## Latchford candidates

 introduced at Chamber event

LATCHFORD - Ratepayers of Latchford had a chance to see their municipal election candidates up close and to hear what they had to say about their election platforms October 6.
The Temiskaming Shores and Area Chamber of Commerce (TSACC) Candidate's Night, was held at the Latchford Community Recreation Centre.
Latchford has two incumbent councillors running for mayor, Sharon Gadoury East and Francine Blowe.

The eight people running for six council seats are Christine Benn, Bryce Bigras, Joanne Cartner, Mike Cole, Peter Davies, Trudy McDonald, Bailey McDonald and Pam Newell.
TSACC moderator Gordon Brock outlined the format for the evening and paid tribute to longtime Latchford mayor George Lefebvre, who is retiring from municipal politics after the October 24 election.

## MAYORAL CANDIDATES

Speaking first in the mayoral candidate position, Gadoury East said she had moved to Latchford with her spouse in 2014.
Elected to council in March of 2017, she cited her experience on several council committees.
She was chairperson of the 100th anniversary of the town in 2017, organized community parades, took part in organizing recreational events and she is the treasurer of the Latchford House of Memories and the Latchford Legion Ladies Auxiliary. She has sat on the Temiskaming District Social Services Administration Board as the representative for Latchford and she volunteers for a local animal rescue group.
Her platform is to continue working on projects that the mayor and council have identified as important to the town such as developing a power generation facility at the Latchford dam, acquiring

## Friday, October 14, 2022 Weekender <br> Survey says parents concerned over road safety near schools

DISTRICT (Special) - A recent school zone safety survey indicates that 78 per cent of Ontario parents report having seen unsafe driving behaviours and only 37 per cent consider the roads around their child's school to be safe.

Some of the most common unsafe driving behaviours parents have witnessed include speeding, double parking and stopping at undesignated areas.
"We all have a role to play in keeping our school zones safe," says Tracy Marshall, manager of community relations at the Canadian Automobile Association (CAA) South Central Ontario. The survey was conducted on behalf of CAA South Central Ontario.
"These dangerous driving behaviours can lead to serious consequences and CAA is
urging motorists to slow down and follow the rules of the road when driving through school zones."
The survey also identified that more than half of parents in the province ( 66 per cent) support the use of Automated Speed Enforcement (ASE) in school zones, with 79 per cent believing its presence would deter speeding around schools. According to the survey, two in three parents consider that ASE should remain permanent in school zones.
"When you're behind the wheel, you have the responsibility to look out for everyone else around you, including parents, guardians and children," says Marshall.
"It's important to always watch out for Community Safety Zone signs as they indicate
areas where public safety is of special concern and drive with caution through school zones, residential areas and any other areas where children may be walking or playing."
Motorists should also keep an eye out for school buses that are now equipped with amber and red upper flashing lights. Under the new system, upper flashing amber lights will turn on as the bus slows down, indicating that drivers need to be cautious and slow down too. The amber-red system will hopefully provide more clarity when to stop, preventing illegal passings and dangerous sudden stops.
CAA reminds motorists that it is an offence to pass a stopped school bus with its red lights flashing and stop arm extended. Fines for a first offense range up

## EDITORIAL

## Acclamations: good or bad?

Voters in one third of Ontario municipalities, which are holding elections on October 24, won't be casting ballots for their heads of council.
That's because entire councils and mayoral or reeve positions have been acclaimed.
That means no one has contested those seats.
Many of those municipalities are found in the Temiskaming region.
According to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) a wave of acclamations have taken place that have swept away the election process in many communities.
Is this a good thing or a bad thing?
Do the acclamations indicate voter apathy or voter satisfaction?
The number of acclaimed mayors and councils is up by 16 per cent across the province from the last election held in 2018.
AMO says there are fewer candidates running in the 2022 election compared to 2018.
Certainly, we know the life of a municipal politician can be rife with long hours, low pay and harassment. Could this be the reason for a drop in candidates overall?
Being a member of a municipal council is not an easy task nor should it be. Municipal governance
is complex and requires a certain level of understanding and dedication.
Understanding the challenges of municipal governance is vitally important. In the largest community in South Temiskaming, which is Temiskaming Shores, there are races for all of the council seats.
But that is not the case in smaller municipalities in the region who perhaps have a lighter council load and have close communication with their ratepayers.
A pleasant trend in the province is the number of women running for councils.
AMO says the number of women candidates in the 2022 election is up from the 2018 election and they are pleased because they wish to see more visible minority groups and women helping to make important public policy for the citizens they represent.
No matter who is elected on October 24, the overriding issue is that residents and councils work together to build strong and vibrant communities.
And above all, that people get out and exercise their democratic right to vote.

## Home, sweet home

I had the opportunity recently to look at my life from a different perspective.

It has helped me to appreciate the good things I have in my life.
I have a car, a good job, a warm bed to sleep in, some fine family and friends and a canoe. I had to get the canoe in there (lol).

I was on a week's holiday visiting a friend in London, Ontario, last week.
Because London is called the Forest City and there are birds galore, I did some birding while I was there.

I was on the hunt to photograph a northern cardinal, the official bird of the City of London.
So I went to beautiful Gibbons Park, bordering the Thames River, and was successful in seeing several northern cardinals.

I wish we had more cardinals in our region.

Anyway, as I made my way down a path to the riverbank, I came upon a homeless man.

He was tending to a large open wound on his leg that extended from his kneecap to his ankle.

to the plight of the homeless.
We know there are homeless people in our communities. Thank goodness we have Zack's Crib, which is raising awareness about homelessness, but also doing something about it.

The Pavilion Women's Centre is also a port in the storm for those seeking shelter from the tempests of life.
The cost of living and the rise in housing prices are putting more people at risk of losing their homes.

Seniors, the disabled, the addicted and those dealing with mental illness are those experiencing homelessness.
We need more affordable housing units for seniors in our region. The topic has finally become an election issue as several municipal candidates have spoken about affordable housing for seniors.

According to Homes First,

older people have less support networks and are 60 per cent more likely than younger people to experience homelessness.

Perhaps a Temiskaming Homelessness Committee can be created to address the big picture of homelessness in our region in collaboration with Zack's Crib's efforts?

And Zack's Crib is still in need of major financial help to complete their shelter to help the most vulnerable in our region.

Washing the feet of the poor makes sense to me.

I do not take for granted the warm bed, the clothes on my back and the food on my plate.

Continued from Front page natural gas service and promoting the town to tourists.
"I will work more on cleaning up our town as residents have expressed. And yes, you are being heard."
She wants to hear from residents and to find out their concerns about life in Latchford and promises transparency and accountability in municipal governance.
"I would love to see this town grow and prosper."
Francine Blowe said she was born and raised in Cobalt but was a seasonal resident in Latchford before becoming a full time resident.
She was appointed to council in 2016 and has chaired recreational and economic development committees.
She said she volunteered at many community events and is the president of the Latchford Legion Ladies Auxiliary.
She is "committed to controlled spending as to the taxes and ensure any development at the dam will protect our water level and provide access to fishing and recreational traffic."
She feels the Montreal River Management Plan is important to the town in maintaining water levels and will work to establish open dialogue with the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry and Ontario Power Generation.
If elected, she will promote council's participation in an open and transparent manner, "while fostering teamwork. I will work to provide continued support to the Latchford Fire Department in finishing expansion of the fire hall."

She sees helping seniors as a priority and keeping them in their homes and will work towards promoting programs to assist seniors as vital to the community.
She would work towards creating a five-year strategic plan for Latchford and towards improving and implementing the town's asset management plan
She feels the Latchford industrial park is a hidden gem and she would try and attract business interests to the project to qualify for FedNor funding.
She says property standards and how the town looks is important to the image of the town and she feels it is important to update the town's website as "it is in dire need of upgrading."
She sees natural gas service as vitally important to the town and will work towards bringing that service to Latchford.

## COUNCIL CANDIDATES

Pam Newell introduced herself as a long time social service worker and a labour activist.
She has volunteered for the New Liskeard Fall Fair organizing committee.
She says the past two years
have put stress on people because of the COVID-19 pandemic and she was proud of the way the people of Latchford came together to support each other.
She acknowledges council will have to make tough decisions about spending tax dollars while attempting to create revenue.
She said council has to work together to come up with new ideas. She believes the industrial park is a good idea but also creating tiny homes could improve Latchford for all residents.
"We have to listen to each other."
She says the new council must work together as a team and set a goal to make life better for all residents. She says her long history as a social activist will help her in her council role.
Bailey McDonald grew up in Latchford and returned home after working away for a few years and said he is new to the environment of municipal governance.
He sees a bright future for himself as he was just hired locally by a refinery company in the region.

He admits he has no experience as a councillor but that

he is eager to learn and be an effective council member attempting to make Latchford a better place to live. He wants to show support for the public works department and the environmental plant employees. He is a Latchford firefighter also.
If elected, he looks forward to working with and learning from the town's staffers.
He wants to ensure natural
gas services come to Latchford and that the fire department has everything they need to be successful.
The promotion of the Latchford dam hydro generating station is an idea he supports and he believes in the concept of creating an industrial park for Latchford.
He says it is important to keep public parks maintained

## Temagami Family Health Team Submitted by Ellen Ibey Eye Damage and Diabetes

Many people living with diabetes have some form of eye damage or "diabetic retinopathy". Diabetic retinopathy can lead to vision changes or blindness.

## How diabetes affects the eyes

Having too much sugar in your blood can damage the blood vessels in the part of the eye called the retina. The retina is the tissue lining the back of the eye. High sugar levels cause the blood vessels to swell and leak into the retina and cause blurred vision or blind spots. If left untreated, new blood vessels may grow and cause further damage to your vision.

## When to get an eye exam

Once a year, unless your ophthalmologist or optometrist has suggested something different. Remember, you may not be aware of changes to your vision and many problems can be treated when caught early.

If you notice any of the following changes to your vision, see an eye doctor immediately:

- blurred vision
- flashes of light in the field of vision
- sudden loss of vision
- blotches or spots in vision

Reducing your risk of diabetic retinopathy
To prevent retinopathy or prevent it from getting worse, keep your blood sugar, blood pressure, and blood cholesterol within a healthy range
Follow the ABCDEs of staying healthy with diabetes to reduce the risk of eye damage:
A - A1C - Most people should aim for an A1C of $7 \%^{*}$ or less by managing blood sugars well. A1C is a blood test that is a measure of your average blood sugar level over the past 120 days.
B - Blood pressure - Control your blood pressure to less than 130/80* mmHg .
C - Cholesterol - The LDL (bad) cholesterol target is less than 2.0* mmol/L.
D - Drugs to protect your heart - Speak with your health-care team about medications.
E-Exercise \& Eating - Regular physical activity, healthy eating, and maintain a healthy body weight.
S - Screening for complications - Ask your health-care team about tests for your heart, feet, kidneys, and eyes.
S - Smoking cessation - Stop smoking and seek support for help with quitting.
S - Self management, stress, and other barriers - Set goals for yourself to reach the targets and live well with diabetes, such as managing stress effectively.

She has been on Latchford council for three terms and believes her experience as an incumbent is invaluable.

She says fiscal responsibility is high on her list of things to do and she is the type of person who gets all the facts before making decisions.

She says she brings integrity, accountability and the ability to listen to ratepayers to bring those concerns back to the council table.

Christine Benn says she fell in love with Latchford 15 years ago when her parents moved to town.
She sees the community as comprised of a strong group of individuals and she promises to listen to ratepayers and to take those concerns back to the council table for resolution.

He says he is actionorientated and wants to see growth and stability in Latchford with an eye to finding new funding opportunities to keep tax increases low.
He said it was important for residents to get out and vote.
Mike Cole is a current member of council and says he is an ideas man. He is employed at the Canadian Mental Health Association as a manager. He feels ideas are important but that council needs to scratch below the surface to flush out what is best for the residents. He wants to become more involved in the community to get a deeper understanding of the needs of the town and its residents.
He feels his experience in working with various government ministries, with budgets and people is a bonus to the town.
He wants to bring out the history of the town and identify the town's strengths and set a foundational plan for the town's future, if re-elected.
He was appointed seven months ago to the council table and feels the creation of an industrial park and tiny home projects must be fully vetted as to the needs of the residents.

He hopes to bring in grassroots policies that will attract people to the town.

## November deadline for child care centres to enrol in program

DISTRICT (Staff) - Four child care centres out of 16 in the district have enrolled so far in the Canada-Wide Early Learning Child Care (CWELCC) program.

In late March, the provincial and federal governments signed the Canada-Wide Early Learning and Child Care agreement to lower fees for parents and to provide more accessible and high-quality child care for Ontario families with children up to the age of five.

The District of Timiskaming Social Services Administrative Board (DTSSAB), which is the social service administrator in the district, is encouraging the remaining child care centres to
enrol in the program.
In a press release, DTSSAB stated that for the parents whose children are registered in the centres enrolled in the program, the result is reduced fees; there was a 25 per cent fee reduction to April 1, and there will be a 50 per cent reduction announcement in December, with the overarching goal to have a \$10-a-day child care, on average, by September 2025.
DTSSAB noted that in August of this year, the Ministry of Education released further specifications and extensions as they pertained to the CWELCC. These revisions included the deadline of November 1, 2022, for child care centres to enrol in
the program.
"We are encouraged to see the interest from the child care centres to participate in the CWELCC program. This will help alleviate some of the financial pressures that child care has on Ontarian families," said Lyne Labelle, children's services manager with DTSSAB. She added that DTSSAB's "children's services staff are actively support the child care providers in the enrolment process."

As the social service administrator in the district DTSSAB has the responsibility of determining eligibility for fee subsidies for parents and quality assurance of all child care centres.

## Prevention

 Week100 YEARS OF FIRE SAFETY 1922-2022

What to do if a fire breaks out lt's impossible to predict when a fire will break out. Here are a few steps to take if you ever find yourself in a fire.
-Head for the exit. Get away from the fire immediately. If you're at home, follow your evacuation plan. If you're in a public place, go to the nearest emergency exit and move away from the building. If it's safe to do so, activate the alarm system.
-Don't stop. Fires spread very quickly and can burn through an entire room in less than three minutes. Don't attempt to retrieve your belongings, and don't linger.
-Correct your route. If the room is full of smoke, get low to the ground and crawl under it. Inspect any doors before opening them. Start by checking to see if the door or door handle is hot. If it is, find another way in. If not, open the door slowly and ensure the space is safe before going inside. Never use the elevator.
-Think about your safety. If you can't reach an exit, stay where you are and close the doors. If possible, place a damp towel at the base of the door to block out smoke. Contact the fire department and announce your presence by waving a light or brightly coloured cloth through a window.
Fire prevention tools like smoke alarms, portable fire extinguishers and evacuation plans can minimize the danger when a fire breaks out. Make sure to follow the recommendations of your local fire department.

$\mathrm{CO}_{2}$ Sensor Lending Program Curious about the air quality in your indoor spaces? The library has a new $\mathrm{CO}_{2}$ Sensor lending program, thanks to a donation by Rise of three Aranet4 Home Air Quality monitors. $\mathrm{CO}_{2}$ is a gas that is produced when people exhale. As more people remain in a room, $\mathrm{CO}_{2}$ levels increase quickly if there is not enough fresh air coming into the space. High indoor $\mathrm{CO}_{2}$ levels can cause tiredness, headaches and other symptoms, and indicate that a space is not well ventilated. High $\mathrm{CO}_{2}$ levels can also facilitate the spread of airborne infections. The devices are not CO (Carbon Monoxide) detectors and are not life safety devices.
