New doc joins BRH as hospitalist

ENGLEHART - A locum has now become a permanent physician at Blanche River Health.

Dr. Scott Daley became a full-time hospitalist at



Osteoporosis and Bone Mineral Density Testing

Osteoporosis is a condition that causes bones to become thin and porous, decreasing bone strength and leading to broken bones, especially the hip, spine, wrist and shoulder. Osteoporosis is sometimes confused with osteoarthritis. Just to be clear, osteoporosis is a bone disease and osteoarthritis is a disease of the joints and surrounding tissue.

Fast Facts:

- Osteoporosis can strike at any age and affects both men and women
- Building strong bones during childhood and adolescence can be the best defence against developing osteoporosis later in life
- Both men and women begin to lose bone in their mid 30s. As they approach menopause, women lose bone at a greater rate, from 2-3% per year
- At least 1 in 3 women and 1 in 5 men will suffer from an osteoporotic fracture during their lifetime
- Over 80% of all fractures in people 50+ are caused by osteoporosis

Testing

Bone Mineral Density (BMD) testing is very important. This test is safe, painless and accurately measures the density of your bones. A BMD test can tell you whether or not you have osteoporosis and how likely you are to develop it in the future. It can help you to make decisions that may prevent fractures or further bone loss.

Who Should Get a BMD test?

- all women and men 65 years or older
- postmenopausal women and men 50-64 with risk factors for fracture including:
 - low bone mass identified on x-ray
 - parental hip fracture
 - high alcohol intake
 - current smoker
 - low body weight, i.e. less than 132 lbs or 60 kg
 - rheumatoid arthritis
- younger men or women (under 50) with a disease or condition associated with low bone mass or bone loss:
 - high risk medication (steroid use, aromatase inhibitors, androgen deprivation therapy)
 - uncontrolled hyperthyroidism
 - early menopause (younger than 45)

Fire Prevention Week highlights the critical role smoke alarms play in fire

In particular, it places an emphasis on the installation, testing and replacement of smoke alarms, carried out by individuals, companies and groups.

It is recommended by the National Fire Protection Association that people test their smoke alarms once per month and to replace smoke alarms if they are 10 years of age or older.

It is also recommended to test smoke alarms by pressing the button on the alarm.

Smoke alarms can also be cleaned at least once

per year using a vacuum to remove dust and debris that could prevent the smoke alarm's operation.

There are battery operated, hardwired and a combination of smoke alarm and carbon monoxide alarms on the market to chose from.

The building code requires smoke alarms to be installed in every bedroom, outside every sleeping area (hallway) and on every level of a home, including the basement.

They need to be installed at least 10 feet from a cooking source and for optimal performance mount smoke alarms on ceilings or high on walls since smoke rises.

The number of fire related deaths in Canada remains high and education on preventing fires is important.

It is also recommended batteries in smoke detectors be changed twice a year.

And while we are at it, let's give thanks to the volunteer fire fighting brigades in our region who go above and beyond to keep us safe and to fight fires when they do occur.

City boosting EV charging capacity

TEMISKAMING SHORES – The city is boosting its infrastructure to add more electric vehicle charging stations.

Temiskaming Shores has approved the purchase of three Level 2 chargers.

They'll be installed at the Don Shepherdson Memorial Arena, the library in New Liskeard, and the Dymond Community Hall complex, at a cost of \$17,220.

Given government's drive to get more electric vehicles on the road, "we need to make sure as a city we're prepared to support that change," said Mayor Jeff Laferriere after a recent council meeting.

"We are seeing great usage of the ones we do have today," he said.

The municipality had originally planned to install one Level 3 120 kW charger in the downtown New Liskeard municipal parking lot.

It would have cost an estimated \$200,000, with grants anticipated to cover all but \$25,000 of the sum.

But in a report to council, city staff noted that grant decisions have been put off until this fall because of the volume of applications.

Staff proposed that the \$25,000 set

aside by the city be used instead for three Level 2 chargers, which would each offer up to 19.2 kW of charging power.

Level 2 chargers are slower than Level 3 equipment. But staff said adding three would increase what is currently limited access to charging facilities.

At this time, the city has three Level 2 chargers, each offering between seven and 24 kW of power, and three Level 3 chargers (50 to 60 kW).

"Installing additional Level 2 chargers at the proposed locations will address this gap and provide the community with more reliable

charging options," staff said.

Staff noted that local use of electric vehicles (EVs) is increasing.

It cites Ontario data finding that the number of EVs in the POJ postal region has doubled in two years, from 31 in the first three months of 2022 to 70 early this year.

"This trend indicates growing community interest and readiness for EVs, highlighting the need for enhanced charging infrastructure," the report said.

Staff said the additional Level 2 chargers will ease range anxiety – the worry facing EV drivers that they'll run

out of power before they reach their destination or a charging station.

Other benefits cited by staff include reduction in greenhouse gas emissions, a boost for tourism, and encouragement for more residents to consider buying EVs.

The charging stations are being purchased from Services FLO, which is headquartered in Quebec City.

Installation is planned for November, and they're expected to be operational soon after, said recreation director Matt Bahm in an email.

Way paved for **Shaver Park** upgrades

TEMISKAMING SHORES - The transformation of a North Cobalt rink into a year-round recreational venue is moving forward.

Temiskaming Shores has awarded an \$89,410 contract to Demora Construction Services to pave the Shaver Park rink surface.

The asphalt will ease ice-making in the winter. For the rest of the year, it'll provide a paved surface for other activities such as ball hockey, roller hockey and bike skills training.

Fencing will also be installed to prevent errant pucks from making their way into neighbouring yards.

The cost to transform it into a four-season facility is offset by a \$50,000 donation from the AC15 hockey tournament.

Plans for Shaver Park are included in a larger project at Rotary Farr Park in Haileybury.

Proposed upgrades include the expansion of the basketball court to full size, resurfacing of the tennis court, improvements to the ball diamond, and the installation of path lighting.

The municipality has applied to the Northern Ontario Heritage Fund for support.

If successful, the Heritage Fund would cover up to 75 per cent of total eligible costs, which are budgeted at almost \$360,000.

The city's share would be just under

There's a portion of the project – about \$51,200 – that is ineligible for Heritage Fund support.

Most of these costs will be covered by the AC15 donation, explained recreation director Matt Bahm in an email.

The city had hoped to pave the Farr Park parking lot as part of the overall project and a way to increase the venue's accessibility and inclusivity. But that paving was deemed ineligible for Heritage Fund support.

To proceed with the parking lot paving would have pushed the city's cost beyond what it had budgeted, Bahm

"Instead of making changes to the budget, it made more sense to just remove that portion of the project and revisit it in the future," said Bahm in an email.

City beaches to be made more accessible

TEMISKAMING SHORES - Beaches in Haileybury and New Liskeard are going to be a little easier to navigate.

Temiskaming Shores recently received a \$22,323 inclusive community grant from the province.

Some of the funding will be used to purchase beach matting in New Liskeard.

The mats are wide strips of woven material that are laid over sand, improving access for people using strollers or wheelchairs or who have any mobility issues.

"We will be getting enough that we should be able to create multiple access points in New Liskeard,"

said recreation director Matt Bahm April. in an email.

Funding will also cover the purchase of two beach wheelchairs, one for New Liskeard and the other in Hailevburv.

"The chairs are able to go over sand and other surfaces that a regular wheelchair cannot," Bahm said.

The city applied for the grant in

BULLYING PREVENTION MONTH

Bullying and taxing: in my neighbourhood?

Every parent hopes that their children are protected from the bullying that goes on in schools, schoolyards, and on the school bus or sidewalks after school. Unfortunately, bullying is so widespread that just about every kid encounters it at some time or another. As parents though, we can help our children to be prepared to face up to these terrible problems, to recognize the signs, and to react appropriately if they become victims. One thing is certain, the persistent myth that nothing can be done to prevent this type of behaviour shouldn't be believed. On the contrary, we should and must react!

WHAT ARE WE TALKING ABOUT?

Taxing is the slang name for extorting or blackmailing money using the threat of violence for noncompliance. It is committed by a young person or a group, and their victims usually belong to the same age group. Bullying, on the other hand, is the use of physical violence, threats, or humiliation, in person or through cyber-bullying, to frighten other children, to victimize them or force them to do something against their will, and, when this is done repeatedly, to isolate them socially. In all cases, the effects are devastating for the victims, who are often forced into silence by their aggressors.

HOW CAN THIS BE PREVENTED?

Make your children aware of all the ways to prevent taxing and bullying as soon as they start school: don't carry large sums of money or expensive electronic devices with them; always stay with a group; sit close to the driver on the school bus; and act confidently, even if it is not how they feel inside.

HOW TO REACT?

Children should always be taught how to react if they find themselves in this predicament: don't get angry; don't provoke a bully; don't fight with him or her; and find out as much information as possible in order to be able to identify their aggressor. Make them aware of the necessity of telling you immediately about any bullying incidents and give them all possible support when they inform the appropriate authorities about this criminal act.

"Bullying -Did you know?"

- · One-third of teenagers have been bullied recently
- Elementary students face bullying every 7 minutes
- 89% of Canadian teachers see cyberbullying as a top concern
- With bystander intervention, 57% of bullying stops in ten seconds
- Harassed students show reduced school engagement and poorer grades

SPACE HEATER SAFETY 101

Fire Prevention Week (FPW) is from October 6 to 12, and this year's theme is "Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!™." It's a great time to refresh your knowledge of fire safety, particularly if you use a portable heater for extra warmth. Follow these 10 tips to ensure you use your space heaters safely:

- Place the heater on a solid, level and non-flammable surface. Never place a space heater on a carpet, table or other piece of furniture.
- 2. Keep the space heater at least one metre away from combustible materials, such as bedding and curtains.
- 3. Ensure the space heater isn't in a high-traffic area or doorway, where it could pose a tripping hazard.
- Inspect the space heater for damaged cords or plugs before every use. If you notice fraying or damage, don't use it.
- Don't use a space heater in a workshop or garage near flammable paints, gas cans or matches.

- 6. Regularly clean the space heater to remove dust and debris buildup, which can pose a fire hazard if ignited by the heat.
- 7. Never leave a space heater unattended, and always turn the heater off when you leave the room or go to bed.
- 8. Plug the space heater directly into a wall outlet—don't use an extension cord or power strip. Moreover, don't plug other electrical devices into the same outlet as the heater.
- 9. Always read and follow the space heater's manufacturer manual to ensure you don't overlook any critical safety instructions.
- 10. Install smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors near where you use the space heater and test them at least once a month to ensure they work. These detectors can provide early warning in case of a fire or carbon monoxide leak.

Visit your local hardware store to find a space heater with an automatic shut-off feature that activates if the unit tips over or overheats. This additional safety measure can help prevent accidents and reduce the risk of fire or burns.


