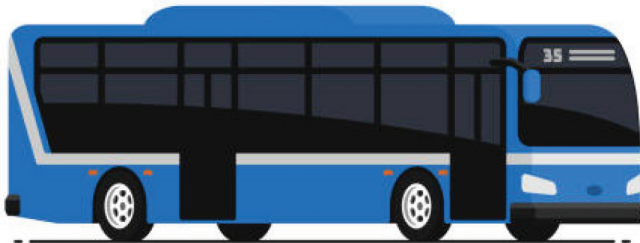

Cobalt council will meet once every four weeks

COBALT - Cobalt council has agreed to try a system for the next year that does not include committee-of-the-whole meetings.

Councillors have agreed to meet once every four weeks, unless a pressing situation occurs, in which case an emergency meeting will be called.

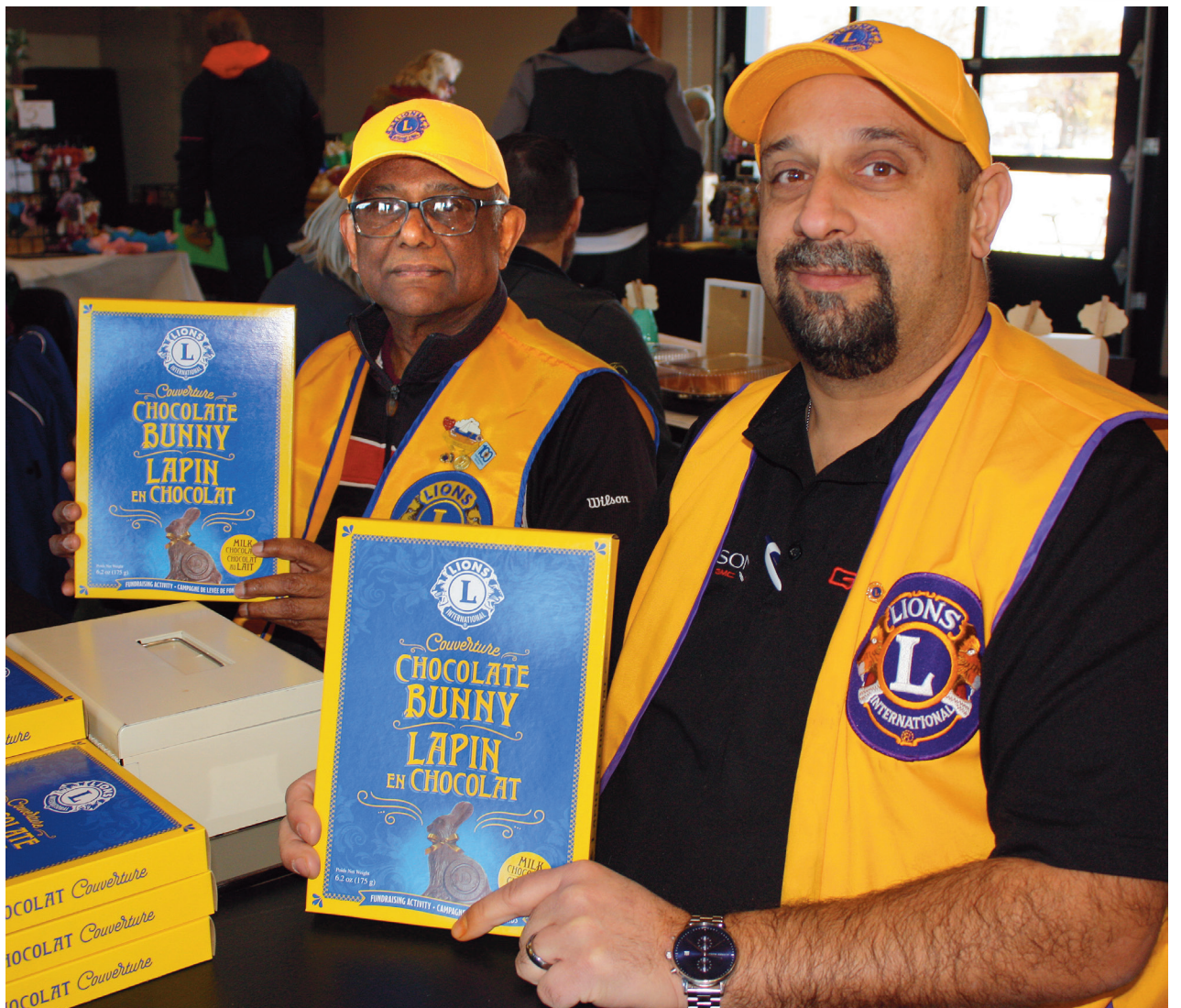
The impetus for the decision was a concern that staff is being overly challenged with its time when having to prepare for two council meetings a month as well as carry out its day-to-day business.

The discussion was held at the town's regular council meeting February 20 and the proposal was passed in a vote of five to two.

Councillors Doug Wilcox and Harry Cooper opposed the change.

However, council did agree to re-evaluate the new system in one year. Council meetings are scheduled to take place April 2 and April 30; May 8; June 25; July 23; August 20; September 17; October 15; November 12; December 10; January 7, 2025; February 4, 2025; and March 4, 2025.

Good for You and Your Money!

Eating well is vital to our health but the cost of food can add up quickly! With a little planning, you can incorporate a variety of nutrient dense food, reduce food waste, and save money! Below are a few steps to help you get started.

Step #1. Make a plan. Plans help to reduce decision fatigue and offer a guideline to help you prepare for the meals ahead. When you have a plan, you will be less likely to spend money on fast food, convenience meals or other random grocery store items. If you're new to planning, start simple; using themes to help guide dinner plans offers an excellent starting point. For example:

Themed Dinners

- Monday – Meatless Monday
- Tuesday – Breakfast for Dinner
- Wednesday – Wraps
- Thursday- Traditional/ Cultural
- Friday – Family Favourites

Step #2. Shop your pantry, refrigerator and freezer. Look at the foods and ingredients you already have on hand and then look for recipes that use those foods and ingredients.

Step #3. Explore meatless options and “in season” produce. Legumes (beans, lentils, dried peas), eggs, tofu, peanut butter and canned fish offer great tasting protein at a good price! Vegetables and fruit are cheaper when they're in season.

Additional Tips!

1. **Plan to use leftovers.** Think about how you can use leftovers. If you're cooking roast chicken with rice and vegetables for Sunday night's supper, then make chicken sandwiches for Monday's lunch. On Tuesday, use the bones to make a chicken soup and add in any leftover vegetables and rice.
2. **Make extras.** If ground beef is on sale, make two batches of lasagna instead of one. Serve one batch for dinner and freeze the other batch in meal-sized portions for another time.

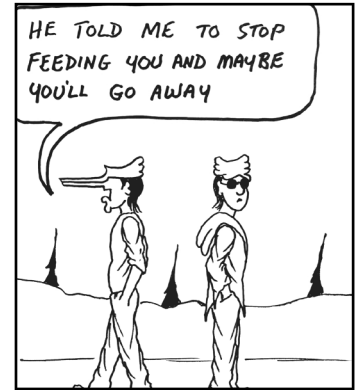

EDITORIAL

Take the jab

It was announced recently by the Chief Public Health Officer of Canada that measles is on the rise again in Ontario.

Measles can lead to serious complications, lifelong disability and even death.

Measles is a highly contagious disease that has been close to being wiped out by the science involving vaccination programs.

"We have to remember that measles is a very, very transmissible infection," said infectious disease specialist Dr. Isaac Bogocho on CTV News.

We know vaccines work.

A good many of the advances in public health over the last 50 or so years have come about because of immunization programs.

But there continues to be a segment of society that is deeply opposed to vaccination programs.

This is a dangerous scenario when we know measles is on the rise.

It is important to check your vaccination records and keep up with routine vaccinations.

The World Health Organization (WHO) says there was a 79 per cent increase in the number

of global measles cases in 2023 compared to 2022.

Deaths in this day and age attributed to measles are preventable as the science shows vaccines do work.

When a person's ideological beliefs ignore facts around vaccines and puts lives at risk, then we need to step up our understanding of immunization benefits.

Playing on the fears of people with quack pseudo science beliefs about vaccines and the pharmaceutical industry could place vulnerable citizens like seniors and children at risk of illness.

The anti-science propaganda must be rejected.

Measles is one of the most contagious infectious diseases, and also one of the most preventable: two doses of vaccine in childhood are 97 per cent protective.

Before people get on a plane and fly away to global destinations for the March break, they should check their vaccination status.

You might return with more than just a tan.

Fortunately for Canada, we have more people willing to get vaccinated for the benefit of all.

As I drive up Highway 11 in the morning, I pass a marsh containing two or three beaver dams.

A few fresh sticks atop the mound of snow makes me notice they are becoming active, sensing the arrival of warm weather.

They are playing the waiting game also inside the shelters they have built. Their stores of feed gathered last fall are providing nourishment until they

can get out and about for fresh sticks and twigs.

The morning of this writing, as I cleared the snow from my car, a sharp wind was persistent.

I am simply waiting for a time when I can slip a 15-foot slice of heaven canoe into a beautiful northern lake while listening to the loon calling in a far off bay.

Public Notice of Application for Consent

Clause 53(5)(a) of the *Planning Act*

The Minister of Municipal Affairs and Housing has received **Application No. 54-C-230666** for consent in the unincorporated township of Lorrain, District of Timiskaming. The subject property is described as Part of Lots 11 & 12, Concession 7, Lorrain UT, PIN 61390-0029.

The application proposes to sever a piece of land from PIN **61390-0029** of approximately 0.11 HA in size as a lot addition to an adjacent lot (PIN 61390-0166) in order to rectify an encroachment issue. The benefiting lot would be 0.51 HA in size with frontage on Paradis Bay. It contains a recreational dwelling and is accessed via Paradis Road.

The proposed retained lot would be greater than 48 HA with frontage on Paradis Bay. It contains both a house and cottage which are serviced by on-site services. Access is via Paradis Road.

The intended use for both lots will not change from their current resource-based recreational and residential uses. No construction or site alteration is proposed on either the severed or retained lots.

The purpose of this notice is to inform the public of the nature of the application, invite public input, advise on how to make comments on the application and advise the public of future notification and appeal rights.

Weather Network forecasts a mild but moody spring

OAKVILLE (Special) - What an extraordinarily mild winter it has been across Canada.

While the past season included a monumental snow-storm for Atlantic Canada and a stretch of severe cold across western Canada, El Nino stole the show with one of the warmest winters on record and minimal snow for many.

Will this pattern continue through spring?

The Weather Network has issued their Spring Forecast for the months of March, April and May.

"El Nino is fading, and La Nina appears to be getting ready to take the stage as we head towards summer," said Chris Scott, chief meteorologist with The Weather Network.

"Therefore, we expect this spring will feature profound mood swings across Canada as periods of late winter-like weather interrupt our journey towards consistent warm weather. However, we expect that warmer-than-normal temperatures will outduel the cold weather for most Canadians this spring."

Spring is a critical season for receiving adequate rain as the growing season begins. While the network expects that March will bring its share of active and stormy weather, it is concerned that large parts of the country will turn rather dry before the country heads into summer.

The meeting schedule will then be reviewed. Upcoming council meetings will be posted on the town's website to assist residents in keeping track of the schedule.

Councillor Pat Anderson noted that the four-week schedule might confuse residents who wish to attend the meetings.

"Every four weeks is good for the staff," she agreed. "My

only thought is that maybe we should set it for the first Tuesday of the month. That makes it easier for our residents to remember when a meeting is if they want to attend, instead of having to ask around or go online."

However she supported the idea in general, saying, "I like having more time for staff to be able to prepare and do the work for us."

Town manager Steven Dal-

ley commented that it would be more beneficial for the town to meet once every four weeks because that would result in 14 meetings a year, instead of only 12 meetings a year.

Wilcox outlined his opposition to the change.

"Committee-of-the-whole meetings are a critical part of good governance in Cobalt. It's an opportunity to discuss things, to scrutinize things,

to explore and develop the best possible solutions for our community. It allows for members of our community to provide feedback on proposals."

A two-week pause between committee-of-the-whole and council meetings gives council members "a chance to give it sober second thought," he added.

Mayor Angela Adshead spoke in support of the

change and said it will give "staff the time to give us more information when we're making a decision."

Councillor Jim Starchuk said he appreciated the point Wilcox was making about committee-of-the-whole meetings, and that they are an opportunity to have good discussions, but he said he was also thinking about the staff.

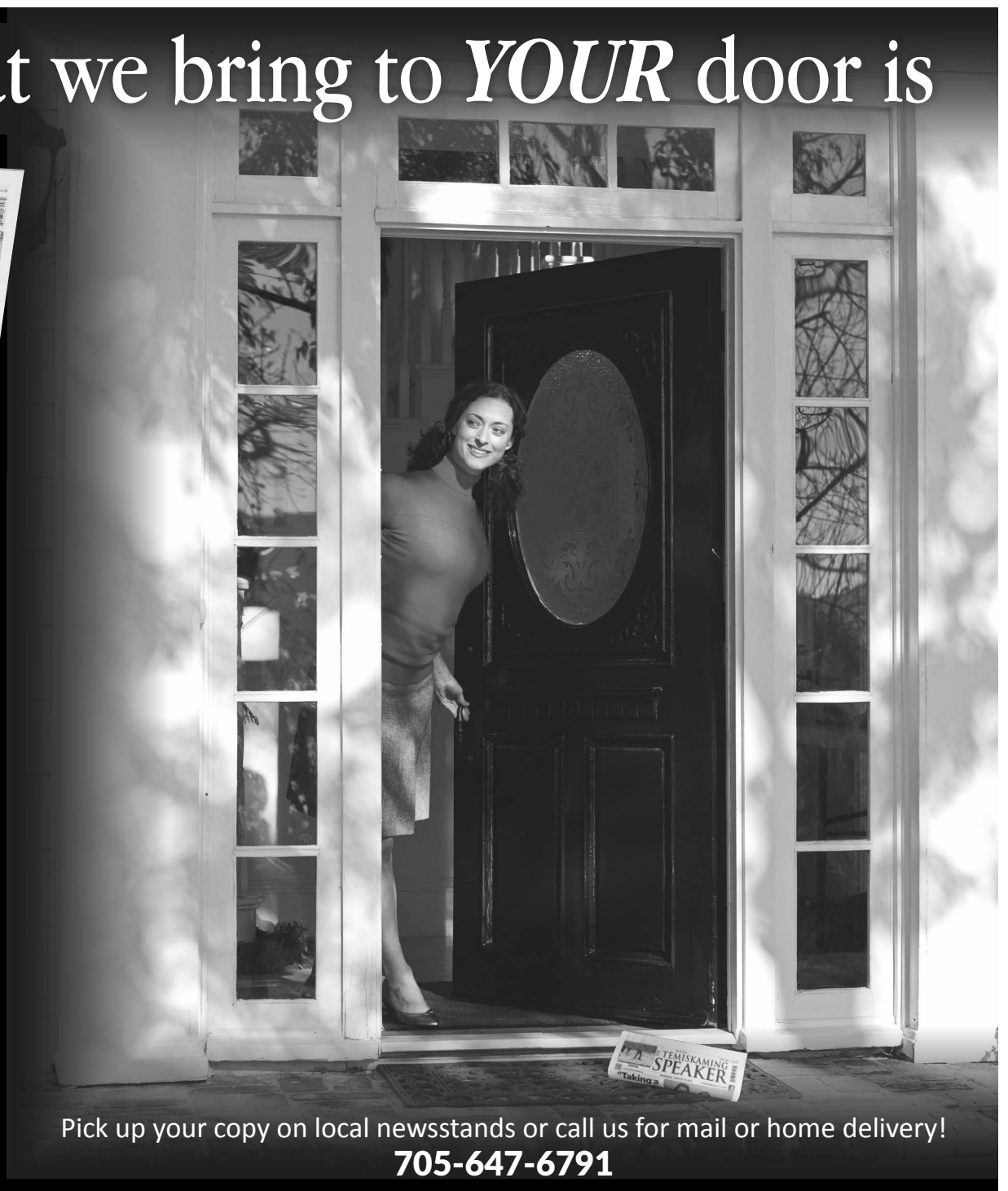

Notice to the Users of the Waterfront Pool Facility

Our pool cannot operate without our staff members. There have been several incidents of disrespectful behaviour from members of the public towards our staff members simply for enforcing basic safety policies. We take these verbal confrontations very seriously and, in a time when quality part-time and full-time staff are in high demand, we expect our pool users to be respectful and abide by the rules set out. If a user is unable to follow the rules, they will be denied entry and may lose their pool access for a period of time. Our City employees deserve respect when doing their jobs.

Pool Admission Policy | All children under 10 years old MUST be accompanied by an adult or guardian (14+) in the pool, regardless of swimming ability. This means adults or guardians must be in a swimsuit, in the pool, within arms reach of their children. This is the standard for pools across Ontario and is in place to ensure the safety of all our young swimmers.

Pool Capacity | The capacity of the pool depends on the number of lifeguards on duty. These numbers are stipulated by the Government of Ontario's Public Pools Regulation 565/90.

0-24 Swimmers | 1 Lifeguard (if the slide is open: 2 Lifeguards)

25-56 Swimmers | 2 Lifeguards (if the slide is open: 3 Lifeguards)

66-100 Swimmers | 3 Lifeguards (if the slide is open: 4 Lifeguards)

101-129 Swimmers | 4 Lifeguards (if the slide is open: 5 Lifeguards)

Cell Phone Use | We understand the desire to take pictures of your own children during public swims. However, due to issues with consent of others and the chance for nefarious behaviour, we do NOT allow cell phone use in the changerooms or on the pool deck. Please put your phone away and be present instead!

Fire Extinguishers

In most cases, the best thing to do in a home fire is to get everyone out of the home immediately and call the fire department from outside:

- Make sure working smoke alarms are installed on every storey of the home and outside all sleeping areas.
- Everyone in the home should practice a home fire escape plan so everyone knows what to do BEFORE a fire occurs.

Many people who decide to purchase a fire extinguisher might not know how or when to use them.

Fire extinguishers should be used only by people who have been trained to use them. People are encouraged to contact their local fire department if they would like fire extinguisher training or have any questions.

The following tips can help people who are thinking about buying a fire extinguisher for their home:

- Consider purchasing a fire extinguisher that has an ABC rating. This type can be used for most types of fires.
- Choose a fire extinguisher that has the logo of an independent, accredited product safety testing agency such as ULC.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions regarding where the extinguisher should be placed in the home.
- Inspect the fire extinguisher once a month and have it serviced by a certified technician every year.
- Fire extinguishers should be used only on small, contained fires. Never let the fire get between you and the exit.

To operate a fire extinguisher, remember the acronym PASS:

- Pull the pin;
- Aim the nozzle at the base of the fire;
- Squeeze the trigger;
- Sweep the extinguisher from side to side until the extinguisher is empty.
- Know when to go. If the fire does not go out after using one fire extinguisher, back out of the area, close the door if possible, and safely get outside and call 9-1-1.
- Remember that many stovetop fires can be safely extinguished without the use of a fire extinguisher. If a pot on the stove starts on fire, slide a lid over the pot to smother the flames and turn off the stove. Leave the pot in place until it has cooled completely.

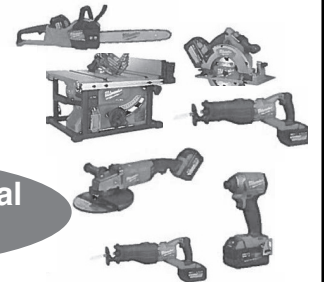

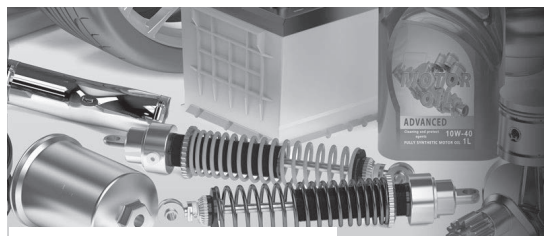

In Ontario and Quebec, spring weather started very early this year and that is a preview of what is to come as warmer-than-normal temperatures will dominate the season. However, the mild spring will be moody at times with

periods of colder-than-normal temperatures, a risk for significant late winter weather and even a threat for a late season frost. The network said it is also concerned about the potential for increasingly dry conditions to develop during the second half of the season.

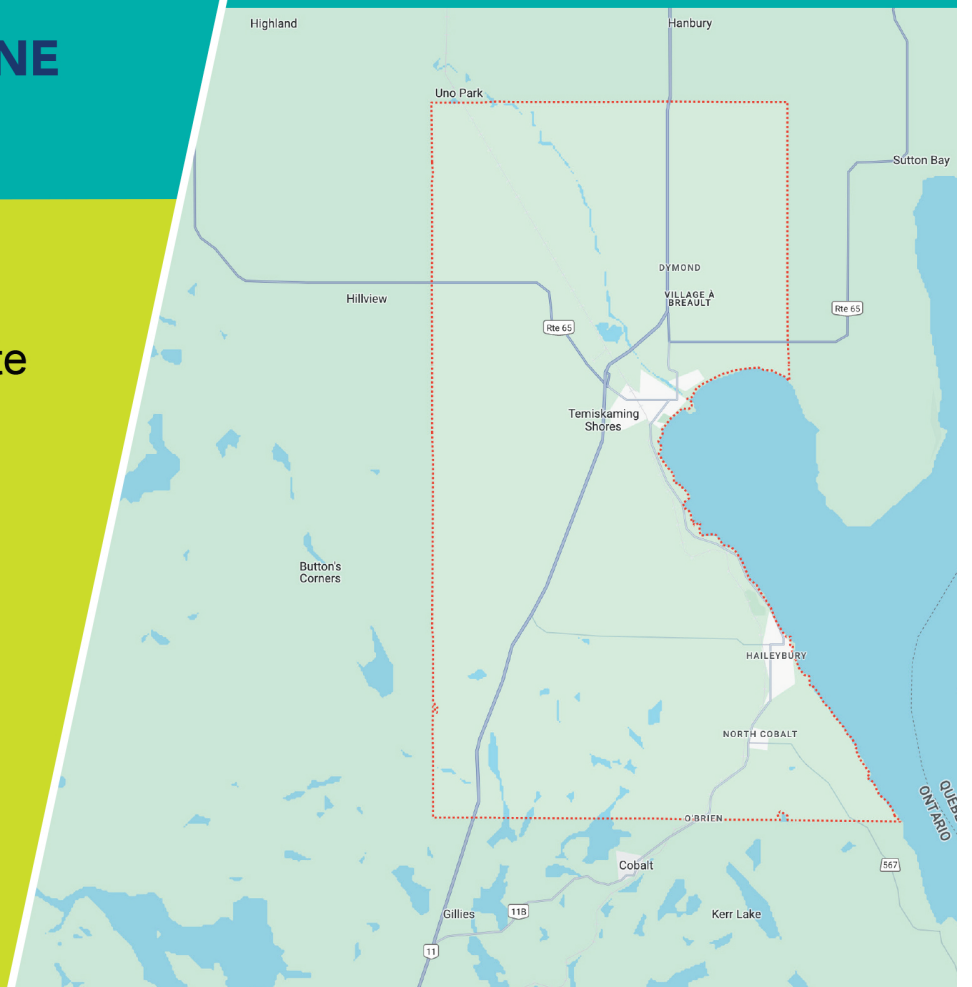
