EARLTON - Everyone from across the area, including municipalities, are being invited to attend Earlton's "Light 'Er Up" Santa Claus Parade Friday evening, November 25.

Maija Inglis and her husband Mike, who own and operate Inglis Farm Drainage Inc. which is organizing and sponsoring the event, have received the support of the municipality.

They are hoping other businesses will register in the parade, which they can do until Thursday, November 24, for an opportunity to win cash prizes.

She added that Inglis Farm Drainage Inc., with help from The Roaster, will also be supplying warm beverages and treats for spectators throughout the evening.

"The Coeur du Village will be setting up an exterior Christmas tree which will be lit the night of the parade. They have also allowed us the use of their parking lot, use of their hydro to power our speakers (borrowed from Mikey's Photography) and beverage dispensers," she added.

People are invited to bring non-perishable food items to the Coeur du Village where there will be a truck located to accept donations for the Englehart and Area Food Bank. There will also be food dropoff points at various locations throughout Earlton in the week leading up to the parade.

The Earlton Fire Department will be assisting with the parade by directing traffic across Highway 571 and leading the parade as well as bringing up the end with rescue vehicles.

KIRKLAND LAKE - Health leaders and advocates recently gathered at the Keepers Of The Circle Office in Kirkland Lake for an open house.

This two-part event was meant to showcase the newly renovated and completed Keepers Of The Circle office building and to host the official opening of the Mino M'Shki-ki Indigenous Health Team office on September 29.

"I am very happy and excited to see everyone who came to visit us today. This is the celebration of so much work by so many people over so many years," said Bertha Cormier, executive director of Keepers Of The Circle.

"Our founder, the late Ann Batisse, was a woman with a vision that started what we have today. What began as a one room office in 1997 with a handful of staff and volunteers has now become a nationally recognized Indigenous services hub that has helped and continues to assist so many people," she said.

Keepers Of The Circle is operated by the Temiskaming Native Women's Support Group (TNWSG). It provides numerous services including Family Services, Childcare Services and Employment and Training Services for Indigenous people and their families in the Temiskaming District.

This umbrella organization also provides health programming through Mino M'Shkiki in partnership with Beaverhouse First Nation, Matachewan First Nation and the Temiskaming Metis Community Council. Mino M'Shki-ki also includes an office location at the Temiskaming Hospital in Temiskaming Shores.

"We are all thankful to so many people that have made all this possible and we are grateful to everyone here today for joining us to celebrate the official opening of our Indigenous Health Team in Kirkland Lake," said Sue Alton, Mino M'Shkiki Health Director.

COLLABORATION

The opening of this new Indigenous health care office was made possible by the collaborative efforts of several organizations in the Temiskaming area. Mino M'shki-ki, a name selected by an Elders Council, translates as "good medicine."

Several presenters spoke to the gathering to give their thanks and messages of support including Carole McBride, President of the National Women's Association of Canada (NWAC) who represents Keepers Of The Circle at the national level.

"I am very proud of all the accomplishments everyone has achieved here over the years. It is very heart warming and satisfying to know of all of the people and families we have helped over the years through this organization," commented McBride.

The event was also led by Keepers Of The Circle board of directors Amanda Julien, Kara Boucher, Brianna Moore, Kelly McBride, Nancy Luna and Bertha Cormier.

Also in attendance was the Council of Wisdom Keepers who guide the organization. They include Elders Mario Batisse, Sally Susan Martel-Brown, Tom and Freda Wabie, Vina Hendrix, Liliane Ethier and Marilyn Chevrier-Wills.



EDITORIAL

Fundamental Rights

The "political action" by thousands of school-based CUPE union workers showed us a side of our government that might not be favourable.

Instead of taking time to fully negotiate with CUPE members who represent school custodians, education assistants, support staff, the government invoked Section 33 of the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms notwithstanding clause, aimed at taking away a group's right to strike.

Some 96 per cent of education workers voted to strike in response to the breakdown in negotiations between the union and the government.

Fortunately, the Ford government rescinded the act because of public pressure and the union and government are back at the bargaining table this week.

As we greet Remembrance Day this year, may we pause and thank our veterans for giving their lives for our present day freedoms.

And may we understand that taking away fundamental rights such as the right of unions to strike goes against everything our veterans fought and died for.

If basic human rights can be trampled upon by governments using the notwithstanding clause, our fundamental rights are gone.

We have a constitution in Canada that guarantees our right to freedom of association and belief, press freedom, freedom of speech and more.

Isn't it time to abolish the notwithstanding clause?

Governments that have a majority can get away with using the notwithstanding clause, but it was public opinion that they didn't count on in the end.

Lest we forget

comes out it will be Remembrance Day, November 11.

I'd like to talk about the Canadian women who played an important role during World War II, both at home and in uniform.

They gave up their sons, husbands, fathers and brothers to the war efforts, like my grandmother, who had five sons enlist in the Canadian Armed Forces.

When I wrote veterans stories for our Survivor Diaries-Stories from Temiskaming's World War II Heroes book published in 2015, I had no idea how many women veterans we had in the region.

I was sadly unaware of their heroics and it was quite astounding to hear their incredible wartime stories.

Too often the war hero narrative can be one-sided and fails to honour the women's experiences.

I thank each and every vet-

> I recall Englehart veteran Norma Elliott being shy at first to tell me her story, often undermining her own importance to the Royal Canadian Airforce Women's Division.

> She was fiercely proud of her uniform and donated it to the Englehart and District Historical Museum.

> She packed parachutes and repaired planes at just 19 years of age. How amazing is that?

The year was 1942.

How about New Liskeard's Sylvia Furnival, enlisting in the British Royal Navy at 17 as a member of the famous Women's Royal Naval Service (WREN).

She said war was horrible but if she had to do it all over again, she would.

"When someone threatens you as Hitler did, threatens your way of life, you have no choice but to fight," she said.

And then there was the feisty Florence Hulcoop, who was a transport truck driver

as a member of the Canadian Women's Army Corps.

Canadian women quickly earned a solid reputation for their mechanical skills and fine precision.

Let us not forget that Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, served as a truck driver and mechanic during the war years when she was 18.

How many stories did we miss because our women veterans didn't feel their stories were important enough to tell?

To forget, omit or downplay





Sorting the real reviews from the fake ones

GATINEAU (Staff/Special) -You're about to click the "Buy" button, but before you open your wallet, it's probably a good idea to read some online consumer reviews, right?

Online consumer reviews help both consumers and businesses - they provide a wealth of "unbiased" product information to help you shop smart, and they reward businesses that provide a great product or service.

But how would you feel if you knew that glowing review you just read was posted by an employee of the company or by a "reputation management" firm

that was hired to post it, and not by a real customer?

Consumer reviews often strike at the heart of a consumer's buying decision. Posting fake reviews online can damage that trust and seriously erode consumer confidence.

- Shop around: Just like you shopped for the right product or service, you should also consult several sources for independent, unbiased reviews.
- Go back in time: Be sure to look at reviews over a long period of time. This will help you to spot potential patterns like a spike in positive or negative re-

The meat is in the middle: Read the 2-, 3- and 4-star reviews too. Someone writing a fake review is more likely to assign a rating of 1 or 5 stars, meaning you're more likely to find balanced critique in the middle range.

• Diversify: Online reviews are just one way to assess a product or service. Branch out - ask trusted friends and family about their experiences. Consider asking the company for references.

If you believe you have come across fake online reviews, report them to the Competition Bureau of Canada.



More awareness needed regarding impact of diet

TORONTO (Staff/Special) - Cleveland Clinic Canada says that almost a quarter of Canadians are unaware of what diets are healthy.

Cleveland Clinic Canada, part of Cleveland Clinic's global health system, conducted a survey earlier in 2022 and found that 27 per cent of Canadians say they are either unable to identify a heart-healthy eating plan or they do not believe diet has anything to do with heart health. It was also concluded that 65 per cent of Canadians do not follow any specific diet plan.

Cleveland Clinic Canada reported that when presented with a list of ten diets from which Canadians could choose up to three options, the Mediterranean diet was most identified as among the most heart-healthy, with 32 per cent naming it, followed by a low-carbohydrate diet (27 per cent) and a vegetarian diet including eggs and dairy (25).

In contrast, only seven per cent of Canadians actually follow a Mediterranean diet, ten per cent a low-carbohydrate diet, and seven a vegetarian diet, with 65 per cent of all Canadians reporting that they do not follow any specific diet plan.

Also notable was a generation-related difference in perceptions of the Mediterranean diet, which was identified as among the most heart-healthy diets by 46 per cent of those ages 58 and above, whereas only 14 per cent of those aged 18 to 25, and 24 per cent of those aged 26 to 41, and 28 per cent of those aged 42 to 57 recognized it as such.

"The survey results indicate that more awareness is needed regarding the considerable impact that diet and other lifestyle habits can have on heart health. It is important that people realize that a large percentage of heart disease is preventable through a healthier diet, avoidance of weight gain, regular exercise, and not smoking. Given that heart disease is the second leading cause of death and a leading cause of hospitalization in Canada, this could have an enormous positive impact," said Anil Maheshwari, MD, Medical Director of the Weight and Lifestyle Management Program at Cleveland Clinic Canada.


