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Transit will continue to roll during switchover

TEMISKAMING SHORES — During the regularly scheduled Temiskaming Shores council meeting December 20, council was assured there would be no disruption of service during a switchover period when the new transit provider takes over.

Municipal transit services covers Temiskaming Shores and Cobalt.

In a staff report, manager of transportation services Mitchell McCrank said the city has reached a deal with DK's Temiskaming Taxi Service from New Liskeard to provide transportation services between the time Stock Transportation ends their contract on January 2 with Temiskaming Transit and when the new provider, Voyago, takes over on March 1.

"A taxi service will be made available for this period running the typical transit route or as required to get people to and from where they need to be," said the city in a press release December 21.

The city says during peak times there may be

"It's been a hot topic lately," said McCrank.

"Since our last meeting there has been some positive steps in the right direction."

He said Voyago had been successful in recruiting new employees to fill driver positions and they now have nine fully qualified applicants at their disposal.

They are also seeking someone to fill the transit supervisor position.

Through weekly meetings, McCrank noted that Voyago is committed to working with the city to ensure transit services between January 2 and March 1 are successful.

During the switchover period there would be a slight change of service before Voyago comes on board due to licensing issues and setting up the new system.

He said transit bus passes and tickets would be used with the new taxi service and encouraged people to stock up on those items. Cash can also be used as a method of payment.

He wanted to assure the public and transit users that there would be transit service, it might have

some hiccups along the way, but the city has done everything in its power to find alternative methods of getting people to their destinations.

"The taxi has a lot smaller vehicles and there are going to be a lot of different things, it is a step in the right direction and positive."

The city is asking riders to plan ahead as it will not be the service level they are used to.

The city says people could car pool or create ridesharing programs with family or friends to help them get through the transition period.

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Councillor Melanie Ducharme asked if the rates or methods of payment would change with the new taxi service.

McCrank said the city would pay a flat rate to DK's and riders would continue using passes, tickets and paying cash for rides as per already established transit costs.


He said more details about the new service provided by the taxi service for a limited period of time would be provided to the public as they Continued on 3



McCrank noted that Voyago might indeed start up their service before the March 1 deadline as they have been through similar transition periods before with other communities.

"They are committed to starting up their service as soon as possible when all their ducks are in a row. We have worked hard on this arrangement and hope to mitigate any disruptions in service," said McCrank.

Council unanimously passed a motion to enter into an agreement with DK's to provide temporary transit service.

Mayor Jeff Laferriere noted the transit information needs to be vetted before the Transit Committee and the Town of Cobalt for approval.

OPG operates 66 hydroelectric stations and 241 dams on 24 Ontario river systems.



PET TAG LICENCE RENEWAL FOR 2023

Please be advised that pet tag licence renewal letters were mailed out a few weeks ago. Effective 2019, the City changed its pet licencing program to a permanent tag which is renewed annually. In order to take advantage of the discounted price of \$10, renewals must be paid by December 23rd, 2022. The renewal fee increases to \$20 after this date.

If your pet tag has a year identified on it (2018 and prior), you must obtain a new permanent tag for a fee of \$20.

12 TIPS FOR HOLIDAY FIRE & CO SAFETY

TIP #1

MONDAY

DECEMBER 12

Use the proper lights when decorating and check for worn or damaged cords. You don't need to be Clark Griswold to shine bright with lights this holiday! Consider using LED lights and hang your outdoor-rated lights with nail-free clips. Cut your loss and toss damaged strings – an electrical fire is a sure bet for a lousy holiday.

TIP #2
TUESDAY
DECEMBER 13

Keep decorations away from candles. Fires caused by holiday decorations and open flames from candles are all too common this season. Battery-operated candles are a great alternative, but if you must light up, put candles in sturdy containers and always blow out when you leave the room. Keep candles away from children, pets and anything that can burn.

TIP #3
WEDNESDAY
DECEMBER 14

Install and test smoke alarms. 'Tis the season - literally! Fatal fires are at their highest rate during the holidays. When seconds matter, a working smoke alarm is the gift of time in the event of a fire. An alarm on every storey, tested monthly, and batteries replaced annually, is probably the best gift you can give your family this season.

TIP #4
THURSDAY
DECEMBER 15

Install and test carbon monoxide alarms. Unlike gingerbread, carbon monoxide is odourless. Unlike your uncle's ugly Christmas sweater, it's invisible. Carbon monoxide (CO) is a deadly gas that can cause flu-like symptoms. A CO alarm alerts you to a potential CO emergency with four beeps and is the best way to protect your family from The Silent Killer.

TIP #5
FRIDAY
DECEMBER 16

Water fresh trees daily. Falling needles are your tree's way of telling you it's drying out and is a fire waiting to happen. If you are decorating with a real tree, avoid being a statistic and water your tree daily. Be wary of heat sources near the tree including furnace vents and non-LED lights.

TIP #6
SATURDAY
DECEMBER 17

Check extension cords for damage and use them properly. Getting wound up in the holiday spirit? Don't "overextend" your outlets! Extension cords are a temporary solution and if more outlets are required, have them installed by a licensed electrician. Fire and electric shock are not on anyone's list this season - avoid overloading a circuit and never run extension cords under a rug.

TIP #7
SUNDAY
DECEMBER 18

Use candles with care. Consider using battery-operated flameless candles for your holiday decorating and celebrations. If your celebration requires the use of real candles, always keep an open flame away from anything that can burn including curtains, decorations, or paper. Keep lighters and matches away from children and douse any used matches before putting in the garbage.

TIP #8

MONDAY

DECEMBER 19

Prepare and practise your escape plan with everyone in your home. Santa needs one way out of your home – you need two. Give your family the gift of peace of mind with a home fire escape plan and have two ways out of every room, if possible, to ensure your loved ones are prepared for the worst so you can focus on the best: festive cheer!

TIP #9
TUESDAY
DECEMBER 20

Look while you cook. Holidays are stressful enough but when 17% of fires in Ontario are cooking-related, it's important to remember to slow things down in the kitchen. Fires caused by cooking mostly happen when the stove is left unattended so be mindful when cooking and never leave the kitchen while using a stovetop.

TIP #10
WEDNESDAY
DECEMBER 21

Keep heating sources away from anything that can burn. Baby, it's cold outside! Staying warm this Winter Solstice means practising fire safety. Space heaters, wood stoves and fireplaces are all great ideas until an accident happens. Keep at least one metre (3 feet) distance between your heat source and combustibles, like paper and fabrics.

TIP #11
THURSDAY
DECEMBER 22

Smoke outside. Lit cigarettes are Ontario's number one cause of fatal fires. This season, have all smoking done outside using deep, sturdy ashtrays. Never flick your butt – a lit butt might be the difference between a holiday to remember and a holiday you'll never forget.

TIP #12 FRIDAY DECEMBER 23 **Be aware of lithium-ion batteries.** Receiving a new toy or device during the festive period can be exciting, but if it has a lithium-ion battery, it can also add potential risk to your home. Always monitor the toy or device when it is charging; read the manufacturer's instructions for safe charging and do not exceed the recommended charging time.

CO, Sensor Lending Program

Curious about the air quality in your indoor spaces? The library has a CO, Sensor lending program, thanks to a donation by Rise of three Aranet4 Home Air Quality monitors. CO₂ is a gas that is produced when people exhale. As more people remain in a room, CO₂ levels increase quickly if there is not enough fresh air coming into the space. High indoor CO₂ levels can cause tiredness, headaches and other symptoms, and indicate that a space is not well ventilated. High CO₂ levels can also facilitate the spread of airborne infections such as COVID-19. The devices are not CO (Carbon Monoxide) detectors and are not life safety devices. Contact the library to learn more!

Gadget Helper

The library's gadget helper program provides one-on one help to people in learning to use their tablets, cellphones and laptops. Water slide

To ride the water slide you must be at least 42" (107 cm) tall and able to comfortably swim 3 meters unassisted. Flotation devices cannot be wom on the slide and jewelry must be removed. Parents cannot 'catch' children at the bottom of the slide. The waterslide will be available during evening and weekend public and family swims.

Hot tub

Children under the age of 12 are not allowed in the hot tub unless accompanied and supervised by a person who is 16 years of age or older. Pregnant people are encouraged not to use the hot tub

Adult Swims

During Adult swim, adults 18 years of age and older may enjoy the pool and hot tub. Lap and leisure swimming is permitted. Adults may have to share lanes and follow lane etiquette. The capacity for the adult swims is 10

Lane Etiquette

Share the pool! Prior to entering a lane, speak with all other swimmers to ensure they are aware you will be sharing the lane with them. Maximum of 4 people per double lane (1/2 pool). Splitting a double lane is only allowed when lane is only occupied by 2 swimmers and they both agree to split the lane - otherwise circle swimming will be required. Counter clockwise, circle swimming is required when more than 2 people are sharing a lane. If you need to pass a swimmer, please wait until you are at a wall to do so. Do not tap their foot to pass. If taking a break, please rest in the corners. To avoid bumping into another swimmer, please ensure to occasionally look at other swimmers. Please speak to the lifeguards if you have any other questions or concerns.

Public Swims

Adults and children (please follow the age admission policy) may enjoy the pool and hot tub, the slide will be made available during evening and weekend public swims.

Age Admission Policy

Children under 6 years old – Regardless of swimming ability, children must be accompanied by a parent or guardian who is at least 16 years of age and responsible for their direct supervision, with a maximum of two children per parent/ guardian and must be in bathing attire and within arm's reach of the child(ren) at all times in and out of the water.

Children aged 6-9 who are non swimmers - Non swimmers who are ages 6-9 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian who is at least 16 years of age and responsible for their direct supervision, with a maximum of three (3) children per parent/guardian and must be bathing attire and within arm's reach of the child(ren) at all times in and out of the water.

Children aged 6-9 who are non swimmers and wearing CSA approved lifejackets
- Non swimmers who are ages 6-9 wearing CSA approved lifejackets must be accompanied by a parent or guardian who is at least 14 years of age and responsible for their direct supervision, with a maximum of Six (6) children per parent/

guardian and must be in bathing attire and within arm's reach of the child(ren) at all times in and out of the water

POOL RULES AND GUIDELINES

No cells phone or personal electronic devices on pool deck or changerooms. Parents/care givers are encouraged to swim with their children and to remain unplugged. Cells phones may be used on the last day of swim lessons and during private rentals.

Alert Staff of any medical problems, (heart condition, epilepsy, etc)

Do not swim if suffering from COVID 19 symptoms, a cold, flu, bacterial or viral infection, communicable disease or severe skin condition. Do not enter the pool if you currently suffer from diarrhea or have had diarrhea within the last two weeks

Report Discharges (vomit, blood, feces) immediately to staff for cleaning. Water contamination may result in long and costly pool cleaning and shutdown.

No spitting or spouting of water or blowing of nose in the water.

Limit your stay in the sauna or whirlpool to no longer than 10 minutes at a time. Please consult a doctor if you have epilepsy, diabetes, high blood pressure, heart conditions or are pregnant prior to using sauna or whirlpool.

Clean swimming apparel is required in the pool.

Take a cleansing shower before every swim to avoid carrying dirt, bodily secretions, bacteria or residue from hygiene products into the pool.

Use washroom facilities before swimming, especially children.

Children who are not toilet trained must wear waterproof diapers.

Ensure children and/or adult diapers are properly secured and changed regularly to prevent over saturation and leakage.

Person(s) under the influence of intoxicants will not be allowed into the facility. Consumption of alcohol and/or drugs on the premises is not permitted.

POOL SAFETY

Know your limitations. Be aware of deep areas.

PFD's are available for use free of charge.

No running on pool deck.

Feet first please. No diving in the pool. The shallow end is .9m and the deep end is 1.98m.

No wrestling or rough play.

Report faulty equipment to staff

No prolonged breath holding or breath holding games.

The bigger float boards are for the shallow end only.

Children under 12 years of age may use the hot tub under direct supervision with a parent or guardian 16 years of age or older

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Significant step toward passenger rail service

NORTH BAY - The provincial government has announced that it has purchased three train sets for the passenger rail service provided by Ontario Northland.

The announcement was made by Ontario Minister of Transportation Stan Cho December 15, at an official visit to the Ontario Northland headquarters in North Bay with Ontario Minister of Economic Development, Job Creation and Trade Vic Fedeli, Ontario Minister of Northern Development Greg Rickford, Ontario Minister of Natural Resources and Forestry Graydon Smith, and Minister of Mines George Pirie.

The announcement was hailed as "a significant milestone in bringing back the Northlander passenger train."

"This is a significant step forward in bringing back the rail service that Northerners deserve," said Cho.

The target date for the service, should it be reinstated, is still years away.

"The reinstated Northlander train will provide a safe and reliable transportation option for Northern communities, especially in the winter months. This purchase demonstrates

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real progress, as we continue to take concrete steps to build a better transportation network for the North."

The three train sets each include one locomotive and three passenger cars, Ontario Northland stated in a press release.

"This purchase is a key next step to support the province and Ontario Northland's ambitious target of a mid-2020s in-service date for reinstating Northeastern passenger rail," said Chad Evans, interim president and CEO of Ontario Northland.

"The rail service will provide passengers more access to safe, reliable transportation options when travelling between Northern Ontario and Toronto."

The Northeastern rail corridor will improve road safety for travellers by reducing the volume of personal vehicles on highways and decreasing the risk of accidents on highways, Ontario Northland continued.

"A connection to Cochrane will serve an additional 5,300 residents with rail travel, for a total of 176,000 residents. This rail connection to Cochrane will enable higher ridership and provide a connection to our Polar Bear Express service to Moosonee."

Driving under the influence: effects, detection and consequences

The holiday season is in full swing, and celebrations of all kinds abound. However, amidst the merriment and festivities, it's important to remember you should never get behind the wheel if you're intoxicated. Here's what you should know.

EFFECTS Many of the skills required for safe driving, such as sound judgment, acute concentration, impeccable co-ordination, pronounced visual acuity and quick reflexes, are impacted by drug and alcohol use. Consequently, being under the influence can result in speeding, driving off the road, swerving into oncoming traffic and dozing behind the wheel.

DETECTION Police officers use their training as well as what they see, hear and smell to determine if a driver has drugs or alcohol in their

system. Plus, they can take a breath sample to determine a motorist's blood alcohol level. Police may also issue a standardized field sobriety test (SFST), which typically requires the driver to walk in a straight line, stand and turn or stand on one leg.


CONSEQUENCES If you're caught driving under the influence of drugs or alcohol, you could have your licence suspended following your arrest, even before being convicted.

Once convicted, the severity of your sentence will depend on your background and the circumstances surrounding your arrest. For instance, you could receive a hefty fine and jail time if you injured or killed someone.



Advice and solutions for debt difficulties

OTTAWA (Special) - Canadians have sources where they can find advice and solutions they can trust to help with their debt.

The Office of the Superintendent of Bankruptcy (OSB) and the Canadian Association of Insolvency and Restructuring Professionals (CAIRP) have websites that provide important tools and information to help consumers deal with financial difficulties.

When seeking help to deal with debt, here are some things to consider:

Beware of unregulated, unlicensed debt advisors that claim to be authorized to assist

you with insolvency options. Some charge hundreds or even thousands of dollars for services they are not licensed to provide, or for unnecessary services offered before, during or after a consumer proposal or bankruptcy filing.

Watch out for high-pressure sales tactics or unrealistic promises to quickly solve your debt problems or to fix your credit score. Signs may include high fees, high interest rates, delayed payments and advisors encouraging you to make further advances on your credit card or take out a high-interest loan to pay their fees.

Meet with a Licensed In-

solvency Trustee (LIT). LITs provide independent, unbiased advice about the options to deal with debt.

The OSB has a directory of LITs and LIT firms. Insolvency services are available across the country, even in remote locations

A trustee may recommend non-insolvency options such as talking to your creditors, consolidating your debts, establishing and following a budget or a Debt Management Plan (DMP). If needed, they would refer you to a reputable credit counselling agency, for example, to access DMP services.

If your financial situation

is more serious, an LIT may recommend an insolvency option such as a consumer proposal or bankruptcy. LITs are the only professionals authorized to administer these government-regulated insolvency options.

Ask for a free consultation. First consultations with an LIT may be free, so those facing debt problems can get advice with no commitment and no upfront fees.

Most importantly, be a well-informed consumer by consulting reliable sources for information, asking questions, and seeking a second opinion. This can help you avoid paying

for unnecessary services or fees.

"Those faced with desperate financial situations are susceptible to false promises of a quick solution to their debt problems. Anyone considering a consumer proposal or bankruptcy should meet with a Licensed Insolvency Trustee first," says Elisabeth Lang, Superintendent of Bankruptcy.

"LITs are the only federally regulated professionals who can provide debt relief options such as bankruptcy and consumer proposals. LITs are bound by a Code of Ethics and required to explore all debt relief options to help debtors find the best solution for their needs," she said.


He was predeceased by parents Hilda and Jim.






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
