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# **North Cobalt** rink prepping for year-round use

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Shaver Park, the city's only community park in North Cobalt, will get a facelift in 2024.

Work will include paving the surface of the outdoor rink.

That will speed ice-making in the winter and open the venue to summer use, explained Temiskaming Shores recreation director Matt Bahm in a report to city council.

A bicycle training course will be painted on the new surface, and the facility will be available for other summer sports.

"There are currently no spaces offered by the city for summer ball hockey or roller hockey and having more spaces for unstructured play is important for the recreational needs of residents," Bahm said.

Total cost of work is \$95,000.

A funder has stepped forward to help.

The Alexa Corneil Memorial Ladies Hockey Tournament, the AC15, is donating \$50,000.

"This is a substantial, substantial donation for the city," said Mayor Jeff Laferriere after council met December 19.

It's awesome, he said, that volunteers in the municipality are taking the initiative "and making a major contribution to that facility."

The work will also include the replacement of fencing behind each goal. New fencing will ensure no errant projectiles make their way on to neighbouring properties, Bahm said.

He said the city has requested support for the North Cobalt park as part of a larger project tallying almost \$600,000 that includes upgrades to Rotary Farr Park.

The plan would include paving the Farr Park parking lot, expanding the basketball court to full size, resurfacing the tennis court, installing path lighting, improving the ball diamond infield and backstop, and purchasing a ball diamond groomer.

But should that funding request not be successful, he said money would be reallocated to ensure that the Shaver Park work proceeds.

**CHAMBERLAIN** TOWN-SHIP - The new year will be quieter for Chamberlain Township than the past few years have been.

Nearly all the bridges in the

township have been repaired or replaced with only one remaining that will likely be a project in the years ahead.

Reeve Kerry Stewart says that he would look in the direction of ditches and drainage for future projects, and that work may begin in 2024.

Overall though, the projects outlined for '24 will be more in the direction of housekeeping.

The township has just finished its upgrades to its municipal hall on Road Five.

The project, completed mid-December, includes new furnaces that will use propane

instead of oil.

The furnace project is the final piece in extensive upgrades that have been carried out on the hall.

"We've done quite a bit of work on the inside and the outside both," he said.

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
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


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

According to a climatologist in Alaska, Ontario has just had one of the darkest winter seasons in nearly a century.

### **Public Notice of Application for Consent**

The Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing has received Application No. 54-C-236417 for consent in Savard Unincorporated Township, District of Timiskaming. The subject property is described as Lot 1 Concession 2, PIN 61267-0017, locally known as 675294 Hwy 573.

The application proposes to sever a lot approximately 4.8 hectares in size, with 250 metres of frontage on Highway 573, for continued residential purposes. The proposed lot contains a house, a garage and a small shed and is serviced by individual on-site water and sewage services.

The proposed retained lot would be approximately 60 hectares in size, with approximately 450 metres of frontage on Highway 573 about 350 metres of frontage on Chamberlain West Road. The land is partially wooded, and partially farm. It is proposed to continue to be used for agricultural purposes. No new buildings or structures are proposed as a result of this application.

The purpose of this notice is to inform the public of the nature of the application, invite public input, advise on how to make comments on the application and advise the public of future notification and appeal rights.

### Second scoreboard coming to The Shep

TEMISKAMING SHORES -A second scoreboard will be installed this summer at the Don Shepherdson Memorial Arena, with advertising covering its cost.

Brownlee Equipment will pay \$7,200 over ten years for a wall advertisement that will be placed beside the new auxiliary scoreboard.

The fee will cover not only the purchase of the new scoreboard but also the advertising fee, said recreation director Matt Bahm in a March 21 report to Temiskaming Shores council.

The existing scoreboard,

which was purchased in 2005, is located at the east end of the New Liskeard arena.

But it's not visible to all users of the facility, Bahm said.

The new scoreboard will be installed on the west wall. above the hall windows, with the Brownlee ad placed beside it. Flags now in the location will be placed further up.

The new scoreboard will both enhance the arena and serve as a back-up in case the existing equipment stops working, he said.

### FROM THE APRIL 21 ISSUE Gibson resigns from mayor's seat in Cobalt

COBALT - Cobalt council has accepted the resignation of Mita Gibson from the position of mayor.

The town now has 60 days to fill the vacancy or declare an election.

The resignation was accepted at council's April 18 meeting without discussion.

Acting Mayor Doug Wilcox read the resignation letter publicly. It was dated April 6 but contained no comment other than Gibson's decision to resign.

On April 4 an integrity commissioner's report was reviewed at the Cobalt committee-of-the-whole meeting, and council penalized Gibson with two month's docked remuneration because of her actions which resulted in the loss of the former library board.

Approximately 45 members of the public were present for the April 18 meeting and the acceptance of the resignation was greeted with applause from throughout the gathering.

### Tips to age in place in your own home

### Northeastern OPP report tragic tally on Easter weekend

NORTH BAY (Staff/Special) -Three people, including two in Temiskaming, lost their lives in collisions in Northeastern Ontario over the Easter weekend period.

Two people were killed in an April 9 collision on Highway 11 north of Englehart involving two transport trucks.

Both individuals – a 25-year-old from Mississauga and a 26-yearold from Brampton, who were in a southbound commercial vehicle - were pronounced dead at the scene of the crash in Chamberlain Township.

The Ontario Provincial Police are no longer routinely releasing the names of people killed in traffic and marine-related incidents.

The collision remains under investigation.

The Northeastern OPP report the third death in the region involved a snowmobile.

### FROM THE APRIL 28 ISSUE **City commits funding to next** steps in community safety plan TEMISKAMING SHORES The city has agreed to financially support a coordinator who will guide the implementation of a district-wide Community Safety and Well-Being Plan over the coming

Temiskaming Shores council has approved funding up to \$33,860 or about one-third of the estimated budget - for the post, which will be overseen by the Timiskaming Health Unit.

It has also requested representation on the steering committee that will oversee the project over the next year.

The city and Kirkland Lake raised the issue of provincial funding for implementation when they met with Solicitor General Michael Kerzner earlier this year.

No funding has come forward "as of yet," said Mayor Jeff Laferriere after council met April 18.

"We are in ongoing discussions with them, but all of the work has been done, and it's time to move forward with the implementation,"

# School and parish team up to donate to food bank

**TEMISKAMING** SHORES - A three-way partnership has resulted in three truckloads of food for the Haileybury Food Bank.

Ecole catholique Ste-Croix students teamed up with members of Église Ste-Croix parish church in Haileybury to set a donation goal of two truckloads of food this year.

The food drive began as a set of challenges whereby each week the goal was to donate food that the food bank needed.

One week it was pasta, the next it was another food item, said Ste-Croix parish member Gracia Lacroix in a telephone interview.

But to the surprise of all involved, they exceeded their goal and donated three truckloads December 11.

Lacroix says this initiative brought the community together to create a giving circle but it also helped to bring the issue of food insecurity to the Ste-Croix students.

"They were given a tour of the food bank and it showed them that not all families have enough food to eat."

She thanked the students and parents for donating food, the parishioners at the church and the food bank volunteers themselves for doing the good work they do to help others.

And she said the food bank volunteers were so impressed with the donation they asked if they might do it again next year.

"We will get everyone together and possibly do it again next year," said Lacroix.

She felt the food drive was an excellent example of how a community can support a local food bank.

The township has also now finished improvements to its municipal park, also located on Road Five.

"The ballpark has been completely refurbished, and it's looking very good." A new playground has also been set up for children, he noted.

The ball diamond has also been improved, and the township has seen good use being made of it by Englehart Minor Baseball and local slo-pitch teams, he said.

Chamberlain has a shared services agreement with the Municipality of Charlton and Dack. The municipalities have been struggling through the past year to fill the position of chief administrative officer and keep it filled, as has been the case with the position of deputy clerk for Chamberlain Township. As the Municipality of Charlton and Dack moved forward into the new year, it was looking to fill the position previously held by long-time deputy clerk-treasurer Gisele Belanger.

Vaughn Finch took the position of chief administrative officer for the two municipalities in the fall, and Michelle Fiset came on board as the new deputy clerk-treasurer for Chamberlain.

Stewart said the shared services agreement is working well but the two municipalities are doing a review of the past three years.

"We're going to put some numbers together so we have a really good idea how

it's been working out," he said.

Chamberlain is also working on emergency management improvements with three other municipalities – Englehart, Charlton and Dack, and Evanturel Township. The four are "a unit in this area," he said. If an emergency were to occur "we need to work together properly."

The municipality is also working on strategic planning, "which goes hand-inhand with our asset management plan."

He said the provincial government is requiring some additional information from the municipalities' asset management plan, which has to be completed by the end of July 2024.

The township also intends to work on website upgrades and development.

Chamberlain Township shares public works with Charlton/Dack, but has its own grader, backhoe and plow truck, said Stewart. It shares an excavator and a tractor with an attachment to mow the roadsides.

The township saw its Krugerdorf Bridge replaced in 2023, and repairs carried out on Aidie Creek Bridge, both of which have been reopened.

Last year the township put approximately \$450,000 worth of gravel into improving the Wawbewawa Road and Road Five with some additional gravel on Road Two as well, said Stewart.

The municipality is taking steps to mitigate its role in climate change.

It has set a goal of net zero emissions - by either eliminating greenhouse gases or offsetting them by carbon-capturing measures – by 2050.

The need to help ratepayers understand why costs are rising was discussed at the May 11 council meeting.



He said Temiskaming OPP conducted "a thorough search" and determined that there was no threat to the safety of students or staff within the school.

During a lockdown, schools and classrooms are locked, lights are turned off, and students are away from any windows or doors, explained Stephanie Shaw, communications officer at District School Board Ontario North East, in an email.

As the investigation continued outside the school, Date said students were in a "hold and secure environment."

"During a hold and secure, students continue learning as usual inside the building, although no one is allowed to enter or exit the school," he explained.

"At approximately 1:30 p.m., an arrest was made by OPP and under advisement from OPP, our school exited the hold and secure," he continued.

"All students and staff are safe, and at no point was there a safety concern within the school," he said.

# Charlton-Dack keeping an eye on the future

CHARLTON-DACK - The Municipality of Charlton and Dack is entering 2024 with the ongoing issue of staffing.

Long-time deputy clerk-treasurer Gisele Belanger has left that position, and at the turn of the year the municipality was seeking applications for the position.

In the late fall a new chief administrative officer, Vaughn Finch, came on board and oversees the administration duties for both Charlton-Dack and for the Township of Chamberlain, which has a shared services agreement with the municipality.

Reeve Sandra Parkin said the focus for the municipality this year will be on technical upgrades at the office, policy reviews where needed, and also municipal infrastructure.

The municipality also wants to update its website and social media. Parkin said the municipality wants to know, "Do we have everything that we need to be efficient and move forward into the future?"

The municipality continues to work on its River Road bridge project, which is still with the engineers.

"We're hoping we're going to be able to tackle that this year," Parkin said of the surface improvement project.

The township will also be looking at needed culvert projects, and examining its budget to see what can be afforded this year.

Technical upgrades are taking place in the office to improve efficiencies and enhance speeds, Parkin added.

"Things are going well on our shared services agreement with Chamberlain, so we're trying to make improvements on that, to see if there are any more efficiencies that we can bring to the table for both townships," she continued.

"It is working from what we can see, so we would like to keep it going in that direction."

The municipality, which has annually held a Canada Day fireworks display, had to hold off on the display in 2023 until late summer due to fire hazard concerns and the potential to start a fire.

"We're looking at a drone show this year," said Parkin.

"A drone show would go regardless of whether there's a fire ban or not," she pointed out. "And, from an environmental aspect, it's a lot nicer for people's pets."

She said the municipality is considering it as a pilot project and needs to determine whether a drone show could be presented at the same cost as a fireworks display.

"It would be something new," she said, adding that she has seen a drone show and it is impressive.

"We have a very strong physician complement," he said.


The hospital has also made "very significant investments" in temporary agency nurses who work in the emergency department and care for in-patients, he said.

The objective is to maintain a minimum standard for addressing snow accumulation. Plowing begins with respect to each class of roadway in accordance with its classification and level of service standard. The depth of snow may be determined by performing an actual measurement, monitoring the weather and performing a visual estimate.

### **Sidewalk Snow Accumulation**

The objective is to make the sidewalk as safe as possible, to be reached as soon as possible, after a storm has ended. To reduce snow to a depth less than or equal to 8 cm within 48 hours and to provide a minimum sidewalk width of 1 meter. \*Remember, not all sidewalks are maintained in the Winter. Sidewalks that are not maintained are considered closed for the season.

Install smoke and carbon monoxide alarms on every storey of your home. Test them

every month.

# How do I prevent a **smoking fire?**

- To prevent smoking fires, you must be alert. You will not be alert if you are sleepy, have consumed alcohol, drugs or medicine that makes you drowsy.
- · Never smoke in bed.
- If people have been smoking in your home, check behind chair and sofa cushions for cigarette butts before going to bed.
- Use large deep ashtrays that cannot be knocked over.
- Empty ashes into a metal container—not the garbage can—and put it outside.
- Do not extinguish cigarettes in plant pots, which may contain a mixture of peat moss, shredded wood and bark that can easily ignite.
- Encourage smokers to smoke outside

### Notice to the Users of the Waterfront Pool Facility

Our pool cannot operate without our staff members. There have been several incidents of disrespectful behaviour from members of the public towards our staff members simply for enforcing basic safety policies. We take these verbal confrontations very seriously and, in a time when quality part-time and full-time staff are in high demand, we expect our pool users to be respectful and abide by the rules set out. If a user is unable to follow the rules, they will be denied entry and may lose their pool access for a period of time. Our City employees deserve respect when doing their jobs.

### **Pool Admission Policy**

All children under 10 years old MUST be accompanied by an adult or guardian (14+) in the pool, regardless of swimming ability. This means adults or guardians must be in a swimsuit, in the pool, within arms reach of their children. This is the standard for pools across Ontario and is in place to ensure the safety of all our young swimmers.

### **Pool Capacity**

The capacity of the pool depends on the number of lifeguards on duty. These numbers are stipulated by the Government of Ontario's Public Pools Regulation

1 Lifeguard (if the slide is open: 2 Lifeguards)

### **Cell Phone Use**

We understand the desire to take pictures of your own children during public swims. However, due to issues with consent of others and the chance for nefarious behaviour, we do NOT allow cell phone use in the changerooms or on the pool deck. Please put your phone away and be present instead!

have, and that's a focus for us."

The hospital is continuing to experience high occupancy rates.

At the beginning of the week, it had 70 in-patients, which represents 120 per cent of its base occupancy.

By that point in June, it was averaging more than 66 patients a day, which is "very, very high for us," he said.

Alternate-level-of-care patients – typically those waiting for a place at a long-term care facility – numbered 34 or 35.

Visits to the emergency department had slowed in recent days, but for several days the previous week's traffic had reached pre-COVID levels.

"That hasn't happened in a long time," he said.
