THU launches new opioid surveillance tool

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff/Special) - In the first three months of 2023, paramedics responded to seven incidents in Timiskaming in which opioid use was suspected.

In the first six months of this year, the district saw six suspected drug-related deaths.

The data can be found on a new online surveillance tool launched by the Timiskaming Health Unit.

The opioid surveillance dashboard was launched to both inform the public about the current local situation and to alert it when new or toxic drugs are circulating.

"It's important to let people know when there are dangerous substances in the community that have been associated with increases in overdoses and poisoning," said Erin Cowan, the health unit's director of strategic services and health promotion and chief nursing officer, in a news release.

Health units have been directed by the province to set up early warning systems to track, identify and respond when new toxic substances are spotted locally, for example, or if drug-related poisonings are on the rise.

The THU's dashboard posts information from provincial databases, local emergency services and community agencies.

Members of the public can submit information anonymously through the online Bad Drug reporting system on the THU's website.

Opioids are a large group of pain-relieving drugs that include morphine, OxyContin and fentanyl, a

product synthesized in a lab.

In 2022, the Public Health Agency of Canada reports there were 7,328 apparent opioid toxicity deaths - an average of 20 per day - across the country.

Just over 81 per cent involved fentanyl, and 79 per cent involved non-pharmaceutical opioids.

In Temiskaming, the health unit is prepared to



issue an alert and step up education when a new toxic drug is identified in the area or opioid-related incidents are on the rise.

In June, it issued a drug alert when trang/ xylazine, a veterinary tranquilizer, was found.

It offers resources on how to respond to an overdose, tips for safer drug use, and the Good Samaritan

Act. The legislation protects anyone at the scene of an overdose from being charged with drug possession or breaches of legal orders related to simple possession.

The health unit also has information about where to find harm reduction supplies and naloxone, which can temporarily reverse the effects of an opioid overdose.

The health unit offers the following advice to anyone who uses drugs or knows someone who does:

- If possible, avoid using alone. If you are alone, call the National Overdose Response Service at 1-888-668-NORS (6677) or call a friend.
- Test a small amount before you use.
- Avoid mixing drugs.

• Ensure that emergency services can be contacted in case an overdose occurs.

 Keep a naloxone kit on hand. They're available for free from pharmacies and health

Melanoma Skin Cancer Awareness

Melanoma skin cancer often starts as an abnormal mole on the skin. A mole is a common non-cancerous growth. It's normally a small, round, or oval spot that is usually brown, tan or pink. It may be raised or flat. Melanoma is most frequently found on the back of men and on the back and legs of women. It is the least common, but most serious, type of skin cancer.

Risk Factors:

- Personal or family history of melanoma.
- Presence of moles--especially if there are many, or if they are unusual or large.
- Sun sensitivity--sun burning easily, or difficulty tanning.
- · Light colored skin, eyes, and hair.
- History of excessive sun exposure.
- Diseases that suppress the immune system.
- Occupational exposure to coal tar, pitch, creosote, arsenic compounds, or radium.

The ABCDE rule below can help you look for the common signs and symptoms of melanoma skin cancer:

A is for asymmetry – one half of a mole does not have the same shape as the other half.

 ${\bf B}$ is for border – the edge of a mole is uneven (irregular). It can look jagged, notched, or blurry. The colour may spread into the area around the mole.

C is for colour – the colour of a mole is not the same throughout. It could have shades of tan, brown and black. Sometimes areas of blue, grey, red, pink, or white are also seen.

D is for diameter – the size of a mole is larger than 6mm (1/4 inch) across, which is about the size of a pencil eraser.

E is for evolving – there is a change in the colour, size, shape or feel of the mole. The mole may become itchy or you may have a burning or tingling feeling.

Other signs and symptoms of melanoma skin cancer include:

- an area that does not heal
- a mole or sore that oozes or bleeds
- broken skin with an open wound (ulceration)

Melanoma is an aggressive form of cancer that can be life-threatening. Schedule an appointment with your primary care provider if you have any of these skin changes.



EDITORIAL The impoverished

The Bank of Canada has once again raised the prime interest rate, this time to five per cent, to ward off the negative affects of inflation.

Canada's inflation rate was four per cent in June and higher in the month of May.

Commodities such as gas and food, along with mortgage rates, are oblivious to inflation-fighting ideas like raising interest rates as those prices are not going down fast enough.

Food prices are up 8.8 per cent over last year and mortgage interest costs up 30.1 per cent.

While the Bank of Canada stands by its interest rate hikes to control inflation, the average Canadian might wonder why the Bank of Canada doled out \$73 million in bonuses to its employees last year.

The Bank of Canada is a crown corporation, paid by taxpayer dollars. Canadians are struggling with a 40-year high inflation rate and high interest rates the bank has intentionally set and yet handing out bonuses to its employees seems appropriate?

A report by the Canadian Taxpayers Federation says those bonuses handed out to bank staff are mostly rubber stamped and not related to performance.

Recent data from Statistics Canada says income inequality in the country

is growing at a rapid pace, showing the gap in net worth between the wealthy and least wealthy has increased by 1.1 percentage points in the first quarter of this year.

The Bank of Canada interest rates have hurt low-income households with variable mortgage payments and with putting food on the table and gas in the car.

The average Canadian might want the Bank of Canada and the federal government to look at corporate greed and gouging by big banks, grocery chains and oil and gas companies that are hurting low and middle income Canadians.

Certainly the government could look at a number of rebates or tax credits to pass on to low-income families for home heating, food prices, etc.

People are spending more on groceries but they are buying less.

At a time when half of older Canadians admit they have no retirement savings, the cost of living is forcing them onto the street or even into hospitals.

And most of all, the government should look at measures to stop employee bonuses not tied to performance and place limits on corporate profiteering.

No one deserves to live in poverty while big banks and corporations make record profits.





Record number of fire deaths sparks call to action

VAUGHAN (Special) – A record number of fire deaths in Ontario has spurred the Ontario Fire Marshal to call for a day of action. In 2023, Ontario recorded 133 fire fatalities, the highest number of fire-related deaths in 20 years.

The troubling statistics have spurred Fire Marshal Jon Pegg to call on all Ontarians to test their smoke alarms September 28.

"Within Ontario, we've seen a significant rise in fatal fires and the number of people we have lost in these fires is very concerning," said Pegg in a news release announcing the initiative.

"Entire families have been lost to fire and the most troubling part is that the majority of these fires did not have a working smoke alarm in the home.

"Had there been working smoke alarms and a well thoughtout and practised home fire escape plan, these deaths could have been prevented."

The law has required smoke alarms to be installed on every storey of a residence in Ontario since 2006.

"Test Your Smoke Alarm Day" marks the first day of action to promote installing and testing working smoke alarms in every home in Ontario.

It's part of a broader strategy by the Office of the Fire Marshal (OFM) to bring attention to the importance of having working smoke alarms.

The OFM is asking all Ontarians to test the smoke alarms in their residence on September 28 by pressing the test button and making sure they are in working order.

Only working smoke alarms will alert you to a fire and give you and your loved ones enough time to safely escape.

"Smoke alarms save lives. Every home in Ontario should have one," said Ontario Solicitor General Michael Kerzner.

"Smoke alarms are widely available, easy to install and effective. I urge all people to get one and make sure you check the batteries on a regular basis. It's one of the best ways to keep your family safe from fire."

Though fire safety experts advise that smoke alarms be tested at least once a month, a recent survey suggests that only 15 per cent of people do so.

"We need to change the channel on how Ontario residents think about smoke alarms and if we can start with getting into the habit of installing and regularly testing alarms, we can save lives," said Rob Grimwood, president of the Ontario Association of Fire Chiefs.

You can be confident your smoke alarm is working, he said, only if it's tested once a month, batteries are replaced once a year, and the alarm is no more than 10 years old.

A raised sleeping platform or cot is a glamping go-to because it offers a more comfortable night's rest than the hard ground. A bed off the ground also makes it easier to get up in the morning, independently or with assistance.

USE SUPPORT

There are plenty of tools that can make outdoor activities more accessible. Depending on your needs, devices could range from walking poles or supportive shoes, to beach and offroad wheelchairs, or tents with wheelchair storage. You might be able to reserve, rent or borrow some of these items.

Working with an occupational therapist (OT) can also help you discover and use tools and approaches to make camping easier for people, no matter their mobility.



NOTICE OF PUBLIC CONSULTATION CITY OF TEMISKAMING SHORES MARINA DEVELOPMENT

THE BASICS

The City of Temiskaming Shores is initiating a process to investigate the potential sale and development of the New Liskeard Marina property. The property is located at 199 Riverside Drive in New Liskeard. It is approximately 3.57 acres in size, is zoned C1 in the City's zoning by-law and designated Recreation Area in the City's official plan.

The property has been underutilized by the City while the building is also in need of \$270,000 in renovations in the near future to maintain current service levels. To best understand the community's desires, City Council has directed staff to open a public consultation asking for input on the property's potential development by the private sector to better inform an Expression-of-Interest (EOI) process.

Regardless of any development, the City intends to maintain ownership of the boardwalk along the water's edge and any submissions from developers must have provisions for maintaining public access to the marina docks and boat launch.

THE PROCESS

The City is first gathering the public's input on the property to better inform potential developers about the needs and desires of residents. Following the public consultation process, City staff will create a report summarizing all the public comments received and release the EOI.

The EOI process is expected to conclude in late October with Council ultimately deciding if the City will then enter into negotiations with any potential developer. The EOI process does not tie the City to the sale of this property and any potential development will still be required to complete the necessary public consultation processes for zoning and official plan changes (if required).






