Second scoreboard coming to The Shep

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – A second scoreboard will be installed this summer at the Don Shepherdson Memorial Arena, with advertising covering its cost.

Brownlee Equipment will pay \$7,200 over ten years for a wall advertisement that will be placed beside the new auxiliary scoreboard.

The fee will cover not only the purchase of the new scoreboard but also the advertising fee, said recreation director Matt Bahm in a March 21 report to Temiskaming Shores council.

The existing scoreboard, which was purchased in 2005, is located at the east end of the New Liskeard arena.

But it's not visible to all users of the facility, Bahm said.

The new scoreboard will be installed on the west wall, above the hall windows, with the Brownlee ad placed beside it. Flags now in the location will be placed further up.

The new scoreboard will both enhance the arena and serve as a back-up in case the existing equipment stops working, he said.

The arrangement followed a request from Brownlee to purchase ad space on the arena boards in both New Liskeard and Haileybury.

Bahm said available spots are limited, thanks to a sales push from staff.

Since the beginning of the year, the number of ads at The Shep has increased from 29 to 40.

Ads at the Shelley Herbert-Shea Memorial Arena in Haileybury are also up, from seven to 12.

The agreement enabling the purchase of the new scoreboard was reached instead.

A new wireless controller will also be installed. It'll serve both scoreboards and replace the existing wired model that had been showing signs of wear.


DID YOU GET The Speaker THIS WEEK? Here are some **April 12, 2023 stories...**

Richard Males

With great sorrow, Gaetane and the family announce Richard Gordon Males' passing on to the Lord on April 3, 2023, at Extendicare after many weeks of valiantly struggling there to overcome congestive heart failure.

In 2005, he suffered a stroke. He continued to excel in his career with Ontario Hydro of 35 years.

Richard was born in New Liskeard, Ontario, on October 1, 1952, to Gordon E. Males and Audrev V. Males.

He attended New Liskeard public schools and graduated from Northern College, Kirkland Lake Campus, with a diploma in electrical engineering technology.

Upon completion of his diploma in 1975, Richard and his wife moved to Kincardine and Richard took up his position at the Bruce Nuclear Power Plant.

After a couple of years, Richard decided the nuclear division was not his area of interest and he transferred to a position in hydro electrical generation in Fraserdale, a small Ontario Hydro community situated on the Abitibi River in the District of Cochrane.

There, the work was more to his liking, and he, Gaetane and their children Dennis and Michelle dwelled there for five years.

Richard was always one to be challenged and to continue to learn new knowledge and skills related to managing electrical generation and transmission, so in 1980, he and his family moved to New Liskeard to a new position and were blessed with a new addition to the family, Melynda.

Then it was on to Blind River, Sudbury and Barrie, each time taking on new areas of responsibility.

In his last few years with Ontario Hydro, his work frequently took him to Toronto at head office.

Upon retirement, Richard was approached by Areva to take on a position at the Bruce Nuclear Plant as an advisor, so he commuted for a few years from Barrie until he and Gaetane decided they would like to make their retirement home on Twin Lakes at the site of Richard's family summer cottage.

This took a little time to organize and execute, so in 2015, they moved to their new home.

Here also, Richard enjoyed the joys of living on a lake surrounded by boreal forest, the rewards of maintaining the grounds around his house, and the benefits of boating with his wife and taking his dog Shakynah on long daily walks.

> He gained much enjoyment from being involved in ministries in his church community in whatever capacity he was called to.

He also sat on the Temiskaming Hospital board for a few years and on the Temiskaming Pentecostal Church board.

In the fall of 2021, Richard and Gaetane moved to town to take up residence in an apartment with fewer demands upon them.

Richard is survived by his wife Gaetane (nee Lariviere); his children Dennis (spouse Danica), Michelle (spouse Marko) and Melynda (spouse Erik); grandchildren Teagan, Hailey, Tyra, Layla and Lochlan; his mother Audrey; brothers Terry (spouse Valerie) and David (spouse Ann Marie); many nieces and nephews and great-nieces and -nephews.

Predeceased by his son, Rodger John Patrick; dad, Gordon; and sister, Janice Leveille.

He will be missed by family, friends, church family, coworkers, all the ministers of GCMF and residents at Dymond Court.

The family is very thankful to everyone who has sent cards, phone calls, Facetime and visited him in the hospital and at Extendicare and for the continued prayers.

Healthy Blood Pressure — Know Your Number!

WHAT IS HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE?

High blood pressure, also known as hypertension, is a medical condition that exists when the force (or pressure) of the blood against blood vessel walls is too strong. Uncontrolled high blood pressure can lead to stroke, heart attack, congestive heart failure and kidney failure.

WHAT CAUSES HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE?

Many things can contribute to the development of high blood pressure — often it isn't just one thing, but a combination. The risk of high blood pressure increases as we get older and is most common among people over 40 years of age. Smoking, genetics and certain health conditions such as obesity, diabetes or kidney disease may also increase the risk.

KNOW YOUR NUMBER

According to Hypertension Canada, one in five Canadian adults has high blood pressure and 20% don't even know it because it has no symptoms. This is why it's also called the silent killer. Knowing and monitoring your blood pressure, especially if it's high, is important for staving healthy.

Your blood pressure should be less than 140/90 mmHg.

Low Risk Less than 120/80 mmHg 121/80 to 139/89 mmHg

Moderate Risk

Elevated Risk More than 140/90 mmHg

WHAT CAN YOU DO IF YOU HAVE HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE (HYPERTENSION)?

Diet and lifestyle changes are powerful tools in helping to lower high blood pressure:

- · If you smoke, get help to quit
- · Reduce the amount of sodium (salt) in your diet
- Limit alcohol to 1-2 standard drinks a day, or less
- Be active at least 2.5 hours a week, with each period of exercise lasting 10 minutes or more
- · Eat a healthy diet
- Manage your weight wisely by adopting a healthy lifestyle

If you're not sure what your blood pressure number is, drop by the Temagami Medical Centre to use our free blood pressure kiosk. Medical grade masks are still a requirement in health care settings, so please wear your mask. You can also call (705) 569-3244 to schedule an appointment to have your blood pressure checked by our nurse if this is something you'd like to have done.

EDITORIAL

Food insecurity

A recent Angus Reid poll says boy for excess? 56 per cent of Canadians are struggling to provide food for their families because they can't keep pace with inflation.

Closer to home, the Timiskaming Health Unit says one in five households struggle to afford food in our region. A further 15 per cent of Temiskaming's population lives with low income.

Thank goodness for the local food banks that work to ease the issue of food availability in our region.

They need our support more than ever.

We know grocery stores in our region give generously to area food banks and they must be thanked for their generosity.

Statistics Canada says grocery prices rose 9.8 per cent last year, more than double Canada's inflation rate, helping grocery chains achieve record profits.

Meanwhile, Loblaw president and chair Galen Weston just raked in a \$1.2 million salary increase for one year over and above the millions he is already making.

Would he then be the poster

A Dalhousie University study of 5,000 Canadians found that 23.6 per cent of the population cut back on food purchases with some even skipping meals, due in large part to rising food prices.

When people can't afford to eat properly their health suffers. Being able to purchase nutritious foods can and does impact the well being of low to middle income people.

Today's hungry child will become tomorrow's malnourished adult.

When are we going to wake up to the fact we need a basic income support program in this country?

While the recent Liberal grocery supplement given out via the GST rebate is a temporary help for low-income people, it does little to solve the problem of hunger.

We look forward to a time when the next headline we write will be "Food banks close as food insecurity ends."

The return of the raptors

Look way up and you will likely see a raptor returning to the Temiskaming region from southern wintering locations.

Raptors are birds of prey such as hawks, eagles, falcons, harriers and owls.

The spring migration is happening over our heads as we speak.

In my estimation, it is the eighth wonder of the world, where birds travel thousands of miles from warmer climates to the Boreal forest to nest and raise their young.

It is a true pleasure to observe the various species of birds as they summer in our region.

So far, I have seen three or four American kestrels this week, the tiniest members of the falcon family, sitting on telephone poles or on highway signs.

I have also seen two red tailed hawks.

I love the way they just drop from their perches onto the ground when they spot a rodent or other small animal in the fields below them.

I've seen many eagles that do not leave the region during the winter months, but have made this region their permanent home.

We rarely saw eagles in this part of the province in the past, but with climate change they may be coming north because of dwindling food sources in other locations.

Their wingspan is quite impressive and a mature bald eagle has a white head and tail versus the darker plumage of the one- to four-year-old juveniles.

It takes a bald eagle about five years to reach maturity.

Breeding pairs of bald eagles may stay together for decades, continuing to return to the same nest each year.

Since the lethal chemical DDT was banned, the eagle population has soared from near extinction just a few years ago.

Last weekend, on a clear sunny day, I watched as two bald eagles soared high above me.

All of a sudden they locked talons and began to freefall from the sky.

It was an incredible nature moment to witness this aerial display. They separated just as they got nearer to the ground and I let out a huge sigh of relief.

Then I saw another two eagles soaring high up in the sky, swirling in circles on updrafts around the sun.

I felt like I was getting my own personal air show as I watched the birds fly with the greatest of ease.

They swirled away slowly and eventually were just dots in the distance.

I was left feeling completely awestruck.

All birds returning to the north share a commonality, the urge to mate and raise a family.

And in the coming weeks our ears will be filled with birdsong as birds sing out their cheery mating calls.

There are thousands of birds passing over our heads on a daily basis during the spring migration.

Look up and scan the skies! You never know what you will see.

COVID-19 Guidance Update Mise à jour des directives relatives à la COVID-19

As part of Ontario's revisions to COVID-19, measures in long-term care homes, retirement homes, and other congregate living settings for residents, workers, and visitors have been updated and include the following:

- Testing of staff, caregivers, visitors, and residents returning from absence who don't show symptoms (asymptomatic) is no longer required.
- Masking outdoors is no longer recommended for residents, caregivers and visitors, although wearing a mask outdoors continues to be recommended for staff when they are near a resident.
- Daily temperature checks are only required for residents who are symptomatic, close contacts, or cases of COVID-19.
- · Physical distancing has been removed.

Timing makes a taxing difference

OTTAWA (NC) – When the tax deadline approaches every spring, some of us choose to file as soon as we can, and some might submit closer to the deadline.

But does the date you file really make a difference, as long as it's before the due

OTTAWA (NC) – When the date? In some ways the answer Saskatchewan, Manitoba and tax deadline approaches every is no. Ontario receive this payment

However, your timing can impact when you receive your benefit and credit payments, including the Climate Action Incentive Payment, known as the CAIP.

Eligible residents of Alberta,

Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario receive this payment to offset what they pay day-to-day for the federal price on pollution.

Although it's now paid in four instalments, you still have to file a tax return to receive the CAIP.

And whether or not you receive the next payment on April 14 is affected by how soon you file.

Canada Revenue Agency recommended filing your taxes electronically by March 10, because that provided the best chance to have your eligibility assessed and your payment processed ahead of the April 14 payment date.

But if you didn't file by that date, don't worry. The April payment will be included with the payment that next occurs after your tax return is filed and assessed.

Residents of Newfoundland and Labrador, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island may be eligible for the CAIP later this year.

But since the federal fuel charge will only begin in those provinces on July 1, the April 2023 payment will not apply to them.

Fox Run getting things moving with #Dear Terry

DISTRICT (Special) - It was April 12, 1980, when Terry Fox set out on his Marathon of Hope.

During this time and after Terry was forced to stop running, schools, offices, and communities across the country sent thousands of letters and drawings to express their admiration and support.

Forty-three years later, as registration opens for the annual Terry Fox Run, the Terry Fox Foundation is introducing a moving initiative inspired by those heartfelt words written by so many Canadians - Dear Terry.

"Since the Marathon of Hope, it has been incredible to see how Terry has remained a source of inspiration for millions of Canadians and people around the world, many of whom have continued to send in messages sharing their own personal connection," says Fred Fox, Terry's older brother.

"Every dollar raised by those that join or support the Terry Fox Run will help fund cancer research. It fills our family with joy to see how Terry's legacy continues to inspire future generations to participate and help realize his dream of a world without cancer."





New rules introduced for underground ventilation

SUDBURY (Special) – The Ontario government is introducing new rules to improve ventilation requirements in underground mines and lower exposure to harmful diesel exhaust.

Long-term exposure to diesel exhaust can be a significant cause of lung cancer in miners, said the Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development in a news re-

"Miners have been the backbone of Ontario's economy for generations, and we owe it to them and their families to do more to keep them safe," said Minister Monte McNaughton.

"These everyday heroes are critical to the future of our great province and I'm proud that our changes today will save lives."

The government is also making changes to allow for the use of track-mounted robots in mines to increase safety.

The specialized machines with a high-definition camera will be controlled by an operator to identify loose rocks, misfired explosives and other safety hazards, while keeping workers

"I come from a proud mining family and keeping workers safe has always been a top priority, but we can do better," said Mines Minister George Pirie.

"As our government helps companies build more mines, we need to attract the best and brightest to work in this exciting sector. These changes send the message that you can find safe, rewarding careers in Ontario's mining industry."

The province said the amendments respond to calls from unions for a reduction of how much diesel particulate miners can be exposed to underground and follow recommendations from the Mining Health, Safety and Prevention Review and recent coroner's inquests.

The regulatory amendments will come into force on July 1 and others on September 1 to allow employers time to comply.

The province said Ontario's level of exposure to harmful substances from diesel exhaust in underground mines will now be the most protective in North America.

As of September 1, the new exposure limit will be a time-weighted average exposure to elemental carbon of not more than 0.12 milligrams per cubic metre of air, instead of 0.4 milligrams per cubic metre of air based on total carbon.

"Today is a good day for Steelworkers and all other workers in mining who have been fighting for such a long time to make the underground air in their workplaces less dangerous," said Myles Sullivan, director with United Steelworkers (USW) District 6.

"The minister's announcement is important for improving workplace safety because there is a level of risk that these workers face every time they start a shift, and anytime we can lower that risk, it's a good thing.

"We also recognize that while the occupational exposure limit for diesel particulate in Ontario is being significantly lowered today, it is not down to the level that Steelworkers have been calling for, at 20 micrograms/cubic metre (0.02) milligrams per cubic metre). It is our hope and expectation that the province will get there in the very near future."

"Clean air and a healthy work environment are fundamental to worker health," said Janice Hobbs Martell, founder of the McIntyre Powder Project.

"Having witnessed the devastation of occupational disease on my dad and the McIntyre Powder Project mine workers, it is very encouraging to see this significant shift toward providing cleaner air for these workers.

"Thank you to Minister McNaughton for his commitment to continuing this progress, and thanks to the USW and CROSH (Centre for Research in Occupational Safety and Health) for championing this change."

The province said Ontario has approximately 5,000 operating mines, 37 of which are underground.

About 12,000 miners work below ground, and Ontario mines employ a total of about 29,000 workers.




