City unleashes consultation on new animal control bylaw

TEMISKAMING SHORES – As the city prepares to try a new approach to animal control, it's asking for public input on a proposed bylaw.

Temiskaming Shores is considering "a huge change" in the administration of animal control, said Mayor Jeff Laferriere after council met August

"It's much easier to ask at the front end than to make decisions and get the input after," he said.

Laferriere said he's looking forward "to making sure we're incorporating the needs of our ratepayers into the decision-making process."

In the past, the city has contracted out animal control services. But attempts to reach a new contract for animal control and pound services last year were abandoned amid public outcry and controversy over the tendering process and approach to the issue.

City council has now agreed to provide the service itself during a two-year pilot project.

A pound will be established in the parks and recreation building just south of city hall.

A new bylaw has also been drafted, and is posted on the city's website for comment.



DRAFT BYLAW

It focuses on responsible pet ownership and humane animal care, said city manager Amy Vickery as she outlined the proposal for city council last

It outlines requirements to register pets and care for them, the powers of the animal care and control officer, kennel licensing, and regulation of other animals such as hens and rabbits.

It was the seizure and impound provisions of the former bylaw that sparked the loudest protests last

The draft bylaw notes that the impoundment of dogs and cats is be only short-term.

It proposes that any dog or cat seized by the animal control officer be impounded for five business days at a minimum. That is up from the current three-day minimum.

Animals not redeemed within the five-day period may be retained longer, depending on where they're going.


Under the draft bylaw, they could be transferred to an authorized shelter, rescue group or other organization registered with the city or in a contracting agreement with the municipality.

Cobalt early days poet featured in park

COBALT - Dr. William Henry Drummond was known and admired in the early 1900s as a great Canadian poet. His popularity was due in part to his ability to capture, with love and humour, the character of many of the French-Canadians he encountered.

A practicing physician from Montreal, Drummond also was managing a family silver claim by Kerr Lake near Cobalt where he had a small home. He died in Cobalt in 1907 at the age of 52.

He was laid to rest in Montreal, but the stone fireplace of his Cobalt area home now stands by the Paul Penna Cobalt Public Library as a tribute to the beloved poet.

Cobalt resident David Brydges has been spearheading the upgrading of the park where the fireplace now stands, and presented a progress report on the project to date to the Cobalt council committee-of-the-whole meeting on August 1.

Brydges related that he undertook the project in 2019 after Drummond was inducted into the Order of the North.

The pandemic delayed his plans for the site, he told council, but this year the final fundraiser took place. The town also provided funding for a contractor to repair the fireplace, adding a new membrane to its roof, cleaning up the retaining wall, and building an accessible sidewalk.

Brydges outlined the work that has been undertaken to date to create a gardened park surrounded by cedar trees and featuring nods to the town's past when Drummond lived.

Brydges said the project was completed with less than \$20,000.


"This is Canada's newest memorial poetry park to our country's first national and international poet of fame," said Brydges.

Visitors spend A Day in Farm Country despite rain

THORNLOE - Rebecca Vandenbogaard used to farm, but her kids haven't.

The North Cobalt family spent A Day in Farm Country "to get the kids around it, because they don't ever see animals. It's good for them," said Vandenbogaard as they toured Golden Acre Farms' dairy barn.

This year's self-guided tour, the fifth, took visitors on a drive through rural South Temiskaming to four very different agricultural operations.


"The rain definitely impacted the day," said Noah Taylor, project assistant with the Northern Ontario Farm Innovation Alliance.

"In the past, we've had around 500 participants. This year, the most visited farm stop had 275 people."

But Taylor was happy with the turnout, in light of the conditions, "and we got a lot of very positive feedback. Lots of people said they had a lot of fun and it was a great tour."

The tour was launched by the alliance in 2017 to let the public see where their food comes from. The tour wasn't held in 2020 and 2021 because of pandemic concerns, but returned last year.

This year's tour August 12 included four stops.

Opening their doors were Golden Acre Farms, a dairy operation near Thornloe, and Bowmanlea Farms, a beef cow-calf, cash crop and pick-your-own strawberry operation in Hilliard.

In the Kenabeek area, Shalom Farms invited visitors to see how it produces vegetables as well as grass-fed and finished beef, heritage breed pork and pasture-raised chickens.

At Poschaven Farms in Kenabeek, visitors could see its grain growing and milling operation. It includes a mill dedicated to gluten-free buckwheat flour and

is expanding its line of oat prod-

The farms on the tour work hard to ready their operations for the public, Taylor said.

"We're very thankful that they open up their farms and are willing to do that for us, and the public really appreciates it as

As for 2024, Taylor said the alliance hopes to coordinate another tour.

"We already have someone who's interested in being our beef stop, so that kind of kickstarts us into next year."

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EDITORIAL

We need a Food Bank usage report?

usage has increased substantially in the Temiskaming region since the pandemic and because of high inflation rates.

Almost every food bank volunteer in our region tells a sad story of new and more frequent clients coming to the doors of their food bank seeking help.

The increased costs of rent, food, gas, heat, hydro and the Internet have put extreme pressures on the budgets of ordinary northerners.

What needs to occur is a current study or report released that accurately details the percentage of food bank users in our region.

Is usage up by 20, 30 or 50 per cent since the pandemic?

The report would take a look at the households who visit food banks in our region, the average age of food bank users, the breakdown of community usage and what percentages of food bank users claim Ontario Works, are employed, have no income, are on Ontario Disability Support Program, are students, those on Employment Insurance programs or seniors on fixed incomes.

The report could also indicate how many people used a food bank for the first time in 2022.

And this report would tell us how many children are relying on food bank services.

Certainly, the COVID-19 pandemic

We are almost positive food bank and inflation are why food bank usage has escalated.

> Especially since the fall of 2022, costs for groceries have risen by 10 per cent or more.

> According to a provincial hunger report, landlords and vacant rental units in Ontario were asking 18.4 per cent more for rent than last year.

> The feelings of defeat and helplessness abound in our communities because of the high cost of living.

> The pitfalls of living in rural regions are not to be taken lightly and include poverty, lack of public transportation, the stigma surrounding food bank use and seasonal employment, addiction and opioid crisis minus a strong social safety net.

> The public and various agencies concerned with health and wellbeing deserve to know the true picture of food bank usage in South Temiskam-

> A food bank usage report would shed sunshine on the issue of food bank usage in our region, which may be considered a public health crisis. The report would also be used to get on the radar of government agencies and perhaps bring much needed attention and problem solving when it comes to food bank usage in our region. And a comprehensive study could help agencies and even the people themselves, through no fault of their own, who are facing food insecurity.

Blue gold

I bought a small basket of blueberries last week and immediately popped a couple of handfuls of the tasty berries into my mouth. Mmmm, they were so delicious.

When I got home, I opened my car door to retrieve the basket and boom, the basket fell on the ground spilling all the berries.

Oh no!

At least the birds had a good feast.

I don't know many people that do not enjoy eating blueberries at the highpoint of summer.

Nothing says summer in the north more than the call of a loon on a mist covered lake and blueberries.

Picking blueberries was an annual ritual of my family bringing back some happy memories of our life growing up in Cobalt.

We sure lived a life and then some.

We'd go out picking with our friends, the Church family and our aunts and cousins. We walked along the railroad tracks to Bass Lake picking blueberries that my mother would turn into delicious blueberry pies.

We also picked on the Nip Hill, near Cobalt, until the day my mother spotted a large bear nearby enjoying the blue gold fruit of summer.

They say you can smell a bear before you see them, something like the smell of a horse barn.

But we didn't see or smell the bear prior to our picking that day and it unnerved my mother to no end.

She warned us not to pick on the Nip Hill, but you know what, we did it anyway.

Why let the bear have all the fun?

At times we would have to sit down and pick because the bushes were laden with clusters of the berries, like pearls on a necklace.

Mom always told us to "pick clean" and not pick the white ones and to take out the leaves.

But we knew Mom would

pick out the leaves, twigs and white berries when we got home.

She would scold us if we ate too many saying we would not have enough for a pie or muffins.

What a far cry those berries are from the big fat Chernobyl ones we see in grocery stores these days that look like they have been nuclearized.

As the years went by Mom got frustrated because she

couldn't pick berries anymore, and she picked berries, let me tell you.

Black and red currants, chokecherries, raspberries, blueberries and wild strawberries were her favourites.

She'd often freeze the berries as there is nothing like fresh berries on pancakes or ice cream in the middle of winter.

Temagami forest now has one million new trees

TEMAGAMI (Staff/Special) There are now one million new trees in the Temagami forest as a result of efforts of tree planting crews this spring.

Foresters working in the Temagami forest say that one million new trees planted in the Temagami forest is a major milestone.

Outland Reforestation undertook the major portion of the tree planting for First Resource Management Group (FRMG) and Temagami Forest Management Corporation (TFMC) early this spring.

With 56 planters, the majority of whom were experienced tree planters, the Outland Reforestation crew planted 924,100 seedlings.

The seedlings included white pine, red pine, jack pine, black spruce and white spruce.

The Outland Reforestation tree planters braved a variety of weather conditions, including snow on May 10. They also endured the usual swarms of black flies and mosquitoes that are found in the northern forests.

The entire 924,100 seedlings were planted before the end of May.

The application proposes to create one new lot approximately 18 hectares in size with approximately 151 metres of frontage on Highway 562, for agricultural purposes. The proposed severed lot contains a well and waterline which services the retained lot.

As such, an easement approximately 24 metres deep across the frontage of the new lot (the servient lands) is proposed to provide continued access for the retained lot (the dominant lands) to the well and water line.



The millionth tree was planted through an additional push by a smaller tree planting crew from Daki Menan Lands and Resources Corporation (DML-RC) who had their own contract with FRMG.

While the second crew was smaller and less experienced than that of Outland Reforestation, they persevered and completed the tree-planting project for the third year is a row. DML-RC general manager Jeff Barton stated he is proud of his crew, and acknowledged the difficult conditions in which tree planters work. "It's a tough job, but these guys have given it their best effort every day," he said.

The smaller Daki Menan crew hit the milestone of planting the one millionth tree in mid-June. "We don't know who is actually planting the millionth tree," said crew supervisor Tim Rankin, "but we all share in hitting the milestone and helping to renew the Temagami forest."

Sebastien Latour and Gabe Potts-Paul have planted before and provided leadership to the newcomers Josh Picard, Liam Clarke, Brandon Prentice and Ethan Paul, but all provided support for each other while taking on the difficult work.

FRMG forest technician Ty-

ler Kinghorn provided oversight to both of the Outland and the Daki Menan crews this year, ensuring that quality standards were met while also encouraging the tree planters. "I remember what it's like, and these guys are going a great job!" he stated.

TFMC is now in its second year as holder of the Sustainable Forest Licence and manager of the Temagami Forest. "It's great to see these young people embrace this work," said TFMC general manager Mark Stevens. "It's an important part of the cycle of our activities and we are fortunate to have these people working in forestry."

They're just a few of the projects across the district that received a financial helping hand from The Temiskaming Foundation in 2022.

The charitable organization was established in 1994 as the Tri-Town Foundation.

It pools donations to create endowment funds, with

the interest income distributed as grants to organizations, projects and special events.

It adopted its current name in 2009 to reflect its district-wide focus.

In 2022, the foundation distributed \$732,000 in grants, and received \$253,000 in donations.

"Like all investors, our Funds had a challenging year but we remain with endowments in excess of \$10 million and continue to distribute at a rate of over \$500 thousand each year," wrote Al Willard, the foundation board's chair, in its annual report.

It's also continuing as the federal government's

proxy for Canadian COVID-19 community recovery fund.

That will enable it to assist qualifying organizations with \$150,000 in funding over and above its normal annual grants, Willard said.

The foundation's annual report was presented to Temiskaming Shores city council June 20.

City unleashes consultation on new animal control **bylaw**

The next step, said Vickery, is establishing relationships with those organizations.

She encouraged them to express their views on potential partnerships with the city.

The draft bylaw provides for the euthanizing of animals without delay if a veterinarian deems it necessary for humane reasons or to protect the safety of people and domestic animals.

Animals that are unclaimed may be euthanized if they're found to be medically or behaviourally unhealthy and untreatable, according to industry-accepted standards.

Vickery said the draft bylaw includes discretionary provisions.

The owner of an animal would, for example, be responsible for pound, board and vet fees. It's proposed that those charges could be waived or paid in instalments for humanitarian reasons.

The draft bylaw does not envision impounding cats that are not owned pets.

It proposes that any cat released outdoors under a citysanctioned effort, such as a trap, spay/neuter and return program, would not be considered to be at large.

The draft also proposes changes to the number of dogs and/or cats that can be within a single residence.

Rather than a set limit, it proposes that numbers vary by zoning. More animals would be permitted on a rural property, for example, than in one unit of a multi-residential building.

Those numbers, as well as fees and fines, are under review, Vickery said.

The proposed bylaw and a survey are posted on the city's website.

Vickery said survey respondents are asked to identify themselves to ensure that feedback is coming from municipal residents.

But the identifying details will be kept confidential, she

A separate survey is being made available to stakeholders in the area with an interest in animal care.

Surveys are also available at city hall and the Pool and Fitness Centre, and comments can be mailed to city hall.

The deadline to submit feedback is September 11.

City staff will summarize the report to council later in September or in early Octo-

THE BASICS

The City of Temiskaming Shores is initiating a process to investigate the potential sale and development of the New Liskeard Marina property. The property is located at 199 Riverside Drive in New Liskeard. It is approximately 3.57 acres in size, is zoned C1 in the City's zoning by-law and designated Recreation Area in the City's official plan.


The property has been underutilized by the City while the building is also in need of \$270,000 in renovations in the near future to maintain current service levels. To best understand the community's desires, City Council has directed staff to open a public consultation asking for input on the property's potential development by the private sector to better inform an Expression-of-Interest (EOI) process.

Regardless of any development, the City intends to maintain ownership of the boardwalk along the water's edge and any submissions from developers must have provisions for maintaining public access to the marina docks and boat launch.

THE PROCESS

The City is first gathering the public's input on the property to better inform potential developers about the needs and desires of residents. Following the public consultation process, City staff will create a report summarizing all the public comments received and release the EOI.

The EOI process is expected to conclude in late October with Council ultimately deciding if the City will then enter into negotiations with any potential developer. The EOI process does not tie the City to the sale of this property and any potential development will still be required to complete the necessary public consultation processes for zoning and official plan changes (if required).


