A COVID-19 fish tale

TAFIP rebounding after two tough seasons

TEMAGAMI – Who would have thought a global pandemic could hamper local fish fans' efforts to bolster walleye numbers?

But COVID-19's side-effects – from social distancing to equipment shortages – have impacted the work of the Temagami and Area Fish Involvement Program (TAFIP) over the past two years.

However, TAFIP president lke Laba is hopeful that operations can return to near normal this spring.

TAFIP helps support the walleye population – and the associated recreational fishery and tourism sector – in Temagami.

Fishing has always been a significant part of the Temagami economy.

Given pandemic-related travel restrictions, Laba said more people were staying closer to home.

Based on reports from local lodges and number of boats and trailers spotted, he estimated that fishing pressure in the Temagami area doubled

In a normal year, TAFIP volunteers live-trap spawning walleye each spring, collecting up to one million eggs from Net Creek and 500,000 from Lake Temagami.

The eggs are fertilized and transported to the TAFIP hatchery in downtown Temagami.

Upon hatching, most of the tiny fish – known as fry – are released into the watersheds their parents came from.

But some of the fry are retained and transported to two rearing ponds, where they grow into fingerlings, so-called because they're about the length of a finger.

Later in the summer, volunteers round them up and then release them into strategic areas of designated lakes.

The larger the fish, the better its chance of reaching adulthood.

Throughout the process – from netting to running the hatchery to collecting the fingerlings for release – volunteers "are working in pretty close quarters," said Laba.

Due to COVID restrictions and the need for social distancing, volunteers couldn't collect eggs or run the hatchery in 2020.

They did clean some shoals where walleye spawn, completed repairs to rearing ponds and a water holding area, and made improvements to the hatchery inside and out.

> Last year, they were able to resume egg collection, hatchery operation and restocking, with pandemic precautions in place.

However, he said the weather posed its own challenges.


Wide temperature fluctuations meant there was still ice on the lakes when early April temperatures

In some areas, volunteers were unable to reach the fish and collect eggs before they spawned.

Low water levels made it difficult for volunteers to reach some water bodies.

However, Laba said they were helped by Indigenous fishers on Lake Temagami. Volunteers were able to collect unfertilized eggs and milt - walleye sperm - from the netted fish prior to the fish being harvested.

But given the weather conditions, he said they were able to collect only a fraction of the eggs they normally would - an estimated 225,000 from Net Creek and 50,000 from Lake Temagami.

Most of the fry that hatched were distributed to Lake Temagami and Cassells, Rabbit, Snake and Net lakes.

About 15,000 were kept and placed in rearing ponds to grow into fingerlings prior to release.

But that process too was complicated by the weather.

Heavy rainfall forced volunteers to first pump water out in order to round up the fish.

What normally takes a week and a half took about three weeks, he said.

In the end, about 1,600 fingerlings were collected for release.

Meanwhile, about \$1,800 of the program's equipment including heavy steel trap net anchors, marker buoys, rope and lumber slated for dock construction – went missing.

But a donation from TC Energy offset the losses.

Through its Build Strong program, the corporation gave TAFIP \$10,000.

Addictions services boosted in Timmins

TIMMINS (Special/Staff) – The region, including Temiskaming, is expected to benefit from funding for more addictions services in Timmins.

On March 17, the province announced almost \$2.3 million from a new Addictions Recovery Fund for 15 new addictions treatment beds, to be added to Timmins and District Hospital and the Jubilee Centre.

The hospital serves residents in Timmins as well as the districts of Cochrane, Timiskaming, Sudbury and Algoma.

The funding will provide two new addictions treatment beds, two new supportive treatment beds and three new withdrawal management beds at the hospital.

The province said it's also adding more than \$880,000 in the hospital's base funding to provide seven additional withdrawal management beds.

The Jubilee Centre in Timmins offers a variety of treatment services, including a residential program, for individuals with substance abuse and concurrent disorders, including mood and anxiety disorders.

The new funding will enable it to add eight new addictions treatment beds.

In a news release, the province pointed to studies showing that opioid-related deaths surged by 79 per cent during the first two waves of the pandemic, with rates three times higher in Northern Ontario.

It said the Addictions Recovery Fund will support almost 400 new addictions treatment beds across the province, helping to stabilize and provide care for about 7,000 clients per year.

The funding was welcomed by both the hospital and the centre.

"We need to continue to build a system in response to the urgency of the current opioid poisoning crisis in our community," said Dr. Louisa Marion-Bellemare, physician-addictions co-lead at the hospital, in the release.

"We need to provide immediate medical care when people request it and we have to ensure we have the capacity to do so," Marion-Bellemare continued.

She said services must be provided along the full continuum of care – from acute through transitional, residential and day care, to day and evening programming – "for as long as people need them."

"We need to save lives and this investment by the province is another step in the right direction."

"The arrival of the COVID-19 and opioid pandemics revealed a mental health and addictions system struggling to meet the surge in demand for services and desperately in need of new funding," said Harry Jones, the Jubilee Centre's executive director.

"The infusion of this new funding will increase bed capacity and help decrease wait times for individuals in desperate need of bed-based mental health and addictions treatment," Jones said.

"It will also decrease the mounting strain on hospital-based services and improve referral pathways between harm reduction, treatment, recovery and hospital-based addiction medicine.

"Most importantly, by improving both the quality and quantity of care at the organizational and systemic levels, people in need of services at the Jubilee Centre will have earlier access to a more robust and responsive mental health and addictions system with more options and overall improved client experience."

Irritable Bowel Syndrome (IBS) Awareness

FAST FACTS:

- 13-20% of Canadians (approximately 5 7.5 million individuals) are living with IBS
- it is more common in women, but still affects many men
- · people of all ages have IBS, from young children to the elderly
- · the primary symptoms are what are commonly referred to as the ABCDs of IBS – Abdominal pain, Bloating, and Constipation and/ or Diarrhea
- symptoms can come and go, so you might feel well for a while only to get symptoms again

Although each person has a unique IBS experience, this condition can significantly decrease a person's quality of life. Interestingly, only about 40% of people with IBS symptoms will seek help from a health care provider.

DIETARY AND LIFESTYLE MODIFICATIONS

The bowel responds to how and when a person eats, so it is important to eat regular, well-balanced, moderately sized meals rather than erratic, variable meals.

Some people find that dietary fats and the food additive monosodium glutamate (MSG) trigger symptoms. Some find symptoms worsen when consuming large quantities of liquids with meals. Others find that cooking vegetables and fruits lessens IBS symptoms, compared to when eating them raw. People with IBS might need to avoid or decrease consumption of caffeine, nicotine, and alcohol, particularly if the main symptom is diarrhea.

An important step in controlling the symptoms of IBS is to increase dietary fibre. Gradually increase your dietary fibre intake, allowing your body to adjust to the change, but make sure to increase the amount of water you drink as well.

It is important to note that for some IBS patients, a diet excessively high in bran fibre might trigger more frequent diarrhea, while other types of fibre could still be helpful. Consult your primary care provider or dietitian if you have any questions regarding fibre in your

The program supports non-profits, registered charities, associations, municipalities, social enterprises, Indigenous groups and foundations with a variety of projects, explained TC Canada

representative Herb Shields in a media release.

They range from equipping first responders and environmental stewards with the resources they need, to improving access to education, protecting and enhancing the environment, and alleviating poverty.

TAFIP used the donation to replace and repair equipment, purchase supplies, and buy a steel container to provide secure storage.

The support will go a long way to helping the hatchery, said Laba.

TAFIP was also supported by the Community Hatchery Program, a partnership between the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters and the province, with \$3,000 for capital expenses and \$2,500 for operations.

The Temagami Community Foundation donated another \$6,000.

"We do get a lot of support from local businesses and private individuals," Laba added.

Thanks to the help, it was able to upgrade the access road from the Sherman rearing pond to the Sherman water holding pond.

TAFIP had also hoped to reconstruct the rearing pond in late 2021, but high demand for heavy equipment postponed the project until this

Laba is now watching as pandemic restrictions continue to lift - when it comes to walleye, egg collection season is quickly approach-

Why do you need your COVID-19 booster dose?

The highly transmissible Omicron variant is the dominant strain of COVID-19 in Ontario and in our communities.

Omicron est le variant le plus transmissible et la souche dominante de la COVID-19 en Ontario et dans nos communautés.

Vaccines are effective at protecting you against severe illness, hospitalization, and death related to COVID-19. However, effectiveness decreases over time and two doses is not enough.


