Behind the arena there will be sheep, goats and poultry livestock displays, and inflatables.


There will also be an opportunity to enjoy a horse-drawn wagon ride both Friday and Saturday sponsored by Georgia Pacific.






for my meatball blunder because the next time I saw her I made sure to mention she was a fabulous cook. And she was.

Their business was called Jerry's Meat Market, located on Whitewood Avenue.


They say life is circular and so it shall be when I attend her funeral this coming weekend. I first met Marie and Joanne

Forests Ontario plants 2.5 million trees in 2023

BARRIE (Special) – Forests Ontario and its partners planted approximately 2.5 million trees across the province this season as part of its 50 Million Tree Program.

This brings the charitable organization's program total to almost 40 million trees planted, creating more than 18,400 hectares of new forest on nearly 8,000 project sites.

"As we continue to see the effects of climate change – including unprecedented wildfires across Canada and around the world – it is imperative that we do everything we can to combat it," said Forests Ontario CEO Jess Kaknevicius in a news release.

"This includes the creation of healthy, new forests as well as managing and improving the diversity and health of existing forests.

"We are proud of our accomplishments this year and know full well they wouldn't have been possible without our incredible planting partners and the generous support of individual donors, corporate partners, and both provincial and federal levels of government."

Forest Ontario said its 50 Million Tree Program significantly reduces the costs of tree planting, making increasing forest cover easier and more affordable while ensuring the right trees are planted in the right place for the right reason.

"At Forests Ontario, we like to say that we don't just plant trees, we grow healthy, diverse forests," said Forests Ontario chief operating officer Elizabeth Celanowicz.

"We can say that because we have a comprehensive network of planting partners with the expertise to manage every aspect of tree planting, from seed collection and growing seedlings to tree planting and maintenance, ensuring our new forests are healthy and thriving."

Landowners who would like to take part in the 50 Million Tree Program need enough space to plant a minimum of 500 trees, which is typically at least half an acre of open land or 1,000 metres for a windrow or riparian buffer planting.

Temagami Family Health Team Submitted by Ellen Ibey Overdose Awareness

An overdose means having more of a drug (or combination of drugs) than your body can handle. All drugs can cause an overdose, including prescription medication. It's important to know the right amount and the right time to take your medication. It's also extremely important to know what drugs should not be mixed, and to get help if you feel you are not in control of your drug use.

Depressants and Opioids

A depressant is a drug that slows the vital activities of the body including breathing and heart rate. Depressants may also be known as sedatives. Opioids (such as heroin and pharmaceutical opioids like hydrocodone), medications like Xanax or Valium and alcohol all slow the central nervous system to produce a calming effect. When taken in large amounts or in combination with other medications and/or alcohol, these medications can weaken normal functions like breathing and lower heart rate until breathing and heart rate eventually stop, resulting in death.

Alcohol

Usually people don't think of alcohol when they think of an overdose, but alcohol is a depressant and it is possible to overdose on it. Acute alcohol poisoning, usually a result of binge drinking, is an example.

If you drink a large amount of alcohol quickly, the level of alcohol in your bloodstream can become dangerously high. Alcohol poisoning could stop you from breathing, stop your heart or cause you to choke on your own vomit.

Stimulants

It is possible to overdose on amphetamines. Adderall and Dexedrine are both examples of prescription stimulants. Amphetamine overdose increases the risk of heart attack, stroke, seizure or drug-induced psychotic episodes.

When to Call an Ambulance

Seeking emergency help isn't just for when someone is unconscious. You should also seek help when someone is:

- Having a seizure
- Experiencing severe headache
- Experiencing chest pain
- Having a hard time breathing
- · Extremely paranoid, agitated and/or confused

It is not necessary for someone to have all of these signs or symptoms for them to be overdosing. Showing signs of one or more could still mean they are in trouble and need emergency help.

Always call an ambulance if you suspect someone has overdosed!!

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



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
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
