TEMISKAMING SHORES — Over 140 people crowded into the New Liskeard College Boreal auditorium for a meeting called by Rockin' On Canada Day organizer/president Barry Phippen.

It was a meeting that became heated at times.

Phippen invited members of Temiskaming Shores council and people from the community to the informal meeting September 10.

It began at 7 p.m., and by the time everyone had aired their concerns, the attendees left at around 9 p.m.

A barbecue was set up outside the entrance to College Boreal earlier in the day, hosted by the New Liskeard Lions Club.

Volunteers for Rockin' On Canada Day (ROCD) were mingling with the crowd asking them to fill out a two-question survey: "Would you like the Bikers Reunion Rockin' On Canada Day back?" and "Would you like the fireworks back?"

Phippen said about four per cent of online respondents so far out of about a thousand people said no to the questions.

He is taking that as a sign people want both to return in 2025.

Louise Young filled out a questionnaire marking yes to both questions because she said her husband, Larry Young, is a biker and he had helped organize the early Bikers Reunion events in 2016.

"We support what Barry does and it is good for the community," she said.

Phippen and his organizing committee were interested in gauging the public's opinion about hosting mega events in the city going forward and how they felt about bringing back the fireworks display and a tent city, denied this year by the city.

"I just want to say right from the start we are a peaceful people and also a passionate people," said Phippen. Continued on page 10

Arthritis Awareness

Arthritis is Canada's most prevalent chronic health condition – for which there is no cure.

Fast Facts:

- Arthritis strikes people of every age, from infants to adults, and stays for life.
- Arthritis is a complex disease with over 100 different types. Major types are inflammatory arthritis (like rheumatoid arthritis, childhood arthritis, ankylosing spondylitis, psoriatic arthritis, and gout), and the most common form, osteoarthritis. Fibromyalgia has similar symptoms to arthritis.
- Arthritis results in painful inflammation and stiffness in joints, limiting the ability to move.
- Left untreated, arthritis can cause permanent joint damage and/or changes.
- A significant proportion of people with arthritis are overweight or obese and are physically inactive, adding undue stress to their joints.
- Some types of arthritis can affect the heart, eyes, lungs, kidneys and even the skin.
- A significant proportion of people with arthritis also have other serious diseases like heart disease or diabetes.

Warning Signs of Inflammatory Arthritis

There are many forms of inflammatory arthritis; signs that are typical for most include:

- Pain, swelling and stiffness in one or multiple joints
- Morning stiffness in and around the affected joints lasting at least one hour
- Pain and stiffness that worsens with inactivity and improves with physical activity
- Reduced range of motion
- Sometimes fever, weight loss, fatigue and/or anemia

Treatment

Arthritis affects everyone differently so treatment planning should be tailored to individual needs with guidance from members of your healthcare team (e.g. family doctor, rheumatologist, surgeon, physiotherapist, occupational therapist etc.).

For the over 6 million Canadians living with arthritis, pain is one of the many challenges they face on a daily basis. And though medication is only one option in terms of arthritis treatment, it can provide pain relief (and slow joint damage in many cases of inflammatory forms of arthritis). Keep in mind that many lifestyle changes, such as healthy eating, exercise and treatments such as physical therapy, should also be explored.

The heavy rainfall caused flooding to several businesses and homes around Temiskaming Shores, in particular the businesses located near the mall.

This is not the first time this area has been hit with heavy flooding and it begs the question - why is there not sufficient drainage in that area?

Perhaps the city can plant a line of trees on municipal property behind those businesses to ward off a flooding risk, or increase the number of drain outlets so people don't

have to experience this devastation.

At one point a social media post had a photo of a man floating on a blowup tube in the floodwaters near Hidden Treasures. there was that much water to deal with on the day.

Some of the businesses in that area may be fed up with the costs of clean-up after a flooding situation like that.

And they pay business taxes to the city.

So when will the city adequately address the issue of more potential flooding in that business-heavy location?

Updated infrastructure is badly needed in that region of the city.

Roads, ditches and sewers all need to be working together in the same way to prevent losses to the business community.

Trees should not be cut down unless a thorough study is done about the secondary effects of flooding and land erosion.

Preparation and cooperation are needed to deal with future flash rainstorms.



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Hard road to adulthood

I was driving down Clear Lake Road in Coleman Township during the early morning hours when I spotted her.

She came limbering up from the nearby lake dragging her prehistoric looking body up to the shoulder of the road.

It was early June, snapping turtle nesting season.

I stopped a safe distance away and watched her drop herself into a hole that she had likely dug under the cover of night.

She began to deposit her eggs right there in front of me, plop, plop, with a watchful eye on me.

I was likely looking like a huge predator and I had hoped not to disturb her as she laid her precious cargo in the soft warm gravel.

It would be a miracle if the eggs survived in that location to hatch almost 90 or more days later.

Raccoons love turtle eggs and chances are if the raccoons didn't smell them or the fox didn't find them, the eggs might survive.

After she lays her eggs, that's the last time momma turtle will ever see her offspring.

When the conditions are right, the baby turtles crawl out of the nest and find the nearest water.

If they are lucky enough, the baby snappers will quickly learn to swim. When the cooler weather does come in a few short weeks, then it is back to darkness as they dig deep into the muddy bottom of the lake in hibernation mode.

If they eventually reach adulthood, it is a miracle.

Why doesn't someone tell those mother turtles to find safer nesting sites away from busy roadways?

I cannot tell you how many dead turtles I saw on the roads this past summer, crushed needlessly because people were not paying attention.

Author/poet Mary Oliver says attention is the beginning of devotion and so paying attention in this beautiful life is a good thing.

Being devoted to the preservation of wildlife is something I take seriously.

Please be on the lookout for baby turtles just hatching from their roadside homes.

They will have to orient their tiny eyes to the bright sunlight, miraculously find a nearby lake and crawl to it.

Last fall I was fortunate to see 42 baby snapping turtles

hatch from their nest at Loon Lake.

It was incredible, they were so tiny, fragile and beautiful.

I held one in my hands and it was not AI generated.

My friend Tim had protected the nest with a wooden box surrounded by bright orange cones all summer long.

Tim is the turtle whisperer and good on him.

It was his reward to see those babies hatch and get safely to the lake.

We know snapping turtles are listed as Special Concern under the Ontario Endangered Species Act.

Every turtle life counts in the preservation of the species.



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The future of history may be on the move

ENGLEHART - "If we can't get people to come to the museum, how can we take the museum to the people?"

That's the thought behind the work of an Englehart ad hoc committee as it attempts to arrange to have Englehart and Area Historical Museum artifacts displayed at locations throughout the town.

The museum at 67 Sixth Avenue has been housing the artifacts for decades. It has three stories of displays but is not fully accessible. A lift in the building had electrical failure several years ago and efforts were made to fundraise to replace it, but never reached the goal.

2025 looms, when municipally-owned buildings are required to be accessible, it has become clear the building doesn't meet the town's needs.

Councillor Jo-Anne Farmer,

who chairs the culture and heritage ad hoc committee, pointed to the efforts of previous councils and museum boards to maintain the museum site over the years during an interview there, but acknowledged "it's a hard grind," she said.

"We credit the work they did and the efforts they did to sustain and revitalize the museum."

Through the pandemic the museum doors were closed and in 2023 it opened again, but the number of visitors to the museum were minimal.

Community services coordinator Johanna Paradis has a background in education, majoring in history at university, and the project has been near to her heart. In the fall of 2023 she reached out to area schools in an attempt to raise interest and attract classes, students, and families to the museum, but did not have the success she was hoping for, she related.

Town council established the

ad hoc committee which has been meeting since the beginning of 2024.

Farmer said the committee was appointed by council "to look at what we could do with our situation. We report to council a lot about it. We're iust trying to look at our artifacts and our collection."

With the building not meeting the needs of the town, work is now taking place to "re-envision" how the museum can continue, while the building's doors are no longer open.

ENGAGING IN LOCAL HISTORY

The mandate of the museum is to bring the local story "to the people the artifacts. and engage people in our local history and we just think we have to do it in a different way," Paradis explained.


A summer student and members of the committee have been assisting in going through the artifacts to organize what is being kept, or to return donated items to families, and also to work with other museums to send some artifacts there to complement their collections.


Paradis said that the committee has been receiving support from within the community and beyond as it works through

For example, representatives of the Next Stop Englehart Quilters Guild have helped the committee examine the 14 sewing machines at the museum. Representatives of the Little Homesteaders Claybelt Museum have taken a number of items that will complement their collections, and Haileybury Heritage Museum representatives have helped the committee in compiling the documents of the Women's Institute and taken the materials to add to the collection in Haileybury.



Wabun Health Services, which services First Nations in Northeastern Ontario. She is very active in the Indigenous community as an advocate for youth and First Nation issues. For many years, she has taken part in traditional ceremonies, gatherings, Pow Wows and events as a traditional dancer, singer and hand drummer.

Naveau is very passionate about supporting Indigenous youth and in creating opportunities to lead them into positive avenues in the arts, writing, music, dance and theatre.

A DOORWAY

"To me, I see theatre as a doorway for Indigenous people in the North to so many opportunities for positive change. One of my hopes in taking part in this performance is that it will encourage Indigenous youth to take up the arts in some form. I want to see those budding young actors and actresses embrace their artistic talents and become part of local theatre arts groups and associations in the north. I also want to thank Wabun Tribal Council and our Chiefs for sponsorship aid and for the support they have shown me," said Naveau.

She hopes to see a growth of Indigenous participation in the theatre arts community in Timmins and Northeastern Ontario. She is inspired by Indigenous-based arts and theatre groups such as the nationally famous Debajehmujig Theatre Group based in Wikwemikong Unceded Reserve in Manitoulin Island and her vision and dream is to see a similar group and venue developed in the Timmins

If you want to be part of developing this vision you can contact Naveau on Facebook @faye.naveau to become involved. This will be an opportunity for Indigenous political organizations, tribal councils and First Nation arts promoters to help with this

"The theatre arts are a great platform to support our young people in so many ways. It is not just a way to encourage their talents but also a platform that can empower, build and strengthen our people emotionally, socially and mentally. It is also a great idea for everyone to support groups such as the Tamarack Arts Association and the festival they have created for everyone to enjoy," said Naveau.

Witches in the Woods will be performed on Satur-

day, September 14, and on Sunday, September 15, during the first annual Tamarack Festival. Written by Playwright Amy Neufeld, the play is a retelling of the classic Grimms' fairy tales with a modern twist.

"I'm really happy to be taking part in this as it is a lovely script taken from old classic stories of Hansel and Gretel but with a few modern twists and turns. It's a story that is both heart pulling, funny but also with serious moments. We're grateful to have playwrights like Amy share their talents to create performances like this. I think everyone will enjoy it," commented Naveau.

The Tamarack Festival is a multidisciplinary event hosted by the Tamarack Arts Association and it will be held in Timmins at the Timmins Museum and Timmins Public Library. The event features theatre performances of Witches In The Woods as well as the play How A Bear Dies, musical concerts and literary presentations by northern writers and publishers.



Efforts are also being made to set up displays of artifacts at places throughout the town such as at the Englehart Public Library, the Englehart and Area Community Arena Complex, and the Englehart town hall. Conversations have also been held with the Englehart Legion representatives about housing the military artifacts at that site, Paradis added.

Chelsea Smith has been preparing an interactive fibre arts exhibit for the Englehart Fall Fair, said Paradis. There will also be an agriculture exhibit upstairs during the event.

Smith "is going to be the keeper of our history," said Paradis.

Paradis said the next step is figuring out the cabinets needed for the displays.

Farmer said the committee probably needs more money from the municipality for the project, and added that "if someone wanted to donate money that would be wonderful. We need access to some dollars to build cabinets, to buy cabinets, to make them accessible and get them installed so we can put the exhibits in them."

Paradis noted that if any exhibits are being displayed off town property, the town will remain responsible for them, and ensure they are displayed in keeping with the Ontario Museum Association standards.

Paradis expressed gratitude "that council is allowing the time that it is going to take for the next chapter to be developed."





"Tent city is the largest revenue generating part of our event, to raise money for specialized equipment for the hospital. Tent city is a lot of work," said Phippen.

Councillor Wilson spoke up and said the meeting was being held under false pretences.

"I am here peacefully as you said and I would like to read my statement and let your meeting continue," said Wilson.

"My intention was to sit down with the committee and talk about the science of some of these safety issues in a private meeting. We set the date for September 10."

Wilson said he was not made aware the private meeting had been changed to a public event and he felt disrespected by the meeting's format.

"Some of you may know I am very passionate about road safety. There is nothing more important than safety.



I would be remiss because it has affected my family significantly. I would be remiss in my duties as a councillor if I did not raise these issues of safety."

He left the gathering and invited the public to come to a council meeting to express further concerns about safety issues around such events.

Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP John Vanthof spoke up as well, saying he had hoped he would not have to speak, but he felt compelled to do so.

"I know Mark Wilson and he has done good things for the safety of Highway 11. It is a tough, thankless job that of a municipal politician because I was one for 12 years. You have heard how we all have to work together to get this done."

He urged the two sides to work together to resolve their issues so events like Rockin' can continue to do good work for the community and the Temiskaming Hospital as their fundraising benefactor.

MAPPING IT OUT

Phippen then drew a map on the blackboard of the tent city location and asked what the safety issues were in that location.

"There are other things in this town that are really quite dangerous."

Laferriere explained that the S corner in front of the Service Canada location was a busy roadway and the city's insurance provider advised them to deny the request.

"I am very passionate as well, I am behind the Bikers Reunion and the Rockin' On Canada Day event 100 per cent. This is not a Mark Wilson issue, this is a council issue."

The mayor explained that Wilson had to leave the meeting because it would have made a quorum situation with having four elected officials in one room at one time. That would be illegal and would require a notice sent out prior to the meeting for the public's interest.

"There is proper protocol that would have to go out about such a meeting like this," said the mayor.

"When we talk about tent city the only thing turned down was tent city on the S curve. We offered the ball fields as an alternative location."

The mayor said when you throw in heavy traffic and alcohol it is a safety issue and the city was concerned with liability.

Phippen denied that the city had offered the ball field location to his organizing committee.

FIREWORKS

The mayor then explained the reason they turned down the request for fireworks this year during the long week-

down to three councillors against and two for the fire-

The reasons involved pollution, noise levels and the impact of the fireworks on pets.

He told the audience he does not vote on issues at the council table, which drew the ire of people at the meeting who felt he should vote and perhaps change the trajectory of contentious issues.

"Council voted the fireworks down and as the mayor, I have to abide by the majority rule. Don't get me wrong, I love fireworks and was in favour of them. I have grandchildren and I wanted the fireworks," explained the mayor.

He was asked by Rockin' On Canada Day secretary/treasurer France Gauthier to make the issues clear to their committee about the 2025 event and to address communication issues within the city staff moving forward.

Phippen and his organizing committee have sent the city a "letter of request" listing five points they wish to have addressed and supported by the city before they begin to organize next year's ROCD.

The organizing committee was informed the site of the 2024 event will not be available next year, so Phippen and company must find another site around New Liskeard.

The five points to address: Use of the Don Shepherdson Memorial Arena and parking lot, use of the fall fair grounds, use of land for RV parking, use of a small stage and fencing, and a Canada Day parade and approval.

ROCD's goals are to foster community spirit, provide economic benefits to small businesses and the broader community and to raise funds for the Temiskaming Hos-

At the end of the meeting, which was contentious at times, the mayor and Phippen shook hands and agreed to work together to bring the Rockin' On Canada Day event back in 2025.



Inspection of MNR-Approved Prescribed Burn Plan for Slash Pile Burning for Temagami Forest

The Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) invites you to inspect the MNR-approved prescribed burn plan for slash pile burning that will be carried out in the Temagami Forest (see map).



As part of our ongoing efforts to regenerate and protect Ontario's forests, some recently harvested areas have been selected to be burned under the guidelines of the MNR's Prescribed Burn Manual. The prescribed burn will reduce the area covered in slash piles while increasing the area available for regeneration and reducing the fire hazard. The burn is scheduled for ignition between October 15, 2024 and December 24, 2024.

The approved prescribed burn plan for slash pile burning, including specific locations and maps, is available for public inspection by contacting First Resource Management Group (FRMG) or Temagami Forest Management Corporation (TFMC) and on the Natural Resources Information Portal at https://nrip.mnr.gov.on.ca/s/fmp-online until March 31, 2025, when the Annual Work Schedule expires. The objectives of the operation are to reduce the amount of productive land lost to unmanaged slash pile accumulation and reduce the fire hazard resulting from full tree logging in a safe and efficient manner. The net area (ha) of slash coverage is 30.09, within the 2024-2025 slash pile burn plan, and will be located within the Townships of Lundy, Hudson, Firstbrook, Barr, Best, and Strathy.








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
