Here are some of the stories in our July 10 edition...

- Ontario's police oversight agency has found no basis for criminal charges against police officers in a shooting in Coleman Township earlier this year that left one man dead and another injured.
- The news of a tentative sale of Thornloe Cheese and plans for the operation's redevelopment was welcomed.

RockWalk Park branching out

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Haileybury's RockWalk Park is known for...rocks.

The outdoor geological garden at Northern College's Haileybury campus offers walkways lined by almost 200 large samples of ore from across Canada.

But shortly after its opening in 2001, Graham Gambles said there were discussions about adding an arboretum – a botanical garden devoted to trees.

"It puts the 'park' in 'park," said Gambles, who was a founding member of RockWalk Park Inc. and is still

its president.

It ultimately hopes to add 75 trees from some 50 species.

Most will be native to the Haileybury area or be found here, and most are considered suited to plant hardiness zone 3B. (Zones take into account a variety of climate data factors over time, including rainfall, frostfree periods, temperature variations, snow depth and wind.)

About half of the rest will be rated for zone 3.

As for the balance, Gambles said planters want to push the growing envelope by testing the viability of some tree species that are rated for a warmer zone.

"TEST PLOT"

"This is a test plot. It's the only arboretum north of Orillia, with the exception of the one at Sault Ste. Marie, which is associated with Natural Resources Canada."

Gambles said a changing climate, diseases and pests may take their toll on existing native trees.

He pointed to ash trees, which are commonly planted along streets. They're being hit hard by the emerald ash borer, which Gambles said is now as far north as Sault Ste. Marie and North Bay.

He's seeing some local stands of balsam fir, which don't do well in heat, die out. But other species may be

Elder Abuse Awareness

Elder Abuse is one of the most underreported crimes in Canada affecting hundreds of thousands of people every year.

Elder abuse comes in many forms:

- Psychological abuse in the form of threats, insults, or humiliation
- **Financial abuse** in which a trusted individual steals or misuses an elderly person's money, forges their signature, or pressures them to make or change legal documents. An example might be sharing an older person's home without paying a fair share of the expenses when requested.
- Physical abuse such as hitting, pushing, or restraining an elderly person
- Sexual abuse including sexual harassment and non-consensual sexual activity
- **Neglect** of an elderly person who requires care. Seniors most vulnerable to neglect, include those who are socially isolated and those with serious health conditions.

The truth is elder abuse is any action taken by someone in a relationship of trust with an elderly person that causes harm or distress.

People can engage in abusive behaviour without realizing it. Sometimes seemingly innocent or well-meaning actions cross the line. For example, someone might open an older relative's mail to save them stress of bill-paying, but if done without the elderly person's permission, that breach of privacy could be a form of psychological abuse. A caregiver who gives more than the prescribed dosage of medication to keep an elderly patient calm could be engaging in physical abuse.

There is no definitive list of everything elder abuse is and is not. We must be mindful of how elder abuse can take on different forms and be cautious of how our actions could cause harm.

Make sure to listen to your elderly parents, friends, or other family members and take their concerns seriously. If you suspect abuse, report it immediately to health care providers, social services, police, legal professionals and/or members of faith communities.

If you are an elder who is being abused, neglected, or exploited, tell at least one person. Tell your doctor, a friend, or a family member whom you trust. Other people care and can help you.

There is no excuse for abuse! If you or someone you know is experiencing abuse, help is available – call the seniors safety line at 1-866-299-1011 Free to call – 24 hours a day - 7 days a week

Loon preservation



The mother loon, located on the shore of my favourite lake has been patiently sitting on her nest for a month now.

The incubation period for loon eggs is between 28 and 30 days.

The loon eggs should be hatching any day now and a dark brown, fuzzy loon chick will emerge, jump on mom's back and be gone.

I have not been able to determine if she is sitting on one or two eggs.

When the chicks are born they cannot swim so they jump on the mother's back and ride away from the nest, never to return to it.

They ride on mama's back to help regulate their body temperature and for protection from underwater predators.

The first week or two of the baby loon's life is precarious at best.

The likelihood of the baby loon surviving to adulthood is slim and getting slimmer all the time.

Between climate change, predation, lead poisoning, loss of habitat, overcrowding on lakes, pressure from humans and motorboats, the loon chicks have got to have luck on their side to reach the junior stage.

When the loon chick reaches the junior stage its feathers are mature enough to fly away with its parents in October or November when the weather turns cold.

The earlier the hatching of the chicks from the eggs the better as they have that much longer for their feathers to mature.

The later the process the more dangerous it becomes for infant loons to be able to migrate south for the winter.

I will never forget the junior loon I saw covered in ice on Clear Lake, near Cobalt one year in early November.

It was born late in the season.

As far as the loon chicks on area waterways, it is vitally important that boaters be aware of the loon families and the baby chicks.

The wake from motor boats and sea doo's can and does swamp the chicks and they will drown.

The loon parents will not dive when protecting chicks and the chicks can't dive out of the way of oncoming boats.

I don't think there has been a successful hatching of a loon chick on the lake in quite a while, perhaps well over 10 years.

Why do I care about loons anyway?

Loons don't write columns about their lives, but that does not mean they don't feel the pain of losing a baby chick.

I believe they feel and that is the purpose of which all consciousness sits.

May we always have respect for the loons as their world is our world, there is only one world.

Let us view all living things with the deepest respect.

That beautiful loon call is a symbol of our northern spirit.

The summer students are also planning a scavenger hunt called "Journey of the Artifacts".

A yard sale on the museum grounds is also being planned for August 10.

Johnston says visitors to the museum will be able to see a small replica of the first airplane used by Laurentide Air Services for the first Haileybury to Rouyn flight which took place September 11, 1924.

Johnston related that the Laurentide Air Services flew a Curtiss HS-2L flying boat with a wingspan of 74 feet, powered by a single 400 horsepower Liberty engine, piloted by Haileybury resident Byron Broatch.

Previously the flight had been attempted from Angliers, Quebec to Rouyn, but obstructions and shoals on the Angliers waterfront made it too difficult.

Lalande-Belanger, who is pursuing a post-secondary edcuation in Fine Arts, and Malette, who is studying history and communications at Cambrian College and Laurentian University, will be combining their skills this summer to create murals and events for visitors.

better suited to changing conditions.

A goal of the arboretum is to offer alternatives to municipalities and home gardeners - some of whom have not yet been born – as they consider landscaping, he said.

Among the new trees is a ginkgo biloba, or maidenhair tree.

Gambles considers it the most exotic of the arboretum's species. It's native to China but has been grown in Canada for a number of years. It's rated for a warmer hardiness zone. But if it identify the trees, as they do thrives, he said it offers potential as a street tree.

He said the arboretum can also be a teaching venue for students from elementary grades on up.

And while most arboretums are typically developed in open fields, he said the project will Haileybury incorporate a gully that's remained untouched as the town developed.

He said the arboretum will also focus on what's known as the understorey, smaller plants such as pin cherries, chokecherries and saskatoons that grow under

the tree canopy.

The arboretum has received \$18,000 from the Chawkers Foundation, which supports projects in environmental research and protection, education and also long-form journalism.

(Gambles said the foundation earlier had provided a \$5,000 grant to install new signage at the RockWalk Park, largely at a collection of distinctive samples re-established as the Queen's Courtyard in honour of Queen Elizabeth Il's platinum jubilee.)

Conventional signs will the rocks. But like the ore samples, they will also include QR codes, allowing visitors to use their smartphones to access more information.

Some of the trees will be dedicated to past instructors at the Haileybury campus.

Organizers are also seeking donors "to adopt these trees," he said.

SUPPORT

Gambles noted that Northern College is assuming maintenance of the park from the municipality.

"Our many thanks to the local taxpayers for supporting this project over its initial 25 years," he said.

He said the board is seeking people who are interested in trees, gardening and climate change. He said it would also like to have some bilingual

expertise to provide info in both English and French.

The board is also looking for social media assistance as it prepares to launch a tree adoption program.

Anyone interested in the project is asked to contact Doug Clark, the board's secretary and dean of sciences at Northern's Haileybury campus.






