Caring Adults Matter campaign launched

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Special) – A new campaign hopes to inspire Temiskaming adults to make a positive difference in the lives of young people.

- "It's never too early to start building resilience and positive qualities in young people," said Kim Jackson, EarlyON program director, in a news release.

"The developmental years of 0 – 6 are critical in building positive relationships, but caring relationships with adults are essential as the child continues to grow, and develop," Jackson said.

EarlyON, the Timiskaming Health Unit, Timiskaming Child Care, the Centre de santé communautaire du Témiskaming and Keepers of the Circle are partners in the campaign.

The initiative will offer practical ideas that caring adults can use to have a positive effect on the emotional health and well-being of children and youth.

Campaign proponents said five aspects are "critical" when forging meaningful relationships with youth – caring; showing support while challenging them to be their best selves; sharing power; showing respect; and expanding their sense of possibilities and opportunities.

"Sometimes, people forget the impact they can have on others," said Krystal Oviatt, public health promoter at the health unit.

"As an adult in a young person's life, your actions and words can have such a profound effect. Caring adults play an important role in the lives of children and youth."

Messages will be posted on social media and around the community.

Shingles Vaccine

What is Shingles?

Also known as herpes zoster, shingles is an infection that can be very serious. The virus causes a painful skin rash with blisters on one side of the body. It can cause complications like loss of vision and debilitating nerve pain. The most common complication is long-lasting and severe pain where the shingles rash was. Shingles cannot be passed from one person to another. However, the virus that causes shingles can be spread from a person with the shingles rash in the blister phase to another person who has never had chicken pox.

Who is at risk of getting shingles?

The risk increases as a person ages. About one in three Canadians will develop shingles in their lifetime and two out of three cases occur in people over 50 years of age. The severity and complications increase with age. The shingles vaccine can reduce your risk of getting shingles and the long-term pain it can cause. There are two different shingles vaccines available with a cost to purchase the vaccine itself. Check with your pharmacy

- Not previously vaccinated children 5 11 years of age require 1 dose.
- Not previously vaccinated individuals 12+ require 1 dose.



COBALT - The work of well-known area artist Berdina Beaven is now on display at the Mezzanine Gallery at the Classic Theatre in Cobalt until January 12.

Classic Theatre general manager Kendra Lacarte says the gallery is open Thursdays and Fridays from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., or people interested in coming to see the exhibition at a different time can also phone ahead to make an appointment.

Lacarte explained that the Mezzanine Gallery has been closed in recent years due to the pandemic and lack of staff.

Lacarte recently took over the position of general manager of the Classic Theatre, which allows the gallery to resume holding rotating exhibitions, she explained.

Following Beaven's exhibition, the artworks displayed in the gallery will rotate every two months.

"This is just a quick pop-up one because the walls were empty," Lacarte stated of Beaven's exhibition.

The gallery wanted to have an exhibition in place for a Christmas concert at the Classic Theatre December 8 and 9, she explained. The gallery contacted Laura Landers, a local art promoter, member of the Temiskaming Palette and Brush Club, and the operator of Laura's Art Shoppe in Cobalt.

Landers was asked if she knew anyone who might have enough paintings to hang for the Christmas season, and Landers related that Beaven was the first person she thought of since Beaven recently exhibited her art works at Northdale Manor.

Beaven, now 93, lives with her daughter Lisa Bernat in Haileybury. Landers contacted Bernat and determined that Beaven did have artworks that could be readied for an immediate exhibition.

"Berdina has been a long-time member of the NOAA (Northern Ontario Art Association) and a very established member too. She's very versatile," said Landers.

Beaven is especially known and celebrated for her collage work.

"She tears little bits of colourful pieces of papers out of all kinds of magazines and sometimes old paintings and just out of her imagination somehow compiles these beautiful compositions out of it all," said Land-

"I have heard that her favourite magazine for the colour and quality of the paper is the LCBO (Liquor Control Board of Ontario) magazines." (Bernat confirmed this fact.)

Beaven still creates art pieces and recently gave a workshop at Northdale Manor.

The artworks, which are 16 by 20 inches in size, are also available for sale.

Preparing for the next bout of severe weather

TORONTO (Special) – A new ity for many Ontarians as we survey conducted by Innovative Research Group for Hydro One reveals that only 52 per cent of Ontarians feel prepared to manage through an extended power outage.

The survey also highlights that, while 28 per cent of Ontarians have at least a partial emergency preparedness kit with some of the items they may need, nearly half don't have anything at all.

Of the 87 per cent of Ontarians who don't have a complete emergency preparedness kit, 39 per cent say it had never occurred to them to have one and 11 per cent don't think having one is necessary.

Hydro One encourages Ontarians to prepare a personalized emergency kit that reflects the needs of their family.

Among the critical items to include:

Water and food that won't

spoil for all family members, including pets;

- A manual can opener;
- Wind-up or battery-powered flashlight and radio;
- Extra batteries;
- Cash;
- First aid kit and medical items;
- Blankets;
- Emergency numbers, including Hydro One's outage line 1-800-434-1235;
- Fully charged cellphone and a backup battery pack or a corded phone; a cordless phone will not work in a

power outage;

· Keep your emergency kit in a backpack and make sure everyone in your home knows where to find it.

Hydro One also has a number of innovative tools available for customers to report power outages and easily access updates when and how they want, including outage text alerts.

When an outage occurs, customers can report it by texting 92887 (WATTS), or by using the company's outage map and app, or calling 1-800-434-1235.

Tips for holiday safety

OTTAWA (Special) – It may be the most wonderful time of the year, but Health Canada warns that Christmas festivities can also pose some safety risks.

It offers the following advice on five categories of products that can brighten the holiday season or ruin it, if not used as intended.

Holiday trees

- Place the tree away from heating vents, radiators, stoves, fireplaces and burning candles.
- Make sure the tree is green and that its needles do not come off or break easily. Water it to prevent it from drying out prematurely. Throw it away after the holidays or when it is dry.

Lights and decorations

- Only use lights that have the mark of an accredited certification agency in Canada, such as CSA, cUL or cETL.
- Light strings and other decorations are rated for indoor or outdoor use, so choose accordingly.
- Discard any wires that are frayed or lighting with exposed wires, loose connections or broken light sockets.
- Avoid plugging too many lights and decorations into a single outlet. Overloaded circuits can overheat and start a fire.

Toys

In Canada, all toys are regulated to make sure they are safe for use by children. But unsafe toys still make their way onto store shelves and into homes.

The ways toys are used can sometimes expose children to hazards. Buying toys online can pose a risk because consumers can't tell if they're counterfeit or of poor quality.

- When buying toys, look for sturdy and well-made ones that include the manufacturer's contact information.
- Read and follow all age labels and safety messages. Toys intended for older children may have small parts or other features that make them unsafe for younger kids.
- Keep small toys and any loose parts/accessories, such as button batteries, out of the reach of children under three years of age, who tend to put objects in their mouths and could choke.

Candle

Candles can be a serious fire hazard if not used properly.

- Extinguish all candles before going to bed or leaving the room. Never leave burning candles unattended.
- Do not burn candles on or near anything that could catch fire, such as curtains, bedding, combustible decorations and clothing.
- Cut candle wicks short to prevent high flames. Preferably use flameless candles.

Fireplace

- Avoid burning wrapping paper in the fireplace. Wrapping paper ignites suddenly and burns intensely, which may result in a dangerous flash fire.
- Before using your fireplace, have your chimney inspected and cleaned by a professional. Always check that the flue is open before lighting up.






