In with the old, out of storage for Claybelt artifacts

TEMISKAMING SHORES – Before this summer is over, history buffs may be able to see some artifacts that the Little Claybelt Homesteaders Museum hasn't been able to display.

Work has begun on a new 630-square-foot building that will house larger pieces of equipment, some more than a century old, now in storage. At the same time, the building will shield the wooden artifacts from the elements.

"Right now, nobody can see them," said Elizabeth Pahkala, the museum's secretary-treasurer.

"It also frees up storage space in the museum, because we're just full up."

Among the pieces that will

be housed in the new building is a wooden seed drill donated by the Peters family of Dymond Township.

It had belonged to William Thomas Peters, whose family settled in Uno Park in 1892, said John Peters, his great-grandson and a member of the museum board.

"When I was a kid, it was stored up in the rafters of a building that we used to use as a play area," he recalled.

He's never seen it properly displayed, and hopes it will be of interest to museum visitors.

The budget for the project is \$75,000.

The museum itself is contributing \$40,000, and had set a fundraising target of \$35,000.

That fundraising now stands at \$31,000, and was recently boosted by a \$10,000 donation

from Caisse Desjardins Ontario.

The museum had applied for \$2,500, and to learn that it had been awarded \$10,000 came as "such a big surprise," said Pahkala.

EXHIBITS

The museum is dedicated to preserving the history of the southern Little Claybelt, and focuses on the period of settlement between the 1880s and 1950s.

It offers a series of exhibits that change every two to three years.

Two existing exhibits are continuing this summer. One is dedicated to the area's hardware stores, and the other offers a sample of antiques collected by the late Vic Heroux.

Two galleries that had been devoted to the Temiskaming

Hot Weather Safety for Physical Activity

Hotter weather has arrived in most parts of Canada. We look forward to this time of year, but too much heat is not good for anyone. It can be riskier as we get older. When we are active, our muscles produce heat. This causes a rise in body temperature.

Our bodies do two things to manage the increase in body heat:

- Our heart rate increases to help deliver blood to the surface of the skin for heat release
- We start to sweat, which helps with cooling

Both of these functions are reduced as we get older. That raises the risk of heat-related illness when we are physically active in the heat, either outdoors or in hot conditions indoors.

Heat-related illness includes cramps, dizziness, edema (water retention and swelling) and exhaustion. There is also a more severe condition known as heat stroke.

Should we stop being active when it gets hot?

Older Canadians do tend to be less active when the weather gets hot and humid. But it is important to stay physically active all year round. In fact, older adults who are more physically fit can adapt better during exercise in the heat.

Hot weather tips

- Older adults should not participate in strenuous physical activities in hot/humid conditions outdoors, especially if they are not used to the conditions or are not used to being physically active.
- Take it easier when you exercise and be active during the cooler times of the day -- early morning or late evening, if you are not able to be active in an air-conditioned environment.
- Wear loose fitting, lightweight, moisture-wicking clothing. Cotton clothing can be cooler.
- Stay hydrated. As we get older, we do not notice thirst as much. That increases the risk for dehydration. Don't wait until you feel thirsty. Drink lots of fluids, especially during exercise.

If you are taking medication or have a health condition, ask your doctor or pharmacist if it increases your health risk in the heat and follow their recommendations.

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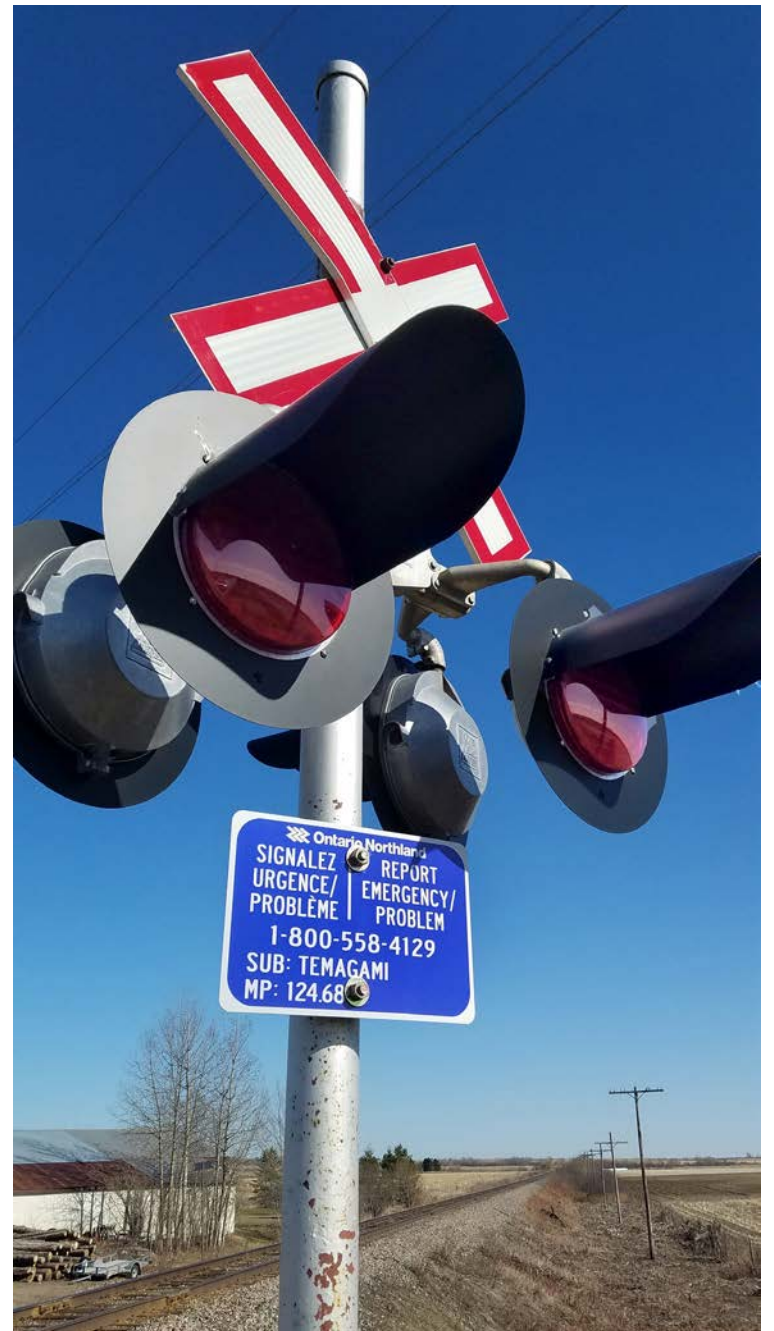

Safety training on track

WINNIPEG – With nearly 45,000 kilometres of active railway tracks and roughly 40,000 crossings, many Canadians encounter trains daily.

That's especially true in rural areas.

"In 2022 there were 232 incidents between trains and vehicles or people in Canada that resulted in 66 fatalities and 43 serious injuries," says CN Police Constable Michael Reid.

"Many of these incidents occurred in close proximity to the victim's residence and each one may have been preventable."

Given their size, trains can appear to be farther away and travelling much slower than they actually are.

But don't be fooled.

The average freight train travels at speeds up to 100 km/h and can weigh tens of thousands of tonnes. It can take the length of 18 football fields for it to come to a stop.

Farm machinery may be larger than most other vehicles, but they're still no match for trains.

And with most farm crossings being passive – having no warning lights, bells, or gates – it's essential to take extra care to ensure safety.

SAFE CROSSINGS

- When approaching a crossing, always open cab windows, turn off radios and fans, remove headsets, and listen for oncoming trains.

- Look in both directions and around obstructions like mirrors and windshield pillars.

- Winter conditions can be particularly hazardous and require extra care because snow can muffle the sound of approaching trains and ice can cause your machinery to slide into crossings.

- If it's safe to cross, ensure your machinery is properly lined up with the railway crossing. Having the wheels

cross tracks at a 90-degree angle will prevent heavily loaded equipment from tipping over.

- Check that there is enough room on the other side of the tracks to fully clear the crossing without stopping, and that the back of your equipment won't be within five metres of the tracks if you have to stop on the other side.

- Not all farm machinery can easily cross railway tracks. Low-slung equipment, for example, can get caught in the tracks.

- When using new farm machinery for the first time,

especially if it's particularly wide or heavy, ensure it can cross tracks quickly and safely. Don't hesitate to contact the railway for help regarding any non-standard machinery.

- If you're towing equipment, it's crucial to prevent it from becoming unhitched when going over farm crossings, so always secure hitch pins with a pin key.

If you do get stuck or stall on train tracks, get out of the machinery immediately. Move at least 30 metres away to avoid being struck by debris if your vehicle is hit by a train.

Once you're safely away

from the machinery, contact the railway company to let them know a vehicle is on the tracks.

Railway companies post their emergency numbers on a blue sign under the crossbuck (the traffic sign used to indicate a railway crossing) or near the crossing. The number may also be posted on a nearby signal house.

This is the first number to call if your machinery becomes stuck or stalls on the tracks, because it's the only way to stop approaching trains.

If you can't locate the emergency number, call 911.

Avoiding rollovers and runovers

OTTAWA (Special) – Looking at the raw data, the Canada Safety Council says the agricultural industry is among the most hazardous in Canada.

In a news release, the council said farming as a profession and a calling offers a unique look at risk – rather than being something to avoid, it's an attitude and culture which is baked into the job and an accepted fact of life.

It's seeking to remind Canadians in the industry that some risks are not worth taking.

"Success isn't about avoiding risks; it's about making informed, intentional decisions on the types of risks worth

taking," said Gareth Jones, the council's president and CEO.

The council cites a 2023 report by Canadian Agricultural Injury Reporting that found the country averaged 91 agriculture-related fatalities every year between 1990 and 2020.

The council notes that the fatality rate begins declining somewhat from 2006 onward – 70 fatalities per year, down from 110 in the previous 16-year period.

It is worth noting, it said, that more than half of the farms in Canada in 1990 are no longer in operation, leading to 571,033 fewer people on farms.

The most common causes

of fatal injuries on the farm are machine-related, and account for two-thirds of deaths.

Almost 30 per cent of these fatalities are due to machine rollovers, when heavy equipment tips onto its side or roof, and runovers, when a machine in operation or rolling on an incline runs over the victim.

Rollovers

Most rollover fatalities in Canada involve tractors.

While many rollovers lack documentation to determine the direction in which the vehicle rolled, almost half of known rollover fatalities occurred when the machine rolled on its side.

To prevent rollovers:

- Avoid riding too close to edges that steeply drop off.

- When travelling on an incline, use the shallowest slope available. Follow the vehicle manufacturer's recommendation on what constitutes an acceptable slope and avoid travelling on a diagonal.

- Install a roll-over protection structure on your tractor that is designed to create a protective zone around the operator in case of a rollover.

Runovers

- Runovers occur most frequently when unmanned vehicles are left running or unblocked on a slope.

- Bystanders can be runover victims because the operator does not expect them to be in the area. Operators can also fall off the machine and fall under the wheels.

- Bystander fatalities tend to disproportionately include children between one and four years of age. Supervise children closely, keeping them away from the farmyard when machinery is in operation.

- Never stand in the direct path of a running tractor, even if it isn't in motion.

- Always block off machines that are not currently in use to eliminate the risk of them rolling of their own accord.

New Liskeard Landfill Site Tipping Fees | New Tipping Fee Schedule

A revenue analysis of the current Tipping Fee Schedule for the New Liskeard Landfill was recently presented to Council. To ensure revenue is consistent with the former Haileybury Landfill, Council approved a staged increase to certain categories.

The first increase will come into effect on **August 1, 2024** with the second increase to come into effect on **January 1, 2025**. Please view the below New Liskeard Landfill Site Tipping Fee Schedule.

Personal Floatation Devices

Puddle jumpers are not permitted at the Haileybury Beach as it is classified as an "open environment" (wind, environmental factors) meaning that child can become more easily swept away from the parent.

This means that all lifejackets must be Transportation Canada approved so that the child swept away will be turned face-up in the "safety position". This also prevents the child from any secondary drowning complications that could occur.

Puddle Jumpers are currently allowed at the pool as it is classified as a "closed environment" (no wind or outside factors). Additionally, lifeguards have extremely quick and close access to swimmers in emergency situations.

Although we allow puddle jumpers at the pool, they are not recommended as they reinforce an improper body position when swimming. The puddle jumper teaches the child to swim in an upright (vertical) position which is also known as the "drowning position" A high percentage of children when they remove their puddle jumper or have a water related accident without it, begin to drown almost instantly as they do not learn how to properly position their body. Lifejackets reinforce the proper emergency stance, and additionally teach the child to form the proper muscle groups and body position required to swim on their front. There is nothing but benefits when it comes to lifejackets!

When using Noodles at the pool or beach they are not classified as Personal Floatation Devices, as they do not prevent drowning. Noodles are only toys for the water within the Swim Admission Policy.

Drowning Prevention Fridays!

Every Friday for the month of July, head down to the Haileybury Beach or Pool and Fitness Centre for some Drowning Prevention games and activities run by the lifeguards. Stop by the guard office to see what activities we have available!

and Northern Ontario Railway and the Ontario Northland Railway have been consolidated into one.

New this year is the recreation of a living room/sitting room typical of the early 1900s.

The museum is open Tuesdays through Saturdays, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

RELIC SHOWCASE

And if you can't make it to the museum – or you want to see some interesting things in some local personal collections – check out the muse-

um's Relic Showcase.

It's an online display featuring photographs and brief descriptions of items submitted by local residents.

It's the brainchild of Morgan Bosak, the museum's office assistant for the summer.

The site enables people to share interesting items they own, without lending or donating them to the museum.

It also allows people who can't physically access the museum, due to distance or other challenges, "to be able to have some sort of museum experience without actually

being here," Bosak said.

More than 15 artifacts have been posted in the showcase's first week. They range from an antique hand-operated turnip peeler to a perfume bottle from the 1920s to an original Nintendo NES console released in 1983.

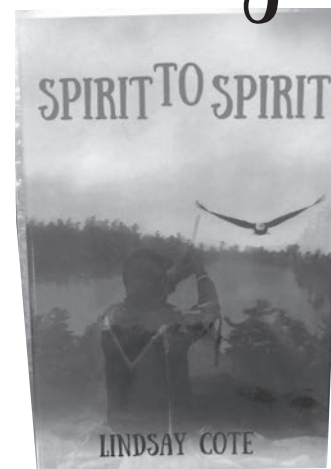

Five things to know about Ontario fruits and vegetables

(NC) - Ontario is Canada's garden – home to more than 125 different fruit and vegetable crops grown in fields, orchards

and greenhouses across the province.

1. Ontario-grown produce includes many long-time fa-

vourites, from apples, peaches, pears, blueberries, strawberries and grapes to carrots, peppers, onions, lettuce, po-

tatoes, asparagus, cabbage, cucumbers and tomatoes. Ontario farmers also grow ginseng, cranberries, garlic, cauliflower, cherries, apricots, hazelnuts, haskap berries and many more. Foodland Ontario's online availability guide (ontario.ca/foodland/page/availability-guide) will show you what's in season.

2. Ontario is Canada's vegetable king. We are home to almost 70 per cent of Canada's greenhouse vegetable production and we are the national leader in growing field vegetables – those grown outdoors instead of in greenhouses.

Did you know Ontario has the most vegetable greenhouses in Canada, covering almost 1,250 hectares (3,100 acres) or about the equivalent size of nearly 8,000 hockey rinks?

3. New fruit and vegetable varieties are being developed especially for the Canadian climate. Radiance is a new sweet potato that is ready for harvest earlier in the fall and can tolerate cooler temperatures than traditional varieties from the United States. Cold snap is a winter-hardy and tasty new pear variety developed by tree fruit breeders at Agriculture and Agri-Food Canada.

4. Wine is a perennial local favourite in Ontario. The province's established wine regions in Niagara, Lake Erie's North Shore and Prince Edward County produce a wide variety of delectable and award-winning wines. Growers and wine makers are also experimenting with vineyards on the shores of Lake Huron, in Norfolk

County and from Southern Georgian Bay across to the Ottawa Valley.

5. Migrant farm workers play essential roles in helping Ontario farmers grow, manage and harvest their fresh produce crops every year. There is a chronic labour shortage in agriculture, making it hard to hire local workers, and growing fruits and vegetables is very labour-intensive. That's because many crops bruise or damage easily, so they need to be planted, harvested and cared for by hand.

Of the more than 17,000 farm workers who work in Ontario every year through the Seasonal Agricultural Worker Program, many have been coming here for decades and often stay on the same farm for years, where their knowledge and experience make them a valuable part of the farm team.

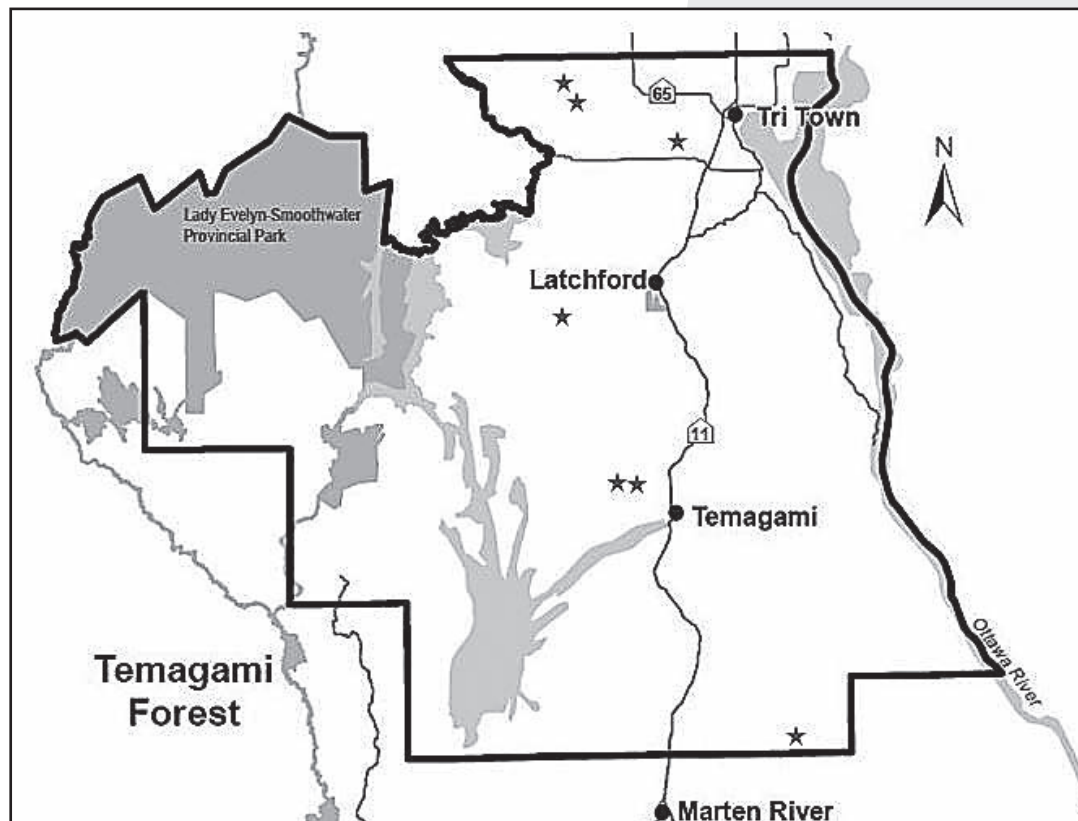
"We started with the farm worker program in 1979 and we presently have 60 Jamaican workers helping us. We consider these workers our family. There would be very little horticulture in Ontario without this program," says John Ardiel, a Georgian Bay-area apple grower.

"I'm always amazed at how the workers speak of the program and its importance to their families. They are really proud of what they have been able to do for their kids, and that makes them proud of themselves – and we're proud of them too."

Way paved for first phase of industrial park road rehab

TEMISKAMING SHORES – The first stretch of road in the Dymond Industrial Park will be paved this year.

The first phase of the multi-year project will see asphalt applied to 500 metres of Hawn Drive, from the intersection with Rockley Road to Mik Mak Fabrication. It will include the entrances to 13 businesses.

When the industrial park was envisioned, the city committed to paving when lot sales hit a certain threshold, explained Temiskaming Shores Mayor Jeff Laferriere.

The park has grown, said Laferriere in an interview after council approved the contract June 18.

"Now's the time. We're going to do it in three phases," he said.

He said the move has garnered a lot of positive feedback from building owners in the industrial park.

From the city's perspective, he said it'll reduce the time spent maintaining the park's gravel roads and free up staff for other work.

"With limited resources, you get to the jobs as time permits, and this will allow folks to get to some of the other projects sooner."

In a report to council at its June 4 committee-of-the-whole meeting, transportation manager Mitch McCrank said the existing gravel road system can handle the traffic.

But it also poses, he said,

"a never-ending maintenance concern."

Maintenance currently includes the application of dust suppressant at least four times a year, as well as weekly grading and repairs of washouts three or four times each summer.

Ditches must be cleaned out every couple of years, and additional gravel is needed to repair deep potholes.

Council awarded the road rehabilitation project on June 18 to Miller Paving, which was the only bidder. Its bid of \$700,730 was within the 2024 budget.

McCrank noted that the cost will be covered by federal gas tax money and the city's economic development reserve.

The road project's second phase would cover about 900 metres and 16 business entrances along the Brazeau Boulevard loop.

A third phase would cover the rest of Hawn Drive, from Mik Mak to Highway 11 at Radley Hill Road, a distance of 1.1 kilometres.

"Phases could likely be coordinated over the years as property sells," McCrank said.

"This would show Council's commitment to future development and potentially further enticing business to set up shop here in the City," he wrote.

He noted that other industrial parks in the region – in Kirkland Lake, Huntsville, Gravenhurst, Bracebridge, North Bay and Timmins – offer asphalt roads.

Haileybury's park has surface-treated roads with gravel sections.

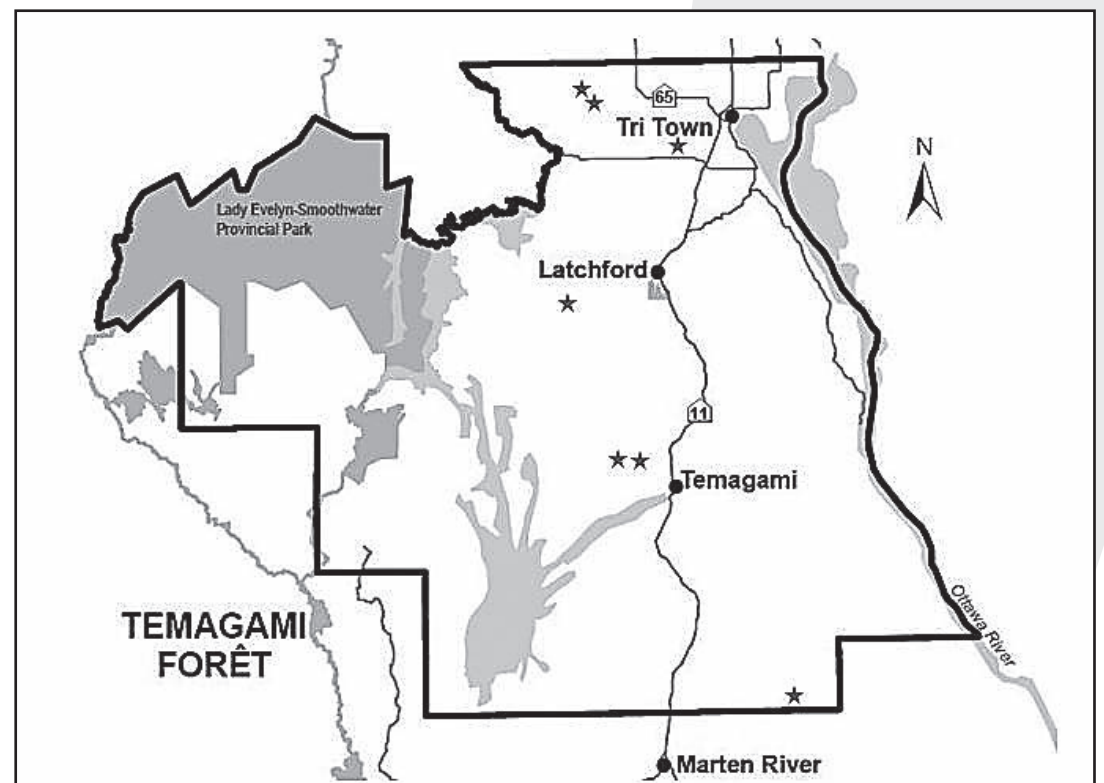
Phase one of the road reha-
