Cobalt considering road safety through town

COBALT - The winding streets of Cobalt were among topics discussed during a strategic planning session by Cobalt council.

Each councillor was asked to put forward ideas for improvements to the town.

Councillor Jim Starchuk, who was absent from the June 13 meeting, submitted his suggestions in writing, which were read out by Mayor Angela Adshead. Starchuk's eye first settled on the location adja-

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Street and Ferland Avenue close to the northeast side of town where he would like to see a four-way stop sign.

He also proposed two three-way stop signs at the intersections of Lang Street and Argentite Street; and the intersection of Prospect Avenue and Galena Street. He observed that there is difficulty at those locations in seeing oncoming traffic due to hills and sharp turns.

Councillor Gary Hughes suggested a lit crosswalk should be installed adjacent to the school. He also envisioned there could be merit in looking into whether there might be funding sources for the project which would increase student safety.

The town has a 40 kilometre-per-hour speed limit along those streets, but Adshead stated that "we all know that there people who definitely don't go 40 through town."

Councillor Doug Wilcox expressed the view that

cent to St. Patrick School at the intersection of Lang installing three-way stops along the roads through the town would not be feasible, and added his view that there is value in maintaining traffic flow through the town.

> Instead, he suggested making Argentite Street a one-way street going northward. Other traffic could merge out onto Silver Street from the north near the fire hall on Silver Street North.

"That solves the problem," he said.

The suggestions for pedestrian safety and traffic safety are being passed on to the public works superintendent for consideration.

MPP looks back on winter/spring session

As the legislature rises for the summer, it is a good time to reflect on the last session.

In the last question period, the Premier, while listing his achievements, claimed that the provincial economy was "on fire"; sadly, the smoke we were smelling in the legislature was from forest fires, not the economy as job growth slows and recession looms.

While there have been many announcements about economic investment, life for most Ontarians is not getting easier.

The cost of housing, food, and other living expenses has risen which has affected everyone, but for those in lower income brackets, they are now forced to use food banks and charities regularly.

So, Ontario is a great place to live, but we have some serious problems, and it has become clear that the Ford government's go-to solution is to help large-scale private investors rather than citizens.

HEALTH CARE

Ontario's public health care system is struggling with a staffing crisis, partly caused by the government's suppression of wages.

Emergency departments are closing temporarily across the province and, in some cases, permanently.

The Ford government's solution was to allow more for-profit health care centres to open. So, while operating rooms that the people of Ontario have already paid for sit unused, for-profit operating rooms are being built.

These for-profit providers do not face the same wage constraints as the public sector, so staff will continue to migrate to the for-profit side, making the staffing crisis in our public hospitals and clinics even more acute.

In the North, we are still struggling to recruit and keep doctors, and this is made even worse by spreading doctors between these two systems.

Although the Ford government maintains that all services will continue to be funded through OHIP, there have already been cases of private clinics up-selling people requiring medical care.

The NDP proposes to concentrate our tax investment on the publicly owned side, making sure that hospitals and public clinics have the funding and tools they need to make full use of their facilities, and to attract and maintain their

Meanwhile, the Ford government continued to fight nurses in court and maintained that the private sector would be the solution to take the pressures they caused off the

public system.

Unfortunately, Ford's solutions will cost Ontario's taxpayers more, but for far less

HOUSING

Another issue Ontarians are facing is a serous housing crisis. People looking to buy a home are continuing to find them unaffordable and rent has gone through the roof.

The Ford government has decided to open large areas of previously protected land in the Greenbelt and other areas to allow for more houses to be

Interestingly, some of the land was purchased by land speculators with ties to the Ford government just before the government changed its designation.

What makes this move even more questionable is that the government's own housing Continued on 20

Optimizing Snacking

Food not only provides us with the energy and the fuel we need but also produces enjoyment, identifies culture, holds tradition and creates community. Every time we eat offers an opportunity to nourish our bodies and enrich our lives.

Snacks are an important part of our daily eating habits and can help us to receive all of the nutrients we require. Incorporating delicious, nutrient-dense snack options can therefore help us to meet our daily nutrition needs and provide us with adequate energy. Below is a list of tips to help improve snacking as well as some snack ideas.

Tips for Snacking:

- Choose a "Veggie Song". Cutting up vegetables and fruits ahead of time allows for easy 'grab and go', nutrientdense, snack options. This task however can feel cumbersome. Choosing a 2-4 minute song, that you enjoy, allows you to set a couple of minutes aside to accomplish the task while listening to a favourite tune.
- **Store individually.** Pre-portioning non-perishable items such as whole-wheat crackers, roasted chickpeas, rice cakes and trail mix, increases the convenience of these high-fiber or protein packed options. Consider storing muffins, and/or pancakes individually in the freezer for an easy 'grab and go' snack to enjoy later.
- **Incorporate what you love.** This will look different for everyone and may include exploring new flavours, including cultural favourites, sharing ideas with family and friends or finding creative ways to modify old-time favourites based on health motivators.

Snack Ideas. A whole grain muffin and an orange; a hard-boiled egg and a pear; pumpkin seeds and berries on yogurt; apple slices and cheese; egg salad or labneh spread (a soft Middle Eastern cheese made from strained yogurt) on whole grain crackers.

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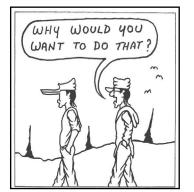

Tiny but deadly!

across Northern Ontario this last while.

The smoke from the forest fires has caused all sorts of health problems for people with respiratory issues and other ailments.

Not only have we lost thousands of hectares of prime forests, but wildlife has been displaced also.

While cigarettes don't account for all forest fires, they certainly account for some of them.

For example, in 2019, seven Vancouver Island fires over the course of seven days were attributed to discarded cigarette butts.

Part of the issue with the butts is they can be tossed out the window, roll into dry grasses on the side of the road and ignite.

But not only are cigarette butts a cause of forest fires, they are the leading item

We've seen quite a few forest fires collected during environmental clean up days across the world.

> There is an estimated 766,571 metric tons of cigarette butts deposited into the environment each year.

> They are the most abundant form of plastic waste in our world, leaching toxic chemicals onto our streets and waterways.

> It is a common occurrence in our communities to see cigarette butts on area streets due to smokers going outside to smoke.

> How many times have we pulled up to a parking lot and found a large pile of discarded cigarette butts?

> Not only are the butts an ugly sight, they are hazardous to pets and small children.

> And they can potentially cause fires if not extinguished properly.

> Please be mindful when extinguishing your smoking materials.

Grandes Rivières board names new director of ed

TIMMINS (Special) - A former teacher with what's now the regional French Catholic school board has become the board's top administrator.

The Conseil scolaire catholique de district des Grandes Rivières (CSCDGR) has appointed Jérémie Lepage as director of education and secretary-treasurer of the board.

"His passion for Catholic education, innovative vision, and inspiring leadership will be invaluable assets to our board," said board chair Roger Grégoire in a news release.

"Together, we will continue to provide a quality education while encouraging our students to reach their full potential."

Lepage replaces Sylvie Petroski, who is retiring at the end of this year.

Lepage has been with the board since the

late 1990s, beginning as a teacher at École catholique St-Jules in Moonbeam. He went on to work as a learning consultant, school principal and supervisory officer, overseeing such areas as special education, mental health and school safety.

In a statement, Lepage said he accepts the new post with "immense pride and a deep sense of responsibility."

"I am committed to working closely with our educational community to ensure quality educational programs based on Catholic values and to support the academic, social, and spiritual development of every student."

Lepage will serve as the associate director of education beginning September 1, and take over officially January 1, 2024.

The dawn chorus

"Someone has put cries of birds on the air like jewels." Anne Carson

It was 5:30 a.m. when I awoke to the sound of the dawn chorus.

At first I grimaced and then I got up, splashed water across my face, grabbed an apple and headed to my canoe.

I was on holidays and it was indeed time I woke up to our wild world.

The dawn chorus is when birds begin to sing at their most feverish pitch.

Scientists aren't sure why the birds do this, but it might have something to do with mating, territory and a love of life.

In the last few years I have become more aware of bird song and I try to identify the birds that I do hear.

This particular morning it was American robins, sparrows and warblers that woke me and sounded like a choir of angels as I paddled around the lake.

The dawn bird song sounds intense because as the still morning air allows sound to travel more easily and less noise from human movement, like traffic, sharpens the sound.

Our avian friends are reminding us it's another beautiful day and that breath we just took is a gift.

A few weeks ago I travelled to Callander, Ontario, to hear author Merilyn Simmonds speak about the life of Louise de Kiriline Lawrence, the Dionne Quint's first nurse in 1934.

De Kiriline Lawrence was also a respected and renowned Canadian ornithologist.

The book is called Woman, Watching: Louise de Kiriline Lawrence and the Songbirds of Pimisi Bay.

The book chronicles Louise's life as a Swedish aristocrat to her arrival in Northern Ontario and the 50 years she spent as a bird watcher at her log cabin in the woods near Pimisi Bay.

She studied birds from 1952 to 1959 and some of her data on certain species of birds is found at the Royal Ontario Museum.

Louise once recorded a red-eyed vireo that sang 70 songs per minute and by noon had sung 14,027 songs.

She also recorded a bird that sang for 14 hours straight with upwards of 22,197 songs in that time period.

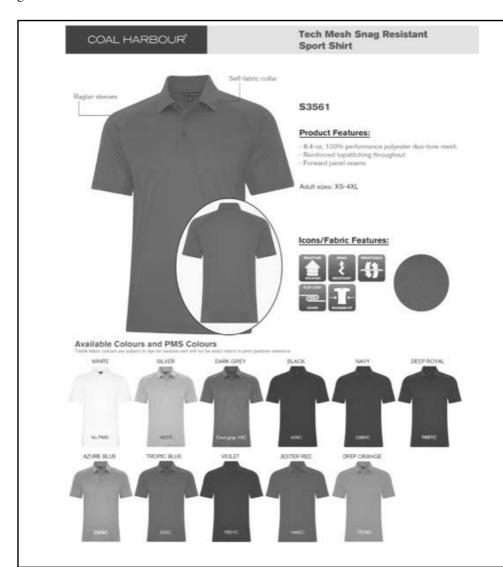
I sing de Kiriline Lawrence's praises because it is long past the time she be celebrated as a world-class ornithologist from Northern Ontario.

There are two sounds made by birds - calls and songs indicating species, location, territory, defensive mechanisms, mating and when danger is near.

We are made joyous from birdsong.

Birds don't own anything, they don't have deadlines and they are free to fly away if the current environment isn't to their liking.

Why wouldn't birds sing?



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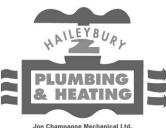
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A SHOE-IN

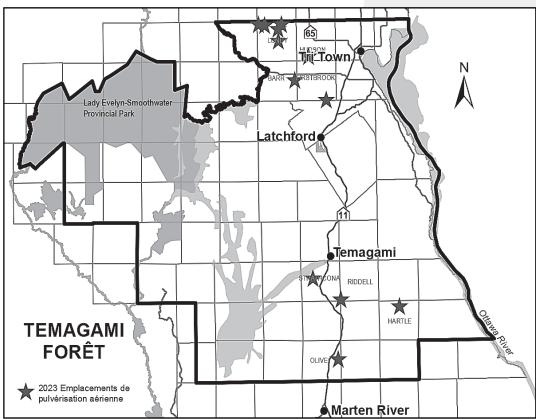

RVs, Trailers and Campers: Propane and Barbecue Safety Tips When Transporting Cylinders:

- · Ensure propane cylinders are upright and secure during transport.
- · Keep cylinder valves closed and protected during transport.
- · Plug or cap cylinder outlets during transport.

When Using Cylinders:

- · Ensure cylinders are upright and secure on a firm footing.
- · Check cylinder connections and hoses for leaks by brushing a 50/50 mix of liquid soap and water onto all connections and hoses. Rising bubbles when you turn on the valve indicate a leak. Tighten connections or repair the hose until there are no bubbles.
- Keep cylinders away from flame, heat, and exits.

Using Propane in your RV or Camper:

- Keep all combustion exhaust vents on the exterior wall of your RV or camper clear of obstructions.
- · Use stovetop burners or ovens only for cooking and not as a source of heat.
- Propane appliances require an adequate supply of fresh air for proper combustion. Ensure your RV or camper is properly ventilated to prevent build-up of carbon monoxide.
- Install a carbon monoxide alarm and propane leak detector.

Barbecue Safety:

- · Ensure barbecues are on firm, level footing.
- Keep barbecues well away from the side of your RV, camper or tent, and other combustibles.
- · Make sure igniter buttons work properly before turning the gas on. If there is no igniter, insert a long match or barbecue lighter through the side burner hole before you turn on the grill controls.
- · Keep barbecues clean of grease to prevent flare-ups.
- · Stay by the grill when cooking and keep kids and pets at a safe distance.
- Turn off all burner controls and tank valves after each use.

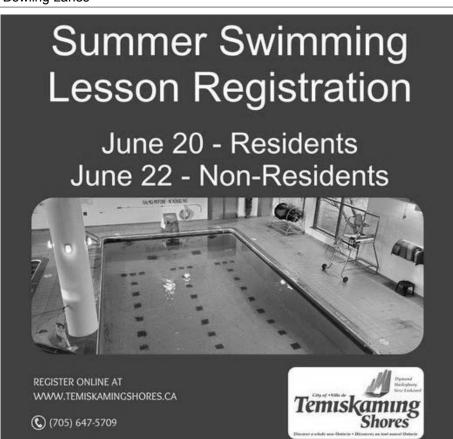

Sharrows

What are Sharrows?

A bicycle sharrow, two chevrons painted above a bicycle symbol on the road,

indicates the lane is shared by both bicyclists and motorists.

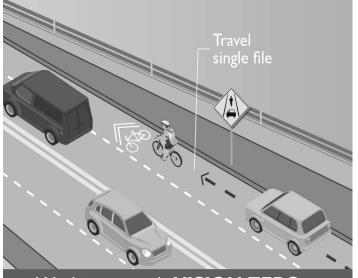
Vehicle and bicycle traffic may be in the lane. Remember sharrows do not mean that the indicated space is exclusively for bicyclists.

Bicyclists

Bicyclists should "take the lane" by riding closer to the middle of the lane to reduce the risk of vehicles passing too closely.

Motorists

Sharrows closer to the middle of the lane remind you that it is unsafe to drive side-by-side with bicyclists. When bicyclists claim the lane, be patient and share the road.

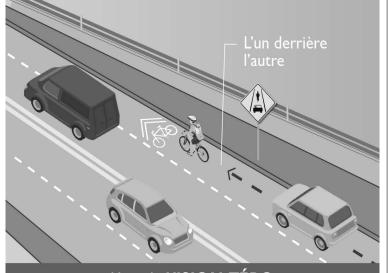

task force said that land availability is not the problem. There was already enough land approved for development prior to the Greenbelt being opened up.

The government also prohibited municipalities from charging development fees for new housing. These fees pay for the streets, water and sewers in municipalities.

This change transfers the tax burden on to existing homeowners which forces municipal taxes to rise quickly where new homes are being built.

There is also no guarantee that any cost savings will be transferred through the developer to the purchaser. Furthermore, although developers play a crucial role in a housing strategy, and they need to make a profit to build homes, the government also needs to invest in housing for low- and middle-income earners. Without affordable housing, the housing crisis will not end

TRANSPORTATION

Finally, transportation has been a crucial issue for Ontarians.

The Ford government has made announcements regarding subway and highway developments in the greater Toronto Area. Some of the highway proposals are particularly contentious, but in the North, highway safety continues to be of great concern.

The volume of truck traffic and the aggressiveness of some drivers is an issue that I continue to bring up to the government at every opportunity.

For most Northerners, the TransCanada Highway is our main street and the only main route anywhere. The Minister of Transportation has announced the 2-plus-1 pilot project and we are anxiously waiting for construction to start.

The government has also announced the purchase of train sets for the return of the Northlander, which is something we have all been pushing for a very long time. I remain concerned about this promise.

The fact that there is currently only one bus a day serving our area to North Bay does not bode well for a train service in the long run.

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
