Bucke Park preparing for new season after a successful '22

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Bucke Park reported a successful 2022 season, with increased revenue and usage.

And in response, Temiskaming Shores has renewed its agreement with current operator Sylvain Gelineau for another season, at a cost of \$18,250.

Gelineau and his team have done "an exceptional job" running the park, said Matt Bahm, the city's recreation director, as council discussed the park February 21.

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, Bahm reported that occupancy and revenues have increased in each of the past three years it's been under Gelineau's operation.

Revenue is up from \$45,600 in 2019 to \$88,400 last year.

On the operations side, 2019 ended with a \$1,500 deficit. The 2022 season wrapped up with a \$19,700 surplus. That surplus was achieved despite costs incurred replacing the water treatment plant building.

In 2022, the marina was filled with boats docked for the entire season, and some small maintenance projects were also completed, he said.

Councillor Danny Whalen commented last week that he's not usually a fan of sole-sourcing, but in this instance is "fully supportive.

He said the park has shown a complete turnaround.

Only four years ago, the city was planning to sell the property.

After many calls to keep the park in public hands, city council put the proposed sale on hold.

Negotiations between the municipality and park's recreation committee resulted in an agreement under which Gelineau, a local business operator

and committee member, runs the park.

Repairs are slated for the chalet's floor this spring that will restore the entire building to use. Drainage improvements are also to be made.

The park itself figured prominently in the city's

The plan also recommended a long-term lease for the park's operation.

Council directed staff last week to prepare an 2020 master recreation plan, in which it was analysis of the long-term operator and lease option.








Canada Post foundation grant applications open

OTTAWA (Special) – Does your charity, school or organization offer programming for kids?

The Canada Post Community Foundation is now accepting grant applications for 2023.

Canadian charities, schools and community organizations that provide programming for children and youth up to age 21 can apply for the grants, which range in value up to \$25,000.

Up to four \$50,000 Signature Grants are also available, including the Indigenous Truth and Reconciliation Signature Grant which was introduced last year.

Applications will be accepted from all communities across the country with a focus on local grassroots initiatives, such as literacy and language programs; youth outreach services; programs supporting Indigenous youth; gender diversity programs; arts and recreation projects; and many others.

The deadline to submit applications is noon March 9 through the Community Foundation website at canadapost.ca/community. Grant recipients will be announced in August 2023.

The Canada Post Community Foundation is a registered charity established in 2012 that operates at arm's length from Canada Post.

It has to date granted \$12.3 million to more than 1,100 community projects across Canada.

Ontario government set spending record in 2020

TORONTO (Special) – A new report by the Fraser Institute shows that the Ontario government set a new spending record in 2020.

Per-person (inflation-adjusted) program spending in Ontario reached \$11,558 in 2020 (excluding COVID-related spending, per-person spending was \$10,226 that year).

"A useful way of measuring a government's fiscal policy is by reviewing per-person (inflationadjusted) program spending by various Premiers," said Tegan Hill, senior economist with the Fraser Institute and co-author of Ontario Premiers and Provincial Government Spending.

This study reviews annual per-person program spending (inflation-adjusted) by Ontario premiers from 1965 to 2021, and finds that the highest single year of per-person spending on record was under Doug Ford in 2020.

Excluding the unusual 2020 year which included emergency COVID-19 related spending, the highest year of per-person (inflation-adjusted) spending was 2010 under Dalton McGuinty at \$11,522.

Overall, (excluding John Robarts whose full tenure is not included due to data limitations), Ernie Eves oversaw the highest rate of average annual per person spending growth (5.4 per cent) - however, Eves only served as premier for two fiscal years - followed by David Peterson (4.0 per cent), and Dalton McGuinty's government had the third highest average annual rate of per person spending growth at 2.9 per cent.

Ford's government has overseen the fourth highest rate of average annual per person spending growth at 2.4 per cent.

"The intention is to provide a historical analysis of this key measure of government fiscal policy," said Hill.

"It will be important to see how per-person inflation-adjusted program spending develops moving forward."

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EDITORIAL Human trafficking must stop

It was revealed last week that 21 police services across Ontario have shared statistics involving human trafficking from 2021.

They have identified 61 victims and laid multiple human trafficking charges as a result of their investigations.

We know 50,000 or more girls and women are being trafficked in Canada, noted Timea Nagy, a victim of human trafficking at a conference held at Northern College a couple of years ago.

She said, "Human trafficking is a symptom of what's wrong with society."

That such a situation could even exist is horrendous enough, but it exists right here in our region.

The truth is human trafficking is taking place in all of our communities, right under our noses.

Human trafficking of children into the sex trade is abhorrent and so is that of vulnerable women.

We must begin to honestly look beyond the statistics of human trafficking and ask ourselves: how can this be stopped?

Human trafficking isn't someone else's problem, it isn't law enforcement's problem - it is our problem.

We need to own the problem in or-

der to fix it.

What can we do?

When we see something isn't right with a situation report it to police.

We can treat our children with the respect that they deserve and build up their self-esteem because children as young as eight are being victimized.

We can stop laughing at social media memes that dehumanize and reduce women and girls to sexual objects.

A large percentage of women who are trafficked are Indigenous.

Let us applaud the efforts of New Democratic Party member Leah Gazan, who is asking that the federal government establish a system that would send a public phone notification when an Indigenous woman goes missing.

It would be called the Red Dress Alert and similar to the Amber Alert.

We can have those difficult conversations with our children to alert them to the idea of those who might exploit them.

And most importantly the people who are using these services can be outed.

We can send emails of outrage to our MPP and MP.

We must do better.

They danced and they pranced



There was magic in the night sky early Monday morning.

The Northern lights were dancing and prancing overhead. What a show!

The Northern lights, or Aurora Borealis, "occur when highly charged electrons from the solar wind interact with elements in the earth's atmosphere" near the North Pole, according to the website Howstuffworks.

The lights symbolize everything that is magical and mystical about the natural world.

A fellow photographer alerted me on social media to the fact that the aurora borealis would be strong in the night sky on Sunday night.

The only problem was when I read his message it was 2 a.m. and I had to work the next day.

Truth is I didn't care what time it was because seeing the northern lights is a rare occurrence.

So I got dressed, grabbed my camera and drove to a location near Sharp Lake that faces northward.

About five years ago at that same location I saw a brilliant burst of the northern lights that I captured with my camera.

That time they appeared much earlier in the night sky around 10 p.m. I could not believe what I was seeing.

Standing in -22 C temperatures in total darkness this past week I saw the sky explode with colour.

Enormous celestial pillars of green and purple danced across the sky followed by pulsating strobe-like columns shooting upwards.

The lights were at first pale green in colour and gradually became dark green with sections of purple and pink in them.

They almost looked like a liquid flame in the night sky. It made me almost giddy with joy to see the lights "dancing" overhead.

I had trouble getting my camera to focus so I just stared up at the sky in amazement.

When you see the northern lights like that it is akin to a spiritual experience.

It makes you realize how wonderful nature is and how small we are in the bigger picture of the universe and the heavens above.

Our First Nation's people have a special relationship with the lights believing them to be the spirits of their ancestors.

The Inuit call the aurora "aksarniq" and believe that souls of the dead dance in the aurora.

When you see the lights moving and changing colours like that you say to yourself, "Wow, holy cow, this is magical."

My daughter messaged me from Glasgow the next morning to say they had also seen the lights over Scotland.

All week long whenever I closed my eyes I saw visions of the lights flashing before me.

I can only imagine what our ancient ancestors must have thought as they stood and watched the skies ablaze with light.

When the universe calls, stop and look upwards.

It is impossible not to come away with a sense of wonder.





Maintaining and testing a sump pump ensures that it works properly when needed. It takes only a few minutes to test a sump pump and doesn't require special training. Here's how to test a sump pump:

- Ensure the pump is upright. If the device is tilted to one side, the float arm can become jammed and cease to operate correctly.
- Pour a bucket of water into your pit. Pour a sufficient amount of water, enough to trigger the switch float or float. If the pump doesn't start immediately, have it repaired.
- If you have a submersible pump, remove it from the pit from time to time and clean the bottom grate (pumps can suck in rocks that may block the inlet).
- Make sure the pipes from your pump are tightly fastened and set to drain at least 20 feet away from your foundation.
- Check the vent hole for any blockages that could prevent water from flowing through your outlet tube.





A second sump pump can be a valuable backup that comes in handy if your main pump quits working or becomes overwhelmed.



Colorectal cancer doesn't wait - neither should you

DISTRICT (Special) - March marks the beginning of Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month.

Under the slogan "Cancer doesn't wait, why should you?" Colorectal Cancer Canada's campaign reminds Canadians of the importance of getting screened because colorectal cancer is preventable, treatable and beatable if diagnosed early.

March is Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month and it's the reminder for Canadians to get screened for colorectal cancer.

"Every March, we need to remind Canadians to get screened, and it is more urgent this year because many people missed their biennial screening due to COVID-19. Colorectal cancer continues to claim far too many lives in Canada. Yet, if caught early enough, polyps can be removed before they become cancerous," says Barry D. Stein, CEO and president of Colorectal Cancer Canada and a stage 4 metastatic colon cancer survivor.

On average, 68 Canadians, men and women, are diagnosed with colorectal cancer every day. Each year, colorectal cancer kills nearly 10,000 people in Canada, making it the second deadliest cancer in men and third in women.

Colorectal Cancer Canada would also like to remind everyone that colorectal cancer does not only affect people aged 50 and over - it also strikes younger people. The number of people diagnosed with colorectal cancer under 50 is on the rise, a segment of the population that faces increased risks due to late diagnoses often caused by lack of awareness of the signs and symptoms.

"Year after year, studies show that colorectal cancer is affecting younger and younger people. Our message is simple. As soon as a patient presents to his or her doctor some of these symptoms - such as a sudden change in bowel habits, bloody stool, loss of appetite, or anemia - it is important to investigate the possibility of colorectal cancer. Travellers arriving at the Toronto, Vancouver, Montreal, Winnipeg, Halifax, Québec City, Ottawa, Billy Bishop and Calgary international airports can make their customs and immigration declaration to the CBSA prior to their arrival using the Advance CBSA Declaration feature in ArriveCAN. Travellers who use this option have access to express lanes to get to an airport kiosk or eGate faster.

• When travelling with children, it is recommended that the accompanying adult have a consent letter authorizing them to travel with the child if they share custody or are not the parent or legal guardian. Border services officers are always watching for missing children, and in the absence of the letter, officers may ask additional questions.

• Cannabis: Don't bring it in. Don't take it out. Bringing cannabis across the border in any form without a permit or exemption authorized by Health Canada is a serious criminal offence subject to arrest and prosecution, despite the legalization of cannabis in Canada. A medical prescription from a doctor does not count as Health Canada authorization.

• Know your exemption limits. Residents returning to Canada who make purchases or pick up online purchases outside of Canada should be aware of their personal exemption limits. Use the CBSA duty and taxes estimator to help calculate your monies owed.

• Be prepared to declare. All travellers must declare their goods upon entry into Canada. Have your receipts readily available for goods purchased or received while outside of Canada. If travelling with firearms, consult the CBSA's website for the rules on firearms and other restricted and prohibited goods.

• Avoid importing raw poultry products or by-products. There are currently restrictions on imports of live birds, bird products and by-products from U.S. states affected by Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza. It is not recommended to bring poultry products into Canada. Otherwise, be prepared to prove the origin of your poultry product at the border.

• If you are travelling with a pet or want to import an animal into Canada, you will need the right paperwork at the border to meet Canada's import requirements.

• Not sure? Ask a CBSA officer. The best thing you can do to save time is to be open and honest with the CBSA officer. If you are not sure about what to declare, don't hesitate to ask. Our officers are here to help!



Home Fire Safety Checklist

Smoke & Carbon Monoxide Alarms

- Install working smoke alarms on every storey of the home and outside all sleeping areas.
 Install carbon monoxide alarms outside all sleeping areas. It's the law.
- For extra protection, install a smoke alarm in every bedroom and a carbon monoxide alarm on every storey.
- Test your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms once a month.
- □ Change alarm batteries annually or whenever the low-battery warning sounds.
- Always follow the manufacturer's instructions for installing, testing, maintaining and replacing smoke and carbon monoxide alarms.

Cooking Fire Safety



- Keep anything that can catch fire—oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains—away from your stovetop.
- □ Keep a proper fitting pot lid near the stove when cooking. If a pot catches fire slide the lid over the pot and turn off the stove. **Do not move the pot.**
- Wear tight-fitting or rolled up sleeves when using the stove. Loose dangling clothing can easily catch fire. If your clothing catches fire, stop, drop to the ground and roll over and over to put out the fire.




