Latchford fitness centre changes rates and increases space

LATCHFORD - The Latchford Fitness Centre is a busy place these days.

At the April 23 regular council meeting, Latchford council passed a motion to approve new rates for its fitness centre and expand the fitness centre space, located in the Latchford Recreation Centre.

At a previous meeting, Mayor Sharon Gadoury said she had made a visit to the fitness centre and noticed there wasn't a lot of space for the number of people working out at the gym.

Since council has decided to move its meeting space from the recreation complex to the municipal office, the space at the complex will now be used to house cardio equipment such as treadmills from the gym.

This should make more room in the gym area, noted the mayor.

The town had received requests from its members for longer terms including six- and one-year memberships.

Those requests prompted council to adjust the membership rates:

Residents

- Monthly fee \$30 plus HST
- Six months fee \$135.40 plus HST
- One year or 12 months \$252.25 plus HST

Non-Residents

- Monthly fee \$40 plus HST
- Six months \$179.65 plus HST
- One year \$336.30 plus HST
- Latchford seniors (60 years and over) pay \$20 per month plus HST.

There is a key fob deposit of \$20.

Membership fees include 24/7 access to the fitness centre and change rooms, showers and WiFi.

MiHR scholarship supports mining students

TEMISKAMING SHORES - A fund made available through the Mining Industry Human Resources council (MiHR) made it possible for Northern College to assist mining students with their costs during the winter 2024 semester.

Northern College communications and government relations officer Kyle Gennings commented in an email that funding received through MiHR "will be issued to our mining students in addition to our existing mining specific funds (O.E. Walli Foundation) until the money allotted is fully issued to students."

The MiHR has provided Northern College with over \$48,000 in scholarship funds for the Winter 2024 semester.

"MiHR has allocated \$2 million in funding to help address drastic enrolment decrease in mining related post-secondary programs in Canada, creating a one-time Financial Scholarship Support Program for students enrolled in the Fall 2023, Winter 2024 semester," Northern College stated in a recent media release.

"The federal government's funding of M4S (Mining Sector Skills and Solutions Strategy for the Clean Economy) through Employment and Social Development Canada's Sectoral Workforce Solutions Program ... demonstrates the importance of mining to the Government of Canada's Critical Minerals Strategy and recognition that the sector is facing a people crisis," said MiHR executive director Ryan Montpelier through the media release.

"In order for Canada's mining industry to support the transition to a clean economy, the sector needs a robust pipeline of qualified and skilled workers to support expansion and avoid ongoing labour shortages. Yet, Canada's mining talent pipeline is shrinking."

Post-secondary enrolment declined in Canada from 2015 to 2020 in the three types of engineering most closely associated with mining,

with materials and metallurgical engineering declining by seven per cent, mining or mineral engineering by 41 per cent, and geological engineering by 29 per cent, according to Northern College.

The funding announcement contributes to Northern's Mining-specific Scholarship Bursary and Awards funding, and has made over \$140,000 available to Northern College mining students through MiHR, the O.E. Walli Foundation and Northern College.

"The mining industry is central to our history as an institution, dating back 112 years," stated Northern College president and chief executive officer Mitch Dumas.

"This kind of support from national bodies like MiHR is a testament to the great work we do at Northern and the significant role we have played in producing the highest quality mining professionals."

The college welcomed the funding allocation, stating that "with skilled worker shortages projected to be significant in the mining industry by the end of the decade, ongoing efforts to draw students to Northern are welcomed."

"With the regional base and precious metal industries in the midst of a significant boom, any incentive that can help draw the next generation of skilled mining professionals to Northern is good news for our institution, and even better news for the economic health of our region," added Dumas.

Partnerships like this one allow Northern College to grow and adapt to the latest in industry and labour market trends, positioning itself to continue to play a large role in Canada's mining industry by eliminating the financial barriers that could prevent potential students from pursuing an education in mining, he added.

The Financial Scholarship Support Program shows students they are supported in mining programs and that they can help Canada be the world leader in safe, sustainable mining, he concluded.

May is Bladder Cancer Awareness Month

DID YOU KNOW?

- There are more than 80,000 Canadians living with bladder cancer
- Bladder cancer is the fifth most common cancer in Canada
- 8,700 Canadians will be diagnosed with bladder cancer this year
- The biggest warning sign of bladder cancer is blood in the urine
- Smoking is a common risk factor, as are age and work related exposure to specific chemicals

SYMPTOMS:

The most common symptom of bladder cancer is blood in the urine. The colour may vary from pale yellow-red to bright or rusty red. Blood may always be in the urine, or it may come and go. Sometimes the blood can only be seen with a microscope or found with other urine tests.

Other symptoms include:

- The need to pee often (also called urinary frequency)
- An intense need to pee (also called urinary urgency)
- Trouble peeing
- A burning sensation or pain when you pee
- Back, pelvic or groin pain

Because the disease may have progressed unnoticed, it is critical to see a health care provider once you begin to experience symptoms. Since many symptoms are similar to other medical conditions, bladder cancer is often misdiagnosed as, for example, a urinary tract infection. If you are concerned, ask your health care provider for a referral to a urologist to rule out bladder cancer.

If you are having symptoms, please call to schedule an appointment with your primary care provider. It may very well **not** be bladder cancer, but these symptoms could be the result of a urinary tract infection which also needs to be diagnosed and treated accordingly.

Cellphoned in classrooms

Ontario's Ministry of Education has just announced a new cellphone policy for schools, to be implemented in the fall of 2024.

The government says cellphones must be silent and out of sight in every class.

If students do not follow the rules, teachers can confiscate cellphones.

In grades one to six, cellphone usage is banned for the entire school day.

In grades seven to 12 students may use their cellphones on breaks and at lunchtime.

Social media sites will not be available on school networks or school devices.

It's not only students who are banned from using cellphones at school, teachers are also being asked not to use personal mobile devices during class.

And finally, report cards will have comments from teachers about student distraction levels in class.

There have been links made to the amount of time students spend on social media and mental illness.

Psychologist Jonathan Haidt says kids are "overprotected in the real world and under protected in the virtual world."

Social media usage linked to cellphones has been found to diminish concentration levels in children.

Who can disagree with a policy that aims to protect children's mental health?

And we should acknowledge the issue after the school bell rings and when children are at home.

It is a difficult task for parents to figure out how to manage screen time for their children in a world dominated by technology.

How is this ban going to be enforced?

Will teachers have to stop teaching and monitor this?

And what about their mental health?

Head games

The last time someone told me what to wear was when my mother saw me going out the door to high school with ripped jeans.

4. submit two letters of reference (one may be from a teacher)
5. submit either a 300-word short essay or a 5-minute video presentation, describing their interest in the field of forestry, environmental sciences, or biology, and why they are choosing to pursue a career in that field.

AVAILABLE FUNDING

Scholarships, each worth up to \$2,500, will be awarded, (50% or \$1,250 is available to part-time students), to a maximum total of \$12,500.

PROCESS

Applications will be accepted from April 1 to September 30, 2024.

Fully completed applications will be reviewed and assessed by the TFMC Scholarship Committee based upon the criteria above. The TFMC Scholarship Committee will award scholarships to successful applicants up to the maximum funding allocation determined annually by the TFMC Board of Directors.

Conditional scholarship awards to applicants who meet the qualifying criteria will be made on a first-come, first awarded basis. Proof of enrollment (tuition paid) will be required before scholarship funds are released.

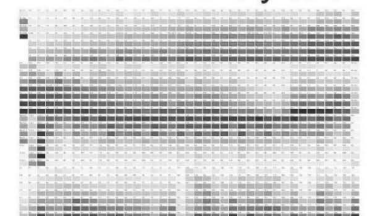

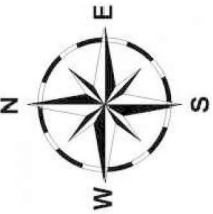

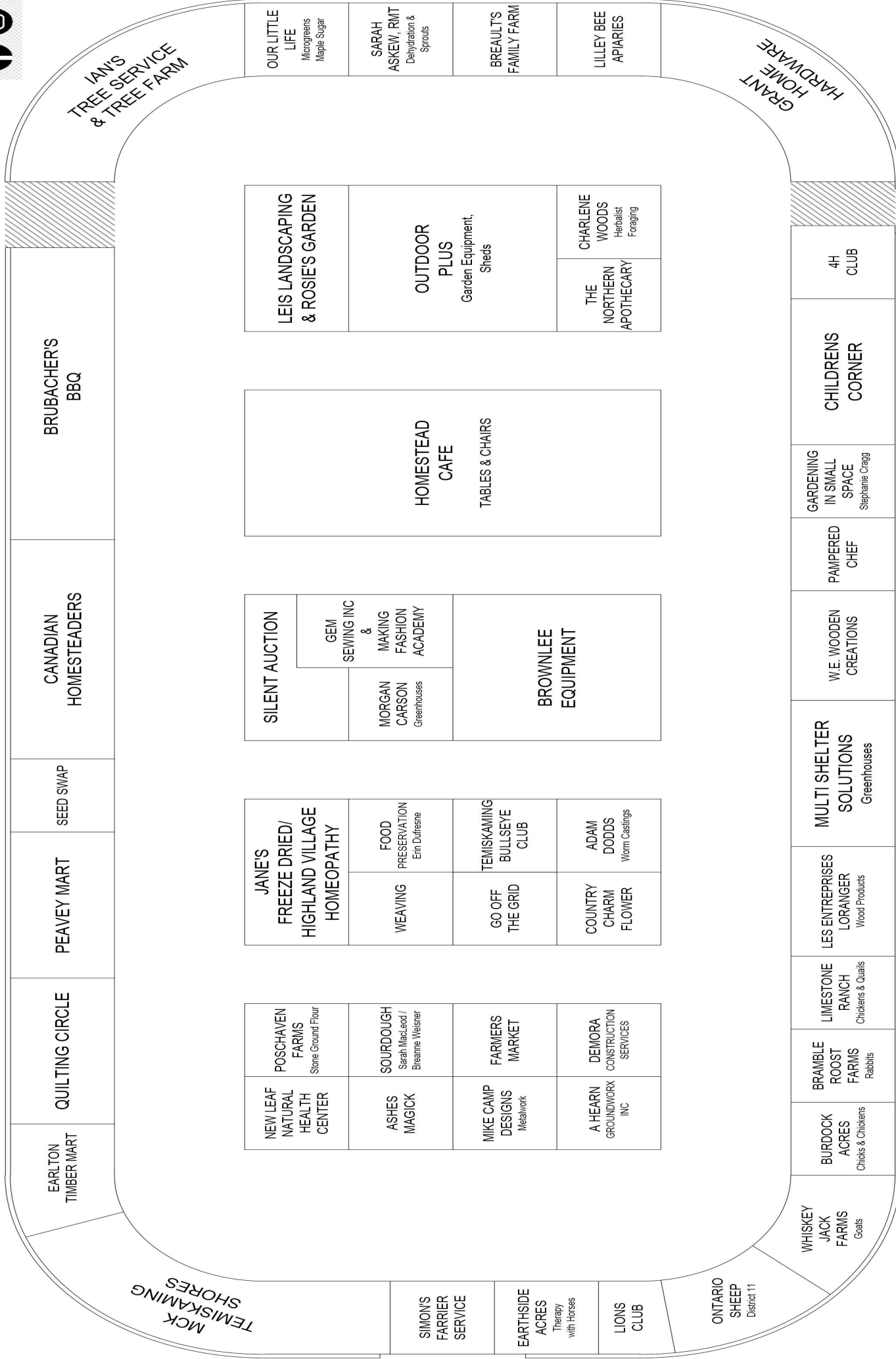

Safety Council tips for camping and hiking safely

“Ensuring camping safety is not just about enjoying the great outdoors, it’s about prioritizing careful and thoughtful preparation,” said Gareth Jones, president and CEO of the Canada Safety Council.

“By keeping safety front-of-mind, we give ourselves the tools to transform potential risks into memorable experiences while remaining out of harm’s way.”

Here are some camping and hiking safety tips to keep in mind before embarking on your next outdoor excursion:

PLAN AND PREPARE

Take the time to thoroughly plan and prepare for the journey ahead. Research your destination, including trail conditions, weather forecasts, and any potential hazards or wildlife encounters. Create a detailed itinerary and share it with a friend or family member.

KNOW YOUR LIMITS

It’s important to know your limits and plan your activities accordingly. Choose trails and campsites that match your skill level and physical abilities, being honest with yourself about your fitness level and pacing yourself accordingly.

DRESS APPROPRIATELY

Dress in layers to accommodate changing weather conditions, including moisture-wicking base layers, insulating mid-layers, and a waterproof outer shell. Wear hiking boots with good ankle support to protect your feet and ankles. Pack a hat, sunglasses, and sunscreen to shield yourself from the sun’s harmful rays, too.

STAY HYDRATED AND NOURISHED

Drink plenty of water, even if you don’t feel thirsty, to prevent dehydration. Pack snacks that are dense and lightweight, including trail mix, energy bars, and dried fruit. While taking part in strenuous activity especially, avoid consuming alcohol or caffeinated beverages — these can contribute to dehydration and impair judgment.

BE CAUTIOUS AROUND FIRE

Use only designated fire pits or backpack stoves. Keep fires small and controlled, and keep water nearby to extinguish the fire if it gets out of control. Be very mindful of the fire’s location at all times, as trips and falls can turn deadly in a matter of seconds.

BE CAREFUL AROUND WATER

According to the Government of Canada’s Health Infobase, there were 323 unintentional drownings in Canada in 2020, of which 47 per cent occurred in natural bodies of water. Be mindful of water conditions, delaying water-related activities if the waves are too rough. Never go in the water without another person or a group - in case of emergency, they will be able to provide assistance or seek help for you.

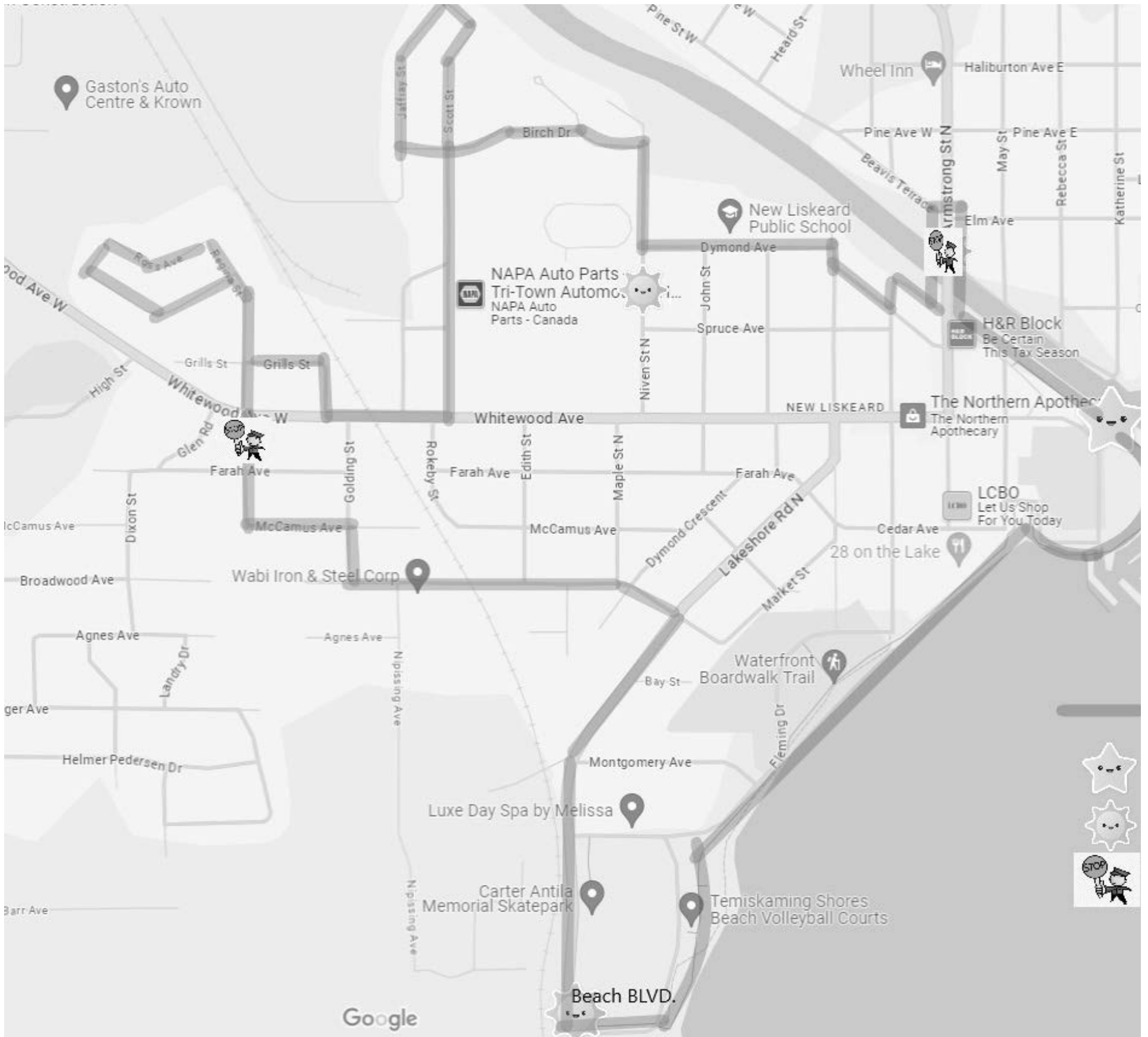

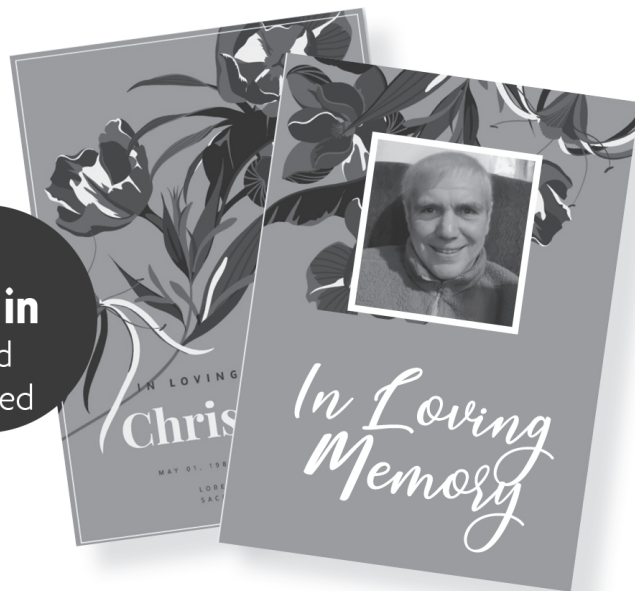

Keepers of the Circle lead wigwam build project

TEMISKAMING SHORES - The Keepers of the Circle, based in New Liskeard, led a wigwam construction build project, located at the back of the Temiskaming Hospital in the forest near the Mino M'shki-hi Indigenous Health Centre.

The project ran from April 12-15.

People from the Toronto region, Manitoulin Island and from across the Temiskaming region took part in the build.

"This brings back so many good memories for me of how I lived with my family," said Timiskaming First Nation elder Marilyn Chevrier.

"My mother and father would build a wigwam and we lived in it during the winter months. We had a wood stove in there and it was a good time in our lives."

A wigwam is the word for house in the Algonquin language.

It is a cone- or dome-shaped house historically used by Indigenous people and today they are places of spiritual ceremonies and cultural events.

Wigwams are built with poles bound at the top similar to a teepee and the floor is covered with pine boughs.

Either birch bark or animal hides were used to wrap over the poles, and in the case of the Keepers wigwam, canvas cloth was used as an outer covering.

In the centre of the wigwam is a fire pit.

The smoke from the fire escapes through a hole in the roof, similar to a teepee.

"Different centres have been part of the development process with the intention of bringing children on the land to experience Indigenous education," said Melissa Gill of Keepers of the Circle.

"The wigwam or lodge is a grandmother lodge or a bush home. The children learn that the land is the original teacher. If there are no medicines being burnt and it isn't on the land, it is not Indigenous education."

She said the wigwam has been named, "Odeminie Wiigiwaamgamink - which means place of learning from the heart."

Dr. Hopi Martin was the lead for the project representing Keepers of the Circle as his research involves Anishanabae cultural ways.

Martin bases his teachings and four elements on what he calls a seasonal pedagogy.

They are relationships, birth, movement and passing, illustrated in the wigwam build by different coloured ribbons hanging from the roof opening.

The District of Timiskaming Social Services Administration Board funded the project.

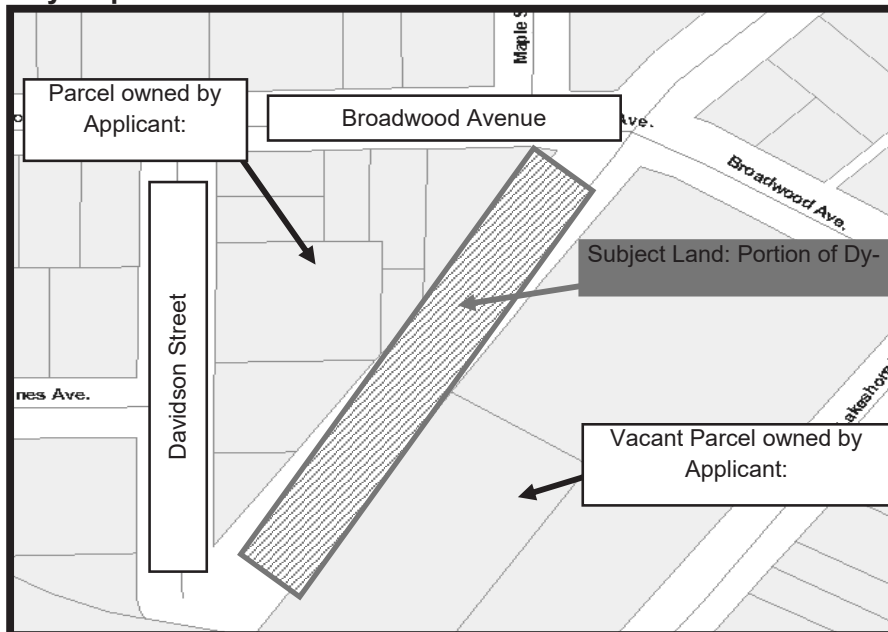

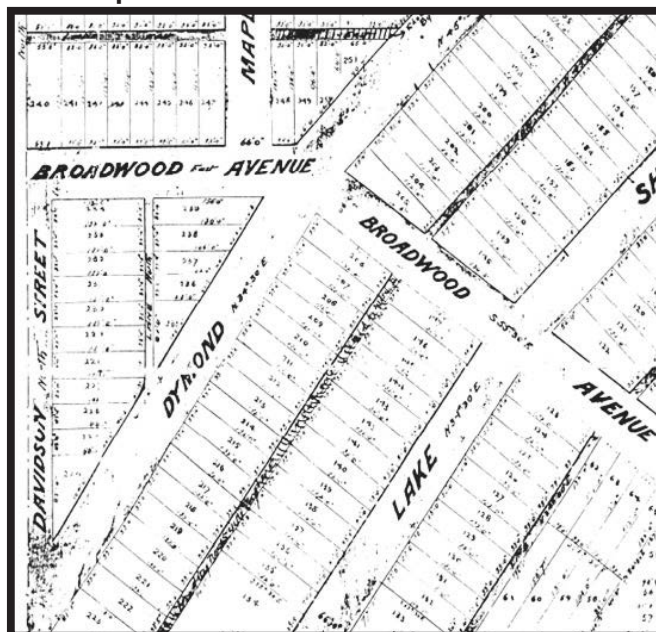

Full house for Ladies Night Out #9

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Floral centrepieces, check. Cupcakes, check. DJ, giant dice, golf clubs, check, check, check.

In the late afternoon April 27, volunteers in black “Cancer Sucks” t-shirts made their final rounds at a Horne Granite Curling Club awash in pink.

They were getting ready to open the doors for the ninth edition of Ladies Night Out, when 302 women bought tickets for a night of dining, dancing, playing games, and auction bidding.

It was “a freezing cold day” when tickets for the 2024 event went on sale, said event founder and committee chair Sandy Sauve.

“Within 10 minutes we were sold out,” she said.

The funds this year have yet to be tallied, but the event has to date raised \$125,000 for the Bikers Reunion’s support of health care in the community.

“As a survivor, I know what it’s like. I’m very fortunate,” Sauve said.

“But there are many who are not fortunate,” she continued.

“You work hard for the people who are really struggling.”

It’s organized by a commit-

tee of about 20, with additional help from other supporters.

The first Ladies Night Out was held in 2013 at Riverside Place in New Liskeard. After three years, it moved to larger quarters at the curling club.

The event, like so many others, was suspended in 2020 and 2021 because of the pandemic. Organizers opted to forego an event in 2022 out of consideration for local businesses that were still trying to recover.

It returned in 2023 and raised a record \$20,000.

This year, more than 126 businesses and individuals supported the event with do-

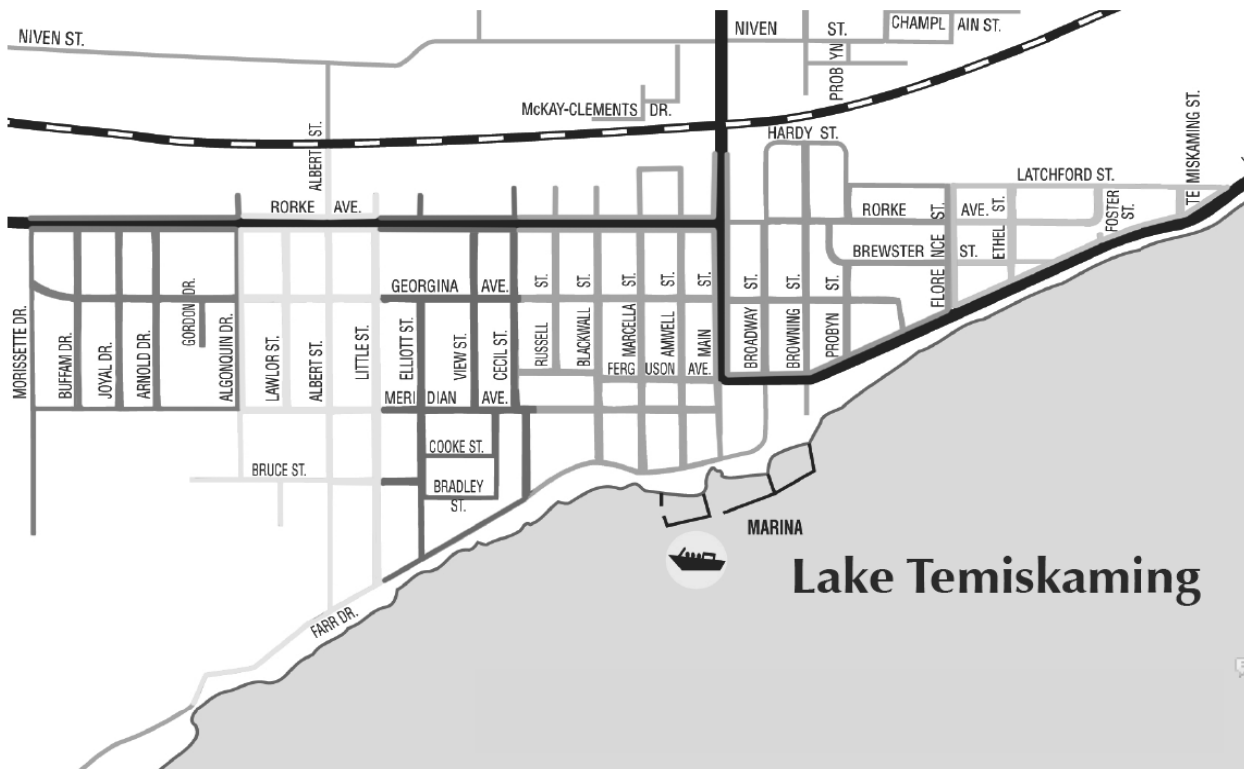
