Zack's Crib on track to open **October 1**

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Zack's Crib is on track to meet the October 1 goal of opening its doors as a homeless shelter.

There is also the hope that the facility can provide day programs to help people who are experiencing homelessness.

Zack's Crib committee chair Yves Paille said in a telephone interview that the renovation stage of the work is a little ahead of schedule, "but that's okay because that will give us a buffer."

He said the operations committee is now discussing what services they want Zack's Crib to be able to offer. The committee is finalizing "the daily routines of Zack's Crib once we open up."

The committee is also looking at the job description for a director of the facility, volunteers and other paid employees, he added.

First, though, the committee is discussing whether the shelter will be open 24/7 with day programs, or whether it will only be a nighttime shelter.


Paille said Zack's Crib has received some funding from certain organizations that are stipulating how they want the funding to be used, "so that's going to steer the direction of Zack's Crib as well and it's the same direction that we have."

He said construction is coming along well and he visits the site at 183 Broadwood Avenue (near Lakeshore Road in New Liskeard) two or three times a week.

"The building is going to look nice," he commented.

Paille related that there are two major fundraising events being held this summer.

Canada Post pays tribute to Indigenous leaders with stamp set

OTTAWA (Special) - Canada Post will once again mark National Indigenous Peoples Day on June 21 by issuing a set of stamps honouring three Indigenous leaders.

Nellie Cournoyea, George Manuel and Thelma Chalifoux will each be featured on a stamp recognizing their dedication to advocate for the rights of the Inuit, First Nations and Métis communities they proudly served.

This stamp issue is the second in Canada Post's multiyear Indigenous Leaders stamp series, launched last year. Each stamp will be unveiled at local events in Ulukhaktok, Northwest Territories, North Vancouver, British Columbia and St. Albert, Alberta.

NELLIE COURNOYEA

Nellie Cournoyea (b. 1940) has devoted her life to fighting for Indigenous self-determination and Inuit empowerment. Selected as Premier of the Northwest Territories in 1991, she became the first Indigenous woman to head a provincial or territorial government in Canada.

She played a key role in the discussions leading to the creation of Nunavut, and after leaving office in 1995, she served for 20 years as chair and chief executive officer of the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation. An Officer of the Order of Canada, Cournoyea

is currently chair of the Nutrition North Canada Advisory Board and vice-chair of the Tuktoyaktuk Community Corporation.

GEORGE MANUEL

George Manuel (1921-1989) was a First Nations political leader, author and champion of Indigenous Peoples.

Over the course of a political career that spanned four decades, he held many influential roles and worked to improve the social, economic and political conditions of First Nations people in Canada.

His efforts contributed to the inclusion of Indigenous and treaty rights in the Canadian Constitution. Co-founder of the Center for World Indigenous Studies, Manuel was nominated three times for the Nobel Peace Prize and received many acknowledgments for his work, including an appointment as Officer of the Order of Canada.

THELMA CHALIFOUX

Thelma Chalifoux (1929-2017) was a Métis activist who channelled the strength she gained from her own personal challenges to help others and fight against discrimination.

The first Indigenous woman appointed to the Senate of Canada in 1997, she devoted her life to improving the welfare of her people, particularly Métis women.

She was instrumental in

helping create provincial programs for Indigenous Peoples in the areas of housing, education and social assistance. Chalifoux also served as Métis Elder in Residence at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology and helped found

the Métis museum and resource centre Michif Cultural Connections, located in St. Albert.

The new stamps and collectibles will be available at canadapost.ca and postal outlets across Canada starting June 21.

NOSM University holds inaugural convocation

SUDBURY (Staff) — NOSM, the only independent medical university in the country, held its first convocation on May 26.

The Northern Ontario School of Medicine (NOSM) University can now grant degrees that previously were granted under the Laurentian University and Lakehead University banners.

Sixty-four newly minted Medical Doctors (MD) are graduating from NOSM, including eight Indigenous and eight Francophone MDs.

That brings the total to 902 graduates since NOSM's inception in 2005.


The school accepted its charter class of 56 students in September and was officially

opened in 2005 by Premier Dalton McGuinty.

Many of those NOSM graduates have gone on to have successful medical careers across the North.

"Our new graduates bring a great deal of pride to our institution," said NOSM president, vice-chancellor/dean Dr. Sarita Verma in a press release. "They bring knowledge, compassion and a dedication to health equity and they are now ready to help others live in good health and with dignity. I am honoured to welcome them to the profession."

On the same day, Indigenous child rights advocate, Dr. Cindy Blackstock, was installed as NOSM University's inaugural chancellor.

A "fire bird"

Haunting and evocative, their calls came floating across the lake to me as I paddled along a green shoreline at dusk.

The mournful wail of the loons grabs my attention and pulls at my heartstrings.

When I hear loons calling the hair goes up on the back of my neck reminding me of our northern spirit, so wild and

In the birding world, there's often a bird that sparks your interest in birding called a fire bird.

This bird is credited with lighting a fire in you to take up birding, inspiring you from a casual interest to a full-fledged passion.

My fire bird is the loon and it changed my life in so many beautiful ways.

Observing loons on my favourite lake these last few years has made me realize there is a great big world of birds out there to delightfully learn about.

I have been hungry to expand my knowledge of birds since I became a regular visitor to the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre, a mecca for birds.

There is always something new and exciting to learn at the Marsh.

When I look back it was a natural progression to go from observing loons to wanting to learn more about birds.

What would our Northern summers be like without seeing and hearing Ontario's provincial bird, the common loon?

Did you know birdsong was found to be the natural sound most commonly linked to stress recovery?

I love it when a loon suddenly surfaces beside my canoe. And yes, this loony birder speaks to them in soft tones.

Loons can live up to 30 years and they mate for life.

I observed a pair of loons building a nest near the end of May and the mother loon has since laid two eggs.

However, the pair is acting strange and they're not sitting on the eggs, which worries

Last year they hatched one chick but it soon disappeared to predation.

This year it was looking marvelous when I spotted not one but two eggs in the nest.

The nest is located in an unsafe spot near a public beach and in a wet, swampy section of shoreline.

I am wondering if the hordes of blackflies around the nest may have driven the mother loon off the nest or a predator

scared her away.

I recommend the loon couple take a Parenting 101 class and get back on the nest, ha,

While I am hopeful there are plenty of loons successfully breeding on our lakes, the issue of declining loon populations is a reality.

That's why the Bird Studies Canada Canadian Lakes Loon Survey is so important to determining loon population declines.

Get involved if you observe loons and wish to protect

Can you imagine a Northern summer without loons?

No, I can't either.

Hyperthyroid and Hypothyroid Disorder Awareness

According to the Thyroid Foundation of Canada, 1 in 10 Canadians suffer from a thyroid condition of one type or another. And as many as 50% of those are undiagnosed.

Thyroid Disease is a Family Affair

The two most common types of thyroid disease are:

- Hypothyroidism (underactive thyroid)
- Hyperthyroidism (overactive thyroid)

Clinical features of hypothyroidism may include: poor appetite; intolerance to cold; dry, coarse skin; brittle hair; fatigue; constipation; muscle weakness; and poor memory retention. Sometimes the voice becomes croaky and hoarse. Examination may reveal dry, scaly, cold, pale skin; a thickening of the skin and underlying tissues; very slow reflexes; and a slow heart rate.

Clinical features of hyperthyroidism may include: weight loss, nervousness, irritability, intolerance to hot weather, excessive sweating, shakiness, and muscle weakness. Other signs include a rapid pulse, loss of body fat and muscle bulk, thyroid enlargement (goitre), fine tremors of the fingers and hot, moist, velvety skin.

Thyroid disorders for the most part are treatable; however, untreated thyroid disease can produce serious results in other parts of the body.

Each person's experience of thyroid illness will be different depending on a number of factors; a patient will not necessarily have all (or even any) of the above symptoms; some patients have the symptoms and no thyroid disease, maybe due to other causes. A primary care provider should be consulted if a thyroid disorder is suspected. Early diagnosis and treatment are crucial.

Zack's Crib is one of the beneficiaries of this year's North on Tap craft beer festival taking place July 8 on the Haileybury waterfront.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Paille has been working to fill volunteer spots at the major event, and about 20 more volunteers are needed to assist as brewery runners; at the registration table; to sell beer tickets; who have Smart Serve training; for front-entrance security; as site monitors; monitoring the kids' inflatables; and helping with tear-down on Sunday.

Volunteers are being asked to work a three-hour shift which in turn gets them a free ticket to attend the event, a free t-shirt, and a North on Tap mug or glass, said Paille.

The second event is the return of the Elk Lake Civic Holiday Weekend and Ball Tournament.

"This has been in the works for almost a year now. We have been approached and we are the main beneficiary

for the ball tournament as well." Paille, his store (Yves' Prime Cut Meats), and volunteers will be in charge of the food kiosk on behalf of Zack's

Fundraising never ends, he said, "because this building has to sustain itself and to do that (requires) fundraising."

Apart from grants and other financial subsidies, the committee has raised approximately \$250,000 over the past three years. That will be used for both renovations and for operations, Paille said.

Paille expressed gratitude to the companies that have made donations to Zack's

"I did a blitz in the spring and it was very successful. Major corporations in the area have reached out and have helped out a lot."

Paille added some companies have assured him that they will also be contributing once their financial year-ends are completed.

"It's very positive," he said. The larger vision is that Zack's Crib will not just be a do it one homeless person at place where homeless people can find shelter for the night, he said.

The Crib is attempting to partner with mental health organizations and the Timiskaming Health Unit so it can provide day programs as well, he commented.

"We won't be able to do that without the help of our local partners. We want to work together to see what we can do and plant the seed for whoever wants help and end homelessness. We can

a time and get them off the street, and get them a proper home."

He said his wife Lianne is particularly interested in providing outreach services, to encourage homeless people to use the new facility not only as a shelter, but as a centre to obtain the services it hopes to offer.

The couple initiated the project after a member of experienced their family homelessness.

FedNor recaps tourism support

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – FedNor recently recapped funding provided over the past couple of years for the tourism sector in the Temiskaming Shores area.

On the private sector side, Old Mission Resort – on the shore of Lake Temiskaming at the narrows in the Lorrain Valley – received an \$80,000 grant under the federal government's Tourism Relief Fund.

In a news release, FedNor said the funding will be used to modernize and upgrade its main lodge so the business can welcome more guests, increase revenue and operate year-round.

The work includes foundation replacement, installation of a steel roof, construction of a split-level deck, and the addition of a screened-in Muskoka room.

The City of Temiskaming Shores received an \$18,000 grant for the design and model of a wooden multiuse bridge over the Wabi.

The bridge – accessible to pedestrians, cyclists, and users of scooters and wheelchairs – was identified in the city's recreation master plan.

It was designed by a team of students and their professor from Laurentian University's McEwen School of Architecture working with Moses Structural Engineers of Toronto.

A model was presented to council late in 2021.

"As we move past the acute phase of the pandemic, Canada's tourism sector is showing strong signs of growth," said Randy Boissonnault, minister of tourism and associate minister of finance, in a recent news release.

Federal investments "over the last two years focused on the survival of our visitor economy," he continued.

"As we move to revival and the growth of the sector, we continue to provide targeted support to tourism businesses so they can keep delivering unforgettable experiences."

Tips on ticks and avoiding Lyme disease

DISTRICT (Special) - The Ontario government is encouraging people across the province to take precautions to prevent tick bites and reduce the risk of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses when enjoying the outdoors.

Lyme disease is a potentially serious infection that comes from being bitten by an infected blacklegged tick, commonly known as a deer tick. Symptoms include fever, headache, muscle and joint pain, fatigue, and an expanding circular rash that resembles a bulls-eye.

Ticks commonly live in wooded areas, tall grasses, and bushes and can be found almost anywhere in Ontario, including city gardens and parks.

"It is important to protect ourselves from Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses," said Sylvia Jones, Deputy Premier and Minister of Health.

"With tick populations expanding every year, the number of people at risk of tick bites is increasing. By taking simple precautions, Ontarians can protect themselves and their families when enjoying time outdoors in our beautiful province."

You can protect yourself from tick bites by:

- wearing light-coloured clothing, so it's easier to spot ticks
- wearing long-sleeved shirts, long pants tucked into your socks, and closed-toed shoes
- using an insect repellent with DEET or icaridin in it
- checking yourself, your children, and your pets for ticks after being outdoors. Any ticks found should be removed promptly
- putting clothes on high heat in a dryer for at least 10 minutes before washing clothing after spending time outdoors.

"We are seeing an increase in cases of Lyme and other diseases transmitted by ticks in line with other jurisdictions," said Dr. Kieran Moore, Chief Medical Officer of Health.


"Simple, precautionary measures can reduce the risk of getting bitten by a tick. This includes being vigilant in wooded or grassy areas, even in your backyard, and doing routine tick checks after enjoying the outdoors."

Ticks are very small and hard to see. When a tick is found, it should be removed immediately using fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to your skin as possible. Once the tick has been removed, wash the area with soap and water and then disinfect the area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or an iodine swab.

If you have any health concerns after a tick bite, consult a health care provider as soon as possible. Most cases of Lyme disease can be treated successfully with antibiotics.

QUICK FACTS

- Infected blacklegged ticks can be found almost anywhere in the province. There have been over 3,000 cases of Lyme disease in Ontario since 2021.
- If left untreated, Lyme disease can make you feel tired and weak. In severe cases, it can affect your heart, nerves, liver, and joints, and, in very rare cases, cause death.
- While ticks are most active in spring and summer, they can be found during any time of the year when the temperature is above freezing.


