Couple hopes oak tree idea will take root


TEMISKAMING SHORES - Ron and Anne Bailey are happy with the success of their project so far, which is to ensure the future of the white oak tree in the

By September 19 they had distributed 29,000 hand-sorted acorns in packages of 25 to area schools with the hope that students will plant them. It will take about 40 years for the trees to mature and they could live up to 600 years, says Mr. Bailey.

The New Liskeard couple accumulated the acorns from the Murray Street area of New Liskeard where they were originally planted by Rebecca Beavis around 1891 when she came to New Liskeard from England as one of the area's first pioneers. Bailey related that when she arrived, she saw that there were no oak trees in the area and, on a return trip to England, she collected some acorns and brought them back. Today, there are several oak trees from that original collection which Beavis planted, mainly in the Wabi River area but also in other places around New Liskeard.

Now, over a century later, the Baileys are observing that the trees are gradually being cut down, and they would like to get area students involved in properly planting acorns so that a new generation will be established.

The couple was recently on vacation in the Niagara Falls area, Bailey related, and were talking to someone in that area who collects acorns to sell.

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"The idea germinated. I really deplore the loss of these majestic trees," he said. "I thought, 'what an opportunity."

The couple is hoping the schools will approve the project and get the students to help spread the acorns throughout the area. With the changing climate, they might even now grow as far north as Englehart, Mrs. Bailey suggested.

Mr. Bailey explained that to plant an oak tree, you place an acorn "about an inch deep and hopefully a squirrel won't find it."

"It can be planted in a milk carton if you want to get all carried away. The best thing is to dig a hole about a foot deep and put some really good soil in it." A good garden-type soil would work, he said. Then, "plant the acorn with the pointy end down."

Hopefully, each student will be receiving a baggie with 25 acorns and where they end up will be determined by the students and their families.

The couple have been checking the acorns to make sure they are whole and not cracked and placing them in small baggies for distribution. They considered using biodegradable baggies for the project, but the cost was prohibitive. They are encouraging the students to save the plastic baggies for reuse.

Schools from throughout the district, from Englehart to Cobalt, now have acorns to plant this fall, and in 40 years a new generation of white oak could be part of a second stage of the area's history.

The Baileys' daughter, Jennifer Bailey, a science teacher at Timiskaming District Secondary School, has also been assisting in getting the project to take root in the area.







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EDITORIAL

Enduring democracy

As Queen Elizabeth was laid to rest this week it might be a time to reflect on the importance of democracy.

The Queen was a stalwart of democracy as the head of state of over 50 democratically run Commonwealth countries.

Democracy's core principles are steadily declining around the world as fragile governments and endemic corruption take place.

The most dramatic example of this was the storming of the United States Capital in Washington, D.C. in January of 2021.

The troubling issues in the non-democratic movement include white supremacist ideologies, conspiracy theories and climate change denial.

With democracy under attack in the Ukraine from the Russian invasion, it shows us how fortunate we are to live in a democratic country like Canada.

Northern ag returning to Royal

STURGEON FALLS (Special/Staff) - Northern Ontario will be back later this year at what's billed as the world's largest indoor agricultural fair and equestrian show.

After moving online in 2020 and 2021, the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair is to resume in person in Toronto for ten days in November.

Returning too will be the Northern Ontario Agri-Food Pavilion.

It will house up to 55 agri-food producers and organizations from across the region, introducing their wares to an estimated 300,000 fairgoers.

FedNor has announced \$247,321 to support the Northern Ontario pavilion. That brings total federal support for the 2022 event to just under

"Northern Ontario's agri-food sector is a key pillar of growth for our region's economy and residents," said Patty Hajdu, minister responsible for FedNor, in an announcement of the funding.

The latest funding will help local growers and producers "showcase their unique products and expand their markets," she said.

The Northern Ontario pavilion typically includes a couple of producers from Temiskaming. Local 4-H members often make a trip to the Royal to compete, and Thornloe Cheese has also scored wins in dairy product competitions.

FedNor has been participating in the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair since 2000.

Its funding is being provided through the Regional Economic Growth through Innovation program, enabling Economic Partners Sudbury East– West Nipissing Inc., a Community Futures Development Corporation, to support Northern Ontario's presence at the Royal.

The Royal runs November 4 through 13 at Exhibition Place. This year marks the 100th anniversary of the first Royal in 1922.

City sets park rules

TEMISKAMING SHORES – City parks are officially closed between 11 p.m. and 5 a.m.

Closure hours are included in a new Temiskaming Shores bylaw approved September 6 that governs general park use.

It covers all designated public parkland and associated parking areas in the municipality.

The city did have a bylaw prohibiting overnight parking, but it now has the authority to tell the public that overnight stays are also not

permitted, explained recreation director Matt Bahm.

Anyone found in the parks between those hours without city approval will be considered to be trespassing. (Bucke Park campground is exempt.)

The bylaw also prohibits the removal, damaging, or defacing of items within parks, including trees, benches and signs, bridges and fencing.

Anyone suspected of having violated the bylaw may be ordered off all city parkland for a period of 24 hours.

Quilt of Valour presented to military veteran

COBALT - A 40-year military veteran recently received a quilt from the Quilts of Valour program.

Jean Gauthier of Fabre, Quebec, who does volunteer work at the Bunker Military Museum in Cobalt, and also is the director of La Maison du Frère-Moffet in Ville-Marie, was presented with a quilt by local presenter Marg Harrison of Cobalt August 25.

The quilt was constructed by the late Bev Maille.

Gauthier retired from the military in 2016 with the rank of Master Warrant Officer.

Gauthier outlined in a telephone interview that his first posting was in Kingston, Ontario, and then he spent just under three years in Petawawa with the special service force. He then returned to Kingston for seven years, and for six of those years he was an electronics instructor. In 1989 he left for Germany where he spent five years in charge of telecommunications at an airport. From 2008 to 2012 he was with an AWACS (Airborne Warning and Control System Aircraft) which is a 727 airliner with a six-ton radar system on the roof. During that time he also was in Afghanistan.

Gauthier returned to Canada and spent ten years working in the underground complex in North Bay. He was in Ottawa and Gatineau for the last four years of his service, and

worked for the North Warning System. He explained that Canada has 36 radars "watching for approaching bombers or missiles from Russia. While in North Bay, the ten years I was there, we were on the receiving end of all the information those radars provided. When I went to Gatineau I was in charge of the quality control, watching over the contractor that did the maintenance for those radars."

Gauthier's children Jean-Daniel and Marie-Eve Gauthier were surprise guests at the event which was hosted at Harrison's home in Cobalt.

The Quilts of Valour program is a Canada-wide initiative to provide comfort to Canadian Armed Forces veterans and Harrison is a local presenter.

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
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THE BIG FIRE OF 1922

Pilot project helps close digital divide

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special/Staff) – Affordability, availability and assistance are preventing some people in Temiskaming from crossing the digital divide.

But a two-year project has helped bridge the online information and communications gap by providing devices and internet access to assist an estimated 750-plus residents.

Closing the Digital Divide, which is now wrapping up, grew out of local discussions in the early days of the pandemic on how to ease disparities in health and well-being.

Those gaps became even more evident as in-person services closed and education, health services, work, applications for financial support, and even social exchanges moved online.

The project was launched in October 2020 as one way to address the inequity between those who have access to information and communications technology, and those who don't.

The pilot project provided about 400 people with devices - laptops, tablets and smartphones – and/or data packages.

Taking into account their household members, project coordinators estimate that more than 750 people benefit-

The project was launched with a target clientele in mind - older adults and those in financial hardship.

In the end, 83 per cent of the individuals participating in the project earned \$25,000 or less. Forty-seven per cent of participants were aged 50 and

In a media release, the Timiskaming Health Unit said several factors leave some people in the district on the wrong side of the digital div-

An evaluation of the project identified as barriers the high cost of technology and online access, limited internet connectivity in rural areas, and the

need for better digital literacy.

"The top two facilitators to digital inclusion beyond the duration of the project were affordable quality internet services at home and public places with free Wi-Fi," it concluded.

SUPPORT

The first phase of the project was funded by \$120,000 from the United Way and Temiskaming's social services administration board.

More than \$200,000 was subsequently provided.

Supporters included The Temiskaming Foundation, the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing's Social Services Relief Fund, the Canadian Mental Health Association, the health unit and Telus.

The second infusion of funding enabled the extension of the program and the hiring of staff to continue work on the issue, said Lorna Desmarais, public health promoter with the health unit, in an email.

"While the COVID-19 pandemic exposed many issues in our communities, it also opened the door to collaboration across organizations and across sectors," said Kerry Schubert-Mackey, the health unit's director of strategic services and health promotion, in the release.

"The creativity and commitment of project partners are what made this project possible."

MINI GRANTS

As the project winds down, individuals who received devices can keep them. They'll have to cover any monthly fees for data or take advantage of local spots providing free Wi-Fi.

The program had some funding left over. Nine organizations have received \$5,000 grants for a variety of projects helping residents access internet services and learn the digital skills they need.

- The Temiskaming Shores library purchased five additional portable Wi-Fi devices with unlimited data plans, which are available for borrowing.
- The Pavilion Women's Centre created a safe community connection outreach space where women can access activities, devices, support and technology.
- Employment Options purchased six new laptops and software to expand its Youth Job Connection Program.
- The Centre d'éducation des adults in New Liskeard provided free classes in basic literacy and cybersecurity for francophones.
- The Armstrong Township library purchased an interactive display and ran drop-in sessions to help seniors and others access technology safely.
- Timiskaming Child Care added six tablets equipped with educational apps to its toy lending libraries across the district.
- The Canadian Mental Health Association purchased 15 cellphones, two tablets and 50 data cards for clients.
- The Englehart Public Library bought five new all-in-one computers for educational use by community members and home-schooling families.
- Matachewan First Nation purchased 10 mobile hotspots to increase Wi-Fi access and also offered cybersecurity programs for seniors.

Protect Against the Flu

Getting a flu vaccine is more important than ever this year to protect yourself, your family, and your community from flu.

What is the Difference between the Flu and COVID-19? Influenza (Flu) and COVID are both contagious respiratory illnesses, but they are caused by different viruses. COVID is caused by infection with a coronavirus and flu is caused by infection with influenza viruses. From what is known, COVID spreads more easily than the flu.

Both COVID-19 and the flu can have varying degrees of signs and symptoms, ranging from no symptoms (asymptomatic) to severe symptoms. Common symptoms that COVID-19 and flu share include:

- · Fever or feeling feverish/chills
- Coua
- · Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue (tiredness)
- · Sore throat
- · Runny or stuffy nose
- · Muscle pain or body aches
- · Headache
- Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults

Because many of the symptoms of flu and COVID are similar, it may be hard to tell the difference between them based on symptoms alone, and testing may be needed to help confirm a diagnosis.

Tips to Avoid Getting and Spreading the Flu and COVID-19:

- · Wash your hands often
- · Cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze
- · Don't touch your face
- Stay at home when you're sick
- Wear a mask when unable to maintain a 6-foot distance from anyone outside your bubble
- · Clean (and disinfect) surfaces and shared items

Flu shot clinic dates will be held in various locations throughout the District of Temiskaming – watch for details from the Timiskaming Health Unit. When flu vaccine is available for Temagami FHT patients, appointments will be scheduled so please call the office at (705) 569-3244 to get your name on the list. It is safe for individuals to get both a COVID booster and flu shot at the same time so feel free to enquire about both when you call.

Key Information to Municipal Electors Regarding the 2022 Municipal Elections

Who Can Vote?

A person is entitled to vote in a municipal election if he or she on Voting Day,

- resides in the local municipality, or is the owner or tenant of land in the municipality, or the spouse of such owner or tenant; and
- is a Canadian citizen,
- is at least 18 years old, and
- is not prohibited from voting under the Municipal Elections Act, 1996 or otherwise prohibited by law

Who Cannot Vote?

The following cannot vote:

- a person who is serving a sentence of imprisonment in penal or correctional
- a corporation;
- a person acting as executor or trustee or in any other representative capacity. except as a voting proxy in a traditional election;
- a person who was convicted of the corrupt practice described in subsection 90 (3), if voting in the current election is less than five years after Voting Day in the election in respect of which her or she was convicted.

Are You on the Voters' List?

The List of eligible voters for the upcoming municipal election has been prepared by the Returning Officer/Clerk of your municipality. We all play a role in ensuring a fair electoral system, and it is the responsibility of every elector to make sure their information is up-to-date and accurately reflected for electoral purposes. - confirm or update their electoral information;
- add an elector name to an address;
- change school support;

Electors will be notified of their voting locations and advanced voting dates in early October.

CO_2 is a gas that is produced when people exhale. As more people remain in a room, CO_2 levels increase quickly if there is not enough fresh air coming into the space. High indoor CO_2 levels can cause tiredness, headaches and other symptoms, and indicate that a space is not well ventilated. High CO_2 levels can also facilitate the spread of airborne infections. The devices are not CO (Carbon Monoxide) detectors and are not life safety devices. Contact the library to learn more!
