Englehart council discusses pet ownership issues

ENGLEHART - Englehart council and staff discussed a strategy to address what is becoming a pet ownership issue in the town at their recent committee-of-the-whole meeting.

The April 10 discussion started off with a strategy to encourage people to stoop and scoop their pet waste. An initial proposal was to provide dispensers downtown so that people could take one and remove their pet's waste.

But that suggestion was not favoured because, it was pointed out, in most cases those who would pick up their pet waste already do so. It would also create additional work for the public works staff to replace the receptacles, it was noted.

Mayor Doug Metson remarked on how much dog waste is visible in the downtown area.

"It's unbelievable," he said.

In response, Councillor Jo-Anne Farmer proposed that perhaps the town should set up cameras in order to see who the people are who are leaving their dog waste on the sidewalks.

But she also favoured a campaign to encourage people to pick up their pet waste.

However, community services coordinator Johanna Paradis pointed out that there is a greater problem in the town when it comes to pet ownership.

"We probably need to do a little better job with our animal control."

"I think there are a lot of animal issues in general," she said.

"A campaign is a great idea," but possibly should go beyond cleaning up after pets, she continued.

"Maybe it's a bigger campaign like responsible pet ownership."

Councillor Brian Bockus observed that Englehart should look at having its animal control officer in town more often.



some traumatic events in the region.

It's part of the job of being a newspaper reporter.

I have never used a disguise to hide my identity, gone through someone's trash or stood in front of a bereaved person demanding answers to questions.

But I know some people who do that.

There is a trust that has to be developed between police, EMS, fire departments and average citizens by the media when covering sensitive and traumatic events.

I have learned over the years to tread lightly with people who have been victimized by crime and tragic circumstances.

Last week a man was swept away by flood waters in Moose Creek in Casey Township.

I was at the Blanche River where police had set up a temporary command post at Judge Park, along Highway 65 East.

When I arrived I saw the police vehicles and I noticed members of the man's family huddled together.

It was not my intention to speak to the family members, but rather to get the facts from the police officers.

A family member did tell me a few things about the incident.

I am often at the scene of I received a phone call from another family member asking that I not divulge any information on the missing person.

I reassured her that I would do no such thing as I felt those comments were off-the-record.

But while we were waiting at the office for police reports I noticed a Facebook page had posted information about the missing person.

And they actually named the individual when police and the family had requested it not be publicized for privacy reasons.

There are those whose sole purpose is to sit on computers all day long passing on information about tragic events.

Often this information is far from accurate and can cause people unnecessary trauma.

It is my intention to act with empathy towards people who are undergoing extreme emotional trauma.

People may not realize how trauma can affect even the

I have been yelled at, sworn at and threatened simply for doing my job.

There are some events that I have covered that haunt me to this day.

I will never forget the image of a young man who had been killed by a train a few years ago near Earlton.

It stays with me constantly When I got back to the office and I have cried about it.



The issue of post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) is real and anyone who is or has dealt with this condition is a hero in my books.

PTSD is found among soldiers, police, medics, firefighters, court workers and others.

Trauma, when not addressed can feel like stepping on nails every day.

My heartfelt condolences go out to the family of the man whose body has since been

HMREC conducts annual nest box cleaning

HILLIARDTON — Spring cleaning at the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre (HMREC) is really for the birds.

Cleaning out tree swallow boxes might not be an activity that many people have undertaken, but it is a necessary activity to ensure returning birds have places to nest and raise their young.

On April 20, several volunteers showed up at the Marsh to help conduct the annual spring cleaning of tree swallow nesting boxes.

Tree swallows, Eastern blue birds and house wrens are soon to return to the Boreal forest during the spring migration and the nesting boxes must be cleaned prior to their arrival.

The female tree swallow builds a nest of grasses lined with duck feathers.

She will lay between four and

seven eggs in a clutch, then both parents take turns feeding the birds until they fledge from the nest about 21 days later.

HMREC bird bander Bruce Murphy told the volunteers the boxes have to be cleaned out so the birds can start fresh each year. The volunteers recorded information such as the number of the nesting box they were at and what they found inside it.

Old nesting material may contain parasites like mites so it is important to clear old nesting materials from the boxes.

Putting up nesting boxes is an easy way to support backyard birds, but they must be the kind that can be opened for cleaning each year.

Murphy said plans on tree swallow nesting boxes are on the internet for people who may want to build their own boxes.

"Tree swallows use feathers to build nests, while Eastern blue birds don't, so this is how one might figure out what spe-

Continued from page 6 cies of bird has nested in the boxes," said Murphy.

Former conservation officer Pete Gilboe, an avid hunter, provides the Marsh with duck feathers.

The duck feathers are left in open spaces around the marsh so nesting birds may access

"I have seen tree swallows fighting over one duck feather, so it is important that they have enough feathers to build their nests," said Murphy.

Murphy noted the number of tree swallows, or insectivorous birds species (birds that consume insects), has been on a steep decline in recent years.

Swallows can consume up to 1,000 insects per day so providing artificial nesting boxes is an important habitat for the birds.

SECONDARY CAVITY **NESTERS**

Because tree swallows and Eastern blue birds are secondary cavity nesters, they benefit from nest boxes, said Murphy.

They can be in competition for nesting sites with the European house sparrow, which many consider an invasive spe-

He noted birds like woodpeckers are primary cavity builders but the availability of holes in trees made by these birds does not often meet the need for nesting sights of many bird species.

The Marsh has installed over 100 nest boxes across the Temiskaming region that they maintain each year.

People visiting the Marsh last Saturday could also view Marsh bird bander Jacob Lachapelle band several common grackles.

Around the marsh there are nest boxes for tree swallows, ducks and owls.

Hitting the ATV trails, safely

OTTAWA (Special) – In an effort to reduce injuries and fatalities amongst young ATV riders, a group of industry players recently joined forces to launch online rider safety training for youth.

Ready to RideON is an Ontario Quad Safety Council program, developed in partnership with the Ontario Federation of All Terrain Vehicle Clubs (OFATV), Yamaha Motor Canada, and Bombardier Recreational Products (BRP)

"ATV riding is not just a fun activity for young riders who get a taste of independence and freedom on the trails, but it's a necessity for some youth who rely on the machines for farm work or transportation, particularly in rural areas," said Shari Black, executive director of the OFATV, in a news release announcing the new initiative.

"We know that helping these young riders build confidence and skills is key to mitigating accidents across the province. As a group of industry leaders, we felt compelled to build programming that would do just that."

ATV riding is increasing in popularity in Ontario, particularly as weather patterns change and trails become accessible for longer periods throughout the year.

At this time, youth aged 12 to 15 are allowed to ride on trails in Ontario and no rider training or rider safety education is required.

But the federation notes that ATVs – which can weigh more than 600 pounds and travel at more than 100 kilometres per hour – pose a serious risk to inexperienced riders and the people around them.

It said SickKids reported 181 cases of serious and/or fatal ATV-related injuries, including six deaths, in 2018. Children aged 10 to 14 represented nearly half (45.3 per cent) of all cases.

The SickKids study also revealed that the likelihood of injury and death on ATVs is lower in provinces where safety training is legislated for youth, demonstrating the importance of programs like Ready to RideON.

The federation noted that vigilance around ATV use should not be limited to youth.

It cited data from the Ontario Provincial Police that showed that 151 people died and more than 1,500 suffered ATV or sideby-side injuries between 2016 and 2022.

Loss of control is the number one cause of accidents.

Ready to RideON is a \$40, two-hour online program designed for 12- to 15-year-olds in Ontario.

It covers all aspects of ATV operation from parts and functions of a machine to riding responsibly on Ontario's trails. For more information, visit of atv.org/ready-to-rideon.



Half Load Restrictions in Effect

March 6, 2024 until June 30, 2024, unless indicated otherwise.

When half-load restrictions are in effect, a road is off-limits to vehicles exceeding 5 tonnes per axle. However, there may be alternate routes that can be taken to reach a destination.

Why

Roads become softer and weaker during the spring thaw. Heavy vehicle traffic on these roadways can cause permanent damage. Following the half-load restrictions reduces the potential for any unnecessary road repairs or reconstruction.

Street Sweeping and Spring Clean-up

The annual spring clean-up includes sweeping all paved roads and some hard surfaces, to remove debris and materials that have accumulated throughout the winter season and could pose dangers to motorists, pedestrians/cyclists as well as clogging up catch basins and inlets.

Residents are asked to help crews clean the city by not parking vehicles on the streets while street sweeping activities are being conducted in the area. Typical hours of operations are Monday to Friday, between 6:30am and 3:00pm beginning in April (weather dependent). Hours of operation may also very depending on the location that needs to be swept.

Hydrant Flushing | 2024

Hydrant Flushing is conducted semi-annually as part of the Water Maintenance Program. These operations are carried out typically in April and October of each year.

During this time customers may experience discolored water. If you do, it would be advisable to refrain from doing laundry or using hot water until the water clears. The Public Works Operations Staff makes every effort to maintain the designated schedule. Your co-operation is appreciated.

Two household items that can be dangerous

(NC) - You probably don't read the label of everything that enters your home, and there are likely a few items in your home that you may not realize are dangerous. Below are two items you should know about to keep your home safe.

BATTERIES - A BURN AND FIRE RISK

Lithium batteries are in many everyday devices, from cellphones to toys to power tools.

While there are many safety standards for them, lightweight, these longlasting power sources can be dangerous if they are not made, stored or handled properly. In fact, according to federal regulations they are classified as dangerous goods.

To avoid chemical burns, fires or explosions, make sure to only buy batteries from reputable brands and retailers and avoid aftermarket or thirdparty batteries. Third-party lithium batteries can be of poor quality or counterfeit and have been shown to lead to more fires.

Keep batteries out of reach

of children and supervise playtime to prevent kids from swallowing small cell batteries found in many children's toys. **AEROSOLS – A RISK OF EXPLOSION**

You may already know that aerosol canisters will explode if heated. But you might be surprised by how many dayto-day products come in these canisters.

In addition to hairspray, you can find cooking oils, sunscreens, perfumes, fresheners and cleaning products in these pressurized

cans. Think about how many you might have in your house while you're out shopping.

If you buy a product that comes in an aerosol canister, be sure to store it away from heat according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Just like lithium batteries, products in aerosol canisters are classified as dangerous goods by Transport Canada. This means that they require a special shipping label when

being transported or shipped.

If you have to return these products through the mail, make sure that the package includes appropriate dangerous goods shipping label.

These labels are required for all packages carrying items classified as dangerous goods. You can find more information about the regulations at tc.canada.ca/en/dangerous-



in Ontario provides coverage against emergencies that can be

Under the new-home warranty, an emergency is a situation that occurs during the warranty period and involves a warranted defect that, if not attended to immediately, would cause substantial damage to your house, condo unit or condo common elements. It may also be something that can pose a risk to your health and safety or make your home uninhabitable.

Examples of emergency situations include:

- A complete loss of heat between September 15 and May 15
- A gas leak
- A complete loss of electricity
- A complete loss of water
- Complete stoppage of sewage disposal
- A plumbing leak that requires the entire water supply to be
- Major collapse of any part of the home's exterior or interior
- Water penetration through the interior walls or ceiling
- A pool of standing water inside the home
- Presence of unacceptable levels of hazardous substances inside the home, such as radon or mould

How to deal with an emergency in your new home

These types of emergencies do not include situations caused by failures of municipal or utility services, or other situations that are not within your builder's control.

WHAT TO DO IN AN EMERGENCY

If you have an emergency that's covered by the warranty contact your builder, who then has up to 24 hours to resolve the issue by making your home safe and preventing any further damage.

If you can't reach your builder or they don't resolve the emergency within this time, you can call the consumer protection organization Tarion. Their role is to ensure homeowners receive the warranty protection you're entitled to, and to hold builders accountable when they fail to meet their obligations. The organization can step in to resolve your claim when your builder can't or won't.

And what to do if you can't reach either? In this case, you can get a professional to do the repair work necessary to correct only the emergency (but not the defect that caused it). Keep records of the emergency and repair work completed, such as receipts and photographs taken before and after the repair so that your builder can reimburse you for the cost. Once the initial emergency is resolved, your builder has 30 days to complete a full repair of the defect.




