# **Nurturing nature** and farming at **Kerns school**

KERNS - Kerns Public School, situated in the heart of Temiskaming farm country, is making the most of its connection to nature and to farming.

Teacher Joanne Goddard teaches Grades 4, 5, and 6 and has been with the school for ten years. She is also a member of the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre, where bird banding and research is carried out.

Recently she was at Riverside Farmers Market with a group of her students who were fundraising for projects, selling items such as Halloween goody bags and tulip bulbs for fall planting.

When she arrived at the school in 2012, she had just returned from an Ontario bird-banding conference where she heard worries being discussed about the decline of the snow bunting.

The school's location off Highway 65 West in Kerns Township is surrounded by farmers' fields, and it was an ideal place for snow bunting banding, said Goddard. She formed the Kerns Public School of Flock with student activities revolving around banding.

Over time School of Flock expanded to include hummingbird banding, and chickadee colour banding to help identify the populations and lifespans of the chickadees coming to the schoolyard.

The students also learned that the tree swallows are in decline, and they became involved in building tree swallow boxes and placing them along area highways as well as in the schoolyard.

Goddard explained that tree swallows are aerial insectivores and are dependent on the area's insect populations. Farming practices and a lack of habitat are affecting the insect populations, she explained.

Because most of the students at Kerns Public School are from farming families, the School of Flock began their own farming activities at the school and now have seven small gardens, the greatest of which is a pumpkin patch, said Goddard. A chicken coop has also been added.

"We have our own eggs and we do our own breakfast at the school," she said.

"A lot of these kids are farmers themselves so they bring a lot of knowledge. I didn't grow up as a farmer so they taught me a lot over the years."

She said of the School of Flock that "we're lucky we are in the country and we have lots of space and the

opportunity."

The connection with the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre has resulted in many of Goddard's students moving on to become Continued on 7


# **DID YOU GET The Speaker THIS WEEK?** Here are some November 2, 2022 stories...

# Haileybury filtration rehab on tap

TEMISKAMING SHORES – The bill to rehabilitate one of three filters at the Haileybury

water treatment plant will be more than \$360,000.

Temiskaming Shores council was recently nformed that the aging, deteriorating filter means the system must be backwashed more frequently.

In a report to council, environmental services manager Steve Burnett said traces of the material through which the water is filtered are also being found in an underdrain system and the clear well.

That's causing higher than normal turbidity, a measure of particulates in the water.

The city had budgeted \$300,000 for the refurbishment of one filter this year.

However, the lone sub-

mission – from Continental Carbon Group Inc. of Stoney Creek – tallied \$376,180.

Rising material costs were blamed for the higher than expected price.

Through negotiations, the cost was lowered to \$360,820.

To cover the shortfall, the city is reallocating \$100,000 from the Robert/Elm pumping station bypass project in New Liskeard, because part of that work will have to be done next year.

When the filter rehabilitation is complete, the system will run more efficiently, said Mayor Carman Kidd after council met October 4.

That still leaves two filters to be refurbished at the Haileybury plant.

The city is also looking at the installation of ultraviolet disinfection at the Haileybury sewage treatment, at a cost of some \$1.5 million, Kidd said.

"It's money, money, money," he said.




# **RELIEF RESUMPTION**

# Temporary lower water levels on the Montreal River

To protect workers during upcoming maintenance/repair work at Hound Chute Generating Station on the Montreal River, Ontario Power Generation (OPG) will be lowering water levels below the normal operating range. Workers will be making repairs to the station's Obermeyer weir.

The work is scheduled to take place on Nov. 8, 2022, but to avoid any sudden fluctuations, OPG will begin decreasing levels as early as Nov. 6, 2022. Water levels will safely return to seasonal elevation after the work is completed.

# Tips to Reduce the Spread of Respiratory Viruses

Everyone has a role to play to reduce the spread of respiratory viruses (such as COVID-19 and the flu). The actions you take will protect you, loved ones and those most vulnerable in your community.

We are expecting high volume pressures across our health system, now and through the winter. This is due to a combination of the usual circulating respiratory viruses, a more challenging RSV season, COVID-19 numbers that remain high, and the early arrival of the flu season. We are already seeing these impacts across the health care system, especially in our child and youth population.

# Tips to Prevent the Spread

We can layer our protection against respiratory viruses with some simple steps:

- Stay up-to-date with your vaccinations including a fall COVID-19 booster and flu vaccine, when eligible, for the best protection against getting very sick from COVID-19 and influenza.
- Even if you have had a recent COVID-19 infection, staying up-to-date with your vaccinations gives you stronger immunity.
- Socialize outdoors when possible outdoors is lower risk than indoors.
- Wear a high quality, well-fitting mask, especially indoors, and based on the setting and situation. Masks are strongly recommended in indoor public settings, and especially if you are around people who are at higher risk or have a health condition.
- Stay home if you are sick or have symptoms, even if they are mild.
- If you have symptoms, get tested for COVID-19 and treatment if you are
- Wash or sanitize your hands often.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with your elbow or a tissue.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces.
- Choose well ventilated spaces when possible.
- Reduce or limit the number of people you have close contact with, especially indoors and if you are around people who are at higher risk or have a health condition.
- Keep a physical distance when possible, especially indoors.

If you are experiencing mild respiratory symptoms and want the opinion of a health care provider, please call your primary care provider's office first before going to the Emergency Room. Same day/next day appointments are available at most clinics.

# Some drive while believing they are impaired: MADD

DISTRICT (Special) – Many Canadians drive after consuming alcohol, cannabis, and illicit drugs, medications (prescribed or not) or other substances for recreational purposes or to get high - even though they believe they are impaired.

That's according to MADD Canada's second National Survey On Driving After Alcohol, Cannabis, Or Drug Use.

These behaviours are elevated among young males aged 18-34.

The poll was conducted by Ipsos on behalf of MADD Canada. It asked Canadians, aged 18-70 with a valid driver's licence, about consumption of alcohol, cannabis, and illicit drugs, medication (prescribed or not) or other substances for recreational purposes or to get high, and whether they had driven while believing they were impaired by these substances.

"The survey results suggest the need for new and different education, awareness and outreach strategies to address misperceptions, to change impaired driving behaviours, and to reduce the rate of passengers who get into vehicles with drivers who have been drinking, consuming cannabis or other drugs," said Eric Dumschat, Legal Director for MADD Canada.

• Among the 67 per cent of drivers who used alcohol in the past 30 days, six per cent drove at least once in the past six months believing they were impaired, with just over a

third (35 per cent) driving with passengers.

- Among the 27 per cent of drivers who used cannabis in the past 30 days, seven per cent drove at least once in the past six months believing they were impaired, with a slight majority (56 per cent) driving with passengers.
- Among the 16 per cent of drivers who used an illicit drug, medication (prescribed or not) or other substance for recreational purposes or to get high in the past 30 days, seven

per cent drove at least once in the past six months believing they were impaired, with a vast majority of these (83 per cent) driving with passengers.

The survey results showed that young males, aged 18-34, are the most likely group to drive after alcohol, cannabis or drug consumption.

The number of Canadians expressing some level of indifference or expressing some misconceptions regarding impaired driving continues to be of great concern.

# Glass show reflects on fragility and strength

TEMISKAMING SHORES -Carmen Cantin creates a shining view into the world of nature with her glass exhibition titled Fragile Nature.

If you missed the array of delicate pieces that were recently on display at the Temiskaming Art Gallery in Haileybury, you can still see her works at Laura's Art Shoppe in Cobalt and at Open Studio Libre, or by contacting Cantin directly at her Notre-Dame-du-Nord home.

The Quebec artist has been building up her deep experience with glass since 1989, and her knowledge and love of the or the thickness of the pour. medium is extensive.

She can discuss the processes of glass art at length, but also acknowledges that at times, when working with the medium, it does things that seem almost magical.

Cantin's images are inspired by nature, and she approaches projects with her vast experience of how materials will respond. Sometimes she is surprised, she admits. Even what she knows will happen, she still regards with wonder.

Silver foil, for example, will appear silver in one piece, but gold in another, all influenced by factors such as the type of glass

Alchemy glass, when placed in an oven, comes out gold on one side and bronze on the other, she points out.

Cantin has also created a series of waving white wall pieces, each of which depicts an aspect of life around Lake Temiskaming. The white glass waves represent the waves of the lake, she explained.

"I tried to depict everything we can see around the lake, on the Ontario side and the Quebec side: the forest in the fall, the enchanted forest, the regatta, the sailboats from Haileybury, the pine trees, the tepees for the



# arbon Monoxide Awareness Week

# **Carbon Monoxide Alarm Tips**

## **Testing and Replacing**

- Landlords are responsible for installing and maintaining carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in their rental units
- · Landlords are required to test CO alarms in rental units annually and when the battery is replaced, changes are made to the electric circuit, or a change of tenancy occurs.
- It is against the law for tenants to remove the batteries or tamper with CO alarms in
- Test CO alarms every month by pressing the test button.
- Replace batteries every year.
- Replace CO alarms according to manufacturer's instructions.

# **Know the Sound of the CO Alarm:**

- Your CO alarm sounds different than your smoke alarm. Test both alarms monthly and make sure everyone in your home knows the difference between the two alarm sounds.
- Know the difference between the CO alarms' low-battery warning, end of life warning and an emergency alarm – consult the CO alarm manufacturer's instructions.

# What to do if the CO Alarm Sounds:

- Exposure to CO can cause flu-like symptoms such as headaches, nausea and dizziness, as well as confusion, drowsiness, loss of consciousness and death.
- If your CO alarm sounds, and you or other occupants suffer from symptoms of CO poisoning, get everyone out of the home immediately. Then call 9-1-1 or your local emergency services number from outside the building.
- If your CO alarm sounds, and no one is suffering from symptoms of CO poisoning, check to see if the battery needs replacing, or the alarm has reached its "end-of-life" before calling 9-1-1.

High CO<sub>2</sub> levels can also facilitate the spread of airborne infections such as COVID-19. The devices are not CO (Carbon Monoxide) detectors and are not life safety devices. 

Often her pieces are framed in aluminum or hung on shimmering bars created by her late husband Ghislain Lemire (founder of Temisko), who died in July of this year.

"He's the one who did all the metal work for me. He was a master in the art of soldering and finishing, very professional."

Cantin said that while he fought cancer, he would ask her to envision complex projects for him to work on so that he would not think about his illness.

is centred around an agate stone, and is titled *Hope*.

Cantin explained that when her husband was having chemotherapy there was a young woman that the couple knew who was also having the same kind of treatments. She expressed interest in watching as Cantin worked, so Cantin chose the large agate stone as the centre for the piece she would work on. The young woman again asked to return to watch the soldering process. After the first side was completed, she said she would come back to see the second side completed. She was confident as she left that she would be returning for another day, but she did not. She was full of hope, Cantin said, and she named the piece in memory of the young woman.

Cantin began learning the art in 1989 while living in Florida

A beautiful pale blue art work for the summer months, learning stained glass work and soldering from local studios. In 1992 she attended a glass convention in Florida and in 1993 decided to try fusion.

"Glass is my passion," she

"I love fusing because it's kind of magical. You can put some colours together and it turns into another colour. You can mix the powders of enamels and it comes out as something else."

Glass is very fragile, she said.

"I depict nature, and nature is also fragile, but it is a medium that can be so strong."

Everywhere you look you will find glass.

"You can transform it but you cannot destroy it because it is all over the planet."

She continued, "It will be there forever, so it is very strong, and at the same time it is very fragile because you can break it."
