TEMISKAMING SHORES – In an effort to improve transit service, the city has authorized the purchase of a used bus, at a maximum cost of \$150,000.

A second-hand vehicle is considered the best interim measure until two new buses that have been ordered arrive.

However, the likelihood that they'll be delivered before the end of 2024 is "very slim to none," transportation services manager Mitch McCrank told Temiskaming Shores councillors earlier this week.

"As of late, we've had some pretty significant issues with transit, and the biggest one is inconsistency," said McCrank at the February 20 meeting.

"We need to get something reliable."

The problem, he said, is delays in receiving need-ed parts.

As buses have been out of service, transit users "are really starting to feel that."

In a report to council, he said there have been no more than three days this year when two or more buses have been available for transit provider Voyago.

The company has brought in another bus as a contingency, and it has been on the road almost every day "which was not the intention," he said.

Rental costs so far have been more than \$8,000. Maintenance costs for the existing fleet have

reached \$45,000 only a month and a half into the year. Earlier this month, the transit committee recommended the purchase of a used bus as the best option. In an interview after the meeting, Mayor Jeff

Laferriere said the pandemic has caused problems for supply chains in a number of areas, and transit has not escaped those challenges.

"For us, we're providing a service to our ratepayers, and we have to make sure it is stable and secure going forward. We have ordered two new buses, that's going to help."

It has budgeted \$573,000 for the two new vehicles. Gas tax revenue and funding from the federal-provincial Investing in Canada Infrastructure Program will cover almost all the cost.




Laferriere said the new buses may not arrive, however, until early next year.

He commended Voyago for providing an additional bus in the interim.

Buying a used bus "I think will really help," he said. "Hopefully the supply chain piece for the parts we need to fix the buses improves and we can start to see a better turnaround time."

When the used bus will be purchased and on the road is not yet known, but McCrank said staff are working to secure it as quickly as possible.



Union warns for-profit plasma could spell disaster

TORONTO (Special) – Canadian Blood Services has announced the opening of plasma collection sites which has met with the disapproval of OPSEU/SEFPO.

In a press release, the Ontario Public Service Employees Union/Syndicat des employés de la fonction publique de l'Ontario (OPSEU/SEFPO) says pharmaceutical company Grifols will open paid plasma collection sites in Whitby, Cambridge and Hamilton in late 2024 and 2025.

Grifols will be operating under an undisclosed 15-year deal with Canadian Blood Services to privatize plasma collection in Canada. "The only way to keep our blood supply safe in Canada is

HEART AND STROKE

Cardiovascular disease or heart disease is the number one killer in Canada. It is also the most costly disease in Canada, putting the greatest burden on our national health care system.

- A number of factors, individually or in combination, can lead to heart disease:
- Smoking; Diets rich in saturated fat; Physical inactivity; Stress;

HEART HEALTHY TIPS

DON'T SMOKE.

Not smoking or quitting smoking reduces your risk of developing heart disease and not smoking may help to increase the "good" cholesterol in your blood. It also reduces your risk of having a heart attack, stroke, and common cancers.

EAT A WIDER VARIETY OF FOODS.

According to Canada's Food Guide, as part of a balanced diet, we should enjoy a variety of foods and choose lower-fat foods more

often.

GET MOVING.

As little as 60 minutes a day of accumulated physical activity will help keep your heart in shape. Not sure how to start? Try the Physical Activity Guide for some ideas.

Eating well and staying physically active will help you to control your weight. Avoid fad or miracle diets. Have regular medical check-ups that include measurement of your blood cholesterol level. You can also be tested for diabetes, one of the major risk factors for heart disease. If you have any concerns about your heart health, be sure and ask your doctor.



Former Temiskaming Shores Minor Hockey Association player and New Liskeard Cub Justin Brazeau put on quite a performance in his first National Hockey League game on Monday, February 19.

The big six-foot five winger scored his first NHL regular season goal in a Boston Bruins uniform against the Dallas Stars.

He looked like a natural on the ice and had a big presence in front of the net.

The Boston Bruins had just called up Brazeau and signed him to a twoyear, two-way contract.

He had been playing for the Boston farm team in Providence, Rhode Island.

We remember when he played for the North Bay Battalion and endeared himself to the City of North Bay and to Ontario Hockey League followers.

In his last year as the Battalion captain he scored an impressive 61 goals and had 52 assists for 113 total points in just 68 games.

Broken wings

The one cool thing I have physicians? noticed about birding is it doesn't discriminate.

All birds are interesting if you take the time to learn about them, have the patience to look up their characteristics and then find them in the wild.

It is my intention to be a better birder as it makes me a better human being.

Birding helps me to escape from the pressures of daily life to a world full of simple wonders.

I understand that many people are struggling with mental health issues in our region.

Perhaps the pain of being alive in these tumultuous times when inflation has us worried if we can pay the rent or buy food is part of the problem.

And addiction issues from anxiety and depression can take over a person's life.

Those daily life strains can affect us in ways that require us to seek help and guidance.

Northern Ontario has the highest rates of opioid use in the province and twice the hospitalization rates for mental health concerns compared to the rest of Ontario.

Providing professional mental health services to people living in our region and across the north is vitally important.

And yet we see the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) Cochrane Timiskaming workers on the picket line.

How many people rely on those services in our region is anyone's guess but I am sure the numbers are significant.

Ontario The Northern School of Medicine Thunder Bay campus did a study and reported that the North is short 40 psychiatrists.

Can you name one psychiatrist in our region? No, but I bet you can name half a dozen

Do you understand the disparity and the stigma here?

I have said all along that when the Timiskaming Health Unit divested itself of providing mental health services, that created an even bigger crisis in mental health care in our region.

I know one person who relies on the workers at the May Street location in New Liskeard for her mental well-being.

She told me she does not want to speak to a member of management because they do not know her, nor are they familiar with her issues.

And the strike is causing her



to be stressed and anxious, more than she normally is.

There is no health without mental health.

The stigma surrounding mental health needs to fly away and for the people in positions of power to end this strike.

It isn't fair to the people who need mental health services and it isn't fair to the workers.

There is an urgency to end this strike as people are suffering.

Broken wings can recover, but they require the right approach and treatment.

Bullying is a major problem in our schools, workplaces, homes, and over the Internet!

Bullying happens in many different forms. It's doing, saying or acting in a way that hurts someone else or makes him or her feel bad on purpose.

Words hurt! We all seem to recognize physical bullying, but sometimes other forms of bullying are not as easy to identify. Being called names can hurt someone else's feelings. All forms of bullying are harmful, but VERBAL bullying, including name-calling, happens more often than any other kind of bullying.

Did you know:

- One in seven Canadian children aged 11 to 16 are victims of bullying
- Bullying occurs once every 7 minutes on the playground and once every 25 minutes in the classroom
- Other kids are watching 85% of the time when one kid bullies another kid. Adults like teachers or parents hardly ever see a bully being mean to someone else.
- In majority of cases, bullying stops within 10 seconds when peers intervene, or do not support the bullying behaviour

Dangers for Children and Adolescents Who Are Bullied:

- Depression
- · Social anxiety, loneliness, isolation
- Stress related health problems (e.g., headaches, stomach aches)
- Low self esteem
- School absenteeism and academic problems
- Aggressive behaviours
- · Contemplating, attempting, or committing suicide





For young families and those just starting out in their careers, the thought of retirement is the furthest thing from their minds. The hustle and bustle of daily life is the priority - getting the kids to hockey or dance class, preparing dinner or taking the dog to the vet.

When you factor in today's cost of living - higher grocery bills, mortgage or rent payments and the cost of gas - it's no wonder that saving for retirement is a distant afterthought or no thought at all.

In fact, a new poll commissioned by the Financial Services Regulatory Authority of Ontario (FSRA) found that 81 per cent of people are now more concerned about paying for basic necessities like groceries than saving for retirement. You may be invited to file your taxes over the phone

OTTAWA (Special) - The return. Canada Revenue Agency's (CRA) SimpleFile by Phone (formerly File My Return) is a free, easy, automated phone service. It uses the information CRA already has on file, and the answers you provide, to auto-file and process your tax

SimpleFile by Phone is an invitation-only service. The CRA will do the work for you to determine if you qualify. People who have a lower or fixed income and a simple tax situation may receive an invitation letter to use this service

Benefit and credit payments, like the Canada child benefit and the goods and services tax/harmonized sales tax credit, make a difference in the lives of Canadians and can help with the cost of living. To receive benefit and credit payments, you need to file your income tax and benefit return every year.

What you need to know • about SimpleFile by Phone:

- You do not need to be a tax expert to use SimpleFile by Phone.
- There are no forms to fill out or calculations to do.
- You do not need to speak to a

contact centre agent.

- You can complete your tax ٠ return in as little as 10 minutes from the comfort of your own home at a time that works for you.
- SimpleFile by Phone is now open.
- The service will then be available 21 hours a day, from 6 a.m. to 3 a.m., Eastern Time, seven days a week.
- You will need to confirm some personal information and then answer a series of short questions, using the keypad of your phone.
- Your invitation letter will arrive in the mail. If you are registered for My Ac-

count and have your correspondence preference set to "Electronic mail," you will receive an email notification to view the letter in your account.

If you are a resident of Quebec, the service only completes the federal tax return. You will still need to complete and submit a Quebec provincial tax return with Revenu Québec.

To avoid scams and fraud, be aware of when and how the CRA might contact you. The Scams and fraud page provides information on the ways that the CRA may contact you, including by phone, email, mail, and text message.

Notice to the Users of the Waterfront Pool Facility

Our pool cannot operate without our staff members. There have been several incidents of disrespectful behaviour from members of the public towards our staff members simply for enforcing basic safety policies. We take these verbal confrontations very seriously and, in a time when quality part-time and full-time staff are in high demand, we expect our pool users to be respectful and abide by the rules set out. Continued from page 3 to keep private, for-profit corporations like Grifols away from it," said Geoff Cain, OPSEU/SEFPO Executive Board member and Chair of the Blood Services and Diagnostics sector.

"Canadian Blood Services already collects plasma. There's no reason why we can't invest in our own plasma centres, and upgrade more of our blood donation centres so they can collect plasma as well from voluntary donors. We don't need a bloodfor-money system in Ontario."

Introducing for-profit plasma collection sites where Grifols can pay donors for their plasma not only exploits vulnerable people experiencing financial difficulty, but could also create a decrease in volunteers donating whole blood to Canadian Blood Services, undermining the system as a whole.

"When the profit motive is introduced into any public service, corners inevitably get cut in order to increase profits," said OPSEU/SEFPO President JP Hornick.

"We simply cannot take the chance with our blood supply that profits will trump ethics. Canadian Blood Services has the trained staff and best practices to ensure that every step of the blood collection process is done safely and ethically in a public system."

After the tainted blood tragedy of the 1980s, the Krever Commission made the following recommendations, reaffirmed by leading blood policy organizations around the world, including the World Health Organization:

• Canada's blood system should be self-sufficient

• Blood should be a public resource

• Donors should not be paid for blood

• Access to blood products should be universal and free.

OPSEU/SEFPO launched NoPaidPlasma.ca in 2023, with actions and resources for the public to take to stop paid plasma collection in Ontario.

"It's time for Canadian Blood Services to cancel their deal with Grifols," said Hornick.

"Plasma and blood are not a for-profit commodity. They are life-saving resources that should be kept in public hands."
