### **City firefighters** answered the call 110 times **in '22**

TEMISKAMING SHORES - A little over \$3 million in damage is estimated to have been caused by fire in Temiskaming Shores in 2021.

But the city's fire chief also estimates that almost \$7.5 million in property was saved by the actions of the fire department.

Fire Chief Steve Langford presented the fire department's annual report to Temiskaming Shores council February 7.

It provides a snapshot of the department's activities over the year.

They ranged from emergency responses to inspections, the issuing of open-air burning permits, public education, and firefighter training.

The department's three stations – in Haileybury, New Liskeard and Dymond - responded to 105 calls within the city over the course of the year.

Only 16 were to actual fires, and two of those were outdoor fires that caused no property loss.

"The firefighters respond to a variety of calls, and thank goodness they're not all fire calls," said Langford in an interview after the meeting.

"Let's keep it that way."

And the rest of the calls?

They responded to three calls where carbon monoxide was detected, and to six natural gas leaks.

Firefighters responded to five collisions and performed extrication at seven crash scenes.

They answered calls to false alarms, downed power lines, complaints of unauthorized burning, and cooking mishaps causing smoke but no flames.

Three calls were in Harris Township, with which the city has an agreement for fire protection.

City firefighters provided auto extrication services to Kenabeek once, and assisted Temagami on one occasion under a mutual aid agreement.



### City firefighters answered the call 110 times in '22

Firefighters even responded to one call of a person trapped in an elevator.

The department performed a total of 470 inspections and issued 812 burning permits.

They issued two charges, both for open-air burning without a permit.

At the February 7 council meeting, Langford highlighted the 1,855 hours volunteers spent at the scenes of emergencies, the almost 1,730 hours in training, and another 730 in meetings.

"It's a huge commitment," he said, noting the contribution of not only the volunteers but their families and the employers who let them leave work when emergencies strike.

He also singled out the work of Fire Prevention Officer Jocelyn Plante, who conducted 470 inspections and took part in a number of public education sessions.

The fire department was a little busier last year than in 2021, when it responded to 97 calls.

Fire losses were a little higher in 2021, estimated at almost \$3.23 million. The estimated value of property saved was \$3.5 million.

# Success for northerners

When it comes to doctor shortages across the Temiskaming region and further afield, we must not forgot about the achievements of the Northern Ontario School of Medicine University (NOSM U).

The school has two campuses, one in Thunder Bay and the other in Sudbury.

NOSM U is a success story with 100 per cent of their graduates passing the provincial exam, 100 per cent of graduates receiving a residency placement and 97 per cent of its graduates choosing to practice medicine in Northern Ontario.

NOSM U is mandated both to educate doctors and to contribute to care in Northern Ontario's urban, rural and remote communities.

It is our hope the recent news that Premier Doug Ford intends to move surgeries to private clinics, fully funded by the government, will not poach doctors from the north.

The Ontario Medical Association (OMA) says across the north there are 300 physicians needed to meet demand.

The OMA says the quickest way to

alleviate doctor shortages is to look to internationally trained physicians that are already in the country, who could be assessed and added to the system as quickly as possible.

We can only hope this government move doesn't lure northern health care professionals to private health care facilities in larger urban centers.

This policy could potentially harm an already stressed medical system short on doctors, nurses and other health care professionals.

The doctor, nurse and personal support worker shortage hasn't happened overnight.

Years of chronic underfunding of Ontario's health care system have caused the shortage.

There should not be competition for valuable health care resources between the public and private sectors. Governments that push the ideology of a two-tier health care system need to be watched and watched closely.

Our national health care system is the envy of many countries around the world and it needs to be preserved and protected.

### The "awe" moments

Spring is nigh on the wings of birds as the days grow warmer and lighter.

I am enjoying watching birds at backyard feeders and at various places across the re-

Recently a photographer posted a photo of a bird on the Nipissing Naturalist Club Facebook page saying, "Almost positive this is a Bohemian waxwing."

I messaged back saying it was a Bohemian waxwing because of the reddish brown feathers on the underside of the tail.

I have delighted in photographing both Cedar and Bohemian waxwings in this area.

Just last week I counted a flock of 50 or more Bohemians feasting on a crabapple tree on Pine Avenue in New Liskeard.

The Bohemians are chunkier than their cousins, the Cedar waxwings, who have yellow plumage on the underside of their tails.

Waxwings are a family of fruit-eating birds that travel around a region in search of crabapple trees, hawthorn, mountain ash, buckthorn ber-

Worldwide, there are three species of waxwings - Bohemian, Cedar and Japanese.

ries and high bush cranberries.

They are a gorgeous bird about the size of a robin with a black bandit mask, with a flattened crest of feathers on its

Their body colouring is grey or pinkish grey and they have bright yellow wings and tail

They get their name from the bright red mark on the breeding adult's wing that looks like a drop of sealing wax. I read that the number of bright red marks on the wings indicates the bird's age.

I love the way they flip berries up in the air and catch them in their mouths.

In the 16th century, the story goes that these birds glowed in the dark.



The Latin scholar, Solinus, said captive birds were used by those travelling at night to light the way.

I don't believe these brightly coloured birds actually glow in the dark, but they certainly brighten up a dull winter's day.

And I was surprised to see a Scottish photographer I follow noting he had found a small flock of Cedar waxwings around Glasgow. He said they usually frequent the forests of Scandinavian countries but when food sources are scarce they travel further afield.

You know what I love about birding?

It is such a fascinating pursuit that contributes to my well-being.

Birding actually changes your biochemistry and can boost your cognitive abilities, say the experts.

A willingness to look at life differently will bring us to a sense of awe and wonder.

If you close your eyes and see the world beyond your own experience, you will know the magic of this world and that of birds.

All forms of bullying are harmful, but VERBAL bullying, including name-calling, happens more often than any other kind of bullying.

#### Did you know:

- One in seven Canadian children aged 11 to 16 are victims of bullying
- Bullying occurs once every 7 minutes on the playground and once every 25 minutes in the classroom
- Other kids are watching 85% of the time when one kid bullies another kid. Adults like teachers or parents hardly ever see a bully being mean to someone else.
- In majority of cases, bullying stops within 10 seconds when peers intervene, or do not support the bullying behaviour

- Depression
- · Social anxiety, loneliness, isolation
- Stress related health problems (e.g., headaches, stomach aches)
- Low self esteem



# Cobalt urged to lobby for passenger train stop

COBALT - Assuming that the province will follow through with its plan to return the passenger rail service to the region, David Brydges of Cobalt wants the town to lobby to have the train stop there.

At this time, the provincial government is suggesting that a passenger rail service could be carrying Northerners up and down the tracks of Northeastern Ontario as early as 2026.

Brydges sent a letter to council outlining his suggestion. The letter was read at the town's committee-of-the-whole meeting February 7 and Brydges attended to speak about his suggestion.

In his letter to council, Brydges said the Ontario Northland Railway's (ONR) website has a document called Northeastern Passenger Rail Service Updated Initial Business Case.

He said it contains an option "to begin the train in Timmins at midnight, and its arrival in Temiskaming Shores would be at 3:15 a.m., eliminating any possibility of using public transit to access the station," he wrote.

"If I and any other potential passengers must travel to New Liskeard to board the train and, upon our return, get off in New Liskeard and then find our way back to Cobalt, it will add another 40 miles onto the trip and numerous hours of travel. Ten miles to New Liskeard, then ten miles back to Cobalt on the train. Returning northward, we would pass Cobalt another ten miles arriving in New Liskeard and returning to Cobalt another ten miles. If we have anyone driving us to the New Liskeard station for a drop-off and pickup, they will travel the same distance."

He continued that "the new Northlander service is expected to run four to seven days a week, depending on the season," with multiple stops from Toronto to North Bay and then in Northeastern Ontario at Temagami, Temiskaming Shores, Englehart, Kirkland Lake/Swastika, Matheson, Timmins and Cochrane.

Cobalt is missing from that list, he said.

"The historic town that built the (Temiskaming and Northern Ontario) Railway into the Ontario Northland Railway. With its most historic and beautiful train station at one time. History is not mentioned in the business plan. Still, it means something to us in Cobalt, for we would have the option to bring tourists to our area if one of the goals is to promote Northern tourism through train travel. At present, we are not in a solid position to benefit."

He asked the council to "create a more robust strategy to emphasize to the ONR the need for a passenger stop in Cobalt."

He noted that the town's logo shows a train coming down the tracks in Cobalt.

When he addressed the council in person Tuesday evening, he noted that South River has lobbied the ONR for a train station in that community.

South River, Kirkland Lake and Swastika are all being labelled as "sensitivity stops" along the route of the passenger rail service when it begins to run

Brydges recommended that council reach out to Metrolinx, which is overseeing the plans.

"The way it stands right now, Cobalt is out of the picture," he said.

No new buildings or structures are proposed as a result of this application.

### FedNor supports Village Noël

THUNDER BAY (Special) – Le Centre culturel ARTEM received federal help to relaunch Village Noël Témiskaming in 2022.

The festival was cancelled in 2020 and 2021 due to pandemic concerns.

But it returned in November, with the assistance of a non-repayable investment of \$78,500 from FedNor.

FedNor recently announced \$4.57 million in support for 27 tourism-related projects across Northern Ontario.

Funding came three initiatives

– the Tourism Relief Fund, the
Northern Ontario Development
Program, and the Economic Development Initiative.

The projects will help create and maintain over 140 jobs, said Patty Hajdu, the minister of Indigenous Services and the minister responsible for FedNor, in a January 27 announcement in Thunder Bay.

"Supporting tourism means not only helping to show the world all of the wonders in and around our communities, but also sustaining businesses and jobs, and building the diversity of our economy," said Hajdu in an announcement.

Other regional projects receiving funding included the Township of Black River-Matheson. It was allocated \$675,000 to complete design and engineering work necessary for improvements to the downtown core.

Wahgoshig First Nation received \$344,700 to purchase equipment and create a tourism hub that includes an outdoor trail network, a gazebo, two teepees, and a Shaputuan (longhouse). It will also complete a tourism opportunity analysis and assessment study.
