Fire restrictions ease but caution urged

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – Restrictions on campfires and open-air burning were eased in some areas earlier this week.

But fire officials are urging the public to continue to take care.

At 4 p.m. July 11, the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry lifted the restricted fire zone (RFZ) that had been in place across much of the province since June 1.

In Temiskaming Shores and Harris Township, the municipal fire ban in effect since May 29 was also lifted at 6 p.m. July 12.

But while open-air fires are now permitted, the city's fire department reminded the public to use "extreme caution" when burning.

In an announcement, it noted that burn permits are required for any open-air fire in the municipality, and no fires are allowed between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

"Only burn during the coolest and calmest time of the day. Don't even consider burning when it is windy," it urged.

Further information can be found on the city's website and Facebook page.

Residents should contact their respective municipalities to see the status of local fire restrictions.

The ministry, for its part, said a number of factors are taken into account when considering fire restrictions.

They include daily weather and fire conditions, forecasts, the number of active wildland fires, and the resources needed to manage current and potential fires.

In an update, the ministry's aviation, forest fire and emergency services in the Northeast Fire Region stated:

"Lifting the RFZ does not mean we can let our

Temagami Family Health Team Submitted by Ellen Ibey Hot Weather Safety for Physical Activity

Hotter weather has arrived in most parts of Canada. We look forward to this time of year, but too much heat is not good for anyone. It can be riskier as we get older. When we are active, our muscles produce heat. This causes a rise in body temperature.

Our bodies do two things to manage the increase in body heat:

- Our heart rate increases to help deliver blood to the surface of the skin for heat release
- · We start to sweat, which helps with cooling

Both of these functions are reduced as we get older. That raises the risk of heat-related illness when we are physically active in the heat, either outdoors or in hot conditions indoors.

Heat-related illness includes cramps, dizziness, edema (water retention and swelling) and exhaustion. There is also a more severe condition known as heat stroke.

Should we stop being active when it gets hot?

Older Canadians do tend to be less active when the weather gets hot and humid. But it is important to stay physically active all year round. In fact, older adults who are more physically fit can adapt better during exercise in the heat.

Hot weather tips

- Older adults should not participate in strenuous physical activities in hot/humid conditions outdoors, especially if they are not used to the conditions or are not used to being physically active.
- Take it easier when you exercise and be active during the cooler times of the day -- early morning or late evening, if you are not able to be active in an air-conditioned environment.
- Wear loose fitting, lightweight, moisture-wicking clothing. Cotton clothing can be cooler.
- Stay hydrated. As we get older, we do not notice thirst as much. That increases the risk for dehydration. Don't wait until you feel thirsty. Drink lots of fluids, especially during exercise.

If you are taking medication or have a health condition, ask your doctor or pharmacist if it increases your health risk in the heat and follow their recommendations.

Climate change accountability

While most of Northern Ontario experienced unusually hot and humid temperatures the last week of June and the first week of July, prompting massive fire bans, we were not alone in the high heat category.

For the third time last week, Earth set an unofficial heat record, say climatologists.

The planetary average hit 17.23 C on July 5, surpassing the 17.18 C mark set the day before.

The outcry across the world involves two words -climate change.

While the increasing heat due to a thinner layer of ozone around the earth is no doubt causing extreme weather patterns like high heat, floods and the like, the average Canadian is not alone in feeling helpless about the situation.

The world has eight billion people and Canada is now at the 40 million mark.

How does a massive effort to avert climate change happen when we are dependent on fossil fuels and massive resource extraction practices?

How do we change lifestyle habits by switching to energy efficient transportation like electric vehicles, which are pricey, when high inflation is challenging people just to put food on the table? We have seen it time and time again where lectures on climate change and reducing our carbon footprint does little to solve the actual problem.

Simplistic solutions make for great sound bites but poor public policy.

It is the politicians, big businesses and the like that need to implement the policies necessary to help us switch our lifestyles to more environmentally friendly and affordable ones.

Our government has imposed a climate change carbon tax to try and dissuade people from using fossil fuels.

But where is the evidence that the government is using the carbon tax to address climate change issues?

Those monies just get pooled into the general tax revenues of the federal government.

Where are the incentives such as sizeable rebates for people who might be interested in purchasing electric or hybrid vehicles?

Where is the clout from the feckless Green Party of Canada?

Until there is more action and reflection from the biggest polluters and climate change lecturers, we will not see the changes needed to affect the course of global warming.

The tall pines of Temagami greeted me as I drove down the Mine Access Road to the first pow wow being held at Shiningwood Bay last weekend.

I knew the day was going to be good when I saw a Cooper's Hawk perched on a wire representing the vision I was about to behold.

Some First Nation people view hawks as symbols of power and courage.

I have attended two local pow wows this summer.

The first was the Timiskaming First Nation Mill Creek Pow Wow, held on June 21, National Indigenous Peoples Day.

It was an incredible sight when 14 busloads of children attended the event from area schools.

The second was the Tema-

fire danger one day, followed by high to extreme hazard the next simply based on the surface forest fuels drying out quickly, leading to fires starting easily and higher rates of fire spread under the right burning conditions."

The province noted that a restricted fire zone could be reinstated in areas of higher risk, depending on conditions.

In Temiskaming, the only active wildfire as of July 11 is now listed as under control.

Kirkland Lake 5, which was spotted June 7 near Lady Evelyn Lake, has ranged over an estimated 2,300 hectares.

As of 6 p.m. July 11, there were 31 active wildland fires in the Northeast.

One was not under control, one was being held, nine were under control, and 20 were being observed.

gami First Nation Traditional Pow Wow, held at Shiningwood Bay from July 8 to 9.

Both events were profoundly beautiful and powerful.

I was amazed at a comment I heard during the Mill Creek Pow Wow. I mentioned the event was being held on the Timiskaming First Nation traditional territory.

Someone near me in the crowd said no, Mill Creek was not part of the TFN's traditional territory. It certainly is as I have educated myself on the boundaries of the Timiskaming and Temagami First Nation territories.

In this day and age of truth and reconciliation, pow wows are a perfect way to learn about Indigenous culture, to celebrate who our Indigenous brothers and sisters are and to fully appreciate their culture and traditions.

Did you know that Canada's Indian Act of 1876 forbid Indigenous people from gathering to celebrate their culture?

It wasn't until 1951 that a bill was passed allowing Indigenous people to gather and celebrate their culture at pow wows. The Indian Act is a shameful, oppressive document that needs to be abolished.



I myself have such an appreciation for Indigenous culture, the people and our mutual respect for Mother Earth.

I absolutely love the different styles of regalia including the jingle, shawl and traditional men's fancy dance.

Seeing the brightly coloured regalia just cheers you up when the dancing happens.


Guest speaker and elder Phil Beaucage said it is important to teach the youth about their culture and to pass on teachings to them.

If anything is going to change in this country to bring people closer to truth and reconciliation it will be because of the children.

They represent our future, they have the power to see people for who they are. I see the power of the pow wow in their faces as they dance, sing and pray. They will pave the way to a more loving, compassionate world free of bigotry and hatred.

A traditional pow wow is a celebration, but it is also a deeply spiritual event.



Board ONE approves \$148.9-million budget

TIMMINS (Special/Staff) – The regional English public school board has approved a balanced operating budget of \$148.9 million for the 2023-24 school year.

That's up from the \$140.8 million in the 2022-23 budget.

On June 20, District School Board Ontario North East (DSB1) also approved capital spending estimates of almost \$20.2 million for the coming year.

That is up from last year's \$19.44 million.

Trustees also approved a total staffing complement of 1,032 full-time equivalents for the

coming school year.

The staffing tally is up eight positions over last year's budget.

"We are proud to approve a budget that supports students in our strategic planning," said board chair Bob Brush in a news release.

The board oversees 25 elementary schools and 10 high schools in a region stretching from Temagami to Hearst.

Its projected enrolment in September is 7,057, which is up 400 from budget figures a year ago.





A bicycle sharrow, two chevrons painted above a bicycle symbol on the road, indicates the lane is shared by both bicyclists and motorists.


Vehicle and bicycle traffic may be in the lane. Remember sharrows do not mean that the indicated space is exclusively for bicyclists.

Bicyclists

Bicyclists should "take the lane" by riding closer to the middle of the lane to reduce the risk of vehicles passing too closely.

Motorists

Sharrows closer to the middle of the lane remind you that it is unsafe to drive sideby-side with bicyclists. When bicyclists claim the lane, be patient and share the road.
