Library foregoing late fines for some overdue materials

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) - If you're a little late in returning a book or DVD to the Temiskaming Shores library, don't worry about a fine – just bring it back.

The library is launching a pilot project that will see it eliminate overdue fines for some traditional materials that are not returned on time.

Fines can discourage some community members from using the library, said library CEO Rebecca Hunt in a news release announcing the fine-fee trial project.

"Studies have shown that fines do not actually deter people from returning items late, but can discourage people from using libraries for fear of fines.

"We wanted to remove this barrier and help ensure equitable access to library collections, which are shared by all members of our community."

The pilot project runs from now until the end of 2024, and will see no fines charged for overdue books, DVDs, audiobooks, magazines and puzzles.

If anyone does wish to pay a late fine, the library said it will accept donations.

And fines will continue to be charged for less traditional and more costly library materials.

They include WiFi hotspots, Ontario Parks passes, pool passes, carbon monoxide detectors, backpacks, walking poles, indoor and outdoor games, snowshoes, and radon detectors.

Fines for these items reflects the staff time involved in tracking down the more expensive items when they're overdue or missing.

And while fines have been eliminated for other items, there's still an incentive to return items on time.

Overdue accounts will be suspended and mem-Continued on 3



EDITORIAL **Temiskaming needs a** clear evacuation plan

With the number of mishaps on Highway 11 and the number of closures of said highway, often lasting for eight hours or more, and with wildfires burning out of control, the Temiskaming region needs a clear, concise evacuation plan.

Living in Northern Ontario can be challenging, particularly when we have only one major highway leading in and out of the region.

We have seen increased numbers of highway closures these last few years, especially during winter months, which is of concern.

The communities of South Temiskaming could benefit from a combined evacuation plan that is clear, concise and easily accessed.

It would be a well-communicated plan to point out the roles of all emergency personnel should a major occurrence happen whereby communities need to be evacuated or when roads are blocked off.

Hopefully, people will see fit to get together to put a plan in place that puts the safety and security of Temiskaming residents at the forefront.

With the 10th anniversary of the Lac-Mégantic rail disaster just observed, that mishap illustrated a perfect failure of regulatory oversight.

Regulatory agencies must take safety oversight seriously because when lives are at stake, giving up or not being prepared is not an option.

It is unwise to wait until a major disaster happens, as many in this region will remember a time when the Sgt. Aubrey Cosens VC Memorial Bridge in Latchford collapsed and Highway 11 was closed in both directions.

Local leaders have a responsibility to create a safety and security plan in case of a major incident that is well communicated to all residents of South Temiskaming.

The plan would be sent to local media and posted on municipal websites indicating where people could gather in case of a major emergency.

Where is the safe gathering location in your community?

These blood lovers have evolved over time from once feasting on dinosaurs to moving onto the next best thing available - mammals and humans.

However, all is not lost as surgeons use them to prevent blood clots, to treat infections and in wound care. I take comfort in knowing because blood is so iron rich, it is toxic to most animals - whew!

And scientists tell us that blood feeders are important to the earth's biodiversity and health of the planet.

I have learned there is a place for every living creature in nature.

Just not on my body please.



Should you get the Pneumococcal Vaccine?

What causes Pneumonia?

There are two main kinds of pneumonia, one caused by viruses and the other caused by bacteria. One type of bacteria is called Streptococcus pneumoniae (or pneumococcus). When these bacteria invade the lungs, they cause bacterial pneumonia. Most cases of bacterial pneumonia are caused by pneumococcus.

Why is Pneumococcal Vaccine important?

Pneumococcal vaccine can prevent pneumonia and other infections caused by 23 types of the Streptococcus pneumoniae bacteria. The vaccine protects about 50 to 80 per cent of people against pneumococcal infection. Vaccination also makes the disease milder for those who may catch it.

Who Should Get the Vaccine?

Anyone 65 years of age and older, as well as adults and children two years and older who have the following high-risk medical conditions

- Cancer
 - · Chronic heart, liver or kidney disease
 - Chronic lung disease
 - · Nephrotic (relating to the kidneys) syndrome
 - · Cirrhosis of the liver
- Alcoholism
- · Diabetes
- · HIV infection and AIDS
- No spleen or a spleen that does not work properly
- Sickle cell disease
- Now also recommended for asthma

When should the Pneumococcal Vaccine be given?

The vaccine is offered routinely for adults at 65 years of age, but you should be vaccinated sooner if you have a high-risk medical condition (see above). An additional dose is recommended 5 years after the first dose if you have any of following medical conditions:

- Asplenia or sickle cell disease
- · Hepatic cirrhosis
- · Chronic renal failure or nephrotic syndrome
- HIV
- Immunosuppression related to disease or therapy

After you get any immunization, make sure your primary care provider updates your personal immunization record.

Doctor foregoing fees in lieu of food bank donations

ENGLEHART – An Englehart doctor is foregoing fees for some services not covered by OHIP.

Instead, Dr. Gretchen Roedde is asking people to make a donation to the food bank if they choose to.

Over a one-month period, she said some five large boxes of food have been taken to the Englehart and Area Food Bank.

In a recent email, Roedde said she doesn't charge for such non-insured services as driver's physicals, sick notes, back-to-work notes, and disability tax credit notes.

She said patients have been happy to make a food bank donation.

She said the approach works on many fronts.

In the case of diabetes-related documentation, she said patients get the assessments they need, and that she requires, for their care.

She completes the Ministry of Transportation driver's physical form at no charge, and patients can drop off items for the food bank if they wish.


"Win-win," she said.

She said she's happy to see other doctor's patients so they receive the service for less money.

She said she started the food donation initiative while working in Latchford, and it's been continued by her successor, Dr. Matt Scott.

Roedde said many of her patients are food bank users.

That was a factor noted by medical students who worked with her in Latchford, she said.

The Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing has received **Application No. 54-C-226012** for consent in Cane Unincorporated Township, District of Timiskaming. The subject property is described as Lot 6 Concession 4, PIN 61316-0180.

The application proposes to sever a lot approximately 1.70 hectares in size, with 188 metres of frontage on Highway 65, for continued residential purposes. The proposed lot contains a house, and barn and is serviced by individual on-site water and sewage services.

The proposed retained lot would be approximately 30.30 hectares in size, with approximately 212 metres of frontage on Highway 65. The lands are proposed to continue to be used for agricultural purposes. No new buildings or structures are proposed as a result of this application.

The purpose of this notice is to inform the public of the nature of the application, invite public input, advise on how to make comments on the application and advise the public of future notification and appeal rights.





Ontario expanding access to French-language nursing programs

TORONTO (Special) – As part of the Ontario government's plan to train more health care professionals, the province is expanding French-language nursing education with the launch of Collège Boréal's new stand-alone four-year Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree at its Sudbury and Toronto campuses.

The new program will give French-speaking students more opportunities to learn closer to home in their primary language and help ensure the province's Francophone communities will be connected to the care they need, when they need it.

"By allowing Collège Boréal to offer a new stand-alone de-

S

gree as well as expanding the number of practical nursing spaces, our government is addressing the urgent need for more nurses in Ontario while also offering more opportunity for French-language post-secondary education," said Colleges and Universities Minister Jill Dunlop in a news release.

"The new degree and additional nursing spaces provide more choice for students when it comes to their education and reduce barriers to French-language education in Sudbury and Toronto, so they can go on to have rewarding careers while offering Ontarians the care they deserve."

As of 2020, Ontario's col-

leges and universities can offer four-year, stand-alone nursing degrees without having to be in a collaborative nursing partnership.

As of June 2023, 17 such stand-alone degree programs have been approved by the ministry.

With the launch of Collège Boréal's new program and additional practical nursing spaces, "French-speaking Ontarians in Northern and Southern Ontario will benefit from more health care workers practising in our health system," said Sylvia Jones, deputy premier and minister of health.

The Ontario government is providing up to \$630,000 to

support an additional 70 practical nursing spaces at Collège Boréal for the 2023-24 school year.

• The new degree programs will launch in September 2024 in Toronto and Sudbury and will each have a cohort of 16 students per year.

• The stand-alone Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree program offers training for students who are planning to become registered nurses (RNs) and the practical nursing spaces offer training for students who are planning to become registered practical nurses (RPNs).

• Since 2018, the provincial government says 60,000 new nurses and nearly 8,000 new doctors have registered to work in Ontario. Last year was a record breaker, with more than 12,000 new nurses registered in Ontario and another 30,000 nursing students studying at an Ontario college or university.

• Applications are now open for the Ontario Learn and Stay Grant.

The grant provides full, up-front funding for tuition, books and other costs for firstyear postsecondary students who enrol in an eligible nursing, paramedic or medical laboratory technologist program and agree to stay in priority communities to work after graduation.







THE BASICS

The City of Temiskaming Shores is initiating a process to investigate the potential sale and development of the New Liskeard Marina property. The property is located at 199 Riverside Drive in New Liskeard. It is approximately 3.57 acres in size, is zoned C1 in the City's zoning by-law and designated Recreation Area in the City's official plan.

The property has been underutilized by the City while the building is also in need of \$270,000 in renovations in the near future to maintain current service levels. To best understand the community's desires, City Council has directed staff to open a public consultation asking for input on the property's potential development by the private sector to better inform an Expression-of-Interest (EOI) process.

Regardless of any development, the City intends to maintain ownership of the boardwalk along the water's edge and any submissions from developers must have provisions for maintaining public access to the marina docks and boat launch.

THE PROCESS

The City is first gathering the public's input on the property to better inform potential developers about the needs and desires of residents. Following the public consultation process, City staff will create a report summarizing all the public comments received and release the EOI.

The EOI process is expected to conclude in late October with Council ultimately deciding if the City will then enter into negotiations with any potential developer. The EOI process does not tie the City to the sale of this property and any potential development will still be required to complete the necessary public consultation processes for zoning and official plan changes (if required).

A key component of the whole process will be consultation with stakeholders, and the general public. Anyone with an interest in providing their input to Council has the opportunity.



PUBLIC EDUCATION

RVS, TRAILERS AND CAMPERS: **PROPANE AND** BARBECUE SAFETY TIPS



When Transporting Cylinders:

- · Ensure propane cylinders are upright and secure during transport.
- Keep cylinder valves closed and protected during transport.
- · Plug or cap cylinder outlets during transport.

When Using Cylinders:

- · Ensure cylinders are upright and secure on a firm footing.
- Check cylinder connections and hoses for leaks by brushing a 50/50 mix of liquid soap and water onto all connections and hoses. Rising bubbles when you turn on the valve indicate a leak. Tighten connections or repair the hose until there are no bubbles.
- · Keep cylinders away from flame, heat, and exits.

Using Propane in your RV or Camper:

- · Keep all combustion exhaust vents on the exterior wall of your RV or camper clear of obstructions.
- · Use stovetop burners or ovens only for cooking and not as a source of heat.
- · Propane appliances require an adequate supply of fresh air for proper combustion. Ensure your RV or camper is properly ventilated to prevent build-up of carbon monoxide.
- · Install a carbon monoxide alarm and propane leak detector.

Barbecue Safety:

- · Ensure barbecues are on firm, level footing.
- · Keep barbecues well away from the side of your RV, camper or tent, and other combustibles.
- · Make sure igniter buttons work properly before turning the gas on. If there is no igniter, insert a long match or barbecue lighter through the side burner hole before you turn on the grill controls.
- · Keep barbecues clean of grease to prevent flare-ups.
- · Stay by the grill when cooking and keep kids and pets at a safe distance.
- Turn off all burner controls and tank valves after each use.
