New term with new faces in **Charlton-Dack**

CHARLTON-DACK - The Municipality of Charlton and Dack has a new chief administrative officer.

Barbara Knauth brings with her 14 years of municipal experience, says Reeve Sandra Parkin.

Knauth started at the beginning of December, and now fills the position formerly held by Dan Thibeault, who now is the chief administrative officer for Armstrong Township.

Some of the council is also new this term. Incumbents Bill Laurila and Debbie Veerman are joined by past councillor Gordon Saunders and Christine Brownlee.

"We're looking pretty good moving into 2023," said Parkin in a telephone interview.

The municipality has received new parts for the water treatment plant, funded through the Investing in Canada Green Infrastructure Stream program and the Ontario Municipal Modernization program.

The computer system at the plant will be upgraded and will improve on efficiencies, said Parkin.

Noting area growth, Parking pointed to Sunday Creek Metals, located just outside Charlton on Grants Road, which has extended its facility to accommodate increased metal sales.

On the municipal side of improvements, work has been taking place on new culverts. Parkin said the municipality is waiting on funding announcements to continue with more road work projects.

A study is currently being conducted by TSI Inc. on the River Road Bridge to look at its condition, said Parkin.

The stone has arrived for the reconstruction of the cenotaph, and that project will be completed in 2023, she continued.

The municipality has had a new columbarium installed in its cemetery and those niches are now available for sale, she said.

The municipality annually holds a large Canada Day fireworks display and in 2022 activities such as bouncy castles were added to turn it into an all-day family event, said Parkin.

"We are definitely aiming for the fireworks next summer and we are pushing for the rest of it as

The municipality's outdoor rink had to be reconstructed after a heavy snowfall collapsed its roof three years ago. The new structure is now "finished and up and running." The public works crew is getting it ready for the new season, said Parkin, commending them for the work they do.

The municipality is working closely with Chamberlain Township in shared services, and that arrangement "seems to be going really well. We're going to continue to work closely and see if there can be any improvements and find more efficiencies," said Parkin.

She commented of her new role as reeve that "I am thrilled to be in the position." But she added she is "heart-broken" that Merle (Bond) stepped down from the position (for health reasons).

"Merle was such a good reeve. I have really big shoes to fill, but I hope I can do him proud and do the township proud."



COVID closes Temagami Santa workshop

TEMAGAMI - Organizers of Temagami's proposed Santa's Actual Workshop have decided to postpone the event until 2023, due to ongoing COVID-related concerns.

Temagami Parks and Recreation coordinator John Shymko advised Temagami residents through an email December 14 that a decision has been made to postpone the event.

"I am writing to inform you that, due to the ongoing

COVID-19 pandemic, we have made the difficult decision to cancel this year's Christmas children's event," he advised.

"The safety of our children and our staff is our top priority, and we feel that it is in the best interest of all parties to cancel the event. We understand that this may be disappointing news, but we hope that you understand the reasons behind our decision."

Plans had already been developed to have a Santa's workshop event at the Caribou Mountain museum and work had begun on decorations and suits for the main characters, he related. Other plans, including gifts, a bonfire, transportation arrangements, and a reservation system had also been prepared, he con-

He said that late in the planning process he, and then his wife, contracted the virus, and while they are now recovering "have decided that there can be no guarantee that we can do this at no risk to volunteers and children within the timeframe we have this year."

He expressed confidence the 2023 event will be "amazing."



Don't lose sight of the road by using navigation apps

In particular, the Council reminds motorists to be aware of dangers around navigation apps that will help you get to your destination.

Perhaps drivers are in unfamiliar territory and are focusing on the navigation app while losing sight of where they are actually going.

This can lead to drivers missing turns and following too closely to vehicles in front of them.

Navigation tools are just that, tools, and they help to reduce driver anxiety and hopefully help people focus on safe driving.

A 2020 poll found that drivers were programming their navigation apps with directions while driving and this was cause for concern.

Stopping on the side of the road or programming directions into a navigation device is always a good idea.

Any task that takes the focus off the road increases the chances of a collision happening.

Program your navigation system before departure and ask a passenger to help you.

But above all, while driving, leave the phone alone as using a phone is a major cause of distracted driving.

Driving under the influence: effects, detection and consequences

The holiday season is in full swing, and celebrations of all kinds abound. However, amidst the merriment and festivities, it's important to remember you should never get behind the wheel if you're intoxicated. Here's what you should know.

EFFECTS Many of the skills required for safe driving, such as sound judgment, acute concentration, impeccable co-ordination, pronounced visual acuity and quick reflexes, are impacted by drug and alcohol use. Consequently, being under the influence can result in speeding, driving off the road, swerving into oncoming traffic and dozing behind the wheel.

DETECTION Police officers use their training as well as what they see, hear and smell to determine if a driver has drugs or alcohol in their system. Plus, they can take a breath sample to determine a motorist's blood alcohol level. Police may also issue a standardized field sobriety test (SFST), which typically requires the driver to walk in a straight line, stand and turn or stand on one leg.

CONSEQUENCES If you're caught driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol, you could have your licence suspended following your arrest, even before being convicted.

Once convicted, the severity of your sentence will depend on your background and the circumstances surrounding your arrest. For instance, you could receive a hefty fine and jail time if you injured or killed






Naloxone kits coming to atrisk workplaces

TORONTO (Special) - The province has announced that, as of June 1, naloxone kits will be required at workplaces where there's a risk that staffers may see or experience an opioid overdose.

In a December 14 media release, the Ontario government announced that it's launching a first-of-its-kind program that will make free naloxone kits - which can temporarily reverse an opioid-caused overdose - and the required training to at-risk work-

"Ontario, like the rest of Canada, is in the middle of an opioid epidemic made worse by a toxic supply of recreational street drugs," said Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development Minister Monte McNaughton in the release.

"That's why our government is the first in North America to require naloxone kits be accessible in at-risk workplaces by June 1, 2023, to raise awareness for those struggling with addiction, reduce stigma and save lives."

In 2021, the province said 2,819 people died from opioid-related causes in Ontario - the highest number on record and up from 366 in 2003.

Of the workers who died from opioid-related causes last year, 30 per cent were employed in construction, making it by far the most impacted industry.

Bars and nightclubs have also seen increased opioid usage and accidental overdoses, often because of recreational drugs laced with deadly opioids such as fentanyl and carfentanil.

Naloxone is a life-saving medication that can temporarily reverse an opioid overdose, restore breathing within two to five minutes, and allow time for medical help to arrive.

For up to two years, the Workplace Naloxone Program will provide at-risk employers with access to free training for up to two workers as well as one nasal spray naloxone kit for each eligible workplace.

The province said at-risk businesses include employers who become aware, or ought reasonably to be aware, that there may be a risk of an opioid overdose in their workplace.

It said a worker may, for example, disclose an opioid use issue, needles and other opioid paraphernalia may be found at the workplace, or employers "are otherwise given information that would lead them to reasonably conclude there is a risk of an overdose in the workplace."

Businesses with questions about their responsibilities under the legislation can visit Ontario.ca/workplacenaloxone.

Once the requirement is in effect, the province said Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development inspectors will take an education-first approach to enforcement.

Naloxone kits are also available to individuals from pharmacies.






