City enforcing zero tolerance for bad behaviour

TEMISKAMING SHORES - An increase in inappropriate behaviour and vandalism has prompted the city to institute a new "R"

The "R" stands for "Respect and Respons-

Temiskaming Shores council has approved a new RZone policy that will apply to all city facilities and properties, the transit service, city-sponsored events and programs, and locations where city staff are working.

It also applies to communications, be they in person, in writing, over the phone or made electronically.

The policy adopts a zero tolerance approach to inappropriate behaviour and sets out consequences.

The city has unfortunately had to deal with some issues, said Mayor Jeff Laferriere when the policy was presented to council at its committee-of-the-whole meeting last week.

City enforcing zero tolerance for bad behaviour

Having a policy in place enables the city to be "fair and consistent" when dealing with incidents, he said January 16.

Councillor Melanie Ducharme said she appreciated the city taking proactive steps, particularly in protecting its younger workers.

She urged that consideration of consequences take into account the impact on the individual staffer.

While an incident may have little effect on one person, for another "it may not roll off," she said.

The city experienced a spate of vandalism at some of its recreational facilities, particularly in Haileybury, over the summer.

In a report to council last week, recreation director Matt Bahm said there have been a couple of incidents of patrons of the Pool and Fitness Centre being disrespectful to part-time staff, most of whom are younger females.

He said de-escalation training is planned for all staff.

The RZone policy will "help ensure that people are acting appropriately within the facility," he said.

POLICY

In a report to council, city manager Amy Vickery said the purpose of the RZone policy is to "promote a positive, safe, and supportive environment for all members of the public, staff and volunteers."

It was first used by Oakville in 2008 and has since been adopted by several municipalities.

Vickery described it as "first and foremost, a proactive education and awareness strategy to promote respectful and responsible behaviour"

The policy outlines what behaviour is considered inappropriate. It includes the use of aggressive or intimidating language and racial, ethnic or other personal slurs.

It extends to the contravention of city bylaws, possession of weapons, the illegal use of drugs or alcohol, vandalism, harassment and physical violence.

The policy also outlines guidelines for the progressive enforcement of consequences.

Depending on the nature of the incident, its seriousness, and whether it's a firsttime occurrence or a repeated act, consequences range from a warning letter to bans from municipal facilities.

In the case of theft and vandalism, it includes payment to cover repairs and administration fees.

After the meeting, Laferriere said society in general is seeing "more and more abuse," whether it's at the grocery store, in the neighbourhood, or at municipal facilities.

The impact of Facebook and the pandemic seems to have

prompted some people to be more disrespectful, he said.

"It is where we are in society."

He said the city wants to ensure that its staff are working in a safe environment.





EDITORIAL

Safety on ice

There are many reasons why we might want to venture out onto area waterways, but with the mild start to winter, is it safe?

Fluctuating temperatures, lots of slush on area lakes and ice thickness must be considered before heading out for a day of ice fishing, snowmobiling or walking on frozen surfaces.

Despite seeing ice huts all across the waterfronts of Lake Temiskaming, caution is needed when traveling on large bodies of water.

Ice is usually safe at this time of year, but this year has been different in terms of the mild temperatures we had leading up to January.

People may not be aware of moving channels of water beneath the surface of the ice, which makes seemingly solid ice unsafe.

When in doubt, stay off of ice until you are sure it is of the correct thickness.

And even then, there could be open spots under the snow that aren't visible.

Is your life worth catching a fish, a skate on a lake or going for a snowmachine ride?

The Farmer's Almanac recommends ice thickness for ice fishing should be 10 to 15 centimetres (cm), or four inches of ice.

For vehicles it is 30 cm or 12 to 15 inches of thickness for safety's sake.

If ice is less than two inches or five cm's, stay on land.

If you are not familiar with area waterways be extra careful about where you intend to travel.

Frozen rivers and lakes can be deceptive, especially with the balmy winter we've had.

The risks are real as we know two teens from Ottawa died when they fell through the Rideau River on December 27 and a 60-yearold man in Hanmer died when he plunged through open water on December 31.

Be smart and stay safe out there!

Beauty on the wing

What's black and orange and can change colour and shape?

A beautiful monarch butterfly. Isn't it a lovely thing to sit back and visualize the monarchs flitting about our gardens and forests in the dead of winter?

The orange and black insect that beautifully represents transformation and renewal is in trouble.

Their population has declined by 72 per cent over the last decade, says the World Wildlife Federation.

I was shocked to learn migratory monarch butterflies have just been put on the endangered species list in Canada.

This endangered designation was a formal declaration done by the federal government in 2023, which means monarch butter-flies are now legally protected on government lands.

This is big news nature lovers and really important.

The butterflies are threatened by habitat loss, pesticide usage and climate change as they migrate across Canada to wintering grounds in tropical destinations like Mexico.

The monarchs return to their summer breeding grounds in our region, much like songbirds each spring.

That's when we get to see their beauty up close when they flit past us like they haven't a care in the world.

Herbicides and the loss of milkweed plants, where monarchs lay their eggs, has worsened the decline of the insect.

That's not only here in our region but all along their migratory paths there is predation present whereby the insects are threatened with death.

Each summer at the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre's Hummingbird Garden Party, there is an educational program presented on the life-

cycle of the monarch butterfly.

Kids can see how a monarch caterpillar beautifully turns into a green chrysalis and then emerges as a gorgeous orange and black butterfly, released back into the wild.

It is not advisable for people to keep monarch caterpillars at their homes and then release them because there may not be enough milkweed plants for them to feed on in a certain area.

Or there may not be enough pollen rich flowers in that area to sustain the butterflies.

At the Marsh there have been many, many milkweed plants planted over the years.

And I cannot even go there where people are breeding monarchs for money. Never order a monarch butterfly from an online source.

Last year I took a photo of a little boy running carefree at the Marsh with a pair of cloth monarch wings attached to his t-shirt.

This is where we can make a difference, when we present children with the winged wonders of this world. If a person falls in love with something, they will tend to protect it.


So, if you have a garden, plant milkweed plants galore in late autumn, plant native wildflowers, avoid herbicide usage and advocate for the preservation of our natural world.

Is there anything more wondrous than the lifecycle of the monarch butterfly?

They help us to know that through life there are many stages, which can all lead to a beautiful outcome.

Keepers gets "Investing in Women's Futures" support

DISTRICT (Special) - Keepers of the Circle in Temiskaming Shores and Kirkland Lake are benefiting from a provincial government investment of \$325,000 over three years.

Keepers of the Circle executive director Bertha Cormier explained in a press release that "we are building on our Culture, Confidence and Competence program, a culturally rooted pre-employment training program; providing wrap-around supports to reduce barriers; supporting Indigenous women entrepreneurs through skills development; as well as enhancing our existing gender-based violence support services to better respond to and prevent gender-based violence among our Indigenous women and girls, and gender-diverse members."

Associate Minister of Women's Social and Economic Opportunity Charmaine Williams stated, "Through this new Investing in Women's Futures program location in Temiskaming Shores and Kirkland Lake, more survivors of gender-based violence will have access to the employment readiness and wrap-around supports they need to increase their participation in the workforce and provide for themselves and their children. Our government is empowering women to achieve the success they deserve because when women succeed, Ontario succeeds."

Such an investment, said Timmins MPP George Pirie, "will connect more women across the north to services that will help them develop the skills they need for financial security and independence. Our government's \$325,000 investment is just one more way we are making sure the women of the north are supported and get involved in high-demand industries like mining and other skilled trades."

The Investing in Women's Futures program expansion is benefitting a total of ten additional locations across the province, and is part of a \$6.9 million investment over three years to enhance the program and create more economic opportunities for women. This brings the total number of service delivery locations to 33 across the province, and builds on the \$18 million funding from 2022-2025 to support the Investing in Women's Futures and Women's Economic Security programs.

In June 2021, the government launched Ontario's Task Force on Women and the Economy to provide advice on addressing the unique and disproportionate economic barriers women face.

In 2022-2023, the Investing in Women's Futures program helped nearly 1,300 women across Ontario secure employment, start their own businesses or pursue further training and/or education.



Physical Activity and Mental Health

The Canadian Mental Health Association estimates that 1 in 5 Canadians will experience a mental health crisis or be diagnosed with a mental illness. By age 40, that ratio increases to every 1 in 2 Canadians. While the benefits of physical activity on physical health are well known, being active can also be an effective pathway to good mental health.

According to the <u>World Health Organization</u>, mental health is "a state of wellbeing in which an individual realizes his or her own abilities, can cope with the normal stresses of life, can work productively and is able to make a contribution to his or her community". The fast pace of modern life can sometimes throw off our mental balance, which is why it's important to find simple and effective strategies to keep it steady. Physical activity is one of them.

Although you won't often see "more physical activity" written on your prescriptions, it's often recommended as a way to counteract and manage many diseases. Mental illnesses such as depression and anxiety are no exception.

Regular physical activity can help:

- · Boost your mood and energy levels.
- · Inspire a feeling of pride, self-esteem and general wellbeing.
- Improve your ability to concentrate and accomplish day-to-day tasks.
- · Reduce your stress and improving your ability to manage it.
- Help you get better-quality sleep.
- Additionally, if you are living with mental illness, including exercise in your daily routine can help reduce your symptoms and help you cope.

The Ideal Level of Physical Activity

You don't have to become a top athlete to see the benefits of physical activity on your mental health. Getting moderate-intensity (and especially aerobic) exercise for at least 15 to 30 minutes a day can be enough to see changes in your mood and wellbeing. That said, if you feel like you can and want to do more, go for it! Just remember that if you have a chronic illness such as heart disease, it's best to talk to your primary care provider before starting a more intense exercise routine. It may also be a good idea to seek help from a qualified personal trainer.

Making physical activity a priority is an easy and accessible way to take care of your health and wellbeing, including your mental health.

North video series by the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM).

SIS Manufacturing, an international supplier of industrial and construction-related steel products and services, is the group's largest company.

But SIS has more recently expanded into tourism, converting a former industrial site into restaurants and pubs, an events centre, a new station for the Agawa Canyon rail tour, and even an outdoor rink. It also runs Border Town Classics, a dealership specializing in classic and muscle cars.

The video, about five and a half minutes in length, includes interviews with the company's executives and employees.

They focus on the wide range of work available at SIS, the ability to develop new skills, and the benefits of a Northern lifestyle.

They're common themes in the Go North series.

The promotional initiative was launched by FONOM in the fall of 2020 with funding from FedNor.

Its first instalment profiled Three H Furniture Systems in Temiskaming Shores.





Notice to the Users of the Waterfront Pool Facility

Our pool cannot operate without our staff members. There have been several incidents of disrespectful behaviour from members of the public towards our staff members simply for enforcing basic safety policies. We take these verbal confrontations very seriously and, in a time when quality part-time and full-time staff are in high demand, we expect our pool users to be respectful and abide by the rules set out. If a user is unable to follow the rules, they will be denied entry and may lose their pool access for a period of time. Our City employees deserve respect when doing their jobs.

Pool Admission Policy

All children under 10 years old MUST be accompanied by an adult or guardian (14+) in the pool, regardless of swimming ability. This means adults or guardians must be in a swimsuit, in the pool, within arms reach of their children. This is the standard for pools across Ontario and is in place to ensure the safety of all our young swimmers.

Pool Capacity

The capacity of the pool depends on the number of lifeguards on duty. These numbers are stipulated by the Government of Ontario's Public Pools Regulation

O-24 Swimmers | 1 Lifeguard (if the slide is open: 2 Lifeguards) **25-56 Swimmers** | 2 Lifeguards (if the slide is open: 3 Lifeguards) **66-100 Swimmers** | 3 Lifeguards (if the slide is open: 4 Lifeguards) **101-129 Swimmers** | 4 Lifeguards (if the slide is open: 5 Lifeguards)

Cell Phone Use

We understand the desire to take pictures of your own children during public swims. However, due to issues with consent of others and the chance for nefarious behaviour, we do NOT allow cell phone use in the changerooms or on the pool deck. Please put your phone away and be present instead!

Memorial Bench and Tree Program

Applications for the City of Temiskaming Shores Memorial Bench and Tree Program, are now being accepted. Leave a lasting memory of a loved one by having a bench installed or tree plated in their name. This is a great way to make a low-cost, lasting impact to our community.

New this year, applications will be accepted to place benches and trees within City cemeteries.

Fee includes the bench or tree, plaque, engraving, shipping, installation and applicable taxes. The cost for a memorial bench is \$2,000.00. The cost for a memorial tree is \$500.00.

The application period is from January 1 until April 15 with all installations to take place by September 30.

Garbage and Recycling Collection | Extreme Weather Conditions

During extreme weather conditions your garbage and recycling collection may be delayed; however, Phippen Waste Management does their best to ensure regular collection remain on time.

Resident Responsibility

- Clear the bins of snow and ice to ensure the lid opens when emptied.
- Make the bin accessible and visible to the collector.

Place bins for collection at an unobstructed site.

- It may be necessary to change the regular placement of your rollout bins
- The bins should be no closer than 3 feet from any obstacle, not obstructing the street (snowbanks, mailboxes, hydro poles, parked vehicles, etc.)
- Keep bins off the travelled portion of the roadway to eliminate interference with snowplows. Do not place bins in a location where the snowplow may hit them.
- Do not place bins behind or on-top of snowbanks.

City of Temiskaming Shores Winter Operations Plan 2023-2024

Friday, January 26, 2024

Although winter weather is often random and unpredictable, city snow removal efforts are not. The city is committed to providing a high level of snow removal service throughout the winter season, with consideration to safety, environmental and budget concerns. Your cooperation in helping to keep streets clean and safe is appreciated.

Winter Maintenance Season

The City will perform winter highway maintenance commencing on or about November 1, 2023 and is completed on or about April 15, 2024.

Snow removal and disposal

As a result of snow plowing operations, snow accumulates at the side of roads as windrows or mounds. The City starts snow removal operations when these windrows reach volumes that create nuisance or hazard to pedestrians and motorists and to maintain capacity for subsequent snowfalls.

The objective is to commence removal operations in Priority 1 locations as soon as practicable after becoming aware that the snow bank accumulation is greater than 60cm and 120cm in Priority 2 locations.

By-law 2009-159, Regulate Removal and Relocation of Snow No person shall;

- Deposit any snow, ice or other debris on City property or street from their property or other private property.
- Move snow within a street or allow snow to be moved from one side of the cleared portion of the street intended for vehicular and pedestrian traffic.
