Matachewan FN reaches historic settlement

MATACHEWAN (Staff/Special) - The Matachewan First Nation, the provincial government and the federal government have announced a settlement under the James Bay Treaty #9 signed in 1906.

A treaty land entitlement claim was settled May 25.

The announcement was made by Chief Alex (Sonny) Batisse of the Matachewan First Nation, and Ontario Minister of Indigenous Affairs Parliamentary Assistant Will Bouma on behalf of Ontario Minister of Indigenous Affairs Greg Rickford and Crown-Indigenous Relations Minister Gary Anandasangaree.

Treaty land entitlement claim settlements are intended to remedy circumstances where First Nations did not receive the amount of reserve land promised to them, and Treaty #9 was to provide First Nations with 640 acres per family of five (128 acres per member).

The Matachewan First Nation did not receive all the land to which it is entitled, and negotiations between Ontario and the First Nation began in 2013. Public and Indigenous consultation was conducted between 2015 and 2022. Canada and Matachewan First Nation reached a bilateral settlement for loss of use compensation in 2019, when Canada provided approximately \$16 million in compensation and a provision for the First Nation to seek to add at least 4,572 acres to the reserve.

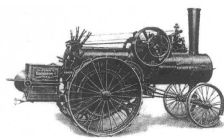

What You Should Know About Lyme Disease

Lyme disease is a potentially serious infection that you can get if you're bitten by an infected blacklegged tick (also called a deer tick).

If you work outdoors or participate in outdoor activities such as golfing, hunting, camping, fishing, hiking, and walking in fields, you may be at greater risk for tick bites.

Cover up and wear:

- light-coloured clothing, so it's easier to see ticks
- closed-toed shoes
- long-sleeved shirts
- long pants, tucked into your socks
- special clothing designed to repel ticks

Use insect repellent

Use an insect repellent, or bug spray, that says "DEET" or "icaridin" on it. Put it on your clothes and exposed skin. Always read the label for directions on how to use it.

Put clothes in the dryer

Kill any ticks that might be on your clothing by putting your clothes in a dryer on high heat for at least 10 minutes before washing them.

Check yourself and your children

After being outdoors, check for ticks on yourself and your children. Look:

- behind your knees
- on your head
- in your belly button
- in your groin area
- in your underarm area
- on the back of your body – use a mirror, or ask someone to check for you

It's a good idea to have a shower as soon as you can to wash off any ticks.

Check your pets for ticks

After being outdoors, check your pets' skin and remove any ticks you find. Ask your veterinarian about options to help keep ticks off your pets.

If you have been bitten by a tick and develop fever, headache, muscle and joint pains, fatigue, and a skin rash, especially one that looks like a red bull's eye in the weeks after being bitten, promptly contact your primary care provider. Bring the tick with you to your medical appointment, if possible, as it may help your provider assess your illness.

"Modernization" has its problems

Dear editor,

In April, there were 46 arrests for impaired driving across the North East region, with 30 involving alcohol. Although these rates are alarming, of more significant concern is that Timiskaming had more incidents of impaired driving than any other district.

When it comes to alcohol, we tend to place a great deal

of emphasis on individual responsibility. However, alcohol is a substance that we know impairs our judgment and impacts our ability to make sound decisions. In addition, our environment strongly influences our behavior.

While impaired driving fatalities may have jumped by 31 per cent between 2018 and 2023, the number of retail outlets that sell alcohol in

Ontario also increased dramatically during this time. Under the guise of "modernization," the provincial government intends to further expand retail access to alcohol by permitting its sale in convenience stores by the end of this summer.

The evidence shows that as alcohol availability increases, so do sales, consumption

Non-emergency encounters Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 or TTY 705-945-7641 if a bear:

- roams around or checks garbage cans
- breaks into a shed where garbage is stored
- is in a tree
- pulls down a bird feeder or knocks over a barbecue
- moves through a backyard or field but does not linger

rates, and, inevitably, alcohol-related harms.

We now know that even in small amounts, alcohol is more harmful to our health than we previously thought, being a direct cause of various cancers, liver disease, cardiovascular disease, and many others. Alcohol significantly contributes to traumatic experiences, including homicides, physical assaults, sexual assaults, domestic violence, child abuse/neglect, unintentional injuries, etc. Trauma is closely linked to

the development of mental health and substance use disorders. Alcohol-related harms impact the consumer, their families, and their communities.

Evidence-based policies in the areas of pricing and taxation, physical availability, marketing controls, alcohol distribution systems, and so forth are effective tools to reduce alcohol consumption and related harms. These policies cost little to implement, and some even generate government revenue. Even still, political and industry pres-

ures continue to contribute to the erosion of these policies in Ontario.

There is a need for all levels of government to recognize the harms associated with alcohol and to implement policies that put health, safety, and fiscal responsibility before commercial interests. Provincially, we need to develop and finance an alcohol strategy before the complete “modernization” of the alcohol retail system takes effect in October.

The costs associated with alcohol-related harms are sig-

nificant, and the tax revenue generated through alcohol sales will never offset these costs. Sadly, in the absence of a provincial alcohol strategy, impaired driving rates are only one of many harms that we can expect to increase. The price to pay for convenience is high, and we need to ask ourselves if it's really worth it.

OBITUARY

William (Bill) Ronald Peters

18 September 1941 – 18 May 2024



Bill was born in Timmins, Ontario, to parents Arnold Peters and Zelma Ethelyn (Watson) Peters. His formative years were spent growing up at the Delnite Property, about five miles outside of Timmins where his father was a driller at the gold mine.

Bill would often regale us with stories of the freedom he and his friends had on the Delnite site and the adventures that freedom afforded them.

Bill spent many summers at his grandfather's Harley Township farm not far from New Liskeard. At five years old he became a working member of the farm by driving the tractor. No telling of the tale was complete without Bill telling us how he had to jump off the tractor seat in order to reach the pedals of the machine. He was often known to tag along with Uncle Roy on tasks around the farm or town. The locals, familiar with seeing the pair together would often quip, "Here comes Pete and Repete."

In 1956, when Bill was 14, his father was working for the Woodworkers of America Union. Arnold was frequently away from home, so he moved the family down to live in a small house on Bill's grandfather's farm.

In 1957, Arnold won the nomination for the CCF party in Temiskaming. He won that election and many others as he served his constituents for 23 years. Again, he was frequently away from home. Arnold bought a property on Dawson Point Road and the family – mostly Bill and his brother Bob – began building their own home. Bill took great pride in the fact that he and his brother had accomplished so much in the building of their house.

During his time at New Liskeard High School, Bill was not a great student but was active in the running of Club 60 – a group of students who ran a dance every Friday. They sometimes were able to book bands for a live entertainment. He was president of the youth club, was a member of the student council and radio club, and played on the football team.

By the time Bill was able to drive he owned an old car and a Harley motorcycle, of which there were many stories of good times, adventures and mishaps. He worked part-time at the local grocery store to pay for these toys and it is at the grocery store where he made friends that have lasted a lifetime.

After high school Bill enrolled at George Brown College in an engineering program (drafting). He always said that he chose this course because on the TV program *Father Knows Best*, the father was a draftsman who always wore a shirt and tie, which impressed Bill.

On completion of the course, he looked in the Toronto newspaper where he saw an ad for draftsman at Fischer & Porter (Cda) Limited. He was the successful candidate for the job designing control panels and automation systems. In later years he became the drafting supervisor and met his future bride, Ann Rossiter.

Bill married Ann in 1967, in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. They had their first son, Adam, in 1967. At this time Bill decided that his career at F & P could not go further so he again went to George Brown College, enrolled this time in a two-year electronics course that gave him his electronic technician papers. During the course he studied – as he says – "like hell," but that earned him the school's medal for the student with the highest marks that year. Their second son, Chad, was born in 1970, shortly before Bill graduated.

Bill went to Atomic Energy for a short time, then back to F & P before applying in 1971 to Ontario Hydro where he obtained a position as control technician with the nuclear division at the Bruce Heavy Water Plant.

The family lived in Kincardine for about one year then purchased a lot in Lorne Beach. Bill put on his drafting hat and designed an unconventional house for them. Bill and Ann did a lot of the work on the house, and they were able to move into the house August 1973 before it was completely finished.

For the last ten years of his tenure at Ontario Hydro, Bill held the position of shift maintenance supervisor. When he retired in 1998, Bill had been at Ontario Hydro for 29 years. He always liked to say that he was there as the heavy water towers were being built, and he turned the lights off as he went out the door when the towers were coming down.

Bill had enjoyed his time at the Bruce and now moved into the retirement phase of his life's adventure. He had numerous interests to keep him busy, projects such as restoring an old Willys Jeepster he'd had as a teenager, which he sold to a Shriner from London. Next was an old bulldozer he restored with help from father-in-law Harry Rossiter. There was also the old homestead farm at Uno Park, outside of New Liskeard. He also did many projects for his brother, Bob, who now owned the house they'd had such a big hand in building when they were younger. Bill didn't have a great number of friends during his lifetime, however, those he had, had been his friends for decades - some from his high school days, others from his time at certain employers, and others from different periods of his life. Now that he was retired, he had time to spend time with those friends who lived in different parts of Ontario.

During the '80s and '90s Bill joined the Peters Family Hunt Camp and spent some good times with his brother and cousins, hunting (he never shot anything), canoeing and sitting around swapping tall tales of their adventures.

In 2014, it was discovered he had two aneurisms behind his sinus cavities and life changed somewhat for Bill. His enthusiasm for projects was lacking as his energy level decreased and he was unable to do what he had always enjoyed.

By 2021, it was decided that it was time to sell the house in Lorne Beach and move to a smaller home. The couple relocated to Cobourg where they built an addition to Chad and Susan's house.

Through the May 25 agreement, Ontario will provide the Matachewan First Nation with \$590,000 in compensation and 5,027.7 acres of provincial Crown land, which may be added to its reserve.

"This is a very important day for Matachewan First Nation that will

better our community and allow us to prosper and grow," said Chief Batisse.

"The settlement of our treaty land entitlement claim will benefit the community's economic and social development in so many ways."

He added that "the Settlement Agreement honours a treaty

promise, and although there were many significant challenges to work through and many long years of negotiations to reach fair compensation for our treaty land entitlement claim, we are enthusiastic to move forward to complete the addition to reserve process."

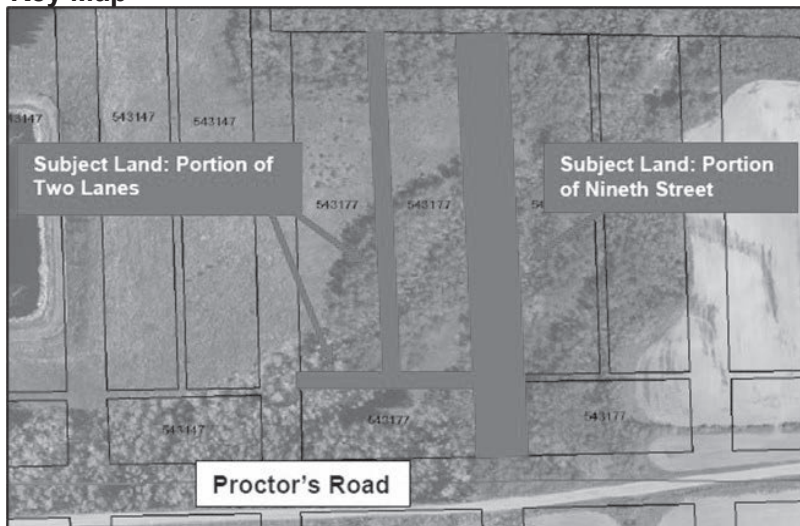

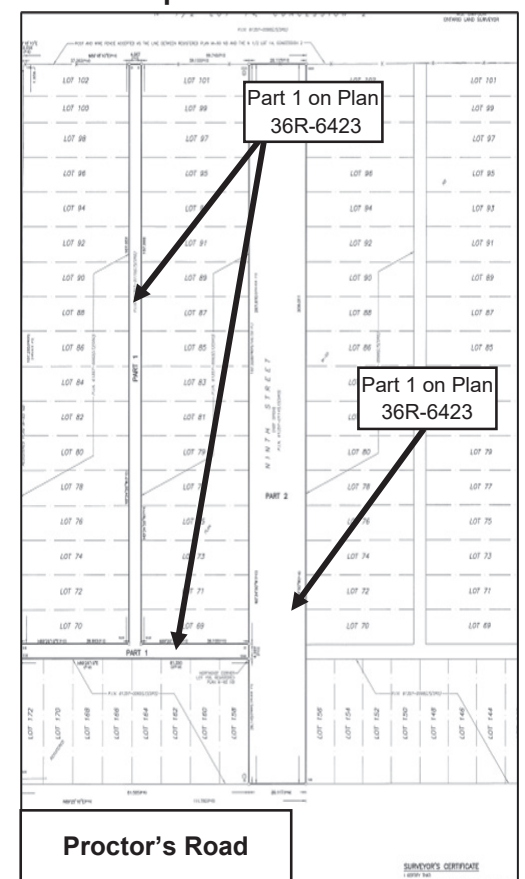

Barbecue Safety

Grilled to Perfection Every Time!



USE BBQS OUTDOORS ONLY! They produce **carbon monoxide**, a poisonous gas that can lead to unconsciousness and even death. Never use or store propane cylinders inside any structure, including garages.

Take these steps when starting a BBQ:

- Open the hood.
- Turn on the gas release valve on the tank.
- Turn on the grill controls or heat settings.
- Take a step back.
- Push the igniter button.
- If there is no igniter button, insert a long match or BBQ lighter through the side burner hole first, then turn on the heat control knob.
- If the burner does not ignite right away, turn the gas off and wait five minutes, keeping the hood open, before repeating the procedure.

At the start of the BBQ season, do this THREE-STEP SAFETY CHECK of your BBQ:

- 1 CLEAN** Use a pipe cleaner or wire to ensure burner ports are free of rust, dirt, spider webs or other debris.
- 2 CHECK** Examine the hose leading from the tank to the burners. Replace it if cracked or damaged.
- 3 TEST** Find leaks by applying a 50/50 solution of water and dish soap to propane cylinder connections and hoses. If bubbles appear, tighten the connection and/or replace the damaged parts and retest.

Stay Fire Safe!

Never leave the BBQ unattended when in use.

Make sure grease does not build up on the burners or at the base of the BBQ. This could cause a grease fire.

Never throw water on a grease fire – this will only spread the flame.

DO NOT place the BBQ close to wooden fences or walls, vinyl siding, or anything that can burn. The area behind your BBQ must be free of anything that can ignite – this is where hot gases escape.

Keep loose clothing away from a hot BBQ.

Keep children and pets at least one metre (three feet) away from a hot BBQ.

When finished barbecuing, turn the gas valve off first, then turn off the burner controls so no gas is left in the connecting hose.

Allow the BBQ to cool completely before closing the cover.

If you live in an apartment or condo building, check with the building owner or property manager, or the Condominium Act of your building, regarding the use of BBQs on your building's balconies.

Campaign aims to not drift away

GUELPH (Special) – Sometimes drift happens.

Drift is the unintentional drift of pesticides through the air away from their intended target. It can affect crop yields and quality, raise costs, and negatively impact neighbours' fields and residences, livestock, pollinators and sensitive natural habitats.

But there are steps that growers can take to reduce the risk.

They're outlined in "Be Drift Aware," a new campaign created by the Grain Farmers of Ontario (GFO), Ontario Federation of Agriculture, Ontario Fruit and Vegetable Growers Association, Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs, and CropLife Canada.

"Each of our organizations has shared best practice resources with our grower members over the years, and now we have

pooled that information for easy access in a single location," said Marty Vermeij, GFO senior agronomist, in a news release announcing the campaign.

On the initiative's website, growers can learn how to lower the risk through sprayer settings and nozzle selections, utilizing the best wind conditions to spray, and using buffer strips.

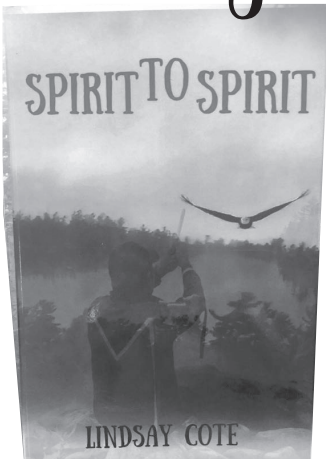

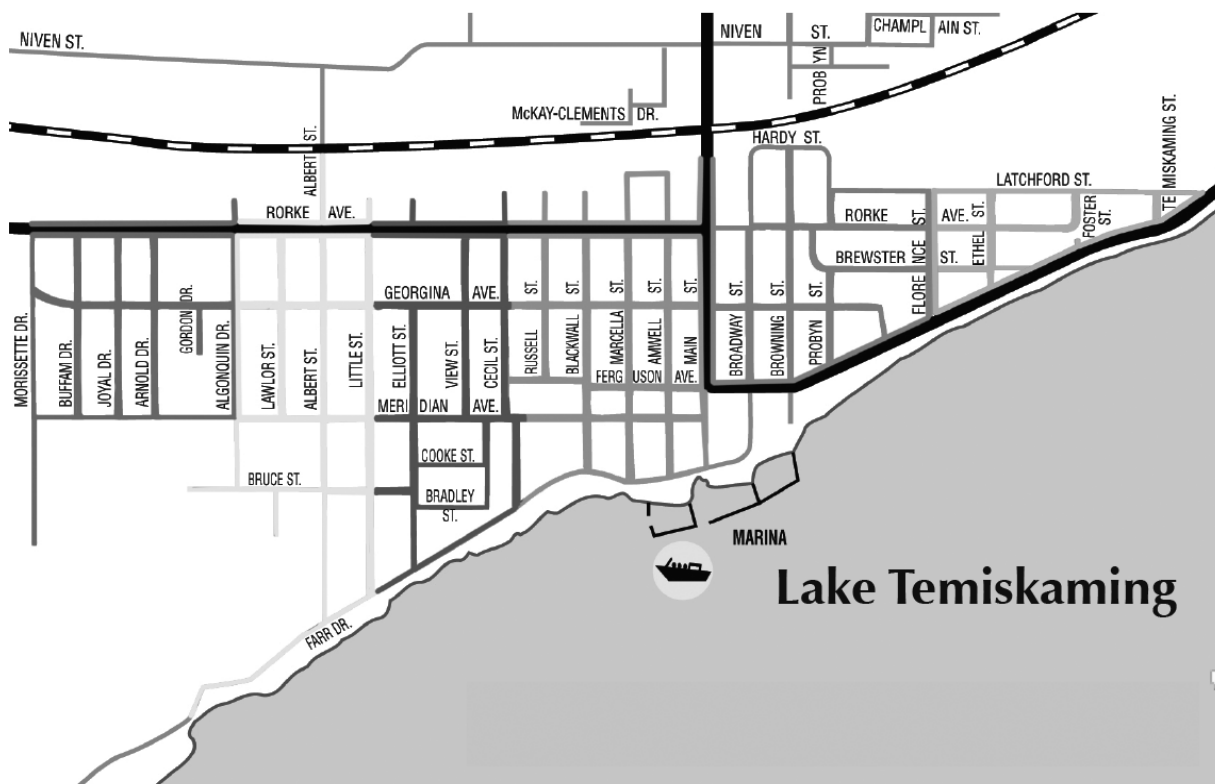
