TEMISKAMING SHORES — Tim Hortons is about to launch its inaugural Smile Cookie Campaign on Monday, November 13.

Both Tim Hortons locations in Temiskaming Shores will be participating in this new cookie campaign, which sees the proceeds from



every cookie sold going to charities.

Tim Hortons general manager Andrew Trounsell says 50 per cent of the Smile Cookie Campaign sales will go to the Tim Hortons Foundation Camps and the other 50 per cent is going to the Temiskaming Salvation Army Food Bank in New Liskeard.

Tim Hortons Foundation Camps, since 1974, have supported over 315,000 youth attending seven Tims Camps.

Trounsell said the new cookie is a delicious, white chocolate chip sugar cookie infused with red and green sparkles and adorned with a white-chocolate icing that features a hand-decorated smile.

They cost \$1.50 each and can be pre-ordered in advance with at least a 24-hour notice given.



EDITORIAL A blow to the North

"Fighting for justice is like washing, if you don't do it you stink." (Attributed to Maude Barlow)

The news last week that the Thornloe Cheese Factory has closed its doors after 75 years of operation came as a shock to most people in this region.

The Thornloe Cheese brand has been a point of pride for people of this region and for the workers at the factory for a good many years.

The closure means a loss of jobs and the economic spin off to the region will be substantial.

In an interview with The Temiskaming Speaker, Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP John Vanthof said, "We're not going to let this go without a fight."

And that is exactly what needs to occur for any major decision like that affecting jobs and the economy of this region and the North in general.

News also came last week that the Scotiabank in Temagami is closing its doors leaving that community without a financial institution.

Emotions are running high as people are expressing their disgust at both those decisions.

But emotions aren't going to help solve the problems of those closures.

Calm, cool heads coming together to think through solutions to these problems is what is needed now.

As a former dairy farmer, and agriculture critic for the New Democratic Party, John Vanthof has been there throughout the change in ownership of the Thornloe Cheese Factory from Parmalat to Gay Lea Foods four years ago.

These closures speak to the bigger issue of how large corporations view the people living in the North and how easily they feel they can potentially take things away.

The people of the North have shown time and time again they are fighters and they don't just spit and moan on social media, they unite, they form committees and they organize and come together for the greater good.

November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month!

In Canada, lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer death in men and women. It is mostly caused by smoking and prevention efforts have largely focused on tobacco control.

What raises your risk of getting lung cancer?

Although anyone can get lung cancer, many factors can raise your risk. If you have any of these risk factors, speak with your health care provider about lung cancer screening:

- Using tobacco, such as smoking cigarettes, cigars, or marijuana.
- Being around smoke from another person smoking cigarettes, cigars or marijuana also called secondhand exposure
- Living or working in a building that contains radon
- Having a job where you are exposed to cancer-causing chemicals
- Having a **family history**, such as a parent, brother, sister, son or daughter
- Having a history of lung disease such as COPD, chronic bronchitis and emphysema, or pulmonary fibrosis with lung tissue scarring

Did you know:

 Based on highlights from the Occupational Disease Surveillance System (ODSS) in Ontario, workers employed in construction, transport equipment operating (e.g., truck drivers) and mining occupations have a higher risk of lung cancer than workers in other occupations.

Approximately 15% of lung cancers diagnosed in Canada each year are caused by exposure to known lung carcinogens in the workplace. Exposure to asbestos, crystalline silica, diesel engine exhaust, and metal fumes (i.e., chromium and nickel compounds in welding) are primarily responsible for occupational cases of lung cancer.

Efforts to reduce workplace exposures along with improved screening and prevention efforts in clinical settings can help reduce the burden of lung cancer for workers in hazardous industries.

Speak with your health care provider about your risk of lung cancer, what you can do to lower your risk and whether you should have lung cancer screening.

that will help us during this difficult time. He was as proud of his family as we were of him.







Portraying the Canadian spirit through sculpting

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Across Canada and around the world, on shelves in dens, boardrooms and lobbies, there are statues of various sizes depicting people, mainly at work in occupations such as mining, forestry, and other outdoor endeavours.

There are also outdoor sculptures in Haileybury - one on the waterfront and one in the Cenotaph Park across from the courthouse.

There are even 23 large pieces representing nursery rhyme characters commissioned for the lawn of a private residence.

The sculptor, now 92, reflects that the figures sitting in businesses and homes around the world are often viewed by people who have no idea who created them.

His name is Ernie Fauvelle. He looks back on a varied and productive career that allowed him to observe many people whose faces, stances and occupations have served as fodder for the sculptures he is now known for.

"I'm finishing up a contract now for some sculptures for Manitoba and once that's done that's the end," he said.

"I'm going to retire officially."

He jokingly adds that he plans to take his computer out into the bush and shoot it.

In fact, he still may work at the occasional piece, but he has an assistant who can help fill orders.

"I've done well in my life," he said.

Local companies like Boart Longyear and Morissette Manufacturing were among his early customers for bronze sculptures.

However, he realized that he could fill large orders, in the hundreds, with a significantly reduced price, by creating molds.

The mass production of his pieces resulted in wide recognition for his sculptures. Today they are still being sold locally at Laura's Art Shoppe in Cobalt and Armstrong on Whitewood in New Liskeard.

SEIZING OPPORTUNITIES


Fauvelle lived his youth through the war years and, in the spirit of the times, he enthusiastically seized work opportunities as they came along, continuing through his teens and the remainder of his life.

Along with playing bass in the Buddy Matton Quartet, Fauvelle worked at many different jobs, moving from one business to another honing his sales and management skills. His varied work experience took him to many places, but some of his notable memories include his time with a New Liskeard men's wear business where he earned renown for his window-dressing skills.

He also worked at places like Glenn Walton Shoes, the Eplett's Ice Cream Factory, and Hill-Clark-Francis, a major building company in New Liskeard, where he was trained in management. He also looks back with satisfaction on his time in Ville-Marie where he produced an English-language radio show for CKVM.

His time in the Arctic assisting with the installation of a radar defence system also stands out in his mind.

During his youth, summers would often see him rolling logs in a forestry operation, or working at a mine site. By 1950 he had saved enough money to buy his first car.

For 15 years Fauvelle drove truck for Diversey Chemicals, travelling across Northern Ontario and Northern Quebec. But during this time he was aware of a growing interest in sculpting.

Returning home early after one of his trips, he was aware that there was a sculpting class that evening in Cobalt. He went, was asked for the \$2 fee, and was directed to the clay.

"It was just like magic," said Fauvelle.

"I got a sense of something out of the clay. It was a strange feeling, and I said, 'this is what I would like to do.""

The instructor commended Fauvelle on the work he was doing, saying "you have some talent there."

From then on Fauvelle spent much of his spare time working on pieces of clay, sculpting and learning, becoming self-taught.

After some practice, he went to the Art Cast Foundry in Georgetown where he expanded his knowledge of sculpting.

In 1971, he constructed a building in New

Liskeard to house his new business, Music and Sound Ltd., which he operated for several years. When he was becoming well known for his sculptures, he sold his business and began focusing his time solely on his art.

Then local businessman Peter Grant approached him with a request for 76 statues to present to his staff as Christmas presents.

Grant continued to place large orders with Fauvelle over the following years.

Many more businesses have contracted him since then and his sculptures have made their way around the world.

Susan Cavanagh also asked Fauvelle to create 23 bronze fairy-tale characters for her, to be placed on her lawn.

"We worked together on making these," said Fauvelle.

"It took me approximately four years."

The piece which may carry Fauvelle's fame on down through the years is *Pioneer Spirit*, located at the Haileybury waterfront. The large statue depicts a man and woman passing a child between them with the woman in water up to her waist. The scene is meant to reflect on that day and night of October 4, 1922, when many people fled to the shores of Lake Temiskaming and spent the night in water while most of their town, and many other communities and farms across the district, were destroyed or damaged in the fire.

The piece was commissioned by the Haileybury Heritage Museum represented by Chris Oslund at the time.

"That was a labour of love," said Fauvelle.

As he made it, he thought of his mother who was one of those who spent the night in the water as Haileybury burned.

"The water's cold in the fall," said Fauvelle.

The Town of Haileybury's centennial committee, chaired by Brian Dobbs, also contracted him to create a statue of Haileybury town father C.C. Farr. The statue is located in Cenotaph Park looking over at the Haileybury courthouse where Farr once had a home.

Fauvelle looks back on his varied career, and believes rightly that his story could fill a book.

In fact many of his stories are told through his statues, depicting the many Canadians he has met as they worked, dug and built this land.



The minimum standard is to monitor the weather, both current and forecast to occur in the next 24 hours, once every shift or three times per calendar day, whichever is more frequent, at intervals determined by the municipality. **When** | October 1 to April 30.

Winter Maintenance Season

The City will perform winter highway maintenance. **When** | On or about November 1, 2023 to April 15, 2024.

Roadway Service Standards

Road surfaces will be maintained by keeping them as bare as possible. Priority Road Routes plowing will begin once 5cm of snow has accumulated. Secondary Road Routes plowing will begin once 8cm of snow has accumulated.

Sidewalk Service Standards

Sidewalks will be maintained in a snow packed condition. Priority Sidewalk Routes maintenance will begin once 5cm of snow has accumulated. Secondary Sidewalk Routes maintenance will begin once 8cm of snow has accumulated.

When

November 1, 2023 to March 31. 2024 Between the hours of 12:00 a.m. to 7:00 a.m.

Where

Any street and City owned parking lot within the boundaries of the City of Temiskaming Shores.

Why

By-law 2012-101, to regulate traffic and parking | Section 5.9 of schedule "A" No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle on any street or City owned parking lot between the hours of 12:00 a.m. to 7:00 a.m. during the period between November 1st in one year to March 31st of the next year.

By-law 2012-019, to prohibit and regulate unusual noise | Section 4.7, exemptions, snow removal

None of the provisions of this by-law shall apply to any vehicle of the Corporation or their agents working on behalf of the Corporation to perform snow removal, snow plowing or snow clearing on any Municipal Highways and properties or to private contactors or person.

*Please remove vehicles from municipal areas by 11:00pm as Winter Crews begin snow removal.
