



Ski village a go thanks to the snow

LORRAIN TOWNSHIP - The downhill runs at the Tri-Town Ski and Snowboard Village are open.

The Lorrain Township facility opened to downhill enthusiasts in the area on February 4.

The cold snap that saw temperatures dipping below -20 C and even -30 C was still hanging on with sharp winds Saturday but, in spite of the cold, there were still people on the hill.

Tri-Town Ski and Snowboard board vice-president Lorna Desmarais said the board “kind of expected it might be a slow start just because of the temperatures today. That’s why we kind of delayed our opening (until noon). It also gave our ski patrollers a chance to go out to mark some areas that might still be a little unsafe because we still don’t have as much snow as we typically would at this time of year, but we thought it was important to open up the runs that we could and get people the opportunity to come out and ski because people have been anxious to start.”

All the activities were available Saturday, including tubing, snowshoeing, skiing, snowboarding and lessons.

Desmarais said the usual goal for the ski and snowboard village is to make it to the end of the March break, “but it just depends on what Mother Nature does.” She said there have been years where there was skiing right up into the beginning of April, and there is always that possibility that this could be a similar year. She said the average opening date is the third week of January, so there is a hope for a late finish to go along with the late start for the season.

The freezing temperatures actually have helped the ski village, she added.

“This cold temperature is nice because the ground really hasn’t been frozen up to this point, so sometimes what happens then is when the sun starts shining in March the snow will melt extra fast because the ground underneath isn’t frozen. The fact that we have cold temperatures will help us keep the snow that we’ve got.”

The Tri-Town Ski and Snowboard Village is a major recreational attraction through the winter months, and Desmarais said that the numbers have increased since tubing and snowshoeing were added, attracting people who “aren’t necessarily interested in skiing or snowboarding or who are just looking for something to do with their families on the weekend, get outside and be active.”

There are plans for the Valentines Day weekend February 11 and 12, when children can hunt for red hearts on the trails and bring them in to the canteen for a Valentines treat.

There are also plans for Family Day weekend. On Sunday, February 19, Whiskey Jack will be running the kitchen and doing all the cooking, with the profits going to the Tri-Town Ski and Snowboard Village. The day will extend right through to midnight with a tubing night and live music.

More family tubing nights will be held throughout the season, along with other events including a Ladies’ Sip and Ski.

Fundraisers being planned this year include the end-of-season banquet that is expected to take place in May or June. There will be another fundraiser in the summer in partnership with Whiskey Jack, Desmarais added.

“We’re always looking at grant opportunities and sponsorships to help as well. Our big fundraising efforts this year are to replace that old chalet (next door to the new chalet).”

She added that a \$150,000 grant has been received from the Ontario Trillium Foundation and funding of \$13,250 has also been received from the 100 Women Who Care Temiskaming Shores and More organization.

“That building has had its day,” said Desmarais.

THORNLOE - The Village of Thornloe is working to relaunch the Village Recreation Committee.

Councillor Pauline Peddie said in an email interview that after returning to live in Thornloe in 2000, she joined the recreation committee.

The committee "had already been in full swing at that time with several children in the community."

Over time though, the number of children in the community decreased, along with the number of volunteers, she

said.

"In 2020, when the pandemic hit, we were forced to close down our hall along with the recreation committee."

However, an idea to relaunch the recreation committee has now arisen and a meeting is to be held on Wednesday, February 15, at 7 p.m. at the Thornloe Community Hall "to see if we would have the interest and the numbers to become active once again. Kidney Disease – Early Detection and Prevention

Kidney disease usually progresses silently, often destroying most of the kidney function before causing any symptoms. There are two key tests used to detect kidney damage and to assess how well your kidneys are working.

Blood Test:

A blood test is used to measure your serum creatinine level. This helps to identify how well the kidneys are filtering the blood. Creatinine is a waste product made from muscle use and the breakdown of the protein you eat.

Urinalysis

Simple lab tests such as urinalysis (a urine dipstick), which looks for blood and a protein called albumin in the urine, are also useful in detecting kidney damage at an early stage. The filters of the kidney do not normally allow protein (albumin) in the urine so if protein is detected, it is a sign that the filters of the kidney are being damaged.

Symptoms

Uremia is a Greek word that means "urine in the blood". Uremia develops as the kidneys fail. Signs and symptoms that may occur with uremia:

- Weight loss
- Weakness
- Vomiting
- Loss of appetite
- Shortness of breath
- Leg cramps
- Itching
- Chest pain
- Easy bruising
- Swelling in ankles and legs
- Fatigue
- Nausea
- Bad taste in the mouth
- Restless legs
- Forgetfulness
- Difficulty sleeping
- Cold intolerance
- Skin color changes
- Decreased sexual desire

Steps to Help Prevent Kidney Disease

- Have your blood pressure checked regularly. Uncontrolled high blood pressure can speed up the natural course of any underlying kidney disease.
- If you suffer from diabetes, make sure that it is under control. A growing number of kidney patients are people with diabetes.
- Be very careful about taking non-prescription medications, particularly pain killers. Discuss all over-the-counter medications with your health care provider or pharmacist before taking them.



We welcomed visitors from Finland and parts of Europe that summer as well as various places in Canada and the United States.

It was an exciting time to be a part of a community.

In essence, I think I learned valuable lessons that summer about the power of volunteerism and the impact it can have on individuals and entire communities.

Volunteering not only made me feel like I was on top of the moon but it connected me to my hometown and to others.

When recreation director Harold Ribson created the Cobalt Miner's Festival, he understood it would take many, many hands to make it the suc-

cess that it was.

He was a natural born leader bringing people together for the common good.

In order to host large-scale events in any community you must have volunteers.

Volunteers put the U in community.

I just heard this week that the Temiskaming Shores Fire Department would be honouring their volunteer firefighters.

Fire chief Steve Langford called his volunteers the "backbone of the organization."

When it comes to dedicated longtime volunteer firefighters, I would be remiss if I didn't mention Cobalt Fire Department volunteer Kenny Pickard, who for 45 years served his community.

Thank you Kenny.

Volunteers need to be treated fairly and appreciated for the work they offer to make life better for everyone.

The only requirement a volunteer should have nowadays is a willingness to give back to help others - and a police check.

I can still picture my Grandmother Smith standing in the kitchen at the Cobalt United Church making sandwiches for teas and baking cookies for bake sales.

against the wealthy mine owners of Cobalt for better and safer working conditions.

Bless their souls.

Being responsive to the needs of others makes us realize our shared humanity.

In all my years of volunteerism, both in this region and further afield, I have never been put through an interview process.

Instead, all that was said to me was "welcome and thank you."

Those two words - thank you - can go a long way to recruiting and retaining volunteers.







Black History Month stamp honours Chloe Cooley

NIAGARA-ON-THE-LAKE (Special) - Canada Post has unveiled a new Black History Month stamp honouring Chloe Cooley, who had a profound impact on the history of enslavement in Canada.

Her act of resistance on the evening of March 14, 1793, ushered in legislation that would lead to the gradual abolition of enslavement in Upper Canada and provide a refuge for freedom-seekers from abroad.

Cooley was a young Black enslaved woman who lived in Queenston, Upper Canada, in the late 18th century. Although enslavement in Upper Canada was on the rise at the time, attitudes toward it were shifting and the abolitionist movement was gaining momentum.

Rumours were growing that enslavement could soon be banned. Fear of losing their investments prompted some enslavers to sell what was legally considered their property. Among them were Sergeant Adam Vrooman, who enslaved Chloe Cooley.

On that chilly March evening, Vrooman abducted Cooley. He violently bound her and, with the assistance of two other men, dragged her to the shores of the Niagara River. But Cooley was defiant.

She had been known to bravely challenge her enslavement in the ways that she could, such as leaving Vrooman's property without permission and refusing to do some tasks. So, when her enslaver abducted her, she fought back hard, screaming and yelling for help as she struggled to get free. Her protests were so loud that they drew the attention of those nearby.

Ultimately, however, Cooley was overpowered and taken across the river to New York State, where she was sold.

Although history doesn't tell us what happened to Cooley after that night, witnesses recounted what they saw to Lieutenant-Governor John Graves Simcoe, an avowed abolitionist. He was able to use their testimony to introduce new legislation.

ENGLEHART - The Englehart Public Library has something special happening every day it's open.

Acting chief executive officer Stephanie Carrier has been building on the programs that already existed at the library, and is adding new programming that reflects the interests and needs of the community, she said in an interview.

The art community also

has been welcomed to meet at the library on Wednesday evenings from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m.

"I thought it would be a good idea for people to gather here," said Carrier.

There is room for ten people to meet for the program and at the first meeting eight people turned out.

"This has been a very positive experience so far," said Carrier. "I'm glad that I'm able to bring people together and collaborate with one another. When we had our first art social it was quite exciting because everyone was working with different materials," she said.

On Thursdays there will be an opportunity for readers to Learn to Use Libby. This is an online app providing access to a wide selection of online e-books, audio books and even magazines that readers can choose from, Carrier explained.

On Friday, Valerie Kennedy, a member of the library's spare staff, is on hand to do a story and craft for children.

Then on Saturdays, children can enjoy the library's Movie Day.

Carrier is also pleased that students of the Englehart Public School will be taking a field trip to the library in February, which is something she would like to have continue through the remainder of the school year.

The library will also be presenting activities in conjunction with the Englehart Winter Carnival taking place March 1 to 5.

Carrier has been working at the library since February 2022, and accepted the position of acting chief executive officer on December 13. She is

currently taking online courses with the goal of continuing the position into the future.

Past chief executive officer Sharon Williams still has a presence at the library, assisting and providing guidance for Carrier as needed.







How do I keep myself and my loved ones safe?

- To prevent cooking fires, you must **be alert**. You will not be alert if you are sleepy, have consumed alcohol, drugs or medicine that makes you drowsy.
- **Always stay in the kitchen while cooking.** If you must leave, turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that burns—oven mitts, cooking utensils, dish cloths, paper towels and pot holders—a **safe distance from the stove.**



- Keep a **proper-fitting pot lid** near the stove when cooking. If a pot catches fire slide the lid over the pot and turn off the stove. Do not move the pot until it has cooled completely.

- Loose-fitting clothes can come into contact with stove burners and catch fire. **Wear short sleeves, tight sleeves or roll them up** when cooking.



Install **smoke** and **carbon monoxide** alarms on every storey of your home.

Test them every month.








BUT HE DOES!

Black History Month stamp honours Chloe Cooley

On July 9, 1793, what became known as the Act to Limit Slavery in Upper Canada was passed.

Cooley herself did not benefit from the legislation, but it opened a pathway to freedom for others, as it set the stage for the gradual ending of enslavement in Upper Canada. It also created a legal refuge for those fleeing enslavement in other countries - helping to pave the way for at least 30,000 freedom-seeking Black Americans to make the dangerous journey north to Canada over the decades to come.

In 1833, enslavement was officially abolished throughout the British Empire, and the last remaining enslaved persons in Upper Canada would finally be freed.

THE STAMP

The Chloe Cooley stamp was designed by Lime Design and features the illustrative work of Rick Jacobsen. With no photographs of Chloe Cooley in existence, the illustration was painstakingly created through extensive consultation with experts in local and regional history, Black history and period fashion, as well as through the use of archival maps, paintings, illustrations and other documents.

Printed by Lowe-Martin, the issue includes a booklet of six Permanent™ domestic rate stamps and an Official First Day Cover. The cancel site is Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ontario, which includes Queenston.

The stamp and collectibles are available at canadapost.ca and postal outlets across Canada.
