City planning for the future

TEMISKAMING SHORES – The city is embarking on two plans looking both inside city hall and outside.

On May 21, Temiskaming Shores council approved the hiring of an Ottawa consulting firm to create a community-based strategic plan.

The goal is the creation of a long-term vision, goals and priorities for the city.

Temiskaming Shores has adopted a number of plans since the amalgamation of New Liskeard, Haileybury and Dymond in 2004, but there's been no

overall plan.

"A strategic plan is our opportunity to look at the next five years," said Mayor Jeff Laferriere in a recent interview.

"We know where we are today, we know some of

Marsh bird banders find rare white-eyed vireo

HILLIARDTON — Bird banders at the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre have been busy banding arrivals during the spring migration.

They have banded over 1,000 birds and identified 50 or more species of birds that have arrived at the Marsh.

But one bird was definitely a surprise sighting.

On Mother's Day May 12, one bander, Paul Xamin, was surprised to spot a white-eyed vireo.

White-eyed vireos are not found in Canada and their range is more the southern United States and further south.

How the bird got to the marsh is anyone's guess, but banders are calling the bird a "lost soul."

And not only is the bird unique to the region, it is unique because it has a defective beak.

The beak is crossed.

Bander Rae Xamin said she has seen this beak deformity in birds before.

"I'd say about one in 2,000 birds have this defect," she said.

Banding efforts began at the Marsh on May 3 and they will last for a few weeks while warblers, vireos, sparrows and other species of birds arrive at the marsh to nest and raise their young in the Boreal forest.

WHY BAND BIRDS?

Bird banding gives researchers and conservationists an idea of the numbers of migrating and resident bird populations in and around



the Hilliardton Marsh.

The Marsh is one of 13 bird banding stations across Ontario and the most northern bird banding station.

A bird is caught in a soft mist net, brought back to the banding station and a small, aluminum band is placed on its leg.

Each bird has a digital number that is unique to that bird. If the bird is recaptured its band number will have valuable information about the bird's migration patterns, wing size, sex, fat content, weight and overall condition.

The banding information is shared with the Canadian Wildlife Service and then can be also shared with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

The best part of the banding process is when members of the public learn about the various species of birds and get to hold one after it has been banded.

The bird is then released back into the nearby forest.

Lead bird bander and Marsh coordinator Bruce Murphy noted that 2023 was a milestone year at the marsh when they banded 16,900 birds.

That was the highest number ever at the Marsh in a single year.

The success of the 2023 season can be partly attributed to visiting banders Rae and Paul Xamin, who volunteer at the Tommy Thompson Park in Toronto.

What You Should Know About Lyme Disease

Lyme disease is a potentially serious infection that you can get if you're bitten by an infected blacklegged tick (also called a deer tick).

If you work outdoors or participate in outdoor activities such as golfing, hunting, camping, fishing, hiking, and walking in fields, you may be at greater risk for tick bites.

Cover up and wear:

- light-coloured clothing, so it's easier to see ticks
- closed-toed shoes
- · long-sleeved shirts
- · long pants, tucked into your socks
- special clothing designed to repel ticks

Use insect repellent

Use an insect repellent, or bug spray, that says "DEET" or "icaridin" on it. Put it on your clothes and exposed skin. Always read the label for directions on how to use it.

Put clothes in the dryer

Kill any ticks that might be on your clothing by putting your clothes in a dryer on high heat for at least 10 minutes before washing them.

Check yourself and your children

After being outdoors, check for ticks on yourself and your children. Look:

- · behind your knees
- · on your head
- in your belly button
- in your groin area
- in your underarm area
- on the back of your body use a mirror, or ask someone to check for you

It's a good idea to have a shower as soon as you can to wash off any ticks.

Check your pets for ticks

After being outdoors, check your pets' skin and remove any ticks you find. Ask your veterinarian about options to help keep ticks off your pets.

If you have been bitten by a tick and develop fever, headache, muscle and joint pains, fatigue, and a skin rash, especially one that looks like a red bull's eye in the weeks after being bitten, promptly contact your primary care provider. Bring the tick with you to your medical appointment, if possible, as it may help your provider assess your illness.

council, but consultants will also be "reaching out to the community, getting their input."

And from the perspective of accountability, he said, it will be "something we've agreed on as a team as we go forward, that we can measure how successful we're being, what we need to change to make sure that we are meeting the needs of our community, today, tomorrow and a number of years out."

The city has hired McSweeney and Associates of Ottawa as consultant, at a cost of \$47,500. Its bid was within the \$50,000 budgeted for the project.

At the same meeting, council also agreed to hire HR Strategies Consulting, based in Richmond Hill, to complete a comprehensive organization review.

The review will analyze the city's organizational structure, job position descriptions, salary grid and benefits.

It will also compare the city's organizational details to similar-sized municipalities and communities in the area and draft recommendations to attract and retain staff.

Council approved the agreement with HR Strategies May 21, at a cost of \$39,865. That was lower than the \$50,000 that had been budgeted for the project.

Cobalt relieved as nearby forest fire eases

COBALT - A Thursday, May 23, forest fire in nearby Coleman Township has left Cobalt shaken.

It was May 23, 1977, when a fire raced through the town and destroyed 140 buildings.

This most recent approach of the 164-hectare fire had people poised for a possible disaster in the town.

By Tuesday people were breathing easier.

At the town's regular council meeting

May 28, Mayor Angela Adshead commented with relief that the fire was dropping in size and being held.

"I've seen them flying over with their infra-reds, checking on the hot spots," she told council. "That's good news. It was a pretty nasty scare on the anniversary of our big fire."

She said the town council, staff and residents were prepared on the evening of May 23 in case the wind shifted.

She explained that even though there has now been rain, "It's still not enough rain. As things are greening they are pulling moisture out of the ground." For that reason, the ground is drying and

caution is still needed.

"I ask the public to respect that there is a fire ban," she said.

At the same time, the municipality is still awaiting word on whether it will be approved for a loan for a new fire truck.

Town manager Steven Dalley told council that he has been submitting all required numbers for the decision to be made, and he expects a recommendation on the application to be made at the end of this week.

Required information included an approved 2024 budget, and all financial information returns from 2022 to show the town's revenues.



"I nominated him in the hopes he would be recognized and he has been recognized and he is very, very deserving of this award. We go back into the '80s when we were fighting issues relative to the forestry industry in Northern Ontario. He is a special character."

I have to thank my family, 40 years on council, it never would have happened without the crew and our staff, who I looked at as friends."







The Ministry of Health recommends the following groups receive an additional vaccine dose this spring:

- Adults aged 65 and older,
- Adult residents of long-term care homes and other senior living communities,
- Individuals aged 6 months and up, who are moderately to severely immunocompromised due to an underlying condition or treatment, or
- Individuals aged 55 and older who are First Nations, Inuit or Metis, and their non-Indigenous household members who are 55 years and older.

The spring booster is particularly important for those at higher risk of severe illness, especially if they missed the fall 2023 vaccine.

If you do not fall into the above categories, stay tuned for further guidance from the Ministry of Heath.




