Three area artists receive NOAA awards

TEMISKAMING SHORES - The

Temiskaming Art Gallery is currently showing the annual travelling juried exhibition of the

Northern Ontario Art Association (NOAA). The exhibition is at the gallery

until March 29, and visitors can drop by to view the artworks on weekdays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

“There were 98 paintings submitted this year in digital format and 38 were chosen for the exhibition,” said Brenda Henderson of the Temiskaming Palette and Brush Club in a press release.

The jurors for this event were Linda Mustard and John Anderson, “both well accomplished artists.”

For most artists across Northern Ontario, to have artwork accepted in the NOAA annual exhibition is an honour. To receive an award is an even greater accomplishment.

Local award recipients in the 67th NOAA exhibition include Englehart Area Artists members: Berdina Beaven with her paper collage titled *Highbush Cranberry Shores* (Best in Show); Lionel Venne with his mixed media artwork titled *Where The Sun Goes to Sleep* (Anne McAllister Johnson Memorial Award); and Danyel Wheeldon with her acrylic on wood titled

Summer's Bounty (Mary Weymark Goss Memorial Award).

An opening reception was hosted by the Temiskaming Palette and Brush Club March 3.

BERDINA BEAVEN

Berdina Beaven commented in a telephone interview that the narrows at the river in Charlton where she lived for many years was the inspiration for her collage. She now lives in Haileybury.

“I use my own photos for reference material,” she said, adding that she has hundreds of the Charlton area.

While she uses photos as reference, she said she changes the colours and moves the trees as she wishes.

“I try to put my own spin on it.”

Beaven uses LCBO magazines as a source for her paper because they provide clear colour and good quality paper. She uses golden gel and high gloss to glue and finish her collages, she added.

that his mixed media painting was inspired by the Egyptian sun god Ra.

"The Egyptians thought the sun goes to sleep in the land of the dead and rises up in the morning again," he said.

The Egyptian theme appears in a series of paintings. The painting chosen for the NOAA exhibition includes an archway "and you can see where the sun would go into an area to sleep and then come back the next day. There's a whole context of spirituality and resurrection involved in that painting."

The blue colour used in the painting is the Mediterranean blue that Venne saw when he visited Europe. When there "I discovered what the Impressionists were talking about," he said.

DANYEL WHEELDON

Danyel Wheeldon is a young Englehart artist and is self-employed as a painter.

"Summer's Bounty is my first admission to NOAA, and I am very grateful to have been accepted and received a gracious award," she said in an email interview.

"Summer's Bounty is a representation of what the seasons have to offer, and how the natural world is fattened by

the generosity of the warmer months.

"I often create paintings inspired by the incredible flora and fauna we have here in the north. Even the wood which I paint on is sourced

by myself or people I know, making it Ontarian through and through.

"This piece is done in acrylic paint on a slice of Manitoba maple approximately six inches by seven inches."

Other area artists whose works were accepted for the exhibition include: Temiskaming Palette and Brush Club members Bea-Yeh Lin Eckert with her acrylic *Until We Meet Again*; Melinda Mauro Ethier with her ink and acrylic titled *Temiskaming Canada Goose*; and Myra McCarthy with her watercolour *Cotton Ball Clouds*.

Englehart Area Artists member Greg Martin's acrylic on canvas *Lacock Abbey* also was accepted.

EDITORIAL

Integrity Commissioner reports

Many municipalities across North-eastern Ontario have had to shell out big payments (taxpayer dollars) for Integrity Commissioner (IC) investigations that have dominated some council agendas.

The investigations are about alleged wrongdoing by elected officials.

In our region there have been several municipalities that have gone through IC investigations that have come with a hefty price tag.

The government of Ontario imposed the IC process on municipalities, because there was no method for calling out bad behaviour by elected officials.

Instead of making the Municipal Act clearer on breaches of code of conduct and other wrongdoings, the province saw ICs, in theory, as the answer. But it failed to take into account the huge costs to municipalities from these investigations.

And the costs to the elected officials in terms of their political integrity.

Even if a councillor or mayor is found not to have committed any wrongdoing, it is a blight on their reputation and a burden on precious municipal resources.

How many sidewalks, roads, pools, trucks or other items could be bought with the funds spent on IC reports?

How many people are taking their petty political grudges to the ICs and who have personal grievances against certain councillors and mayors?

Running a municipality is an expensive undertaking, especially in these high inflationary times.

It might be time for the province to take a long look at the IC process to determine the costs of the process to the ratepayers, especially for smaller municipalities.

A scary time

I was feeling groggy and not quite myself after the clocks moved forward one hour last weekend.

Why are we still taking part in the spring and fall time changes?

It doesn't make sense. They serve no real purpose other than throwing off people's circadian rhythms.

I already felt a little off because of a dramatic scene that had unfolded in Coleman Township last week.

On Thursday night I was at home in Cobalt when my phone received several emergency alerts.

It was all very scary as police announced there was a serious incident playing out on Portage Bay Road in Latchford.

I immediately knew this was wrong because Portage Bay Road is miles away from Latchford.

But the reports kept coming mentioning the location as Latchford. Accuracy matters.

I am familiar with Portage Bay Road because I enjoy

birding along that road and I know several people who live there.

Apparently two fugitives who were on the run from the Kirkland Lake region had driven down Portage Bay Road and the police had them cornered there.

A gunfight broke out and a 26-year-old man was killed, a citizen was injured and there was a manhunt on for one of the fugitives who escaped into the nearby bush.

The police had called in a canine unit and helicopters in hot pursuit of the fugitive.

Wow, this all happened in our region?

I see more and more serious crime happening here because of the drug trade where dealers are coming to our communities dealing their hard core drugs, often times with guns in tow.

I felt for the police officers that had to deal with that dangerous situation. I thought about their families who must have been worried sick about them. I realized what a danger-

ous job they have of protecting the public and I was thankful none of the officers were injured in the incident.

I was also concerned for the people living on Portage Bay Road and the 76-year-old man who was injured.

Statistics Canada says violent crime with firearms has risen by almost nine per cent in Canada since 2022.

What seems like something out of a bad movie actually has become more commonplace in our country.

Whether gun violence deaths are caused by mass shootings or criminals — perpetrated because of hate, mental illness or some other reason — the real problem is the easy access to all kinds of guns.

Also, the amount of drugs being bought and sold in our communities is scandalous.

Let's get those drugs off our streets.

I support stiffer gun laws aimed at criminals to ensure public safety.

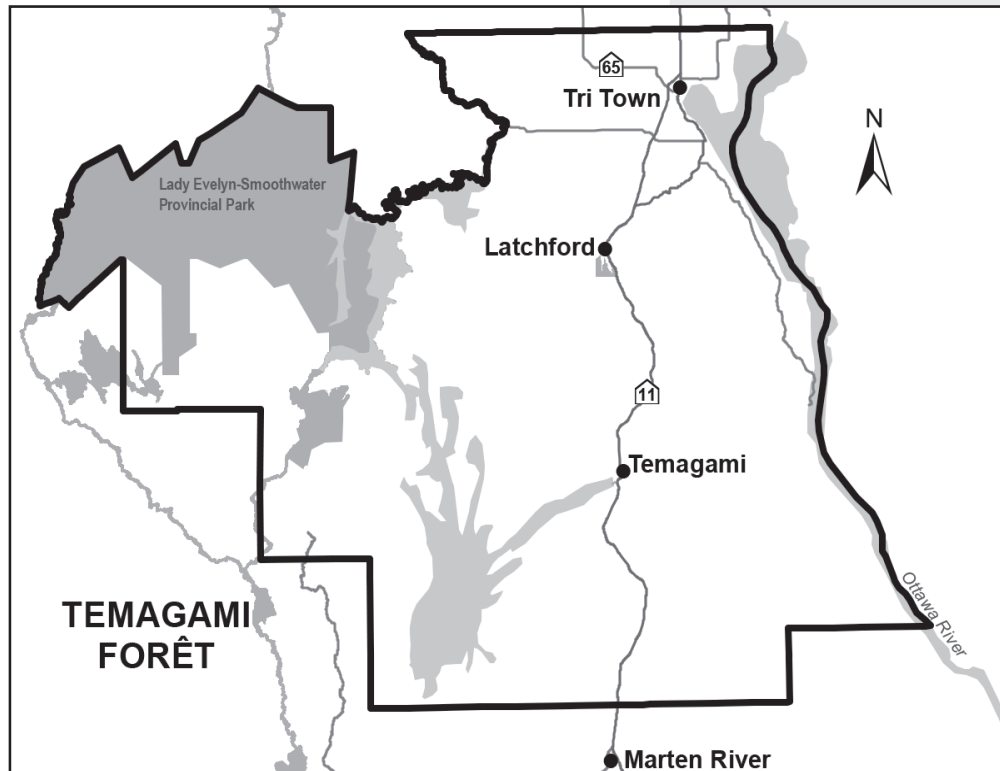

Hire fuel pros, says TSSA

TORONTO (Special) – Fraudulent fuels workers, commonly referred to as “trunk slammers,” pose a significant threat to the safety of Ontarians, says an Ontario public safety regulator.

Uncertified workers perform services at a reduced rate using substandard and unsafe materials, says the Technical Standards and Safety Authority (TSSA) in a news release.

The TSSA is launching its fifth Trunk Slammers Awareness and Enforcement Program during Fraud Prevention Month.

It's urging Ontarians to hire registered and certified fuels contractors, understand how to distinguish between legitimate and illegitimate fuels contractors, and remain vigilant against fuels scammers by reporting them to the TSSA.

According to TSSA's historical data, about 65 per cent of fuels-related incidents were caused by issues including substandard installation of fuel-burning appliances and poor maintenance practices.

It said its most recent public safety report highlights an incident where improper installation of fuels appliances resulted in an explosion, injuring two Ontarians.

Under Ontario law, furnaces and fuels-fired appliances must be maintained by TSSA-registered contractors. All registered contractors are required to hire TSSA certified gas technicians who have extensive training and are qualified to perform fuels work safely.

With some 9,000 registered fuels contractors and 78,000 certified professionals across the province, the TSSA says consumers have numerous legitimate options for fuels-related services.

As trunk slammers lack certification or registration with TSSA, neither their work, equipment nor qualifications are audited and verified by TSSA.

Hiring these fuels scammers, it says, can lead to serious risks, including carbon monoxide poisoning and other harmful consequences.

“Safety is a right, not a compromise. Hiring registered fuels contractors is the right thing to do to keep you and your loved ones safe,” said Kelly Hart, director of TSSA's Fuels Safety Program.

“Before engaging any fuels contractor, always verify the contractor's registration status using the convenient and easy-to-use lookup tool on our website.”

“Fuels scams are a serious issue,” Hart continued.

“When you are approached by fraudulent fuels workers, report them to TSSA. TSSA is committed to investigating these reports and taking legal action against unlawful players.”

The divisions included the Grade 3/4 boys and girls and Grade 5/6 boys and girls.

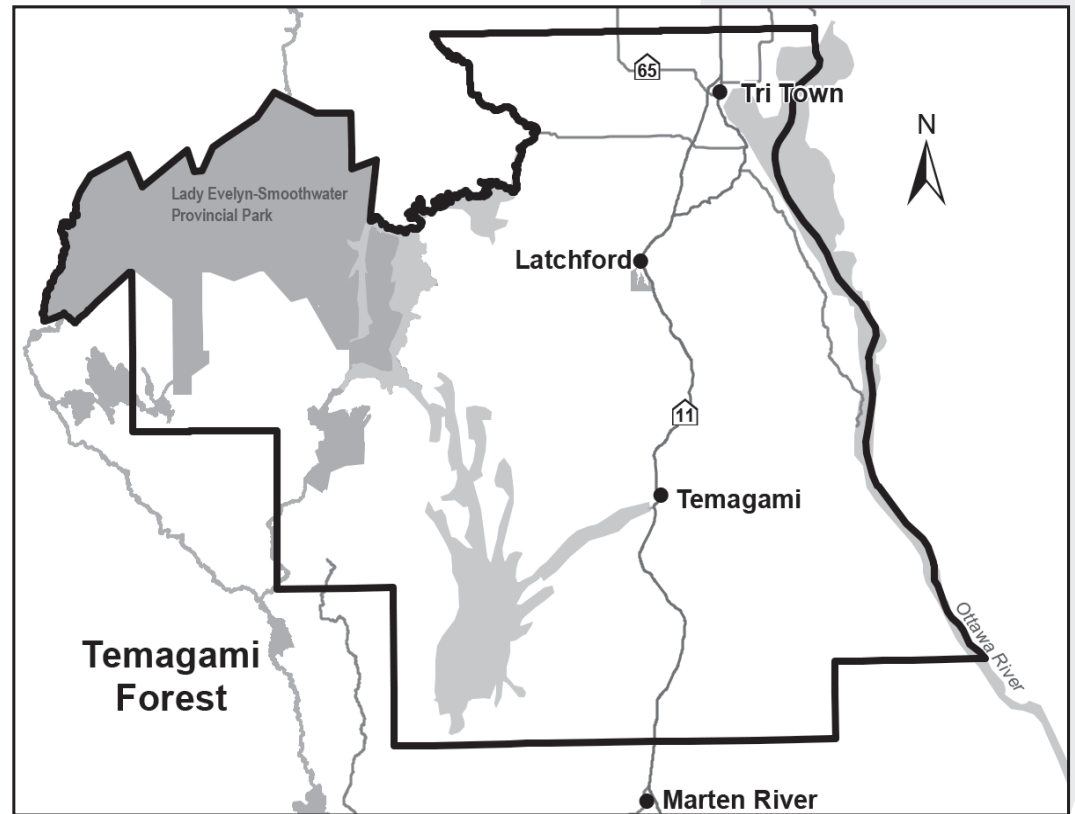

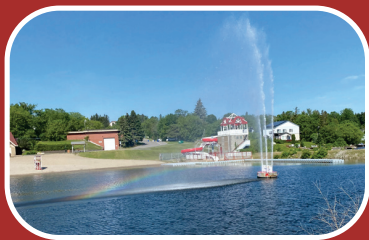
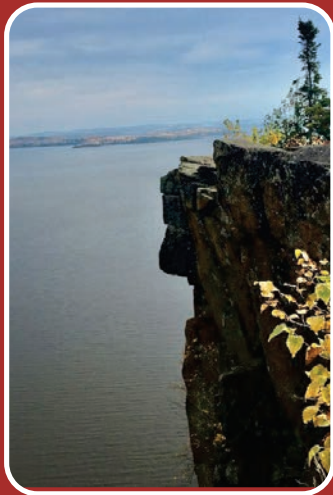

Eating Disorder Awareness

Thoughts, feelings and behaviours related to managing food and weight can begin to interfere with everyday activities. When we focus too much attention on our bodies and our eating, these thoughts can quickly lead to missed opportunities in other parts of our lives.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The most common age of onset is between 14 and 25 years of age, however the disorders are being seen more and more in children as young as 10 years of age;
- It's estimated that 3% of women will be affected by eating disorders in their lifetime;
- In a recent study, 27% of Ontario girls 12-18 years of age were reported to be engaged in severely problematic food and weight behaviour;
- Eating disorders are now the third most common chronic illness in adolescent girls;
- The death rate associated with anorexia nervosa alone is more than 12 times higher than the overall death rate among young women in the general population;
- Recent studies show that 25% of eating disorder cases occur in young boys and men

If the way you eat and think about food interferes with your life and keeps you from enjoying life and moving forward, then that is disordered eating. Take it seriously and talk to someone who can help.

Track Attack shines at Ontario Youth Championships

COLEMAN TOWNSHIP — Six skiers went, they skied and they came back with top 10 finishes and medals.

The Temiskaming Nordic Ski Club (TNSC) Junior Track Attack Ski Team had multiple successes at the Ontario Junior Championships. The races were hosted by the Soo Finnish Club at the Hiawatha Highlands Ski Trails March 2-3.

Over 250 skiers from across Ontario competed in the two-day event featuring U8 to U14 skiers.

The team is coached by Anthony Story and Paul Cobb.

“This is the first season that Paul and I have been coaching Track Attack together,” said Story in an email interview.

“I’ve helped this group for a few years previously.”

Cobb was also a volunteer with the TNSC Jackrabbit Learn to Ski Program.

The Track Attack program is about three years in duration, and skiers then graduate to the TNSC Nordic Team.

There were eight skiers in the Track Attack program this year, with six youth competing in Sault Ste. Marie.

Despite some icy and slushy conditions

against top-level competition, “Paul and I were impressed that everyone battled really challenging conditions and tough competition,” said Story.

Between the six skiers, they earned seven top 10 results in their age categories over the two days of racing.

It was the first year competing in U14 races for Ferial Cobb, Griffin Juurlink and Leo D’Hondt. It required skiing longer distances of four kilometres (km) per race compared to 2km for the U12 division.

“Griffin Juurlink narrowly missed out on a podium finish in his age category in Sunday’s classic race. Mathilda Story bounced back from a fall in icy conditions in Saturday’s skate race and posted a top 10 finish in Sunday’s classic race. Sacha Cobb, the team’s youngest competitor, brought home two gold medals in his age category, which is quite remarkable since he had not competed at the Ontario Youth Championships previously.”

Both coaches were pleased with their skiers’ efforts.

“As a team, the skiers made excellent progress this year, highlighted by Lina Story’s award for best classical technique by a U10 girl skier,” noted the proud coach and father.

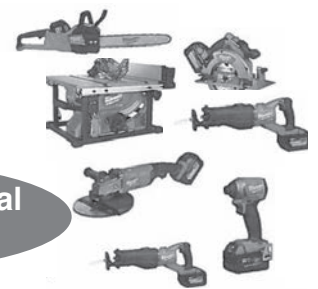

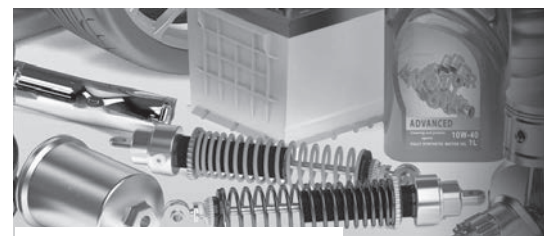

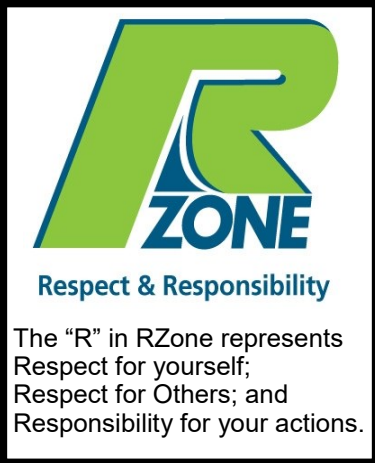
PFC Family Pool Passes for Loan

CO2 Sensor Lending Program

Curious about the air quality in your indoor spaces? The library has CO2 Sensors for loan. CO2 is a gas that is produced when people exhale. As more people remain in a room, CO2 levels increase quickly if there is not enough fresh air coming into the space. High indoor CO2 levels can cause tiredness, headaches and other symptoms, and indicate that a space is not well ventilated. High CO2 levels can also facilitate the spread of airborne infections. The devices are not CO (Carbon Monoxide) detectors and are not life safety devices.

Notice to the Users of the Waterfront Pool Facility

Our pool cannot operate without our staff members. There have been several incidents of disrespectful behaviour from members of the public towards our staff members simply for enforcing basic safety policies. We take these verbal confrontations very seriously and, in a time when quality part-time and full-time staff are in high demand, we expect our pool users to be respectful and abide by the rules set out. If a user is unable to follow the rules, they will be denied entry and may lose their pool access for a period of time. Our City employees deserve respect when doing their jobs.

Pool Admission Policy

All children under 10 years old **MUST** be accompanied by an adult or guardian (14+) in the pool, regardless of swimming ability. This means adults or guardians must be in a swimsuit, in the pool, within arms reach of their children. This is the standard for pools across Ontario and is in place to ensure the safety of all our young swimmers.

Barbecue Safety

Grilled to Perfection Every Time!



USE BBQS OUTDOORS ONLY! They produce **carbon monoxide**, a poisonous gas that can lead to unconsciousness and even death. Never use or store propane cylinders inside any structure, including garages.

Take these steps when starting a BBQ:

- Open the hood.
- Turn on the gas release valve on the tank.
- Turn on the grill controls or heat settings.
- Take a step back.
- Push the igniter button.
- If there is no igniter button, insert a long match or BBQ lighter through the side burner hole first, then turn on the heat control knob.
- If the burner does not ignite right away, turn the gas off and wait five minutes, keeping the hood open, before repeating the procedure.

At the start of the BBQ season, do this THREE-STEP SAFETY CHECK of your BBQ:

- 1 CLEAN** Use a pipe cleaner or wire to ensure burner ports are free of rust, dirt, spider webs or other debris.
- 2 CHECK** Examine the hose leading from the tank to the burners. Replace it if cracked or damaged.
- 3 TEST** Find leaks by applying a 50/50 solution of water and dish soap to propane cylinder connections and hoses. If bubbles appear, tighten the connection and/or replace the damaged parts and retest.

Stay Fire Safe!

Never leave the BBQ unattended when in use.

Make sure grease does not build up on the burners or at the base of the BBQ. This could cause a grease fire.

Never throw water on a grease fire – this will only spread the flame.

DO NOT place the BBQ close to wooden fences or walls, vinyl siding, or anything that can burn. The area behind your BBQ must be free of anything that can ignite – this is where hot gases escape.

Keep loose clothing away from a hot BBQ.

Keep children and pets at least one metre (three feet) away from a hot BBQ.

When finished barbecuing, turn the gas valve off first, then turn off the burner controls so no gas is left in the connecting hose.

Allow the BBQ to cool completely before closing the cover.

If you live in an apartment or condo building, check with the building owner or property manager, or the Condominium Act of your building, regarding the use of BBQs on your building's balconies.

Eating Disorder Awareness

Thoughts, feelings and behaviours related to managing food and weight can begin to interfere with everyday activities. When we focus too much attention on our bodies and our eating, these thoughts can quickly lead to missed opportunities in other parts of our lives.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The most common age of onset is between 14 and 25 years of age, however the disorders are being seen more and more in children as young as 10 years of age;
- It's estimated that 3% of women will be affected by eating disorders in their lifetime;
- In a recent study, 27% of Ontario girls 12-18 years of age were reported to be engaged in severely problematic food and weight behaviour;
- Eating disorders are now the third most common chronic illness in adolescent girls;
- The death rate associated with anorexia nervosa alone is more than 12 times higher than the overall death rate among young women in the general population;
- Recent studies show that 25% of eating disorder cases occur in young boys and men

If the way you eat and think about food interferes with your life and keeps you from enjoying life and moving forward, then that is disordered eating. Take it seriously and talk to someone who can help.

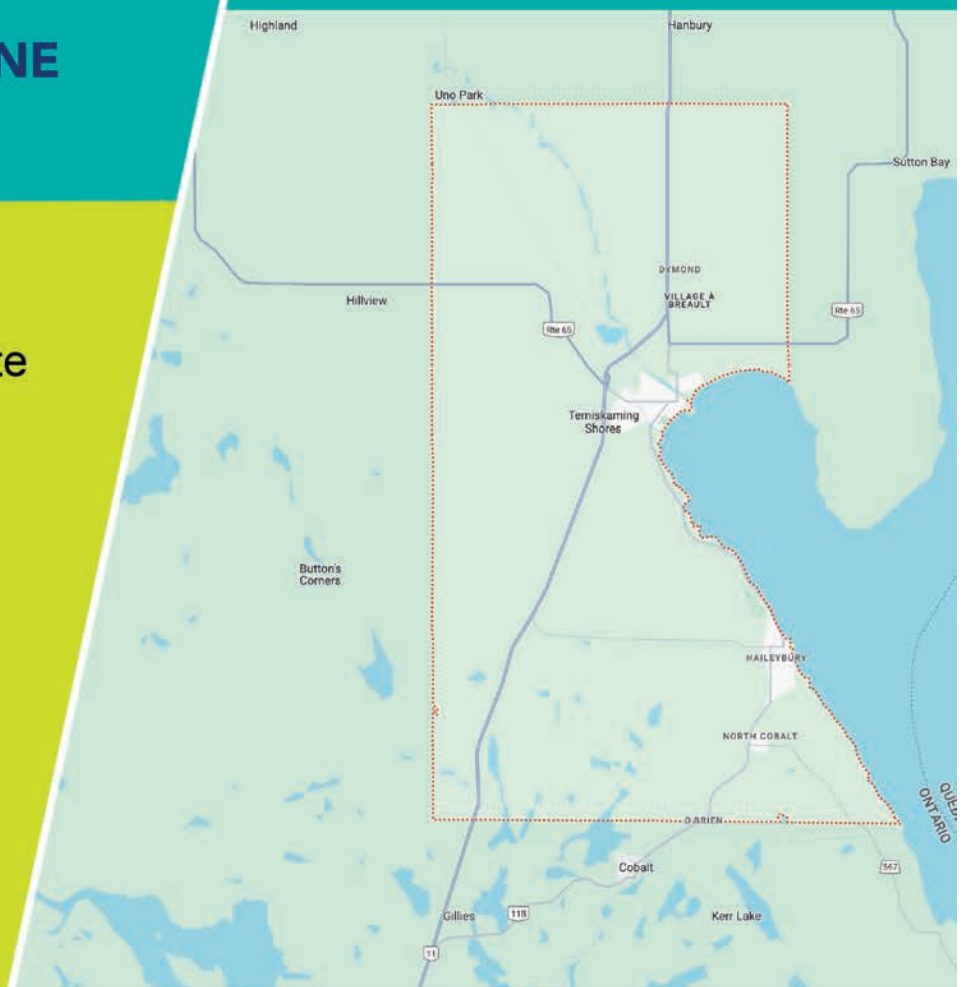
