Temagami Canada Day includes music, activities

TEMAGAMI - Temagami is adapting to the call for inclement weather on Canada Day weekend.

Plans for a Friday evening concert and Saturday outdoor activities are now being altered and moved indoors.

Temagami parks and recreation co-ordinator John Shymko has advised that the bouncy castles will be brought into the arena in Temagami North, along with everything else, unless the weather forecast changes.

A live concert by the Jesse Thomas Band will now be taking place at the Bunny Miller Theatre at the municipal complex in downtown Temagami. It will be getting underway Friday, June 30, at 8 p.m.

There will be no fireworks in Temagami this Canada Day due to area forest fire conditions, he stated.

Shymko said the concert is being held Friday evening because the bar in town will be having a live band perform Saturday night and the town didn't want to compete with them.

On Canada Day July 1 the centre of activities will be at the Temagami arena in Temagami North.

The festivities were held at the waterfront in past years, but the arena has more space, plus more of the community lives there, said Shymko. Continued on 3

The TFMC Scholarship Program is available to all students who:

- are enrolled in a post-secondary educational program in the Fall of 2023, working towards a Degree, Diploma or Certificate in forestry, environmental sciences, biology, or a related field.
- permanently reside, and completed secondary school within the past five years, on the Temagami Forest land base including: Temagami, Bear Island, Cobalt, Latchford and Temiskaming Shores, or the communities in which one of our primary receiving mills is located (i.e., Elk Lake, Englehart or Sturgeon Falls).

Applicants are required to:

- 1. complete the Application Form (found at <u>www.temagamiforest.com</u>)

- 3. submit proof of application to one of the identified post-secondary programs
- 4. submit two letters of reference (one may be from a teacher)
- submit either a 300-word short essay or a 5-minute video presentation, describing their interest in the field of forestry, environmental sciences, or biology, and why they are choosing to pursue a career in that field.

AVAILABLE FUNDING

Scholarships, each worth up to \$2,500, will be awarded, (50% or \$1,250 is available to part-time students), to a maximum total of \$12,500.

The application deadline for this scholarship program is **September 30, 2023.** Applications will be reviewed by the TFMC Scholarship & Work Force Development program committee. Before being awarded a scholarship, the successful applicant must provide proof of enrolment into one of the indicated programs.

Before you head outdoors:

Check the air quality forecast by going to <u>https://weather.gc.ca/airquality/</u> <u>pages/index e.html</u>. This Air Quality Health Index (AQHI) was developed in partnership with Health Canada. It updates twice a day and provides a risk rating on a scale of 1 to 10+. One to three represents a low health risk, four to six is a moderate risk and seven to 10 is considered high risk. Very high pollution levels are considered "10+".

When Smoke is Thick and the Air Quality is Bad:

Stay indoors if possible, closing any potential ways smoke might enter your home. If you have an underlying health condition like asthma, for example, think about asking your health care provider for a renewal of your inhaler ahead of time.

If you do need to venture out on smoky days, you can use a well fitted N95 mask. You can tell that it fits well if, when you breathe in, the mask sucks into your face. If you can feel the air coming around the sides, then it's not a good fit or maybe it needs to be better moulded to your face.

Health Risks:

Your body will try to protect itself against the smoke particles by making more tears and mucous.

Exposure to wildfire smoke can cause:

- runny nose
- · scratchy throat
- irritated sinuses
- headache
- cough
- · difficulty breathing
- · chest pain

Children, older adults, and pregnant women may feel the effects of smoke earlier and have more severe symptoms than others in the community. Smoke exposure can worsen existing lung conditions such as COPD and asthma, and it can also worsen cardiovascular outcomes.

If you have uncontrolled coughing, wheezing or choking, or your breathing does not improve when you go indoors, consult your health care provider or call 811 or chat online at **ontario.ca/health811**.

Clear the Air

Even after the air quality advisories lift and the skies look clear, there's still work to be done. Smoke can get inside your home despite your best efforts to keep it out. When the air clears again, open all the windows to let any smoky air that's built up inside your house out.





The Fire Ban will remain in effect until Fire Hazard conditions improve.

Developing a taste for haskaps

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) - You may have seen them or heard about them.

On July 8, you'll have a chance to taste them.

Grower Graham Gambles will have two or three varieties of haskap berries available for visitors to try at the Saturday morning Riverside Farmers' Market.

Gambles has also provided berries to six market vendors who will have products available that incorporate the deep blue berry.

The July 8 event ties into National Haskap Days, a Canada-wide promotion of the unique berry.

Meanwhile, Gambles is also inviting visitors to drop by his haskap acreage on the West Road outside Haileybury.

From 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. July 3 through 7, visitors can drop by for an informal tour and see haskap varieties at different stages of maturity.

"Do a bit of comparative taste-testing on the side and learn how to both pick the berries and identify if they're actually ripe," said Gambles in an email.

Visitors may also be able to pick their own berries, but only if the weather cooperates.

Picking wet berries turns into juice manufacturing, he said.



Timmins now offers 10-day passport service

TIMMINS (Special/Staff) - The expansion of 10-day passport service to Timmins has a stamp of approval from the region's MP.

"People are travelling all the time," said Timmins-James Bay MP Charlie Angus in a news release.

"People require a passport turnaround time that meets the needs of Northerners. It is not fair to have to travel to Southern Ontario to get these services," said the New Democrat MP.

The expansion of 10-day service to Service Canada centres in Timmins as well as Dryden took effect June 21.

It means Canadians can apply for a passport and pick it up in 10 business days or receive it by mail (mail time not included).

In Ontario, ten-day service is also available at Service Canada locations in Sudbury, Sault Ste. Marie, Barrie and Kingston.

Angus said ten-day service provides certainty for those who must travel on short notice.

"We have pushed for regional centres to ensure fairness across the country. I have long argued the merits of putting this service in Timmins, and I thank the government for working with us on this important addition to passport services."

Canadians who need their passport in less than 10 business days must visit a passport office that offers express or urgent pick-up service.

For mail-in applications and applications submitted at regular Service Canada centres, the goal is 20 business days.

Since March 21, Canadians have been able to get real-time updates, 24 hours a day, on the processing of their applications through the online Passport Application Status Checker.

In the 2022–23 fiscal year, Service Canada issued 3.35 million passports.

It forecasts that between 4.3 million and 4.9 million passports will be issued in the 2023-24 fiscal year.





- · Inspect and clean the lint screen after each load of laundry. The build-up of lint can lead to a fire. Regularly remove lint from ducts and exhaust vents.
- Regularly inspect the outdoor vent to ensure it is unobstructed.
- Turn the dryer off if you leave home or when you go to bed.
- Keep the area around the dryer **clear** • of items that can burn.


What are Sharrows? A bicycle sharrow, two chevrons painted above a bicycle symbol on the road, indicates the lane is shared by both bicyclists and motorists.

Vehicle and bicycle traffic may be in the lane. Remember sharrows do not mean that the indicated space is exclusively for bicyclists.





