ahead. When you have a plan, you will be less likely to spend money on fast food, convenience meals or other random grocery store items. If you're new to planning, start simple; using themes to help guide dinner plans offers an excellent starting point. For example:

Themed Dinners

Monday – Meatless Monday Tuesday – Breakfast for Dinner Wednesday – Wraps Thursday- Traditional/ Cultural Friday – Family Favourites

Step #2. Shop your pantry, refrigerator and **freezer.** Look at the foods and ingredients you already have on hand and then look for recipes that use those foods and ingredients.

Step #3. Explore meatless options and "in season" produce. Legumes (beans, lentils, dried peas), eggs, tofu, peanut butter and canned fish offer great tasting protein at a good price! Vegetables and fruit are cheaper when they're in season.

Additional Tips!

- 1. Plan to use leftovers. Think about how you can use leftovers. If you're cooking roast chicken with rice and vegetables for Sunday night's supper, then make chicken sandwiches for Monday's lunch. On Tuesday, use the bones to make a chicken soup and add in any leftover vegetables and rice.
- **2. Make extras.** If ground beef is on sale, make two batches of lasagna instead of one. Serve one batch for dinner and freeze the other batch in meal-sized portions for another time.

"Do you call that freedom?"

Dear editor,

This letter is in regards to an editorial in last week's Weekender ("True freedom" March 25).

First of all, I sympathize with the people of Ukraine. They didn't ask for what they are dealing with.

But on another note.

I always thought we lived in a free country, up until COVID started two years ago.

We have a daughter and a son-in-law and a two-and-a-half-year-old granddaughter that live in New York City. I got to see my granddaughter when she was one week old, before COVID. The next time I got to see them was 13 months later. Can you imagine how much a child that age changes in that length of time? Luckily, we Face-timed often, but that's a far cry from actually seeing them in person.

To be really honest with you, I didn't want the vaccines, because I honestly didn't think it had been tested enough. People tell me, "You had a choice. You could take it or you could choose not to take it."

Well, I think different. If I wanted to see our kids the only way was to take the jab.

Do you call that freedom?

We drove to their place in February of this

year, for two weeks. When we crossed the border into the States, there were no questions asked, but when we drove back, it was a totally different story. We needed to provide proof of a negative COVID test, which cost us \$150 U.S. each (not sure where that money goes though, probably shared between Joe Biden and our illustrious leader), plus we needed proof of vaccinations or a 14-day quarantine, plus the ArriveCan app on our phones.

Then the guy hands me two COVID tests and says we've been randomly selected to take two COVID tests, that we had to do within 24 hours of crossing the border. This is where you call an 800 number and they put you in a virtual waiting room, which you could wait up to five and six hours, to do the test in front of a nurse.

If you call that freedom, I'm anxious to see what real freedom is like, but it won't happen anytime soon as long as our country is being run by a couple of corrupt idiots!

Walk 'N Roll project launched at two Englehart schools

ENGLEHART — Students and staff from two Englehart schools took part in a Winter Walk Day around the town recently as part of a larger project called Walk 'N Roll.

Walk 'N Roll is an Active School Travel Plan led by the Timiskaming Health Unit that has received an additional \$60,000 from the Ontario Active School Travel (OAST) Fund, said Active School Travel facilitator Elizabeth Morland.

The OAST fund is part of Green Communities Canada and made possible through financial support from the Government of Ontario.

The project has been in existence since 2019, but recently added Holy Family School and Englehart Public School to the project in 2021 that sees partnerships with police, school boards, municipalities

community groups in the South Temiskaming region.

The school program was officially launched when the two schools walked around Englehart in conjunction with Winter Walk Day on March 2.

Both schools were gifted with large Active School Travel banners that they happily displayed during their community walk.

Continued from 6 hart Public School principal Sheila Siermachesky as her students headed off for their walk around town.

The Walk 'N Roll project works with school staff, students, families and regional stakeholders to encourage active lifestyles and also to re-

move any barriers that may exist in communities that would discourage active travel.

The goals of the project are to increase the number of students using active methods of transportation to and from school, which could include riding a bike or walking to school, and also to decrease

traffic congestion around schools and enhance safety overall

The program places emphasis on working with schools to host events like Winter Walk Day and to provide skillbuilding opportunities via bike to healthier students, safer safety skills training.

Morland says she has spoken

to the Town of Englehart about designating a school zone with decreased speed limits around Holy Family and Englehart Public as well as nearby Englehart High.

"Active school travel leads school zones and more connected communities," said Englehart council member Jillian Plaunt in a press release.

"It takes a community working together to make active travel the easy and safe choice and through this project the people of Englehart are showing how much they care about the wellbeing of their children and youth."

Hilliardton Marsh hosts bird banding and snowshoe event

HILLIARD TOWNSHIP -The Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre held a soft opening bird banding and snowshoe event at the Marsh on March 12.

The birds being banded during the event were common red polls, but don't let the name fool you.

Common red polls are small finches of the far north that tend to stray south during the winter months when food sources such as conifer seeds are scarcer further north.

"We were walking the trails the other day and it was windy and we saw the seeds from the trees all over the ground, so this is what the finches are feeding on here in this region,"

said HMREC lead bird bander Bruce Murphy.

He says they are seeing healthy numbers of common red polls at the marsh because food sources are available here for them.

Common red polls have brown streaked flanks, a red cap and black face surrounding a tiny yellow bill.

They have pouches in their throats to store extra food for later use.

Visitors to the marsh had a chance to watch birds being banded and they could snowshoe around the trails at the marsh and even hold a bird in their hands before it was released.

The birds are captured in feeder traps, put into cloth bags to calm them down and then brought into the birdhouse office for banding.

Their age, sex, health and other important data are collected and then a tiny metal band is placed on the leg of the bird. They are then released back into the wild.

Marsh hosts bird banding

"We have banded roughly 250 red polls this year," said Marsh program developer and assistant bander Emma Gignac.

She has completed a Masters degree in Environmental Anthropology at the University of Ottawa studying wetland environments.

"Starting at the marsh has been fantastic. It is a beautiful and warm work environment," said Gignac in an email interview.

"I am passionate about environmental education and believe that the path to a cleaner and healthier planet will be through collective action and empathic learning. The marsh is an excellent place for children and families to have fun learning about the importance of wetlands."

She began working at the marsh in January and is contracted for 2022.

"When identifying this tiny bird the main characteristics to look for are its rosy cap and white and brown streaked plumage. Although plumage varies a lot with this species, you may find one with orange caps or other contested species of the frostier Hoary redpoll. They reside primarily in the Arctic."

She mentioned she doesn't believe there is an irruption of the birds in our region.

"If there are more redpolls around your feeders it may indicate there was less food available for them in the Arctic."

These tiny birds can survive below freezing temperatures and their migration patterns remain somewhat of a mystery to researchers.

"Additionally, the data we collect can help researchers learn more about the various common redpoll subspecies. One of the redpolls we banded was once recaptured in Alaska."

A study from Alaska found common redpolls could survive -65 Fahrenheit (about -54 C), which makes these tiny birds anything but common.



Barbecue Safety Grilled to Perfection Every Time!

USE BBQS OUTDOORS ONLY! They produce carbon monoxide, a poisonous gas that can lead to unconsciousness and even death. Never use or store propane cylinders inside any structure, including garages.

Take these steps when starting a BBQ:

- Open the hood.
- Turn on the gas release valve on the tank.
- Turn on the grill controls or heat settings.
- Take a step back.
- · Push the igniter button.
- If there is no igniter button, insert a long match or BBQ lighter through the side burner hole first, then turn on the heat control knob
- If the burner does not ignite right away, turn the gas off and wait five minutes, keeping the hood open, before repeating the procedure.

At the start of the BBQ season, do this THREE-STEP SAFETY CHECK of your BBQ:

- **CLEAN** Use a pipe cleaner or wire to ensure burner ports are free of rust, dirt, spider webs or
- **CHECK** Examine the hose leading from the tank to the burners. Replace it if cracked or damaged.
- **TEST** Find leaks by applying a 50/50 solution of water and dish soap to propane cylinder connections and hoses. If bubbles appear, tighten the connection and/or replace the damaged parts and retest.

Stay Fire Safe!

Make sure grease does not build up on the burners or at the base of the BBQ. This could cause a grease fire

Never throw water on a grease fire – this will only spread the flame.

DO NOT place the BBQ close to wooden fences or walls, vinyl siding, or anything that can burn. The area behind your BBQ must be free of anything that can ignite – this is where hot gases escape.

Keep loose clothing away from a hot BBQ.

Keep children and pets at least one metre (three feet) away from a hot BBQ

When finished barbecuing, turn the gas valve off first, then turn off the burner controls so no gas is left in the connecting hose.

Allow the BBQ to cool completely before closing the cover.

If you live in an apartment or condo building, check with the building owner or property manager, or the Condominium Act of your building, regarding the use of BBQs on your building's balconies.




