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TEMISKAMING LODGE

The Butterfly Approach Making a long-term care facility a home

It was five-and-a-half years and \$40 million in the making, but the new Temiskaming Lodge now stands proudly at 144 Drive-In Theatre Road in Dymond Township, part of the City of Temiskaming Shores.

In 2023 Jarlette Health Services, headquartered in Midland, Ontario, opened the doors of the newly constructed long-term care home.

Meaningful Care Matters, a company now based in Australia, responded and shared information with her about the Butterfly Approach.

"Butterfly is really about infusing life into institu-

tions," Knowlton explained.

"It's an emotion-focused living philosophy."

The setting inside the buil-



ding and living areas is designed to meet the emotional needs of the residents, along with the care that is provided, which is relational rather than routine, as in an institution.

Colours define certain areas, partly to help people to find their way around. There are also displays of old-time items, such as plates, skis, or license plates, that relate to the lives of the people who live there.

"We use very deep colours because older adults with dementia see colours that are five to seven shades deeper," Knowlton said.

"If we were picking a shade, let's say pink, if you were at the top of the colour chart, older adults would see that as beige, and so we need them to see the pink, so we need to count down five to seven squares on that colour chart."

She continued that the colours "help people with orientation and feeling better." She noted that "beige or grey can be very disorienting to older adults."

HOME AREAS

There are four home areas and each bears the name of a favourite area walking trail: Pete's Dam, Devil's Rock,

Mill Creek.

Beautiful large depictions relating to the chosen trail are mounted on the wall to add to the sense of place and directional aid.

Temiskaming Lodge administrator Francine Gosselin said the home areas were named through a contest involving families, residents and staff.

In each home area there are 20 private rooms and six semi-private rooms (shared between two people).

Each area includes a nursing station, resident lounge, resident dining room and activity room as well as quiet nooks with rocking chairs to read, relax and visit with friends and family.

Gosselin related that it was first learned in May 2018 that money had been awarded for the addition of 46 beds, along with the already existing 82 beds.

At that time the long-term care home was located on Bruce Street in Haileybury, also part of the City of Temiskaming Shores.





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

RIGHT SITE

The right site was found on the edge of the Dymond subdivision, near an area where there are young families, and also near Dymond Court where there is seniors' housing. There are stores nearby, and the site sits beside farmland that appeals to many of the residents who come from agricultural settings.

To be able to have such an open and pleasing site was a great benefit in a time when many long-term care homes in Ontario must settle for a space which is available and affordable, Knowlton commented. In many communities the available locations are in industrial areas or on the corner in a city setting where there is no sense of community, she noted.

"Here, we knew what the development plans were for around the home and that it would be developing more as



him, but that was not feasible because of the square footage and the big gully at the front," she said.

Jarlette and his team then met with Temiskaming Shores planner Jennifer Pye who gave them a number of site options.

The other piece is that we wanted to make sure we would have access to enough land, and of course if you're down in Toronto or the GTA you're lucky if you can get a couple of acres."

The two-story building has 80 private rooms and 24 rooms shared by two people. The main floor is spread over 4,779 square metres and the second floor is over 3,465 square metres.

Gosselin related that the original plan for the building had been to construct it up to four stories, but the soil type



made it necessary to build lower and spread the building over a wider space.

Knowlton explained that to

decrease the weight of the building, a lighter gauge of siding was used rather than brick which is typically used on Jarlette long-term care homes.

"When you come out of your room you need to see something that means something to you,"

"The building is run on a building automation system," Knowlton explained.

"Francine can go on her computer and see the temperature in different zones in the building."

It is also possible for that information to be seen at the home office in Midland.


The lighting is controlled to prevent shadows which in turn reduces the amount of falls. The lighting is on timers and can also be read from a central location and changed from that location.

SAFE AND MODERN

There are detailed building standards from the government that have been met in order to ensure a safe, modern and comfortable home for residents and this also includes having an automatic water sprinkler system.

Materials, including ENERGY STAR windows, make the building more energy-efficient.

Noise control was also considered. Knowlton pointed out that there are hangings and displays on the walls which soften and dampen the noise.



The items chosen for the walls represent the residents and their lives. There are displays related to topics such as mining, farming, school, sports, clothing for small children, seasonal scenes, and more.

"When you come out of your room you need to see something that means something to you," Knowlton said, "and not something that doesn't have anything to do with you. It's a way that makes the space more personal and makes it unique and makes it more like home."

DESIGNATED SPACES

The Temiskaming Lodge includes designated spaces for activities, such as a hair salon, a large event centre, and smaller areas where family and friends can visit. There's an exercise room and a laundry room.

Throughout the lodge there are a number of artifacts that

have been either purchased or donated by generous people from the community. There's a celebration and reflection room and also a family dining room where residents can have a party or dinner with family members.

There's a space for a small business to rent the space to sell refreshments, for example.

Residents can move from one area to another.

"We encourage that, and we want residents to move freely around the home and use all the spaces in the home. There's no point in having it if we're not using it," Knowlton said.

She explained the concept that is behind the changes to make life at the residence more like home.

"You get care but you have to live here, and a lot of times in long-term care (I would like to say long-term living) this needs to be like home to you."



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
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DoHeat Pumps Written by David Baerg Was Sense?

If you were putting a new heating system in your house, would you choose the one with lower fuel costs or the one with lower carbon emissions? What if the answer was the same for both? An air source heat pump along with an electric tank or heat pump water heater will now provide heat and hot water at the lowest cost and lowest carbon emissions of any of the fuel options open to you.

For those unfamiliar with heat pumps, they use the same technology as an air conditioner. The only difference is that a heat pump has a reversing valve that allows it to provide heat to your house in the winter. Because an air source heat pump draws heat from the outside air, its capacity drops as the temperature drops. In our climate, that means you need a backup source of heat to supplement the heat pump's output in very cold temperatures (i.e. below -15 C).

The chart below shows estimated fuel costs and total costs for various common (or soon to be common) fuel combinations for a well-insulated house in New Liskeard.

They all come out fairly close in operating costs, but a fully electric house is the clear winner in total cost and greenhouse gas emissions even though it uses relatively costly electric resistance for the backup heat source and to heat hot water. While a heat pump may have higher upfront costs, you will quickly recoup those costs with lower operating costs. I didn't include cooling costs in the chart above. But, if I had, the heat pump would do even better as heat pumps are usually more efficient at cooling than conventional air conditioners. They are also more effective at dehumidifying your house than conventional AC.

When it's time to buy, check for grants available to you as there will likely be new programs announced soon by Enbridge, Hydro One and the federal government.




