Airport Authority seeking more **support**

HILLIARDTON - Representatives of the Earlton-Timiskaming Regional Airport Authority will be reaching out to non-participating area municipalities in an attempt to convince them of the merit of joining and supporting the airport.

The Airport Authority is a partnership of a number of area municipalities who deem it beneficial to the region to maintain and operate the airport.

The participating municipalities provide financial support to the airport to keep it operating.

The Authority also discussed the importance of updating the levies charged to the municipalities through the 2021 census numbers to ensure that the levies fairly represent the population changes that have occurred in the district in recent years.

The airport is a regional central point for air ambulance, corporate business flights in and out of the area, as well as private plane owners who can lease hangars there. Temiskaming Search and Rescue also has a base at the airport and the Hercules military aircraft frequently flies in for search and rescue training events. During a major forest fire in the region in 2019, the airport was used as a base by firefighting teams sent in to the area.

At the Airport Authority's February 16 meeting at the municipal hall in Hilliard Township (which is one of the participating municipalities), an agreement was reached to request financial support from the non-participating municipalities.

The airport had previously belonged to Transport Canada, but was transferred to Armstrong Township. Area municipalities agreed to provide financial support and, in 2016, it was decided to form the Airport Authority, which would be able to apply independently for grants to support capital projects.

Temiskaming Shores Mayor Jeff Laferriere is the chair of the board, taking the position held until re-

cently by former mayor Carman Kidd. James Smith is the airport manager.

"Our fuel sales are significantly higher year over year," said Laferriere in an email interview after the meeting. He said there were 328 air ambulance movements in 2022. There has been a small increase in the number of charters with 264 in 2022, he added.

Airport Authority members have agreed to seek the support of the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities on the view that the airport is an integral part of the area's health care, with the goal of obtaining provincial financial support for the airport in that role.

The need to increase revenues at the airport was a main topic of discussion at the meeting as the Airport Authority approaches its 2023 budget. Laferriere stated at the meeting "there are a number of things we are going to have to look at for generating revenues." He added that the Airport Authority will also have to "develop some strategies."

The approval of the 2023 budget has been deferred to the March 16 meeting of the Airport Authority.

"We need to clarify a few items," Laferriere stated in the email.



EDITORIAL

Northerners matter

might think the statement "Northerners don't matter to governments" to be a strongly worded statement.

But that's the message that continually gets sent to Northerners from federal and provincial governments.

Take for instance the Ontario Federal Election Boundary Commission final report on electoral boundaries.

In that report it was suggested that Northeastern Ontario would drop one Member of Parliament and that boundaries would be jigged to make other ridings larger.

Algoma-Manitoulin-Kapus-The kasing riding would disappear with the southern portion joining a larger Nickel-Belt riding, to be renamed Manitoulin-Nickel Belt. The other riding seeing boundary changes is Timmins-James Bay, which would expand to take in Smooth Rock Falls, Kapuskasing, Hearst and Horne-

A number of Northern Ontario MPs have expressed their disappointment in the electoral boundary changes.

It's suggested the number of ridings in the north be reduced from 10 to nine.

Of course we can't compete with Southern Ontario in terms of population growth, and residents who need to access services from their elected

Some people reading this editorial members can't jump on a subway or GO train either to get to constituency offices.

> We also have unreliable internet access in the north, which also makes a difference to government services northerners need to access.

> Timmins-James Bay MP Charlie Angus said, "The current proposal hurts people in Northern Ontario."

> Northerners should be concerned about this issue because it means we will have fewer voices, less representation and less funding for services in the north.

> Are ridings in Quebec being changed?

> We should never be penalized in terms of representation because a government doesn't deem there to be enough votes in a region for their benefit.

There is still time for MPs to object to the current electoral boundary proposal, which must be filed by March 12.

The Commission will submit a final report to the Speaker of the House of Commons (Nipissing-Timiskaming's own MP Anthony Rota) in June 2023.

The earliest any changes could be implemented is the spring of 2024.

Democracy is precious and riding boundaries matter.

No matter what your definition of family is, it comes back to one thing - love.

All of the definitions of family were on display this past weekend at the fishing derby held in memory of 19-year-old Isaac Walker-Dupont.

I worked the Family Day long weekend and one of my duties was to attend the Family Day Fun Fishing Fundraiser, hosted at Windy Point on Lake Temiskaming.

All proceeds from the fishing derby are being directed to a fund set up at the Temiskaming Foundation in Isaac Walker-Dupont's name.

The money will go back into the community to support youth bowling, fishing and hunting programs.

The latter two are outdoor-based activities Isaac loved and valued in his all too short life.

I wish I had met Isaac as anyone who loves the outdoors like he did is in my good books.

Child loss is like no other and it is often misunderstood. Compassion is always needed.

Bereaved parents whose willingness to share their grief but also to turn that grief into something positive are special.

We saw it with the Team Shan organization that educates young women about breast health in memory of 24-year-old Shanna Larsen.

We witnessed it when the One Foot Forward event was created to honour the memory of toddler Greyson Zubyck.

We remember 17-year-old curler Danny Wilson and the Scholarship Fund created in Dan's name at The Temiskaming Foundation, established by parents Mark and Carol Wilson.

We remember Alex Duguay from Earlton whose life was tragically taken while walking home.

We have seen how people can look outside themselves and visualize how loss can be translated into a healing journey.

These events give people dealing with loss a sense of achievement despite their heavy burden of grief, thus alchemizing one's grief into positive ways

You don't get over the loss of a loved one or move on. There is no glue that can mend a broken heart.

I know this because my sister lost her only son, Adam David Larabie, when he was just 38 years of age. And I lost my precious nephew.

There is always going to be an empty chair at the table, an empty space in a family photograph.

The people who decide to turn the tragedy of child loss into transformation and legacy by giving back to their communities are brave warriors.

We can't understand the pain of a bereaved parent, only that we show our love and support.


A healthy heart is a gift for life
