CHAMBERLAIN TOWNSHIP - The Chamberlain Township recreation committee decided to make the most out of the new kitchen at the township hall July 25.

Dietician Jasmine Connelly of the Englehart Family Health Team was invited as a guest to speak to a group of people who gathered there.

Chamberlain Councillor Tracey Giesen, also a member of the recreation committee, brought some locally grown produce and homemade bread.

A range of topics were discussed, centring around good options for healthy diets.

Connelly outlined general healthy eating advice, and strongly endorsed favouring a Mediterranean diet.

"I recommend it for most people," she said.

The diet is not just about food but also about lifestyle, she explained, and about sitting and taking the time to actually enjoy meals.

"Here in North America we are rushed in eating."

A Mediterranean diet has been shown to lower the risk of heart disease, lowers blood pressure, cholesterol and blood sugar, she said.

"It's one of my go-tos for most things. It has lots of plant-based eating, and lots of those fruits and vegetables."

She recommended people try to have a little more grains and fibre in their diet.

Connelly also pointed to the glycemic index, and said that in most cases she recommends people choose from the lower to medium lists, even if they don't have diabetes. Legumes are good sources of fibre, good sources of protein, and low in fat, she continued. Canned or dried, they're also good in terms of the budget, she said.

PLATE METHOD

The plate method is also good for most people, said Connelly. It features a plate

half filled with a rainbow of vegetables and fruits, one quarter filled with protein foods, and the other quarter of the plate is filled with whole grain foods.

Water is the drink of choice. She encouraged people to make their own bread "which is wonderful." She added that "it's important to have enough starch in your diet," as well as enough protein, which she said is really important.

Having enough calcium helps to build bones and teeth and prevent osteoporosis, she noted. Getting enough Vitamin D, and watching out for high-sodium foods, is also key.

"I find that balance is important," she told the group.

She encouraged people to watch for foods high

in sugar, salt and fat, and to eat them only in moderation. She also urged people to look at food labels.

Small changes are good, she said.

Should you get the Pneumococcal Vaccine?

What causes Pneumonia?

There are two main kinds of pneumonia, one caused by viruses and the other caused by bacteria. One type of bacteria is called *Streptococcus pneumoniae* (or pneumococcus). When these bacteria invade the lungs, they cause bacterial pneumonia. Most cases of bacterial pneumonia are caused by pneumococcus.

Why is Pneumococcal Vaccine important?

Pneumococcal vaccine can prevent pneumonia and other infections caused by 23 types of the *Streptococcus pneumoniae* bacteria. The vaccine protects about 50 to 80 per cent of people against pneumococcal infection. Vaccination also makes the disease milder for those who may catch it.

Who Should Get the Vaccine?

Anyone 65 years of age and older, as well as adults and children two years and older who have the following high-risk medical conditions

- Cancer
- Chronic heart, liver or kidney disease
- Chronic lung disease
- Nephrotic (relating to the kidneys) syndrome
- Cirrhosis of the liver
- Alcoholism
- Diabetes
- HIV infection and AIDS
- No spleen or a spleen that does not work properly
- Sickle cell disease
- Now also recommended for asthma

When should the Pneumococcal Vaccine be given?

The vaccine is offered routinely for adults at 65 years of age, but you should be vaccinated sooner if you have a high-risk medical condition (see above). An additional dose is recommended 5 years after the first dose if you have any of following medical conditions:

- Asplenia or sickle cell disease
- Hepatic cirrhosis
- Chronic renal failure or nephrotic syndrome
- HIV
- Immunosuppression related to disease or therapy

After you get any immunization, make sure your primary care provider updates your personal immunization record.

The first gold medal performance of the 2024 Paris Olympics might not have been because of an athletic achievement.

Emergency situations Call 911 or your local police if a bear poses an immediate threat to personal safety and exhibits threatening or aggressive behaviour, such as:

- enters a school yard when school is in session
- stalks people and lingers at the site
- enters or tries to enter a residence
- wanders into a public gathering
- kills livestock/pets and lingers at the site

Non-emergency encounters Call the toll-free Bear Wise reporting line at 1-866-514-2327 or TTY 705-945-7641 if a bear:

- roams around or checks garbage cans
- breaks into a shed where garbage is stored
- is in a tree
- pulls down a bird feeder or knocks over a barbecue
- moves through a backyard or field but does not linger

Questions to ask on retirement products

expectancy increase each year, those who are retired or are planning for retirement might wonder if they'll have enough money to comfortably live out their lives.

Regulatory Authority of Ontario (FSRA) commissioned poll suggested that 81 per cent of respondents were more concerned about paying for necessities than saving for retirement and 44 per cent

said the high cost of living was a barrier to retirement savings.

Withdrawing savings during retirement is called "decumulation." As Ontario's financial services regulator, we have noticed a growing number of "decumulation" products on the market designed to help consumers find ways to live on their savings, without outliving them. These products work by pooling funds from many people to achieve investment and longevity benefits for those participating.

Some decumulation products are promoted as providing a lifetime of guaranteed income, similar to a pension. Promotion of these products may describe them as pension plans or use terms associated with insurance, such as "annuity" or "tontine." When you are looking to purchase these products, be sure to read more than the marketing material, and ask questions, to really understand what you are buying.

Some questions you should consider asking before investing in a decumulation product:

- What guarantees are offered? Some products appear to offer payments for life, but the fund manager may have discretion to change or stop the payments anytime.
- What protections apply? Some decumu-

lation products are investments or mutual funds, which are regulated under securities law by the Ontario Securities Commission. They are not the same as insurance or pension plans, and offer different protections than products regulated by FSRA.

- Are there additional costs? Some investments require a consumer to pay fees from funds outside the investment.

As with any financial product, it's important to proceed with caution and evaluate all available information to make an informed decision. It can be beneficial to speak with a financial planner/advisor, life insurance agent, or securities advisor about whether a decumulation product is right for you.

At FSRA, consumer protection is our priority. Visit our website to learn more about decumulation products and some additional questions you might want to ask before signing on the dotted line.

Evaluate all your options before making the decision to decumulate your savings. Take the time to understand your needs and situation before committing to any financial product. Your future depends on it.

Public Education

RVs, Trailers and Campers: Propane and Barbecue Safety Tips

When Transporting Cylinders:

- Ensure propane cylinders are upright and secure during transport.
- Keep cylinder valves closed and protected during transport.
- Plug or cap cylinder outlets during transport.

When Using Cylinders:

- Ensure cylinders are upright and secure on a firm footing.
- Check cylinder connections and hoses for leaks by brushing a 50/50 mix of liquid soap and water onto all connections and hoses. Rising bubbles when you turn on the valve indicate a leak. Tighten connections or repair the hose until there are no bubbles.
- Keep cylinders away from flame, heat, and exits.

Using Propane in your RV or Camper:

- Keep all combustion exhaust vents on the exterior wall of your RV or camper clear of obstructions.
- Use stovetop burners or ovens only for cooking and not as a source of heat.
- Propane appliances require an adequate supply of fresh air for proper combustion. Ensure your RV or camper is properly ventilated to prevent build-up of carbon monoxide.
- Install a carbon monoxide alarm and propane leak detector.

Barbecue Safety:

- Ensure barbecues are on firm, level footing.
- Keep barbecues well away from the side of your RV, camper or tent, and other combustibles.
- Make sure igniter buttons work properly before turning the gas on. If there is no igniter, insert a long match or barbecue lighter through the side burner hole before you turn on the grill controls.
- Keep barbecues clean of grease to prevent flare-ups.
- Stay by the grill when cooking and keep kids and pets at a safe distance.
- Turn off all burner controls and tank valves after each use.

How to take on extreme heat

DISTRICT (Special) - Did you know that when the outside air temperature is 23 C, the temperature inside a vehicle can reach over 50 C?

Many places in Canada have a high number of extreme heat events or heat waves. Extreme heat can put your health at risk, causing illnesses like heat stroke and even death. It is important to take precautions to protect your health and the health of your family and loved ones, says Health Canada, Ontario Re-

gion.

What are the signs and symptoms of heat illness?

- Heat exhaustion can cause skin rash, muscle cramps, dizziness or fainting, nausea or vomiting, heavy sweating, headaches, extreme thirst, dark urine and decreased urination. If you experience any of these symptoms during extreme heat, immediately move to a cool place and drink water preferably.

- Heat Stroke is manifested by a high body temperature,

confusion and lack of coordination, dizziness or fainting, no sweating, but very hot, red skin. Heat stroke is a medical emergency! Call 911 or your local emergency number immediately.

While extreme heat can put everyone at risk from heat illnesses, health risks are greatest for the elderly, infants and young children, people with chronic illnesses (like breathing problems, mental illness and heart problems), people who work or exercise in the

heat, homeless people and people with low-incomes.

During extreme heat, the most important thing is to keep cool and hydrated. Remember that you should never leave people or pets inside a parked vehicle or in direct sunlight.

STAY HYDRATED

Drink plenty of liquids (especially water) before you feel thirsty to decrease your risk of dehydration (not having enough fluids in your body). You may be dehydrated even

if you are not thirsty. Stay hydrated.

- If you eat less, you may need to drink more water.

- Drink water before, during and after physical activity.

- Remind yourself to drink water by leaving a glass by the sink.

- Eat more fruits and vegetables as they have a high water content.

- Flavouring water with natural fruit juice may make it more appealing.

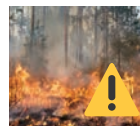

THE ONTARIO HERITAGE ACT NOTICE OF AN APPLICATION TO REMOVE A HERITAGE DESIGNATION COBALT UNITED CHURCH MANSE, 34 COBALT STREET

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Council of the Town of Cobalt received an application on June 19, 2024 to repeal By-Law 79-9 under Section 32 of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1990, as amended.

PURPOSE AND EFFECT

By-Law 79-9, was enacted by the Corporation of the Town of Cobalt on May 14, 1979, designating the property known as the Cobalt Unit Church Manse at 34 Cobalt Street, Cobalt as being of architectural value or interest pursuant to Section 29 of the Ontario Heritage Act, 1974. The reason for designation, as stated in the By-Law, is as follows: "The Presbyterian Manse is recommended for designation for architectural reasons. Constructed in 1907 by the Presbyterian congregation for their minister, J.D. Byrens, it is one of the most handsome of those very few original residences that have survived in Cobalt. The Manse is designed in an angular variation of the Queen Anne style, as characterized by the somewhat irregular plan, cross gable roof, shingled gables, diamond paned windows, peaked dormer, second floor bay window, first floor inset corner bay, and spacious wooden verandah and the gallery with the many sticklike balusters. It appears to be the only example of this style in the Town of Cobalt and has survived with almost no alterations."

Notice of objections may be served to the Clerk within 30 days after the date of publication **Deadline to file an objection on this file is Friday, August 23, 2024 at 4pm.**

Cleaning up farm plastics

ETOBICOKE (Special/Staff) – Canadian farmers are taking steps to recycle and safely dispose of agricultural plastics, says an industry stewardship organization.

Cleanfarms says its waste management programs have become part of the year-round routine for many farmers, and they're growing in popularity.

In Quebec, the program is known as AgriRÉCUP. It recently added more types of plastic bags – for feed, peat moss and animal bedding – as well as maple syrup tubing to the list of materials it accepts.

In PEI, a new program for fertilizer bags has been introduced.

"We're thrilled to have seen so much expansion in our programs last year," said Cleanfarms executive director Barry Friesen in a recent media release.

The Tem Ag Centre, a Co-op Régionale location on Development Road in Harley, is a Cleanfarms collection depot.

Producers can drop off seed and pesticide bags, large totes, plastic containers up to 23 litres in size, as well as other totes and drums.

Further south, a Co-op Régionale location in Verner is also a drop-off point.

Cleanfarms' most used and longest running program collects pesticide and fertilizer containers up to 23 litres in size, and pegs the recovery rate at 77 per cent.

The plastic is recycled into new products, many of which will be used on farms, such as flexible drainage pipe, fence posts and composite dimensional lumber

used in industrial construction.

In Western Canada, about 66 per cent of grain bags are recovered and recycled into such products as plastic bags, sheeting, and composite dimensional lumber.

Cleanfarms sees the potential to collect more materials.

"We're excited to see new growth that will result from the coming year as we continue to collaborate with all levels of the Canadian ag sector and municipal bodies," Friesen said.

"Our collaborators make operating and developing new programs possible, and together, we will strive toward our shared vision of zero ag waste in landfills."

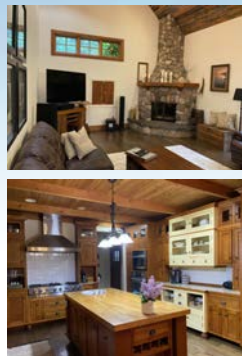

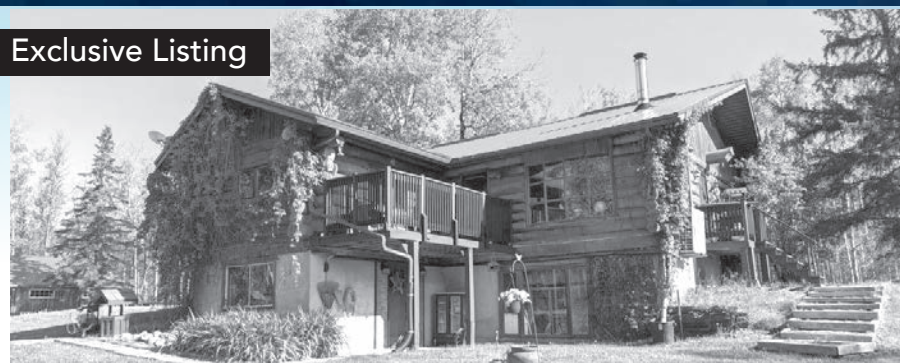

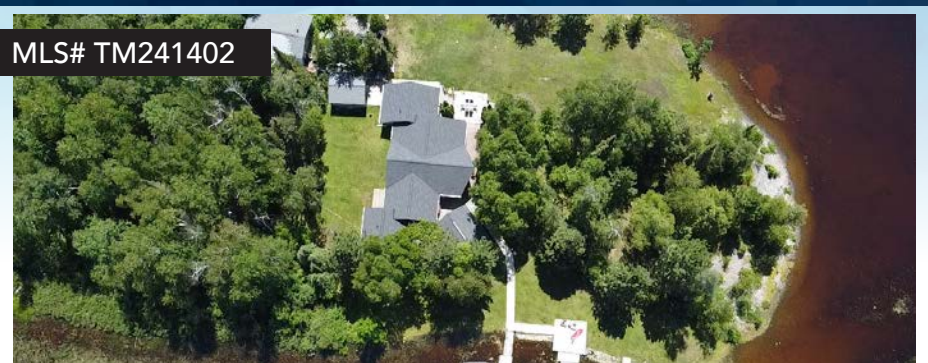
