Feast on the Farm offers food, tourism combo

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff) – You can feast on a Temiskaming farm next month, with a menu featuring Northern foods prepared by Northern chefs.

There will even be a behind-the-scenes tour of a bison ranch.

The Feast on the Farm will be held at Bison du Nord over two days.

On September 17, the public can purchase \$100 tickets for a three-course meal prepared by local chefs Sean Laferriere of Zante's Bar and Grill, Thornloe Cheese brand ambassador Pam Hamel, and Brianna Humphrey of Timmins' Radical Gardens.

The menu showcases foods produced in the North, including bison, Mangalitsa pork, cheeses, maple syrup, haskap berries, micro greens, and beer.

September 18 is reserved for local restaurants, food purveyors and agrifood businesses.

Speakers will offer their expertise to the industry, including the sourcing and use of local foods.

Tickets for the industry day are \$25.

Feast on the Farm is the brainchild of the Culinary Tourism Alliance (CTA), and this year four events are scheduled.

Last year, the North's first "feast" was to have been held in Temiskaming, but it was postponed.

The city has worked with the culinary association in the past, and was asked it if would host the first Northern event, economic development officer James Franks wrote in a report to Temiskaming Shores council earlier this month.

"This is a great opportunity to showcase our agricultural region and wonderful food offerings to

Planning can make travelling more enjoyable

(NC) - Travelling as a family **ARRIVE EARLY** is no simple task, but with a little planning, it can be a fun and memorable experience for everyone.

A few tips from the Canadian Air Transport Security Authority (CATSA) can help make your summer air travel experience run smoothly.

One of the most important things to keep in mind when travelling with children is to allow yourself plenty of time at the airport to check in, go through security and get to your gate. It's recommended that you arrive at least two hours in advance for domestic flights and three hours in

advance for U.S. and interna- tity of 350 ml or less. tional flights.

PACK SMART

Packing for children can be a fun activity if you involve them in the process. Let them choose a few items, such as a favorite toy or book, to keep them entertained during the flight. Snacks can also keep everyone happy. Solid foods are permitted in your carry-on baggage, but liquids, aerosols and gels are limited to containers of 100 ml or less and must fit in a one-litre clear, re-sealable plastic bag.

These restrictions don't apply to items for infants younger than two years of age, such as baby food, milk, formula, water and juice. Note that certain powders and granular materials (e.g. baby powder, sand, bath salts) in your carryon are limited to a total quan-

PREPARE YOUR CHILDREN FOR SCREENING

Another great idea is to discuss the screening process with your children before arriving at the airport. Let them know that they'll need to remove their jacket and put their bag in a bin to be inspected by a screening officer. You can even get them to practice walking through a doorway at home and pretend it's a metal detector. Making it a fun game can help them understand what to expect ahead of time.

Stay safe from ticks while working outdoors

massive growth in ticks across the country over the past couple of years is putting an increasing number of Canadians at risk of developing Lyme disease, among other diseases.

There have been over 17,000 reported cases of Lyme disease across Canada between 2009 and 2022, according to the Public Health Agency of Canada.

Outdoor workers face a number of hazards on the job. From heat stroke and sun exposure, outdoor workers need to also protect themselves from ticks. Especially those who work in wooded or bushy areas, or an area with high grass must be mindful of protecting themselves from ticks in the spring, summer, and fall.

It's important to first conduct a risk assessment of the area and then encourage outdoor workers to take the following preventative steps.

• Wear light-colored clothes to help find ticks more easily.

• Wear long sleeve shirts, long pants, and boots.

• Use insect repellent.

• Immediately after outdoor

> • Put clothes in the dryer for one hour on high heat to kill any ticks.

Ontarians have learned via the of his election campaigns. province's Auditor General, Bonnie Lysyk, about a scandal involving Premier Doug Ford and the sale of Greenbelt lands to developers that were friends and campaign contributors of Ford's.

Apparently Lysyk's investigation into the sale of Greenbelt lands says developers, who contributed money to the Conservative Party and who were friends of the premier, got preferential treatment when the land deals went down.

Lysyk said, "Direct access to the Housing Minister's chief of staff resulted in certain prominent developers receiving preferential treatment."

The problem began in 2022 when the government severed 7,400 acres (3,000 hectares) from the Greenbelt for housing development, as part of the plan to build 1.5 million homes over the next 10 years. It didn't matter that there was already enough land to meet the province's housing target without dipping into the Greenbelt.

The Greenbelt is a protected green space of farmland, forests, wetlands and watersheds located around the Golden Horseshoe in Southern Ontario.

Ford had pledged to protect the area from development during one

He was quick to deny the Auditor General's findings saying no one had preferential treatment when accessing those valuable lands in and around the Greater Toronto Area.

The developers are standing to make billions when the lands are opened up to housing developments.

Premier Ford has said the need for housing trumps protecting the Greenbelt, home to some of the province's prime agricultural land.

Is this the kind of government the people of Ontario wish to have?

A kind of government that runs on "it's who you know" that counts?

The Greenbelt land giveaway is an abuse of power and it was not transparent, fair or objective.

The values of those lands sold to friends and donors to Premier Ford have found themselves to be automatic billionaires as the land has substantially risen in value over the years.

Ford maintained he had no knowledge of the land sales and that it was his staffers in the Housing Ministry that were responsible for the land sale fiasco.

They are your staffers, they are under your watch and you must take responsibility for this gaffe Premier Ford.

A tragedy

The Temagami wilderness is beautiful and rugged, attracting visitors from around the world to its pristine lakes and forest.

More than ever, people are looking to escape urban places for the healing power of wild places.

Going into the wilderness is not the same as taking a leisurely stroll around a provincial park.

Wilderness travel is not for the faint of heart and you have to know what you are doing.

It was horrible to learn the news that a 24-year-old male paddler was found deceased in the waters of Wasaksina Lake in Temagami last week.

I was told that there are at least six portages to get into that remote lake location.

Police divers confirmed that the man and his canoeing partner were not wearing lifejackets.

The other person was lucky enough to swim to shore.

That canoeist was way too young to die, he had his whole life ahead of him.

The greater canoeing community is grieving with this man's family and friends.

I thank the OPP divers who face dangerous conditions themselves and trauma from recovering missing persons in their line of work.

I often describe the fun of being on water but I am witness to some foolhardy things I see every summer.

Ontario is blessed with over 250,000 lakes and they can be dangerous if not respected.

I don't believe anyone should be sold a kayak, a canoe or Stand Up Paddleboard unless they go through some kind of safety course that outlines what to do when hazardous weather arises, the importance of wearing floatation devices, the basic paddle strokes, navigation skills, how to enter and exit a canoe or kayak safely, knowing the lake you are on and most important of all, having swimming skills.

When I see children in kayaks and canoes without life jackets on in the middle of the lake, I shake my head.



I shudder when I see people drinking alcohol on the water. It just doesn't mix, ever.

I see people at landings with stacks of beer, red and black plaid shirts and brand new camping gear with the tags still on them that have no clue about how to paddle the craft let alone what to do if trouble arises.

Know your canoe strokes, know how to read weather and direction, know the lay of the lake and where the shoals are, know how to distribute a load in a canoe, take an outdoors first aid course and so on.

Knowledge is power!

It is so much fun to be out on the water but always keep your mind on safety because people care about your wellbeing.

My heartfelt condolences go out to the deceased man's family and to everyone affected by this terrible tragedy.

Stay safe out there!

Remembering those touched by drug overdose

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) - In the first six months of 2022, the Temiskaming area experienced six suspected drug-related deaths.

On August 31, the public is invited to remember those who have died or suffered due to a drug overdose, and to take action to reduce the stigma associated with drug-related deaths and reduce the harms of drug use.

In New Liskeard, a memorial tree and art project will be held to commemorate International Overdose Awareness Day (IOAD).

People can drop by the area near the beach volleyball courts at the south end of the boardwalk in Algonquin Regiment Memorial Park from 10 a.m. to noon.

The activity is hosted by the Pavilion Women's Centre, with the support of other agencies. Information and resources as well as naloxone kits which can temporarily reverse an overdose - and training will also be available.

"As we mark International Overdose Awareness Day in 2023, we honour the people whose lives have been deeply impacted by overdose: communities, families, friends, healthcare workers, support services, and first responders," said the Timiskaming Health Unit's Erin Cowan, co-chair of the Timiskaming Drug and Alcohol Strategy, in a media release.

The strategy is a multisectoral initiative involving mental health and addictions treatment services, Indigenous services, community members including those with lived experience, social services, family health teams, hospitals, school boards, police, and public health.

"We encourage everyone to join us in raising awareness of drug overdose and stigma," said Brian Pascoe, who has lived experiences with substance use and is a member of the strategy

group, in the release.

"Start a conversation about overdose, share what you know, put on something purple on August 31, and head to a local IOAD event," Pascoe said.

"The threat is real; we must put an end to the stigma surrounding drug use and addiction. We can make a difference and save lives, but this requires our joint effort."

unfortunate — and sometimes irreversible — consequences, wear sunglasses. Opt for wrap-around styles that shade the sides of your face. The darker the lenses, the better, as long as they don't impede your vision. Choose models with 60 to 90 per cent UVA protection and 95 to 99 per cent UVB protection.





- Follow provincial requirements linked to occupational illness.
- Address required forms to use to document the events.
- Initiate further risk assessments.

Employees should also be educated on what to do if bit by a tick and what symptoms to watch out for. This includes fever, headache, skin rash, and swollen lymph nodes. Workers should see their doctor or a healthcare provider right away if they have symptoms, or are just feeling unwell in the weeks following a tick bite.

Does any of this sound like your child or teen?

- · Clinging, crying and/or tantrums when you separate
- Excessive shyness, avoiding social situations
- Constant worry
- Avoiding situations or places because of fears
- Complaints of frequent stomach aches or headaches
- Experiencing sudden and frequent panic attacks

If you answered yes to any of these statements your child may be experiencing anxiety.

As a parent of an anxious child, you are not alone.

Anxiety is one of the most common mental health concerns for children and adults, affecting upwards of 20% of children and adolescents over the lifespan. Anxious youth are often quiet and well behaved, and thus frequently go unnoticed by their parents, teachers, and coaches. Alternatively, others can be disruptive and act out, being labeled as having attention deficit disorder or being a "bad" kid. Both scenarios result in children failing to receive the help they desperately need. Sadly, untreated anxiety can lead to depression, missed opportunities in career and relationships, increased substance use, and a decreased quality of life.

Pointers for Helping Children Escape the Cycle of Anxiety

1. The goal is not to eliminate anxiety, but to help a child manage it

The best way to help kids overcome anxiety isn't to try to remove stressors that trigger it. It's to help them learn to tolerate their anxiety and function as well as they can, even when they're anxious.

2. Don't avoid things just because they make a child anxious

Helping children avoid the things they are afraid of will make them feel better in the short term, but it reinforces the anxiety over the long run. If a child in an uncomfortable situation gets upset, starts to cry and the parents whisk them out of there, or remove the thing the child is afraid of, they learn that coping mechanism, and that cycle has the potential to repeat itself.

3. Express positive but realistic expectations You can't promise children that their fears are unrealistic but you can express confidence that they are going to be okay, they will be able to manage it, and that, as they face their fears, the anxiety level will drop over time. This gives them confidence that your expectations are realistic, and that you're not going to ask them to do something they can't handle.

THE BASICS

The City of Temiskaming Shores is initiating a process to investigate the potential sale and development of the New Liskeard Marina property. The property is located at 199 Riverside Drive in New Liskeard. It is approximately 3.57 acres in size, is zoned C1 in the City's zoning by-law and designated Recreation Area in the City's official plan.

The property has been underutilized by the City while the building is also in need of \$270,000 in renovations in the near future to maintain current service levels. To best understand the community's desires, City Council has directed staff to open a public consultation asking for input on the property's potential development by the private sector to better inform an Expression-of-Interest (EOI) process.

Regardless of any development, the City intends to maintain ownership of the boardwalk along the water's edge and any submissions from developers must have provisions for maintaining public access to the marina docks and boat launch.

THE PROCESS

The City is first gathering the public's input on the property to better inform potential developers about the needs and desires of residents. Following the public consultation process, City staff will create a report summarizing all the public comments received and release the EOI.

The EOI process is expected to conclude in late October with Council ultimately deciding if the City will then enter into negotiations with any potential developer. The EOI process does not tie the City to the sale of this property and any potential development will still be required to complete the necessary public consultation processes for zoning and official plan changes (if required).


