Hospital facing outbreak amid occupancy, **staffing** challenges

TEMISKAMING SHORES - A COVID-19 outbreak at Temiskaming Hospital earlier this week has forced the hospital to temporarily restrict visitors once again.

"We know it's tough, we know it's difficult for people to not have that human touch, but on the other side of this is, people can die from it," said hospital CEO Mike Baker in an interview earlier this week.

An outbreak is declared when two or more in-patients experienced symptoms of the virus and tested positive.

As of January 10, eight patients were reported to have COVID-19.

In response, the hospital has suspended visits by the general public and designated care partners to patients in acute and long-term care.

However, designated care partners can still visit patients in palliative, obstetrical and pediatric care.

Care partners are also allowed to accompany out-patients who need support due to physical, intellectual, cognitive or emotional conditions.

In making its decisions, Baker said the hospital is following national and provincial standards. It has two employees on staff who are certified as infection control and prevention professionals.

He said its own system of designating patient rooms - depending on symptoms, COVID test status, and length of stay – impressed Accreditation Canada on a recent survey of the hospital.

Through its actions, he said the hospital is trying to keep people safe.

They include the most vulnerable, he said, pointing to the aged and people with compromised immune systems who come to the hospital for chemotherapy and dialysis.

It's also treats people ill with COVID-19, he said.

The hospital, he said, is the only place in the community where all that happens.

OCCUPANCY, STAFFING

The hospital is also seeing its occupancy rates starting to climb again.

Baker said occupancy averaged 90 per cent in November and 99 per cent in December.

On January 10, the hospital's rate was 112 per cent, and has averaged 102 per cent for the month so far.

Respiratory illness is "a ma-

hospital's admissions, he said.

Its number of alternate level of care patients – for the most part, older patients waiting on transfer to a longterm care residence – is also rising, from 23 and 24 in the last two months of 2022 to 26 at this time.

Like many hospitals, it's also facing staffing challenges.

He said it has a "significant number" of temporary agency nurses to fill vacant positions on staff.

Baker said it's come at a significant cost, and nursing costs will total "well over" \$5 million this year. It's also controversial, he said, because it means that somewhere else is left short-handed.

"But the issue is, if we don't do this, then there would be services that would have to close," he said.

It could mean reducing surgeries or possibly cut-

jor contributing factor" to the ting emergency department hours, he said.

> "With our geography, we just couldn't afford to not have services open," he con-

tinued.

"It's unfortunate, but it's something we think is the right thing to do for the community."

There has been some nasty backlash against the Temiskaming Transit Committee on social media during this transition period to a new provider, which began January 3.

The previous transit provider, Stock Transportation, ended their agreement to provide transit on January 1. The new provider, Voyago, is not scheduled to begin their contract with the City until March, thus resulting in spotty service.

The Temiskaming Transit committee operates under the auspices of the City of Temiskaming Shores and the Town of Cobalt.

The City has entered into an agreement with DK Taxi Service, located in New Liskeard, to provide temporary transit options during the pre-planned service lull.

But it has obviously failed to meet the demand for service as people have been left waiting at stops with no bus arriving and the taxi service way you look at it.

run off it's feet - or wheels, as it were.

People who work in Haileybury and New Liskeard have been left without viable transportation options and they are not happy.

Some questioned why the City. which owns the transit buses, couldn't put a bus-bridging option together and use their buses on the routes until the new provider was in place.

Public transit service disruptions are common among different transit providers, but some say the City had plenty of time to avoid a transit service disruption.

Communication from the City says they have exhausted as many avenues as possible to provide transit services during the changeover period.

The web of life

I've been reading author/naturalist David Attenborough's book called Living Planet: The Web of Life on Earth. I am fascinated by how life on the planet is so interwoven.

If you are a birder, you may understand how important the web of life is to birds.

The health of entire ecosystems is dependent on the health of our wetlands, forests and waterways.

If the forests are being cut down then there will be fewer habitats for birds and other wildlife.

If the wetlands disappear then habitat for fish, frogs, turtles, shore birds, snakes and other aquatic life is compromised.

But along come the beautiful pine grosbeaks, evening grosbeaks, blue jays, woodpeckers and the like to take our thoughts away from icy roads, no sunlight, frozen lakes and the bills.

The largest finches - the evening and pine grosbeaks - seem to be dominating the backyard feeders of this region.

And of course, the blackcapped chickadees are plentiful as well.

The heavier-set evening grosbeak with bright black and gold feathers with thick beaks are not shy.

They descend on backyard feeders by the hundreds de-

vouring black oil sunflower seeds with a flourish.

That beak is really powerful too and Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre expert birder, Bruce Murphy, tells me it can pack a mighty bite also.

So here's the thing: evening grosbeak populations have declined by 92 per cent since 1970, according to the Cornell Lab of Ornithology.

The grosbeaks are the most steeply declining land bird in North America.

Scientists know this because of events like the annual Christmas Bird Counts, backyard feeder counts and other research projects.

We had a glimpse of the future of birds when hometown documentary producer, Jo-Ann Jackson, brought her riveting film Messenger to New Liskeard a while back.

The film detailed the factors affecting bird populations including birds dying from flying into buildings, cat predation and some agricultural practices.

The evening grosbeak's declining populations are the canary in the coalmine telling us about the health of our planet.

The same planet we rely on for our health and wellbeing.

Attenborough writes of how

animals have miraculously adapted to changing environments from the dawn of time.

Are humans capable of those same adaptions when there's no clean water to drink, when all the trees are cut down and when nature itself is devalued in favour of virtual worlds?

That is why all of Ontario should be wary of what's happening in Southern Ontario with the Greenbelt develop-



Ontario expanding use of biosimilar drugs

TORONTO (Staff/Special) - The Ontario Ministry of Health has announced that it is joining other provinces and territories in expanding the use of "biosimilar drug treatments" for patients.

On March 31, 2023, when "Ontario Drug Benefit recipients who are on an originator biologic will begin to transition to a Health Canada approved biosimilar version of the drug at no cost," the Ministry stated in a December 20 press release.

"Patients will continue receiving the same high-quality treatment, while allowing the government to fund more new drug therapies, bring innovation to the health care system and continue its work to deliver better, connected patient care," said Ontario Minister of Health Sylvia Jones.

The Ministry stated that "patients and health care providers can be confident that the quality, safety and patient benefits of the biosimilar are highly similar to the biologic drug. Biosimilars undergo the same robust and rigorous approval process by Health Canada and to be approved in Canada, a biosimilar must be proven to be highly similar, with no clinically meaningful differences in terms of safety and efficacy.

Patients receiving "Copaxon-Enbrel®, Humalog®, Humira®, Lantus®, NovoRapid®, Remicade®, Rituxan®, will be required to transition to the biosimilar version by December 29, 2023. During the transition period between March 31, 2023, and December 29, 2023, patients are encouraged to discuss a transition plan with their health care provider through in-person, telephone or virtual visits. Exemptions will be considered for patients in certain clinical circumstances on a caseby-case basis in consultation with their health care provider," the press release stated.

Healing gardens to grow at Englehart, KL hospitals

KIRKLAND LAKE (Special) – Hospital patients in Englehart and Kirkland Lake will be enjoying new outdoor spaces as part of their care.

Blanche River Health (BRH) will be constructing healing gardens at both locations, using proceeds from the BRH Foundation's 50/50 online lottery.

Because residents have opened "their hearts and wallets" to support the lottery, "hospital patients will soon have safe, tranquil gardens to enjoy while they receive the care they need," said foundation chair John Sullivan in a news release.

BRH says healing gardens have been shown to improve well-being, reduce stress, and promote faster recovery.

It pointed to recent studies demonstrating the benefit of nature as therapy.

Evidence demonstrates, it said, positive impacts on a wide variety of conditions, from depression, anxiety, attention deficit disorder and hyperactivity to diabetes, obesity, migraines, vertigo, respiratory disorders, and infectious, cardiovascular and musculoskeletal diseases.

The benefits of healing gardens extend beyond patients, said Joan Brazeau, BRH's interim CEO.

"The number of hospitals that offer healing gardens to their patients is on the rise, and as an added benefit, they have gained popularity among patient visitors and hospital employees," Brazeau said.

The total cost of the project will be covered by the lottery's proceeds.

Since being launched in July 2021, the monthly draws have raised more than \$150,000.

Half of the proceeds go to the draw winners, with the other half collected by the foundation. Its share has to date surpassed \$75,000.

Replacement of the ONR Overhead Bridge, Highway 11 at Earlton (GWP 5101-17-00)

THE STUDY

The Ministry of Transportation Ontario (MTO) and WSP Canada Inc. have completed the Detail Design and Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) Study for the Replacement of the Ontario Northland Railway (ONR) Overhead Bridge, Highway 11 at Earlton, Township of Armstrong. The bridge location is shown on the key plan.

THE PROCESS

This study followed the approved environmental planning process for Group 'B' projects under the MTO Class *Environmental Assessment for Provincial Transportation Facilities* (2000).

A Transportation Environmental Study Report (TESR) has been prepared which documents the existing conditions, impact assessment, evaluation of alternatives, consultation undertaken, and the proposed project design including the plan for traffic management during construction.

The TESR is available for a 30-day comment period from **January 16, 2023** to **February 15, 2023**. A copy of the TESR will be available for review at the following location (during regular business hours):



Foods that Can Lower your **Blood Pressure**

Have you ever heard of the DASH diet? DASH stands for Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension (high blood pressure). It's a way of reducing blood pressure through changes in what you eat. It focuses on fruits, vegetables, whole grains, lean meats and low-fat dairy.

Green leafy vegetables: Eat spinach, broccoli, kale, or collards for a potassium boost. The mineral helps flush sodium out of your body and relaxes your blood vessel walls. Recommended daily serving: 2-3 cups (raw leafy vegetables)

Berries: The pigments that give blueberries, strawberries, and blackberries their rich colors also come with a benefit for your blood vessels: anthocyanin. It can help artery walls become wider and more flexible to lower your blood pressure and improve your heart health. Recommended daily serving: 2-3 cups (fresh or frozen)

Yogurt: Calcium is a key player for good blood pressure because it helps your blood vessels tighten and relax when they should. Recommended daily serving: 2-3 cups (yogurt or milk)

Fatty Fish: Another good source of calcium is bone-in fish, like canned salmon or sardines. Oily fish are flush in omega-3s, the fatty acids that boost health and help your heart. Recommended daily serving: 3-6 ounces (fish, lean meat, poultry)

Seeds: Unsalted seeds are a source of vital minerals like magnesium, which helps control your blood pressure and relax your blood vessels. *Recommended* daily serving: 1 to 1.5 tablespoons

Garlic: Garlic can add more than just flavor to your dishes. It may also have a hand in boosting your nitric oxide levels, which dilates blood vessels. Recommended daily serving: 1-2 cloves

Unsalted pistachios: Unsalted tree nuts can be a great source of healthy fats that help your heart. But for high blood pressure, your best pick is pistachios. They seem to have the strongest effect on lowering both your top and bottom blood pressure readings. Recommended serving: 1—2 cups per week (nuts)

Olive Oil: Protective antioxidants in olive oil improve blood vessel health and help them stay elastic. Recommended daily serving: 2-3 teaspoons (oil, may or salad dressing)


Dark chocolate: Dark chocolate (at least 50% to 70% cocoa) can give you a boost of a plant compound called flavanol. This antioxidant can make your blood pressure drop a notch. Recommended serving: An occasional nibble If you are considering starting on the DASH diet, discuss it with your healthcare provider first.





New federal pandemic recovery funding offered

TIMMINS (Special) - Charities, non-profits and Indigenous governing bodies in Northeastern Ontario are eligible for more than \$1.2 million in federal pandemic recovery funding.

The United Way Centraide North East Ontario/Nord-est de l'Ontario (UWCNEO) will distribute the Community Services Recovery Fund.

The fund is a one-time investment of \$400 million to help eligible organizations across Canada acquire the tools they need to adapt and modernize.

"We have seen the effects of the pandemic on our community organizations and the increased need for services," said UWC-NEO executive director Mary Lou Hussak in a media release.

She said UWCNEO will help facilitate the distribution of the funding alongside the Canadian Red Cross and Community Foundations of Canada.

Funding is open to qualified recipients in Timiskaming and Cochrane as well as Nipissing, Greater Sudbury, Parry Sound

It's earmarked to help organizations develop their organizational capacity by:

- adapting how they deliver services to support their staff and volunteers;
- purchasing equipment, such as computers and software;
- creating new ways of working, such as developing new fundraising approaches;
- supporting staff and volunteers through such things as training and supports for mental health and well-being;
- developing plans to receive funding from diverse sources.






