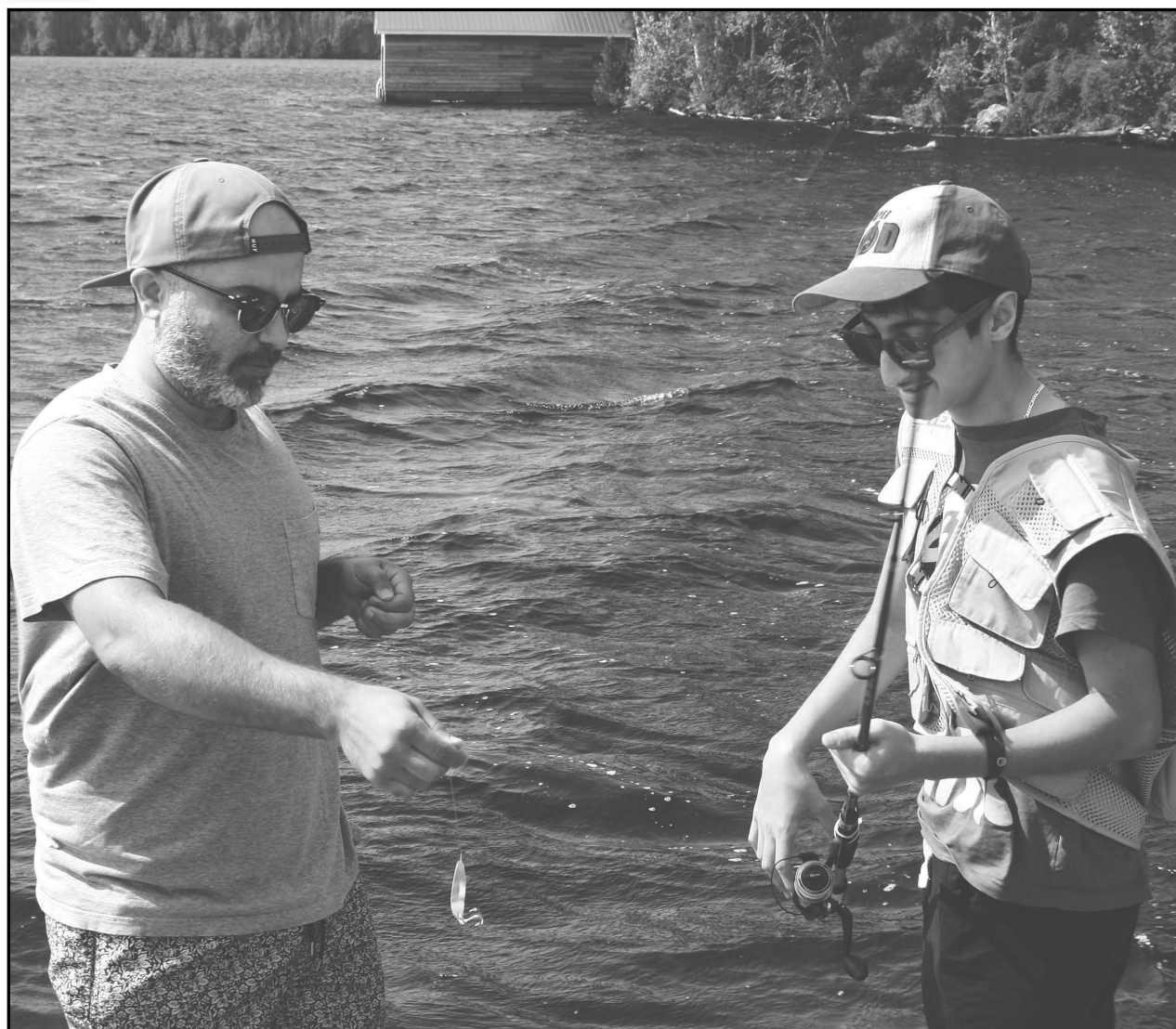

September sees road safety upgrades

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Students may have rushed back to class, but traffic to one Temiskaming Shores school is slowing down.

New lights have recently been installed in the vicinity of École catholique St-Michel on Highway 11. When the lights are flashing, the speed limit drops to 60 km/hour.

It marks a further reduction since April.

At that time, after years of lobbying by the school, municipality and road safety advocates, the Ministry of Transportation lowered the speed limit along a stretch of highway that includes the school to 70 km/h from 80 km/h.

A further speed limit reduction in the school area was part of that plan, said Temiskaming Shores Mayor Jeff Laferriere in an interview after city council's committee-of-the-whole meeting September 5.

But he said the Ministry of Transportation had to order equipment and there were delays in its arrival.

However, he said the new signs signalling drivers to slow down have been installed just as a new school year begins.

GRANT DRIVE

The city has also seen the opening of a new travel route that is also expected to improve road safety.

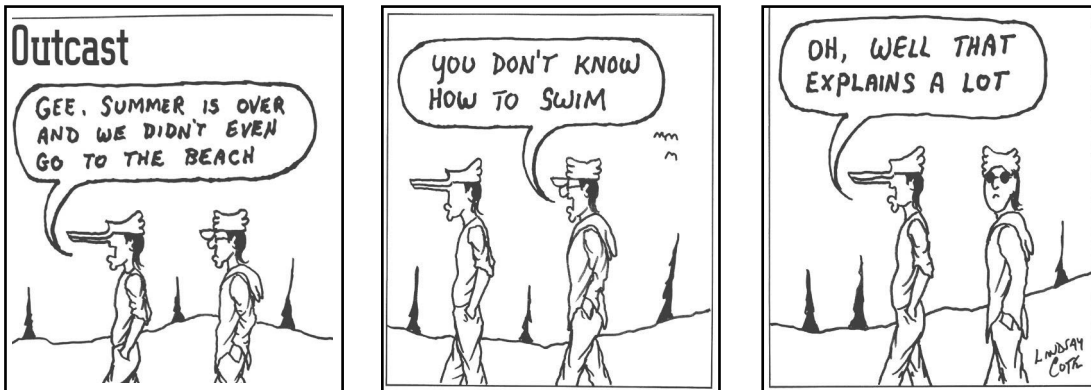

EDITORIAL

Stop the spending

A number of municipalities across the South Temiskaming region have completed their budget processes.

Managing a multi-million dollar budget in the age of inflation is not an easy task.

But the bottom line is those budgets must reflect the inflationary times we are living in.

In Temagami the taxes could go up as high as eight per cent and in Cobalt taxes have risen 12 per cent, without even including a rise in that community's water rates.

Costs for residents living in the region include high gas and food costs despite the consideration of higher municipal taxes.

People are being asked to tighten their belts to ride out inflationary times and that should also apply to municipal councils.

When there is no money to spend, then spending must be stopped.

The purchase of new vehicles or the completion of capital works projects that aren't emergency situations should be put on hold.

Municipal taxes should not amplify the already high costs of inflation.

Those people on fixed incomes or low incomes and ODSP pensions will be hard pressed to absorb high property taxes.

The simplest way to reduce the pain of inflation is to stop spending.

And if spending is to be done, it must be done on a needs basis, not a wants basis.

No one can expect a municipality to deliver a zero per cent tax increase in this day and age. However, taxpayers should expect that municipalities temper big purchases and spending on capital works projects to reflect manageable taxation levels focusing on affordability.

What must be considered also is the proportion of households on fixed incomes rather than employable incomes and how many residents in a community will actually be asked to shoulder higher tax increases.

The fungus among us

The warm weather mixed with all the rain we had this summer is making our woods lush and bountiful.

Have you noticed all the fungi lately?

Fungi are living organisms such as mushrooms, mold and yeast.

I've seen mushrooms growing in some of the most unusual places.

Large ones the size of Frisbees growing in the woods, smaller yellow, brown and orange ones growing in the grass and on trees.

I find the large ones the most mysterious.

Can they be eaten? I am not about to find out, as I don't know that much about edible plants.

I've been watching the larger ones growing in a field where I keep my canoe. These space ships are often 20 centimeters or more across the top with a thick three to four inch stem.

The gills of the underside of the fungus are so intriguing.

I envision leprechauns sitting underneath them having a cup of tea saying to one another, "Did you see that strange woman who swims across the lake most days and who paddles her canoe?"

I've never been out on walks

with mushroom hunters so I am not sure of how to identify the various plants.

The variety of colours and shapes of the mushrooms are amazing. I have learned mushrooms have been around for millions of years, according to the earliest fossils found in China.

I've been told that in the year following a forest fire, a mushroom bonanza takes place wherein mushroom pickers gather for the highly prized "burn morels."

That must be the silver lining to those devastating forest fires.

And apparently in France there is a mushroom field that is 700 years old where truffles grow.

How interesting that mushrooms use decomposing plant material for food, so they are the ultimate recyclers and they also absorb carbon dioxide.

Apparently, more than 90 per cent of the estimated 3.8 million fungi in the world have not been identified.

Mushrooms are weird organisms yet they are the basis for earth's ecosystem.

And yes, there are a number of mushrooms that can produce hallucinogenic effects called magic mushrooms.

Do not go into the forest looking for these mushrooms or consuming any mushroom without an expert opinion whether it is safe to eat.

How about the Jack Lantern mushrooms that glow in the dark? They can easily be mistaken for golden Chanterelles, but the difference is the Jacks grow at the base of trees and the Chanterelles grow from the soil.

I may not know the names of all the fungi I see in the woods, but I sure enjoy the white/brown ones from the grocery store paired with a nice big juicy grilled steak.

What is Gout and What Can You Do to Better Manage or Prevent it?

What is Gout?

Gout is a type of arthritis caused by a surplus of uric acid in the body. This excess can trigger the formation of urate crystals in joints, cartilage, tendons, and bones, causing inflammation, swelling and pain.

While many people associate gout with being overweight, and this does increase your risk, but gout is also linked to kidney disease, drinking large amounts of alcohol, and eating foods that are high in purines (e.g. meats, seafood, peas, beans, lentils, spinach). The risk of getting gout increases with age and men are at a higher risk than women.

Treatment options

Treating gout involves a two-pronged approach that combines medications and lifestyle changes. Medications for gout ease the pain and inflammation of acute attacks and control uric acid levels to prevent future attacks.

Self-Care

Adopting healthy lifestyle habits is a key part of an effective gout treatment plan. Eating a healthy diet, getting regular physical activity and losing weight (if needed) can lower your risk of repeat gout attacks, as well as the chances of developing heart disease, which is common in people with gout.

Diet

Developing a lifelong eating strategy that focuses on following a heart-healthy diet should be the goal for people with gout. This diet includes all of the food groups, especially vegetables, whole grains, plant proteins such as nuts and legumes and low-fat dairy.

The following foods are known to trigger gout attacks:

- Red meat and organ meats (liver, tongue and sweetbreads)
- Shellfish such as shrimp and lobster
- Sugary beverages
- Excessive alcohol (more than one alcoholic drink for women and two for men within 24 hours)

Physical Activity and Weight Management

Being physically active is an important part of managing weight, but getting started on losing weight or being active isn't always easy. A health care provider can help set realistic goals and choose appropriate exercise.

Under self-isolation guidance, if you have symptoms, you should self-isolate until you have no fever and your symptoms have been improving for 24 hours (or 48 hours for nausea, diarrhea, or vomiting). This will reduce the spread of COVID-19 and other respiratory and gastrointestinal illnesses.

If you have symptoms, test positive, or are a close contact of someone with COVID-19, you should also take additional precautions for 10 days. These include wearing a mask in indoor public settings and avoiding visiting people at a higher risk of illness.

CRA offers back-to-school tax tips for parents

OTTAWA (Special) – As the new academic year approaches, the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) said helping your child understand taxes can set them up for success.

In a media release, the CRA describes tax literacy as an important life skill.

• Get your child ready for the new school year with more than just school supplies.

Introduce them to the “Learn about your taxes” tool, an interactive, self-guided online resource to help young people better understand their pay stub, benefits and credits, and more.

By encouraging your child to explore this tool, they can get familiar with their tax obligations through self-guided

lessons and quizzes.

The CRA has also created videos that help explain tax basics like important documents, how to file a tax return, and filling out a TD1 form.

• The CRA also has free webinars for students, international students, and more. And if you miss a webinar, recordings are available online.

The new limits include an increase from \$5,000 to \$8,000 in the first 13 weeks of enrolment in a qualifying educational program (full-time studies), and from \$2,500 to \$4,000 in any 13-week period while enrolled in a specified educational program (part-time studies).

Electra focusing on black mass economics

NORTH COBALT (Staff) - Electra Battery Materials Corporation has presented its quarterly report along with its plans for the year ahead.

“Our recent efforts have been primarily focused on strengthening our balance sheet and updating our refinery project and black mass economics,” said chief executive officer Trent Mell.

“With completion of our re-baseline engineering report, scoping study, and recent equity financing, which raised \$21.5 million in gross proceeds, now behind us, we will accelerate our black mass recycling strategy,” he said in a press release.

Black mass refers to the material resulting from shredded lithium-ion batteries. “This will entail building continuous operations at our refinery complex capable of processing up to 2,500 tonnes of black mass material per year and advancing our joint venture with Three Fires to process lithium-ion battery scrap in a primary recycling facility in Ontario.”

Mell added, “Over the longer term, we remain committed to completing our cobalt sulfate refinery project in Ontario, supplying battery grade material to LG Energy Solution and other customers, and advancing plans for a second refinery in Bécancour, Quebec.”

Mell continued that “the updated capital spend total reflected the impacts of

inflation, supply chain disruptions, and scope expansion since the construction project was initiated. The total capital spend for completing the refinery project is currently estimated at \$155 to \$167 million of which \$81.7 million of capitalized development costs have been incurred to date.”

The report noted that the company has recently “signed a memorandum of understanding with the First Nation-owned Three Fires Group to form a joint venture focused on the recycling of lithium-ion battery waste in Ontario. The joint venture plans to recycle lithium-ion batteries and supply black mass to be processed at Electra’s refinery complex using the Company’s proprietary black mass processing capabilities that recover high value elements, including lithium, nickel, cobalt, and graphite.”

The elements are used to manufacture electric vehicle battery cells.

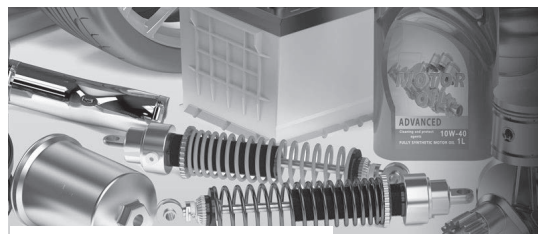
Electra noted that the company intends to use the net proceeds of the equity financing to advance its black mass recycling strategy, its cobalt refinery, for working capital to retire existing payables, and general corporate purposes.

Through its agreement with LG Energy Solution Electra “will now supply 19,000 tonnes of contained cobalt in sulfate over a five-year period beginning in 2025, up from 7,000 tonnes over a three-year period when the supply agreement was first announced in September 2022.”

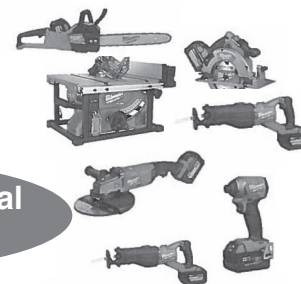

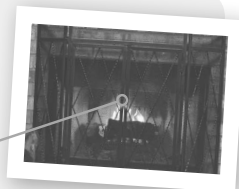

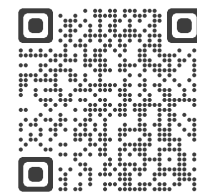

September sees road safety upgrades

The long-awaited extension of Grant Drive, which runs east of the Timiskaming Plaza mall and connects to Hwy. 65 East, opened September 6.

“This is definitely going to really help us manage the traffic a little better through the Dymond subdivision,” said Laferriere, “and really helping us from a safety perspective.”

It provides an alternative for traffic accessing what’s a growing part of the municipality. In recent years, new developments have included a 68-unit seniors’ apartment complex and an eight-unit development operated by the district’s social services administration board.

The new, bigger Temiskaming Lodge is also preparing to open.

As more and more people use the area, “the timing couldn’t be better,” Laferriere said.

He said new development began occurring when the first stretch of Grant Drive was open.

The extension “will continue to help,” he said.

Construction of the extension began in 2022, with final paving this year. The city and ministry split the cost of turning and taper lanes from Hwy. 65 East onto Grant Drive, which were recently completed.

The STATO trail, meanwhile, is now located off the extension, separated from the actual roadway by a buffer.
