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Moving is an art for **Open Studio Libre**

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Open Studio Libre patrons will once again be able to exercise their creativity, but in a new location.

The outreach program of the Temiskaming Art Gallery is preparing for a reopening in the near future at its new digs in the upstairs space at the Shelley-Herbert Shea Memorial Arena known as the Lions Den.

Temiskaming Shores council has approved a fiveyear lease with the gallery for the space.

"We will still have art classes, we'll have community music events, we'll still have sales," said gallery director and curator Melissa La Porte last week.

A long-term lease gives Open Studio time to

"It's going to allow us to have a more stable financial model. We'll be able to put more money towards programming rather than paying overhead like rent."

It will be able to start saving money for bigger projects in the future, she said.

The new location is just a couple of blocks from Continued on 3

Open Studio's most recent home at the intersection of Main Street and Ferguson Avenue.

The Open Studio was launched as a pilot project in 2019, and has offered workshops, exhibitions, drop-in activities and concerts for all ages and populations.

Proponents began searching for a new location in the fall, citing rising rent costs.

Under the lease agreement with the city, the studio will pay a monthly rent of \$575 the first year, \$600 in the second and third years, and \$625 in the fourth and fifth years.

Rental fees are "considerably less" than its current charges, she said.

To reach the Lions Den, pa-

trons will use the stairs at the Ferguson Avenue entrance.

The space is not currently accessible to the disabled, "but the plan and the goal is to have an accessible option within a year," she said.

The new space offers washrooms and a kitchen and will continue to host birthday parties and be available for private rentals.

La Porte said a new partnership with Haileybury Branch 54 of the Royal Canadian Legion will see the branch host the studio's sip-and-paint sessions

It has reached out to other community organizations, she said, to share space.

She said it also welcomes donors to assist with preparation of the space and Open Studio projects.



A cool thing about living amidst the Boreal forest is the amount of wildlife you see from time to time.

I've seen moose, bobcats, lynx, otters, beavers, foxes, bears, eagles, hawks, wolves, mink, muskrat, ravens, snakes, skunks, turtles and on and on.

Occasionally, a beautiful, friendly fox wanders into our yard in Cobalt.

I do not fear this animal because it is gentle and more scared of my presence than I am of it.

So when someone spotted a lynx/bobcat on Lakeshore Road recently, it bothered me the way the animal was portrayed on social media.

First of all, it's always a good idea to know the difference between the two wild cats.

Most definitely they are difficult to tell apart, but upon closer inspection, a bobcat is smaller than a lynx and its tail is white on the underside and the lynx's tail looks like it has been dipped in black ink.

Bobcats have black and brown spots and stripes on them while the lynx is more greyish coloured and they have a stubbier tail.

But that's not what I was the most concerned about.

The comments about the animal leaned towards it being dangerous and that people should be fearful.

I pictured someone grabbing a gun and going out to look for this beautiful creature.

I'm not saying this animal should ever be approached, but it needs to be given respect.

For the most part, it was likely the animal was passing through the area to either get to winter hunting grounds or had become lost and was briefly disoriented.

It is not in their nature to wander into areas where humans are.

In fact a lynx is often referred to as "the grey ghost of the north" due to their elusiveness and their nocturnal wanderings.

Did you know the lynx has special eyes with mirror-like cells that allow it to see at night?

And its thick fur covered paws act like snowshoes allowing the feline to travel through deep snow.

Count yourself lucky if you ever get a chance to see one.

I did briefly see a lynx last year near Sharp Lake on a snowmobile trail, before it disappeared into thin air.

Don't cry wolf about an animal that for the most part has done nothing wrong but to be seen in an urban setting.

Of course if you see this animal repeatedly hanging around a certain area call the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry.

With climate change at the forefront of animal migration, we need to understand animals, not fear them. Let us cast aside the notion that at the edges of our towns is where wild creatures wait to devour us.

Our actions towards animals reflect our humanity.

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Latchford approves 2024 budget process

LATCHFORD — Latchford's mayor and council have agreed to fine-tune the town's 2024 budget process by allowing the finance committee to create the budget, and then bring it back to council and the public for final approval.

Latchford council met virtually during the regularly scheduled November 14 meeting.

The annual budget process meets the needs of the community to ensure all strategic priorities for Latchford are addressed.

The finance committee consists of councillor Joanne Cartner, clerk-treasurer Jamie Allen and deputy treasurer and deputy clerk Laurel Gadoury.

"We spent three-quarters of a year working on budget matters," said councillor Mike Cole, who brought the idea of letting the finance committee fine-tune the 2024 budget to council.

"Let the finance committee bring it to us and

then we will let the public see the budget."

Councillor Cartner said it makes sense to look at the budget now and begin to prepare for its completion sometime in the New Year.

"If we start looking at it now, Pam Newell from recreation can tell us what she needs, Roger Clark in Public Works has his wish list and we can bring it forward for discussion. I'd like to have it done early in the year. We can see what we have and what we don't have."

Mayor Sharon Gadoury asked council if they were in agreement with the idea of the finance committee doing the heavy lifting on the 2024 budget and then bringing it back to approval to council. It was a unanimous decision to proceed with the members of the finance committee who will begin to work on the budget.

"I like the idea of doing it that way, having the finance committee overseeing the budget process," said the mayor.

Updated agriculture boundaries part of new official plan

HARLEY TOWNSHIP - In preparation for new official plans and zoning bylaws, the townships of Hudson, Harley and Casey are having a LEAR (land evaluation and area review) conducted.

Harley Township clerk-treasurer Krystle Seymour, who Hudson and Casey Townships through their shared services agreement, explained in an email that the LEAR study will ensure the outcome is consistent with provincial policy statement 2020 in which "municipalities must designate prime agricultural areas in their official plans."

She went on to say that the

also is the clerk-treasurer of LEAR study "is a method used to evaluate where these prime (agricultural) areas should be located. Each council designated an agricultural committee to work with our planner (J.L. Richards) to review the outcome of the LEAR study and make necessary changes (or) comments. The outcome of their study will be included in our new official plan after

public consultation and ministry approval."

The LEAR study has a quoted cost of \$16,000 which is being split between the three participating communities, she added.

Seymour noted that some changes have been proposed, "mostly due to the fact that OMAFRA's (Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs) approach states when mapping a prime agricultural area, designations should be established by utilizing common identification and delineation practices. One of these practices is to make the prime (agriculture) boundaries identifiable using things such as a lot line, road way or watercourse. Another practice is that they typically include having approximately 250 hectares of generally contiguous area where prime agricultural area characteristics predominates in order to justify the establishment of a prime agricultural area and conversely requiring approximately 250 hectares of generally contiguous area where non-prime agricultural area characteristics predominates in order to justify the exclusion of lands that are surrounded by a prime agricultural area. Currently, the prime (agriculture) designations do not always follow the above which is why some changes are proposed."

She continued that "a new official plan will modernize the three townships' zoning by-laws and official plans to accommodate the latest provincial policies, including but not limited to the More Homes More Choice Act to help with the affordable housing crisis across the province."

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Englehart Lee Pool to get new liner

ENGLEHART - Englehart council has given the nod to replace the town's swimming pool liner.

At Englehart's regular meeting November 22, town chief administrative officer Malorie Robinson told council that the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund Corporation will provide \$150,000 in funding for the \$184,000 project. The town will be responsible for any overages in the project's cost, she said.

Town public works superintendent Ryan Vickery told council that the project will be carried out in the spring, and the liner for the Englehart Lee Pool is expected to last 15 to 20 years.

Councillor suggests Ontario-wide council training package

COBALT - At the beginning of a new term, municipal councils are each paying for their own training for clear information on their roles and responsibilities.

Cobalt Councillor Angela Hunter proposed that if the provincial government created a standard online training program for new councillors, there could be a reduced cost to municipalities overall.

She was speaking at Cobalt's committee-of-the-whole meeting November 7 when Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP John Vanthof was visiting to hear council's concerns and determine if he could assist with any needs they could identify.

Hunter pointed out that municipalities across Ontario have the same basic training when a new municipal term begins. She suggested that the provincial government has three years now to put something together for new municipal council members entering the next term.

"I don't know how much it would cost to put together," she said, but it would be a fraction of the cost that municipalities are spending on individual training, she added.

She noted the conflicts that occurred with Cobalt's new council in early 2023, and added that other municipalities have experienced similar challenges.

Vanthof agreed that there would be value in having a uniform training program for council members.

Hunter added that there should also be something available online for people to review when considering running for council, so that they would know in advance what is involved in being a municipal council member.

Vanthof agreed with the validity of that idea as well.

He noted that people entering municipal politics sometimes do so with "the idea that you can run for council and change the world."


Hunter added the role of council with staff "is an area a lot of new councillors get in trouble with." She said new council members may have the idea that they can just tell staff what they, as individuals, want to have done, and it gets done.

"You can't do that," she said.

Vanthof said that he would contact the Association of Municipalities of Ontario and Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing Paul Calandra about the suggestion.

Mayor Angela Adshead raised the issue of integrity commissioner investigations, and the high cost to the municipality when that is required.

Vanthof pointed out that council training and integrity commissioner investigations are closely related.



Villeneuve seeking federal **Conservative candidacy**

Born in Iroquois Falls and raised in North Bay, Villeneuve has served in numerous roles supporting Conservative MPs in Ottawa. Most recently she served the shadow minister of public safety in the fight against the proposed firearm restrictions.

She stated in her press release that the Liberal Party does not represent Northern Ontario.

"Let's be honest – our values are not represented by Justin Trudeau's government in Ottawa. In fact, the Liberals have been working against everything that Northern Ontario stands for, so why do we keep sending them back to Ottawa?" she said.

Villeneuve said she is also focused on addressing the cost-of-living crisis impacting

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Municipalities informed of OMPF allocations

TORONTO (Staff) - A general fund for Ontario's Northern, rural and small municipalities to spend as they see fit will remain at \$500 million in 2024.

The province recently announced how much each of the 390 qualifying municipalities will receive from the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund.

In southern Temiskaming, funding will go up for seven municipalities. In Temiskaming Shores, it'll rise by \$62,800, and in Thornloe, by \$200.

Funding will drop for ten. Charlton-Dack will see the biggest decline, by \$13,200; in Brethour, the decrease will be \$100.

Funding is unchanged for Englehart and Cobalt.

For a look at individual municipalities' OMPF funding in 2023 and 2024, see the accompanying chart.

In a news release, the province highlighted other sources of support for municipalities.

Beginning in January 2024, it said it will restore \$47 million in annual base funding to public health units to levels previously provided under the 2020 cost-sharing ratio.

Northern municipalities will continue to qualify for the Northern Ontario Resource Development Fund, which provides up to \$15 million a year over five years to municipalities for infrastructure.

Beginning in 2022 and continuing over five years, the province said it is stepping up its support of the Ontario Community Infrastructure Fund by \$1 billion.

The fund supports 425 small, rural and Northern communities renew and rehabilitate roads, bridges, water and wastewater infrastructure.

It said the Building Faster Fund will provide up to \$1.2 billion over three years for municipalities that meet or exceed the housing targets they pledged to achieve by 2031.





TIPS FOR HOLIDAY FIRE & CO SAFE

TIP #1 TUESDAY DECEMBER 12

HOLIDAY LIGHTS. You don't need to be Clark Griswold to shine bright with lights this holiday! Consider using LED lights and hang with nail-free clips for your outdoor-rated lights. Cut your loss and toss damaged strings - an electrical fire is a sure bet for a lousy holiday.

TIP #2 WEDNESDAY **DECEMBER 13**

CANDLES & DECORATIONS. Is that candle too close to the decoration sitting on your table? Fires caused by holiday decorations and open flames from candles are all too common this season. Battery-powered candles are a great alternative but if you must light up, keep candles away from pets and children, put the candle in a sturdy container and always blow out when you leave the roon

TIP#3 THURSDAY DECEMBER 14 SMOKE ALARMS "Tis the season - literally! Fatal fires are at their highest rate during the holidays. When seconds matter, a working smoke alarm is the gift of time in the event of a fire. An alarm on every storey, tested monthly, and batteries replaced annually, is probably the best gift you can give your family this season.

TIP#4 FRIDAY DECEMBER 15 CARBON MONOXIDE ALARMS. Unlike gingerbread, it's odourless. Unlike your uncle's ugly Christmas sweater, it's invisible. Carbon Monoxide (CO) is a deadly gas that can cause flu-like symptoms. A CO alarm alerts you to a potential CO emergency with four beeps and is the best way to protect your family from The Silent Killer.

TIP #5 SATURDAY DECEMBER 16

TREE WATERING. Falling needles are your tree's way of telling you it's drying out and is a fire waiting to happen. Avoid being a statistic and water your tree daily. Be weary of heat sources near the tree including furnace vents and non-LED lights.

TIP#6 SUNDAY DECEMBER 17

EXTENSION CORDS. Getting wound up in the holiday spirit? Don't "overextend" your outlets! Extension cords are a temporary solution and if more outlets are required, have them installed by a licensed electrician. Fire and electric shock are not on anyone's list this season - avoid overloading a circuit and never run extension cords under a rug.

TIP #7 MONDAY DECEMBER 18

KIDS IN THE KITCHEN. Holiday baking with children this holiday season? Make sure to keep an eye on those little bakers and remember to never leave the oven unattended. Safety first, cookies second! #HolidayFireSafety

TIP #8 TUESDAY DECEMBER 19

HOME FIRE ESCAPE PLANNING. Santa needs one way out of your home – you need two. Give your family the gift of peace of mind with a home fire escape plan and have two ways out of a burning home to ensure your loved ones are prepared for the worst so you can focus on the best: festive cheer!

TIP #9 WEDNESDAY DECEMBER 20

COOKING. Holidays are stressful enough but when 17% of fires in Ontario are cooking-related, it's important to remember to slow things down in the kitchen. TIP #11 FRIDAY DECEMBER 22

SMOKING. Lit cigarettes are Ontario's number one cause of fatal fires. This season, have all smoking done outside using deep, sturdy ashtrays. Never flick your butt - a lit butt might be the difference between a holiday to remember and a holiday you'll never forget.

TIP #12 SATURDAY **DECEMBER 23** LITHIUM-ION BATTERIES. Receiving a new lithium-ion toy during the festive period can be exciting but it can also add potential risk to your home. Always monitor the toy or device when it is charging; read the manufacturer's instructions for safe charging & do not exceed the recommended charging
