



Remembering loved ones during Christmas season

KIRKLAND LAKE – The holiday season may be synonymous with family and good times, but it can be especially difficult for anyone grieving the loss of a loved one.

In Temiskaming Shores, Englehart and Kirkland Lake, some illuminated trees serve as a reminder of family and friends who have passed away.

The Tree of Life is an initiative of Timiskaming Hospice Palliative Care.

It represents “connection, family, strength, growth and peace, and provides us with an opportunity to remember and reflect on those loves ones who are no longer with us,” said program coordinator Betty Smallwood.

Trees were illuminated in the Englehart Centennial Park November 18, in Kirkland Lake at the Canada Post office on November 23, and in the New Liskeard Cenotaph Park November 25.

In Englehart and Kirkland Lake, celebration of life services followed the lighting of the trees.

The tradition began in Kirkland Lake 30 years ago and quickly extended to Englehart and New Liskeard.

“It’s something that everyone looks forward to,” said Smallwood.

But the tree lighting is just one act of remembrance during the Christmas season.

Donations to the hospice palliative care program can be made in memory of a loved one. Their names are inscribed on scrolls that will be installed at post offices. They’re also written on images of festive light bulbs that are posted at hospitals in New Liskeard, Englehart and Kirkland Lake.

It’s a significant fundraiser for hospice palliative

care, Smallwood said.

The program was founded in Kirkland Lake in 1989 and expanded across the district.

Its mission is to help people facing a chronic disease or life-limiting condition.

While “palliative care” was once considered only in the weeks or days prior to death, it’s evolved to

be a source of support to people long before the end of life.

Fundraising offsets the cost of training and in some cases of travel for volunteers to remote locations, Smallwood said.

In its pre-pandemic days, the Timiskaming program offered volunteers who ran errands or

City to coordinate Northern mining showcase in '23

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) – The city will once again coordinate a showcase of Northern Ontario businesses and organizations at a mammoth convention for the mining industry.

The city will lead organization of the 2023 Northern Ontario Mining Showcase (NOMS) at the Prospectors and Developers Association of Canada's mineral exploration and mining convention in Toronto in March.

FedNor recently announced \$745,000 in support for the Northern Ontario pavilion.

It's expected to be a leading attraction at the 2023 convention, bringing under one roof

up to 110 Northern Ontario suppliers of products and services to the mining industry.

In a news release, FedNor projected the showcase will help participants increase sales and exports by more than \$10 million, while creating 75 high-quality jobs in Northern Ontario and maintaining 100 more.

"I'm proud the City of Temiskaming Shores will once again be leading the charge to ensure NOMS remains a major driving force behind jobs, growth and business success here at home and across Northern Ontario," said Mayor Jeff Laferriere in a statement.

"Thanks to FedNor's ongoing

support, the pavilion has grown in size and scope to help as many businesses as possible realize on benefits NOMS delivers in the form of new partnerships, increased exports and profitability."

Since its launch in 2015, NOMS is credited with helping to create more than 750 jobs and generate more than \$85 million in increased sales and exports.

Nipissing-Timiskaming MP Anthony Rota described the showcase as "a must-see for convention-goers looking to generate new business contacts, clients and sales.

"With results still coming in, last year alone this flagship

initiative helped participating businesses increase sales by more than \$8.5 million and create close to 80 new jobs in municipalities and Indigenous communities across our region," Rota said.

The convention typically attracts some 25,000 visitors from more than 130 countries.

The pandemic, however, forced its move to an online-only format in 2021. In 2022, its 90th edition ran online and in-person, with some 17,000 attendees in Toronto.

Plans call for the 2023 in-person convention to be held in March.

accompanied a client to a medical appointment, or simply provided a friendly listening ear.

Clients could still be living in their homes or in long-term care residences or the hospital. Volunteers also provided bereavement support to clients' families.

The pandemic, however, limited the program's work by curtailing in-person visits.

"COVID really set us back," she said.

"In the north end, we have about 12 volunteers that are still active, and they've just begun to go back into face-to-face visits."

In the south part of the district, she said new policies related to infection control have had to be developed before in-person visits can resume.

"We hope to do that soon," she said.

The initiative continues with donations for furnishings, she said.

Retrospective of George Cassidy work at gallery

HAILEYBURY - Some of the art works of the late George Cassidy (1909 to 1987) are now on display at the Temiskaming Art Gallery where they will remain until December 23.

Cassidy was well loved in the area, said Felicity Buckell who is the project coordinator for the exhibition.

When his work was last shown as a solo exhibition, he was present. The event had taken place at the former location

of the Temiskaming Art Gallery, at the former Haileybury Public Library.

"We thought it was time to celebrate his work again," said Temiskaming Art Gallery executive director/curator Melissa La Porte.

She noted that the Group of Seven has just celebrated its hundredth anniversary and "we strongly feel George Cassidy, had he decided to stay in Toronto, would have been included in that group."

Buckell told the gathering that

she found a written report by Cassidy about a 1934 excursion with Group of Seven member A.Y. Jackson in which they went painting together on a snowy March day in the Cobalt area.

“His work is comparable in quality,” said La Porte. “He really had a vision of Northern Ontario that was on par with what (the Group of Seven) did.”

The exhibition has been made possible through the Department of Canadian Heritage which provided a Museum Assistance Program grant to facilitate a project making public a part of Canadian heritage and Canadian history, said La Porte. Centre Culturel ARTem also assisted with financial aid, translation of materials, and moral support, she added.

Chris Oslund of the Haileybury Heritage Museum and Marg Harrison of the Bunker Military Museum in Cobalt also spoke about Cassidy’s life and contributions.

Cassidy attended the Ontario College of Art in Toronto for one year and then went on to

study to become a teacher, related Buckell. His first year of teaching was at the Cobalt High School in 1932. He joined the Algonquin Regiment and went overseas to Europe to fight in World War II. When he returned he taught at the Kirkland Lake High School for a year before being made principal of the Haileybury High School in 1950 where he remained for 21 years, retiring in 1971.

As an artist he worked mainly in tempera paint and sometimes in watercolours. He wrote two important books of area history well before there were many other historical documents for public consumption. They are Warpath and Arrow North. While overseas, he also kept an artist’s sketch book.

Buckell commented that everything Cassidy did was done with an additional level of quality. He was decorated for bravery for his war service. As an educator he wrote musicals for the students and painted the backdrops for the annual productions. His books of area history are considered important refer-

ences for the region. He was a loving father of six children.

Oslund noted that Cassidy’s work is “much sought after and

After the presentations, local musician Jamie Dupuis, recog-

nized internationally for his performances on a 20-string guitar, provided some musical entertainment.

Trumpeter swan in care at rehabilitation centre

COBALT - A young trumpeter swan rescued in North Cobalt Monday, November 21 is getting some care at Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary in Minden.

Mita Gibson, the new mayor of Cobalt, who has experience with bird rehabilitation, captured the swan in North Cobalt after her wife Jennifer Pereira spotted it walking across a lawn.

The swan appeared to have a broken right wing with missing flight feathers, she related in a telephone interview.

Gibson said she had to chase the swan to capture it and “thankfully we had a towel in the car.”

They took it home for the night, and during efforts to find a rehabilitation centre to take the swan, a connection was made with a lady travelling from Timmins to Barrie who in turn made contact with Critter Cabs Animal Rescue Transport of Ontario on Facebook, Gibson said. The lady picked up the young swan and took it to Gravenhurst, and from there it was taken on the last leg of its journey to Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary in Minden, Ontario.

On Saturday, November 26, Gibson received a message from Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary stating that the swan’s wing had been bandaged and antibiotics were being applied to a small wound on the joint.

Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary suspects the swan suffers from angel wing, which is a nutritional deficiency caused by a lack of vitamins and minerals, and also a high level of carbohydrates and sugars. One possible contributor to angel wing is the feeding of breadcrumbs to waterfowl. Woodlands Wildlife Sanctuary stated they are trying to strengthen the wing and set the bone. Mr. Mister, as the young trumpeter swan has been named, “is a sweetheart and a wonderful patient. Hopefully we will have some success,” Gibson shared from the message provided to her.

Gibson is familiar with handling birds and does rehabilitation of corvids such as ravens,

crows, bluejays and magpies, she related. A crow that was rehabilitated by the family still stays with them, she noted. She has also rehabilitated robins and blackbirds, she added. The larger birds, such as the trumpeter swan, are sent on to a rehabilitation centre.

This is the second swan Gibson has captured, however the swan she rescued a few years ago was close to a fence. “It was pretty easy,” said Gibson. This one was a little more challenging. “It’s my first out-in-the-open capture,” she said. “I did have to run it down.”

Gibson said while she was seeking a place to rehabilitate the swan, she had a discussion about the Cobalt area trumpeter swan population with the Wye Marsh Wildlife Centre which is closely connected with Trumpeter Swans of Ontario. As a result of that conversation, Gibson is having further discussions with Trumpeter Swans of Ontario about the possibility of an assessment and studies being carried out on the Cobalt area trumpeter swan population this spring, she related. “There’s quite a bit around here.”



Driving under the influence: effects, detection and consequences

system. Plus, they can take a breath sample to determine a motorist's blood alcohol level. Police may also issue a standardized field sobriety test (SFST), which typically requires the driver to walk in a straight line, stand and turn or stand on one leg.

CONSEQUENCES If you're caught driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol, you could have your licence suspended following your arrest, even before being convicted.

Once convicted, the severity of your sentence will depend on your background and the circumstances surrounding your arrest. For instance, you could receive a hefty fine and jail time if you injured or killed someone.



To avoid collisions and other serious consequences of getting behind the wheel while under the influence, make sure you drive responsibly.

Curious about the air quality in your indoor spaces? The library has a CO₂ Sensor lending program, thanks to a donation by Rise of three Aranet4 Home Air Quality monitors. CO₂ is a gas that is produced when people exhale. As more people remain in a room, CO₂ levels increase quickly if there is not enough fresh air coming into the space. High indoor CO₂ levels can cause tiredness, headaches and other symptoms, and indicate that a space is not well ventilated. High CO₂ levels can also facilitate the spread of airborne infections such as COVID-19. The devices are not CO (Carbon Monoxide) detectors and are not life safety devices. Gadget Helper

The library's gadget helper program provides one-on one help to people in learning to use their tablets, cellphones and laptops. 12 TIPS FOR HOLIDAY FIRE & CO SAFETY

<p>TIP #1 MONDAY DECEMBER 12</p>	<p>Use the proper lights when decorating and check for worn or damaged cords. You don't need to be Clark Griswold to shine bright with lights this holiday! Consider using LED lights and hang your outdoor-rated lights with nail-free clips. Cut your loss and toss damaged strings – an electrical fire is a sure bet for a lousy holiday.</p>
<p>TIP #2 TUESDAY DECEMBER 13</p>	<p>Keep decorations away from candles. Fires caused by holiday decorations and open flames from candles are all too common this season. Battery-operated candles are a great alternative, but if you must light up, put candles in sturdy containers and always blow out when you leave the room. Keep candles away from children, pets and anything that can burn.</p>
<p>TIP #3 WEDNESDAY DECEMBER 14</p>	<p>Install and test smoke alarms. 'Tis the season - literally! Fatal fires are at their highest rate during the holidays. When seconds matter, a working smoke alarm is the gift of time in the event of a fire. An alarm on every storey, tested monthly, and batteries replaced annually, is probably the best gift you can give your family this season.</p>
<p>TIP #4 THURSDAY DECEMBER 15</p>	<p>Install and test carbon monoxide alarms. Unlike gingerbread, carbon monoxide is odourless. Unlike your uncle's ugly Christmas sweater, it's invisible. Carbon monoxide (CO) is a deadly gas that can cause flu-like symptoms. A CO alarm alerts you to a potential CO emergency with four beeps and is the best way to protect your family from The Silent Killer.</p>
<p>TIP #5 FRIDAY DECEMBER 16</p>	<p>Water fresh trees daily. Falling needles are your tree's way of telling you it's drying out and is a fire waiting to happen. If you are decorating with a real tree, avoid being a statistic and water your tree daily. Be wary of heat sources near the tree including furnace vents and non-LED lights.</p>
<p>TIP #6 SATURDAY DECEMBER 17</p>	<p>Check extension cords for damage and use them properly. Getting wound up in the holiday spirit? Don't "overextend" your outlets! Extension cords are a temporary solution and if more outlets are required, have them installed by a licensed electrician. Fire and electric shock are not on anyone's list this season - avoid overloading a circuit and never run extension cords under a rug.</p>
<p>TIP #7 SUNDAY DECEMBER 18</p>	<p>Use candles with care. Consider using battery-operated flameless candles for your holiday decorating and celebrations. If your celebration requires the use of real candles, always keep an open flame away from anything that can burn including curtains, decorations, or paper. Keep lighters and matches away from children and douse any used matches before putting in the garbage.</p>
<p>TIP #8 MONDAY DECEMBER 19</p>	<p>Prepare and practise your escape plan with everyone in your home. Santa needs one way out of your home – you need two. Give your family the gift of peace of mind with a home fire escape plan and have two ways out of every room, if possible, to ensure your loved ones are prepared for the worst so you can focus on the best: festive cheer!</p>
<p>TIP #9 TUESDAY DECEMBER 20</p>	<p>Look while you cook. Holidays are stressful enough but when 17% of fires in Ontario are cooking-related, it's important to remember to slow things down in the kitchen. Fires caused by cooking mostly happen when the stove is left unattended so be mindful when cooking and never leave the kitchen while using a stovetop.</p>
<p>TIP #10 WEDNESDAY DECEMBER 21</p>	<p>Keep heating sources away from anything that can burn. Baby, it's cold outside! Staying warm this Winter Solstice means practising fire safety. Space heaters, wood stoves and fireplaces are all great ideas until an accident happens. Keep at least one metre (3 feet) distance between your heat source and combustibles, like paper and fabrics.</p>
<p>TIP #11 THURSDAY DECEMBER 22</p>	<p>Smoke outside. Lit cigarettes are Ontario's number one cause of fatal fires. This season, have all smoking done outside using deep, sturdy ashtrays. Never flick your butt – a lit butt might be the difference between a holiday to remember and a holiday you'll never forget.</p>
<p>TIP #12 FRIDAY DECEMBER 23</p>	<p>Be aware of lithium-ion batteries. Receiving a new toy or device during the festive period can be exciting, but if it has a lithium-ion battery, it can also add potential risk to your home. Always monitor the toy or device when it is charging; read the manufacturer's instructions for safe charging and do not exceed the recommended charging time.</p>


