# Local victim services in the spotlight

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Last year, more than 500 referrals were made to a Temiskaming organization that offers victims of crime and tragedy immediate help, emotional support and ongoing assistance.

Half of the referrals related to intimate partner violence, said Monique Chartrand, executive director of Victim Services of Temiskaming and District.

The Temiskaming organization traces its roots to 1997 and an initiative introduced in the Tri-Town area. Over the years, it's evolved, changing its name and expanding to cover the entire district.

But its mission has remained the same – to provide emotional support and practical help in the hours, days and months following a crime or a tragedy.

May 12 through 18 has been designated Victims and Survivors of Crime Week in Canada.

It's an opportunity to make the public aware of victims services, what they offer, and how important they are to the area, said Dan Dawson, who chairs the Temiskaming organization's board.

That the local service exists is also "extremely important" to the police, said Dawson, now retired from the Ontario Provincial Police.

When a victim services worker comes on to the scene, he said, "officers are freed up to do investigations, and you know that the victims are being cared for."

To mark the week this year, the district organization has once again been offering a series of free selfdefence workshops for girls and women aged 16 and up.

Chartrand said last year's workshops were a huge success.

The idea was born, she said, after a young girl had been involved in an assault and her father approached the organization about help for his daughter to develop skills to protect herself. *Continued on page 5*

TEMISKAMING SHORES The Earlton Timiskaming Regional Airport Authority hosted the eleventh annual Airport Management Council of Ontario (AMCO) Wednesday, May 8.

Airport manager James hand Smith was on at the Holiday Inn in Temiskaming Shores to greet representatives of airports from across Ontario, from as far away as Red Lake and Windsor.

He explained that AMCO moves its annual conventions to different areas from year to year "and this year we were selected to host and we were happy to do so.

"The purpose of the convention is to highlight some of the challenges that airports are facing, in particular funding, and AMCO has taken a lead on that federally and provincially to be a voice for airports to help with the funding."

AMCO chief executive officer Laura McNeice was also on hand. She explained that AMCO is "advocating to aerodromes who have no the provincial government for a capital assistance program to help small airports registered and

#### made in April involving impaired driving across the North East region.

Impaired driving can be as a result of alcohol or drug consumption over the legal limit permitted in Ontario.

Police say 30 of those arrests were of individuals impaired by alcohol and 16 from drug consumption.

Out of 12 districts across the North, the Temiskaming district had the highest amount of impaired driving charges at a staggering ten.

The closest community to ours was James Bay with eight impaired driving arrests.

The Temiskaming Detachment of the OPP released a statement saying in just a 24-hour period, they laid four individual impaired charges in our catchment area.

That's four charges in one day.

And across Ontario, impaired driving fatalities jumped 31 per cent between 2018 and 2023, when there were 385 fatalities on OPP-patrolled roads. Cases of police laying impaired driving charges also increased by 33 per cent during the sixyear period, the OPP said.

And nationally, Canada has the highest legal blood/ alcohol limit in the world at 0.08 per cent. Some countries have the same limit but there is none higher than the true north strong, free and drunk.


It is very concerning that people are choosing to drive while impaired.

They are endangering the lives of others and it is an incredibly selfish act.

It would seem that impaired driving charges are on the increase instead of the decrease.

There is no excuse for impaired driving. We must have zero tolerance for impaired driving, and much stronger response to end it.

# A game changer

If you are remotely interested in the world of birding, you will want to download the free Merlin Bird ID app.

Identifying birds is difficult, especially if you are new to the hobby and also during the spring migration when so many birds are flocking to our area.

But the Merlin app makes it so easy. Have you downloaded the app? What are you waiting for?

It is a game changer and it will make your birding experiences that much more enjoyable.

To my utmost delight, I heard the call of two male ruby crowned kinglets while I was eating my lunch by a local lake.

I wondered what bird was making that sound so I pulled out my phone and enacted the Merlin Bird ID app.

Sure enough, it identified the song as a ruby crowned kinglet.

I looked and looked in the foliage and had almost given up spotting the bird when I saw a bright red flash in the trees.

That's when I saw this twitchy little greenish coloured bird on a branch close to my vehicle.

The crown on this bird was bright crimson and I could not believe I was actually seeing the kinglet.

The bird raises the red coloured feathers on its head when singing mating songs to attract females.

These birds are smaller than a chickadee and the females can lay up to ten eggs in a clutch, says the Cornell Lab of Ornithology.



It was a "lifer" for me. A "lifer" is a term used by birders to describe a bird that they have never seen before.

There are golden crown kinglets too, cousins to the ruby crowned which I have not yet seen.

I was absolutely thrilled to photograph the ruby crowned kinglets.

They are tiny and don't stay in one place for long so you have to be quick with the camera.

Another time, when I went to my canoe recently, I heard a vociferous bird near me.

Sure enough the Merlin app identified the bird as an Eastern Bluebird. No way, it must be a mistake I thought, because I had never seen one at the lake before.

But seeing is believing and sure enough, there it was high up in a red pine tree singing its heart out.

Forget lugging heavy guidebooks on your outings, the Merlin app can fit nicely into your pocket.

You know the greatest and most educational tool is not a text book or the words of a great philosopher.

It is found in things that inspire curiosity.

Curiosity creates new expertise and being curious about the natural world makes us better people.

The Merlin app is like magic, and it makes the entire birding experience that much more pleasurable.



Continued from page 3 Club annual Civic Holiday weekend flea market sale. After years of moving from one place to another, the Lions Club has now obtained a permanent storage space thanks to the assistance of a special fund managed by David and Carol Oley of North Bay on behalf of an American couple who had spent their summers in Temagami. The American couple have now passed away, but had expressed the wish to remain

#### anonymous.

In a telephone interview Carol Oley related that the last of that fund has now been invested into this and another Lions Club project: the purchase of batteryoperated Jaws of Life for extrication of victims in traffic accidents.

In a telephone interview, Laba also expressed gratitude to Russ Manderstrom of Longshot Diamond Drilling for the site for the trailer; JPL Storage Haileybury (Janice and Peter LaRocque) where the trailer was purchased; and the Temagami Community Foundation which provided funding of \$2,700 for additional items needed for the trailer.

Laba commented that "without a storage container we would have to cancel many of our community assistance programs."

Laba related that formerly the items had been stored in the homes of Lions Club members. A space then became available at the Temagami Marina which was used for seven years. Then, due to an ownership change, the items had to be moved. At the same time, the pandemic had closed the Temagami arena, so the Lions Club received approval from the municipality to store the items in a dressing room there. In 2023, with the reopening of the arena, the issue of storage became critical, and at that time Laba approached the Oleys

who agreed to assist with a donation of \$10,000 toward the new storage container, he said.

Since 1990, the Oleys have been managing the funds donated by the anonymous American couple.

In a telephone interview Carol Oley related that she and her husband met the couple in 1990 through Block Parents and since that time the couple provided the Oleys with an amount *Continued on page 14*

## Charlton and Dack seeking funding assistance after storm

CHARLTON-DACK - The Municipality of Charlton and Dack is making an application to the Disaster Recovery Assistance Program through the provincial government to help with costs related to repairing damaged culverts and roads caused by the April 12 rainstorm.

Approximately 70 millimetres of rain (three inches) fell in a short period of time causing substantial damage in the municipality and surrounding area.

It is believed that the storm damage was worsened because there was still frost in the ground at that time, and the water had nowhere to go other than to fill waterways, damage culverts, and overflow onto roads causing washouts.

The municipality's worst damage was experienced on Harman's Road where a large steel culvert was swept away by the force of the water.

At council's May 6 meeting, public works superintendent Jon Schenk gave council an estimate of \$189,000 to replace that culvert.

A new 80-foot plastic culvert on Grant Road also was swept away in four sections. The four twenty-feet long four-feet wide culvert pieces are now three miles down the Englehart River, Schenk told council.

The Temiskaming Municipal Services Association has a drone which was brought into service to assist in finding the pieces, said Schenk.

"Two four-footers are at the bottom of 80-Foot Falls," he said.

He estimates the replacement of the culvert on Grant Road will have a cost of caus \$90,000.

He added that there are still "lots of small culverts anywhere from \$10,000 to \$20,000 a crossing" that have been affected. "We've got pictures of every washout." A package of information relating to the damage is being compiled, and will be used in the application for assistance.

Ontario Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing representatives have visited the Municipality of Charlton and Dack, as well as the neighbouring Chamberlain Township, to view the damage

caused by the storm.

Acting Mayor Debbie Veerman expressed gratitude toward Kirkland Lake Mayor Stacy Wight who called the ministry up to the area for the Town of Kirkland Lake which also experienced major flooding during the storm. Wight also connected neighbouring municipalities and the ministry representatives. "It's wonderful that she thought of us," said Veerman.

Staff also were commended for their response after the storm.

## Integrity commissioner comments on two Cobalt matters

COBALT - Cobalt council has passed a resolution preventing Councillor Doug Wilcox from communicating directly with town staff. All council members apart from Wilcox voted in favour of the resolution.

As well, coming out of a separate incident, council has suspended the remuneration of Councillor Harry Cooper for two months. Wilcox and Councillor Angela Hunter did not support the resolution.

The two matters were heard at the town's council meeting April 30.

Integrity commissioner Peggy Young-Lovelace of E4m, was present and presented a legal opinion in closed session, which had been obtained by E4m to answer a question regarding the legality of the resolution against Wilcox.

Young-Lovelace had previously attended council on the matter relating to Wilcox March 7. The specific complaint outlined at that meeting was that Wilcox had communicated by email with a staff member and had asked for something in wording which Young-Lovelace said could be perceived as an order. It was copied to other council members and Young-Lovelace said that could be interpreted as a threat to the staff member if the direction were not followed.

Young-Lovelace expressed concern this was one of a number of similar incidents.

Young-Lovelace recommended council should have a resolution that Wilcox should direct questions to staff members by emails to the mayor, who would then relay the message to the town manager, and respond to Wilcox.

Cooper asked for a list of similar instances that Young-Lovelace suggested had occurred, and sought to defer the vote until that information was provided.

Young-Lovelace stated, "I want to be clear that the reason we're asking for this (resolution by council) is to prevent the (integrity commissioner) inquiry from going ahead so there is no additional cost to the municipality. If council doesn't put this restriction in place the inquiry will go ahead. We will be then coming forward with a report with all of the details you are looking for."

The Speaker contacted the Ontario Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing for a comment on the restrictions on councillors communicating directly with staff.





During the years when we were given this money we bought playground equipment for the Temagami Public School and also put playground equipment in a small park in Temagami North."

She added that at Christmas, in years when the Temagami Legion needed extra food for the Christmas baskets, the Oleys used some of the funds to assist with that.

Over the years books, resource materials and shelving were also purchased for the Temagami Public School library through the fund. She said she and her husband agreed to the Temagami Lions Club projects because they feel that there will be children who will benefit from the organizations the Lions Club is donating clothing to, and at some time the Jaws of Life will be needed at a car where there is a child.

She said of the anonymous couple, "Both these two people have passed away. All the money has been invested. We just gave the Lions Club the last of the money." Signage with the name



to have a program that can assist them in maintaining their airports for safety and things like that."

She said the quest for provincial funding "is a continual ongoing issue. We hope we are making progress, but as anything is, it is a slow road, but we feel we are making some positive strides. The airports have significant value to the areas they are in. They provide live-saving services through medevac flights and through wildfire suppression, and economic development. It attracts business and highly trained employees, tourism, OPP, hydro, and search and rescue. There are so many uses and things that are happening through airports." She said airports provide much more than just a place for a person to get onto a plane to fly to a vacation spot.

Smith agreed with McNeice's outline of services that airports offer, and those services are also what drive the Earlton Airport. Although the airport does not have a scheduled service it does "provide all the critical support to economic development and the safety of our communities, and with some work in the future we're hoping to bring some more business into the airport which helps with the economic growth of our communities."

He added that the AMCO workshops "are a great tool for airports across Ontario to learn about challenges other airports are facing, and up and coming trends and ways to improve our operations and safety."

#### Continued from page 9 "TYPICALLY COUNCIL AS A WHOLE DIRECTS"

spokesperson Ministry Conrad Spezowka replied that "municipalities are required to adopt a policy respecting the relationship between members of council and municipal staff. Municipalities have the flexibility to determine the content of these policies. Municipal decisions are generally made by council as a whole, unless specifically delegated. Section 243 of the Municipal Act, 2001 provides that each member of council, including the head of council, has one vote on matters that come before council. Typically, council as a whole provides direction to municipal staff."

subject of an integrity commissioner inquiry which concluded with a recommendation Cooper's remuneration should be suspended for a period up to 90 days.

Councillor Pat Anderson suggested Cooper should also be removed from the procedural committee "until he proves himself up to date on all roles." She also stated she expected him to apologize to the town foreman if that has not already been done. Neither of those two suggestions were formalized in a town resolution though.

Wilcox suggested the integrity commissioner's recommendation for a suspension of Cooper's remuneration up to 90 days should be waived altogether. "I think that's way above anything

that any councillor should be subjected to," he said. He added, "There are a number of things that weighed in on what occurred both at the council meeting in question and how it came about. For councillors who haven't been in the business for a while, I can tell you that previously in my experience, that when a department head attends a council meeting, the department head is subjected to questions. They're responsible for the answers. The answers could be delayed for a month and they could get back to you. That kind of thing would be fine."

He continued that Cooper "has been through enough hoops.... I think we should let it go and get on with being a council."

#### "A SYMBOLIC GESTURE"

Hunter also spoke against a 90-day remuneration suspension. "Our remuneration isn't that high," she said, and she opposed the idea that a suspension of Cooper's remuneration would help to offset the costs of the integrity commissioner inquiry. "It will never come close," said Hunter. "It is more like a symbolic gesture." She suggested that a one-month suspension of remuneration would be an adequate amount as a symbolic gesture.

Adshead responded that although the remuneration suspension will not recoup the costs of the investigation, "there was a cost that our ratepayers are going to be absorbing in the budget."

She expressed the view

that a harassment complaint is very serious. "This council is the most trained council there's every been and for the behaviour to continue after that I believe is unacceptable."

Councillor Gary Hughes suggested a two-month suspension of remuneration.

Council did vote first on a 90-day suspension but that was defeated in a three to three vote, with Hughes, Hunter and Wilcox opposing it, and Adshead, Anderson and Starchuk supporting it.

That vote was followed by a vote for a two-month suspension which was approved in a vote supported by Adshead, Anderson, Hughes and Starchuck.

The Ministry of Health recommends the following groups receive an additional vaccine dose this spring:

Adults aged 65 and older,

Cooper's matter was the

- Adult residents of long-term care homes and other senior living communities,
- Individuals aged 6 months and up, who are moderately to severely immunocompromised due to an underlying condition or treatment, or
- Individuals aged 55 and older who are First Nations, Inuit or Metis, and their non-Indigenous household members who are 55 years and older.

The spring booster is particularly important for those at higher risk of severe illness, especially if they missed the fall 2023 vaccine.

If you do not fall into the above categories, stay tuned for further guidance from the Ministry of Heath.

- Les adultes de 65 ans et plus

Il est particulièrement important de recevoir un vaccin contre la COVID-19 au printemps 2024 pour les personnes qui courent un risque plus élevé de maladie grave en raison de la COVID-19 et qui n'ont pas reçu une dose pendant le programme d'automne 2023.



A fire in the early morning hours of May 8 destroyed a barn belonging to Hillside Farms located on Armstrong Street north of New Liskeard.

The barn is part of a complex of ten buildings purchased from the University of Guelph four years ago.

There were 140 head of cattle in the barn at the time of the fire. Ten head of cattle were lost but the remaining herd of 130 was saved by the actions of farm manager Chris Aitchison.

Herd manager Ben Belanger stated that Aitchison and six members of the Temiskaming OPP raced through the barn and opened gates, leading most of the herd to safety in the adjacent pastures.

"What Chris and six members of the OPP did was nothing short of heroic. Luckily, no one was hurt. Saving 130 of the 140 head of cattle was a miracle," said Belanger.

"Barns can be rebuilt, but you cannot replace people. We are grateful for the courageous efforts of the OPP and the fire department that contained the fire and ensured it didn't spread to nearby buildings."


The property has been used over 80 years as an experimental farm with an infamous herd of cattle dating back over 50 years.

"Our commitment to New Liskeard and this property and this herd is unwavering," said Belanger. "We plan to rebuild immediately as soon as the authorities give us the goahead.

"Having a cattle farm in the centre of New Liskeard will continue for years.

"The importance of this herd's genetics cannot be understated. Fifty years of the University of Guelph's genetic efforts were saved today, and we are so grateful that this herd will continue to flourish."
