

Fledgling Niska Park hoping for Heritage Fund support

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Volunteers anticipate digging into a new park on the Haileybury waterfront this month.

Landscaping, excavating and tree planting at the new Niska Park is expected to begin this month, wrote project manager Felicity Buckell in a letter to city council.

However, the committee behind the project is hoping for up to \$150,000 in financial help from the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund.

The committee would cover the remaining \$50,000 of the budget to create the park.

The park was proposed by friends and family of Nicole Guertin as a tribute to the Haileybury entrepreneur and community leader who died in 2021.

"Niska" is Cree for "goose," and the committee has adopted the name as a symbol of the synergy exhibited by a flock of geese in flight.

Prior to her death, Guertin and partner Jocelyn Blais established the Niska Fund to help finance the notfor-profit Centre de Leadership Niska Leadership Centre. It will support entrepreneurs and social enterprises in the Northeast, and the park is its project.

The city approved the creation of the park last year on one acre of vacant municipal property south of *Continued on 11*

Ministry to consider roundabout among options

TEMISKAMING SHORES -The Ontario Ministry of Transportation will consider a roundabout as it looks at options for the intersection of highways 11 and 65 East in Temiskaming Shores.

"We understand the city has previously discussed the potential of a roundabout with ministry staff," wrote Herb Villneff, the ministry's director of Northeast operations in North Bay, in a letter to Temiskaming Shores mayor Jeff Laferriere.

"Based on preliminary investigations, traffic data does not indicate operational issues at this intersection.

"However, as part of the design process, many factors will be reviewed and considered, including options to improve the operations at the intersection, such as a roundabout."

Two separate projects are

planned on Hwy. 11 in the vicinity Temiskaming of Shores.

Villneff said the design assessment of the Hwy. 65 East intersection is expected to begin next year.

"We look forward to discussing options for this location in further detail as the design progresses," he said.

There's a lot of traffic at that intersection, and city representatives have spoken to experts in the field, said Laferriere after council met August 8.

Councillor Mark Wilson, a road safety advocate, has also provided information "to support a change in what we see as the design there," he said.

The city has forwarded its recommendations to the ministry, he said.

"We would like to see a roundabout put there to really slow down traffic, and really making sure it's safe for everyone," he said.

Kidney disease can hit anyone, anytime

(NC) - A myth about kidney disease says it only affects people with high-risk factors such as diabetes and high blood pressure.

But it can affect people who seem otherwise perfectly healthy and fit, including children and teens.

It's estimated that nearly four million Canadians suffer from kidney disease, and about 4,000 die from it annually.

Because kidney disease can progress without any noticeable symptoms, many Canadians are unaware they have any issues until permanent damage has occurred and life-saving treatment is necessary.

For those in later stages of

the disease, dialysis is the goto treatment. It often leaves patients and families physically and emotionally overwhelmed. Dialysis can involve four to six hours of treatment, three to six days per week for the rest of the patient's life, often with distressing side effects. This extensive treatment also uses significant resources and dollars from the health care system.

But dialysis is just a bridge to help people get to the best treatment option: a donor kidney. Almost 80 per cent of Canadians on the waiting list for an organ transplant are waiting for a kidney. Currently, wait times for kidneys

from deceased donors are four years or more, meaning most patients die before receiving a transplant.

However, there is a lifesaving alternative: living organ donors. You do not need to be related to the recipient to be a match. If you are healthy enough, you could be a match for a neighbour, friend or stranger.

If you have a medical condition that increases your risk of kidney disease, speak to your doctor about monitoring your kidney function.

Bigger is not better

We learned last week that the Timiskaming Health Unit (THU) and the Porcupine Health Unit (PHU) are engaging in a voluntary merger in the coming months.

Just prior to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2019, the Ford government proposed Ontario's public health units to be reduced from 35 to 10 in an attempt at modernization.

Modernization is doublespeak for the dismantling of public services.

That means that for northerners, we will now have a public health unit that covers an area from Temagami in the south to Hearst in the north.

But Northerners are already underserviced in terms of health care.

I was a former THU board member and whenever the idea to merge the two health units came up the board unanimously rejected that move.

We had a strong board rejecting the provincial government rolling us over.

In my opinion, having one entity to manage the important role of public health over such a vast geographic area is not good for the public in public health.

Strong public health units have always been the bedrock of health in any region, and since the pandemic we know those services are invaluable.

Where was the public consultation process in this public health merger?

Residents in this region fund public health with their tax dollars and they do not want reduced services in order to save the Ford government money.

The Northern Ontario population has higher rates of cancer, cardiovascular disease, stroke, respiratory disease and diabetes, says a report from the North East Local Health Integration Network (LHIN).

Now is not the time to reduce health care services because of government directives that quite often fail to understand the geographical, political and



physiological needs of the north.

The people of the north should not accept the gutting of public health via this merger, which may compromise the needs of a widely dispersed population and an increasingly older population.

Northern public health units at present are scrambling to meet the needs of their already vast territories.

The government said it would give increased funding to health units that merge ahead of a forced merger down the road.

So in effect, the government is exploiting the meagre financial resources of northern public health units and bribing them with one-time funding increases.

It appears to have worked locally.

This merger leaves just two health units for all of Northern Ontario. Think about that.

Northerners deserve better.

Arthritis Awareness

Arthritis is Canada's most prevalent chronic health condition – for which there is no cure

Fast Facts:

- Arthritis strikes people of every age, from infants to adults, and stays for life.
- Arthritis is a complex disease with over 100 different types. Major types are inflammatory arthritis (like rheumatoid arthritis, childhood arthritis, ankylosing spondylitis, psoriatic arthritis, and gout), and the most common form, osteoarthritis. Fibromyalgia has similar symptoms to arthritis.
- Arthritis results in painful inflammation and stiffness in joints, limiting the ability to move.
- Left untreated, arthritis can cause permanent joint damage and/or changes.
- A significant proportion of people with arthritis are overweight or obese and are physically inactive, adding undue stress to their joints.
- Some types of arthritis can affect the heart, eyes, lungs, kidneys and even the skin.
- A significant proportion of people with arthritis also have other serious diseases like heart disease or diabetes.

Warning Signs of Inflammatory Arthritis

There are many forms of inflammatory arthritis; signs that are typical for most include:

- Pain, swelling and stiffness in one or multiple joints
- Morning stiffness in and around the affected joints lasting at least one hour
- Pain and stiffness that worsens with inactivity and improves with physical activity
- Reduced range of motion
- · Sometimes fever, weight loss, fatigue and/or anemia

Treatment

Arthritis affects everyone differently so treatment planning should be tailored to individual needs with guidance from members of your healthcare team (e.g. family doctor, rheumatologist, surgeon, physiotherapist, occupational therapist etc.).

For the over 6 million Canadians living with arthritis, pain is one of the many challenges they face on a daily basis. And though medication is only one option in terms of arthritis treatment, it can provide pain relief (and slow joint damage in many cases of inflammatory forms of arthritis). Keep in mind that many lifestyle changes, such as healthy eating, exercise and treatments such as physical therapy, should also be explored.

Federal funding assists two Haileybury locations

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) - Nipissing-Timiskaming MP Anthony Rota has announced funding of \$100,000 for the Haileybury Golf Club and funding of \$96,250 for the Haileybury Beach Motel.

Rota recently visited the Haileybury Golf Club (HGC) and the Haileybury Beach Motel to view the upgrades and plans at the two locations.

The HGC received \$100,000 from the Department of Diversity, Inclusion, and Persons with Disabilities, through the Enabling Accessibility Fund. The money will be used to install an accessible elevator and accessible washroom in the clubhouse.

"It was great to see how these two investments are benefitting small business owners in Haileybury," said Rota in a press release.

"The funding the Haileybury

golf course is receiving will make a huge difference in making their space more accessible for persons with disabilities."

HGC manager Paul Gordon said, "The accessible lift will provide opportunities for all family members to participate in family celebrations at Haileybury Golf Club."

He stated stairs and washroom facilities for those with mobility restrictions will make it possible for them to easily participate in events in the dining hall.

"The support of the federal government in making this a reality has been greatly appreciated and we were pleased to show MP Rota our planning for the fall," he said.

The second investment, announced in 2022 through Fed-Nor, was a \$96,250 non-repayable investment for the Haileybury Beach Motel through the Tourism Relief Fund.

"The Haileybury Beach Motel was able to use the money to modernize the motel and improve the tourist experience," said Rota.

"Those improvements will help strengthen local tourism and the economy by drawing more tourists to the area."

Motel owner Vimla Menezes said the funding "helped us upgrade our facilities and create a take-out restaurant, Beach Bitez, within our premises. The guests who stay with the Haileybury Beach Motel now have a more comfortable living space and hot breakfast provided with their stay. The take-out is also open to the residents and visitors of the Temiskaming Shores area," she said.

Organizations join forces to connect youth with more mental health support

TORONTO (Special) - Kids Help Phone, Canada's only 24/7, free, multi-lingual e-mental health service for youth, and Cam's Kids, which supports post-secondary students with anxiety, are partnering to help students across Canada with a wider range of mental health support.

In a news release, the organizations say the partnership will expand Kids Help Phone (KHP) programs to more post-secondary schools from coast to coast through student ambassadorship programs and mental health awareness.

Both KHP and Cam's Kids provide tools, resources and a peer-to-peer community for young people to learn how to navigate their mental health.

The family of Cameron Hicks, who lived with anxiety, founded Cam's Kids eight years ago to support other young people living with anxiety.

Cam's Kids has trained over 150 students who've received mental health certifications and trained over 2,100 students to become ambassadors for the program.

It operates a crisis text line and has teams at a number of post-secondary schools, including Laurentian University, Nipissing University and Canadore College.

KHP operates a crisis line staffed by trained volunteer crisis responders.

It said it has supported young people almost 16 million times since the onset of the pandemic.

It said 76 per cent of young people report something to KHP that they've never shared with anyone else, and 88 per cent report feeling better after connecting with it.

"Every single day, Kids Help Phone hears from courageous young people across Canada who share that anxiety is challenge for them," said KHP president and CEO Katherine Hay.

"We're honoured to join forces with Cam's Kids and are committed to supporting the mental health of even more young people in schools and communities, in person and virtually, across Canada with any issue, no matter how big or small."

When you do need to turn on lights, choose energy-efficient LEDs. They use less energy and last significantly longer than traditional incandescent light bulbs. By switching to LEDs, you can reduce both your energy use and the number of bulbs that end up in landfills.

ADJUST YOUR THERMOSTAT

Save energy without sacrificing comfort. During cooler months, lower your thermostat by a degree or two and put on an extra layer of clothing. In summer, raise the temperature a bit and use fans for added cooling. Also consider a smart thermostat to automatically adjust temperatures based on your schedule.

UNPLUG AND POWER DOWN

Many electronics and appliances use standby power — also known as phantom power — even when they're turned off. It's a good idea to unplug them when not in use to reduce energy waste. Also think about using power bars with switches to easily turn off multiple devices at one time.

SEAL ENERGY LEAKS

Are your windows or doors drafty? Use inexpensive weatherstripping and caulking to seal up gaps. This simple step can keep your home better insulated and temperatures more stable. That way, your heating and cooling systems don't have to work as hard to keep your home comfy.

TAP INTO LOCAL PROGRAMS

Check out programs that help homeowners reduce energy use, such as Home Efficiency Rebate Plus. A partnership between Enbridge Gas and the federal government, it offers rebates for energy-efficient home upgrades, such as insulation, windows, doors and more.

Temiskaming Shores city hall.

Plans call for a community garden, play areas and a gathering circle, all connected by pathways and art installations.

Harvest and conversation tables will be erected in memory of the late Dawson Durling, who grew up nearby and played there as a child.

Support for the project to date has included a \$25,000 grant from Hydro One's Energizing Life Community Fund and \$3,000 from The Temiskaming Foundation.

On September 5, city council agreed to submit the application to the Heritage Fund on behalf of the Niska committee.

City recreation director Matt Bahm described the application, if accepted, as "an opportunity to ensure that this new greenspace gets created within the City at no cost to ratepayers."

The park would be "a benefit to our community," he told council at its committee-of-the-whole meeting.






