Armstrong library booking more Saturday fun and learning

ARMSTRONG TOWNSHIP - Armstrong Township has approved another year of Saturday afternoon hours for the public library.

This means that from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturdays, members of the public will continue to have somewhere bright and cheerful to go, teeming with books, and always with a community jigsaw puzzle on the go.

There are public computers, and often a special activity, such as a tablet class for Francophone seniors, or crafts for kids.

The library, located in the basement of the Armstrong Township municipal building in Earlton, serves a growing and changing community where there are increasing numbers of young families taking up residence.

"This community is really changing in demographics," says Corinna Dallaire, the chief executive officer of the library.

"We are getting more kids, and getting more young people."

This is a shift for the library that, as little as three years ago, saw more seniors using the library, she said. However, a change in the community means the library has to change with it.

The library also serves the people of the Municipality of Charlton and Dack, and of the townships of Hudson, Kerns and Hilliard, and the Village of Thornloe. Those councils have all signed on with the library for service, in exchange for the provincial grant they each receive toward library service. That grant is turned over to the Armstrong library. However, Armstrong still pays the lion's share of the cost, says Dallaire. Grants, such as one for the internet for one year, also add support to the library's activities.

"Financially we're doing quite well and we've brought in a lot more things," Dallaire said.

VISITING THE LIBRARY

Class visits from École catholique Assomption and a playgroup from Early On are part of the scene that is making the library a fun-filled place to be. At Halloween and Easter, kids will find the library the place to drop by for added fun.

Dallaire says she expects to

see more seniors coming in soon, as winter weather limits activities and people turn to the library for a warm, comfortable setting in which to wile away the hours, or a place to pick up a jigsaw puzzle to take home, and a good book.

The library also offers online borrowing with the Libby service, giving patrons access to more books.

"That's very popular," said Dallaire. "Some people get a membership for the Libby because it's free."

A recent renovation in the building meant a new ceiling and new lights for the library. While the furnishings were wrapped in plastic, staff painted the walls and library assistant Celine Duguay has created a bright array of crafted items now displayed on the walls.

"She dreams up all kinds of stuff," said Dallaire.

The library is located at 25 10th Street in Earlton and current hours are: Monday 9-4; Tuesday 9-4 and 6 to 8; Wednesday 9-4; Thursday 9 to 5; and Saturday 11-3. The li-

brary is closed on Fridays, Sundays and for lunch Monday to Thursday from 12 to 1 p.m.

The library has a Facebook page and a website and puts up posters at the Earlton post office.

Next year the library will be celebrating 50 years, Dallaire noted. The library was first opened by Armstrong Reeve Dorothy Houston on June 9, 1975, and was located in the basement of École catholique Assomption. It moved to its current location on May 30, 1978, after the municipal building was constructed.

October is Occupational Therapy Month

What is Occupational Therapy?

Occupational therapy is a type of health care that helps to solve the problems that interfere with a person's ability to do the things that are important to them.

An Occupational Therapist (OT) may check:

- Your physical abilities like strength, balance and coordination
- Your mental abilities like memory, coping strategies, organizational skills
- What materials or devices you use to participate in activities like furniture, utensils, tools or clothes
- What social and emotional support is available to you at home, school, work or in the community, and
- The physical setup of your house, classroom, work place or other environment

Depending on the problem, the OT can help you solve it by:

1. Helping you overcome your disability. OTs do this by:
 - educating or instructing you on how to do things with the abilities you have - e.g. getting around your community in a wheelchair
 - suggesting activities that will help you improve or maintain the abilities you have - e.g. improving your coping strategies
2. Adapting the materials you use. OTs do this by changing the things you use:
 - around the house – e.g. a special key holder to make turning keys easier
 - in sports or leisure activities – e.g. a playing cards holder
 - at work or school – e.g. special tools that help prevent injury to hands and back
 - to take care of yourself – e.g. special bath or toilet seats
 - to get from place to place – e.g. car modifications such as one-handed steering wheels
3. Recommending changes to the environments where you do your everyday activities. OTs do this by recommending that you:
 - change the physical layout of your workplace, home or school – e.g. lowering/raising desktops, countertops or cupboards
 - find out about the supports in your community – e.g. specialized public transportation
 - work with the people in your community – e.g. providing education about a disability to the teacher or employer
 - work with the government to encourage health living – e.g. request funding for special equipment

Vaccines work

It's that time of year when flu season kicks in and we know the COVID-19 illness is still present and circulating in our communities. It is essential for people to get vaccinated against

these illnesses, particularly if they are vulnerable and have pre-existing health issues.

No one can be forced to have a vaccine but saving one's life is something we all are interested in.

Diphtheria was once the leading cause of death in children until under the age of 14, but by the 1930s a vaccine was available.

And guess what? Diphtheria deaths dramatically decreased with the last one recorded in 2010.

Polio cases in Canada crippled children needlessly. But by 1955 a vaccine became available and now Canada is thought to be polio free.

Measles is a highly infectious disease that has resurfaced in Canada. It can cause blindness and deafness and even death.

A measles vaccine became available in the 1960s which virtually eliminated the disease in Canada.

The World Health Organization says the measles vaccine has pre-

vented 57 million deaths between 2000 and 2022.

So when people say vaccines are harmful and not to get them, they are separated from the truth and reality.

The conspiracy theorists who deny the effectiveness of vaccines are threatening the health of all of us and encouraging risky behaviour.

We have a solid history in this country of overcoming infectious disease through immunization.

To suggest otherwise is simply wrong.

FOODCYCLER PILOT PROGRAM

The Township of Coleman is seeking interest in a "Food Waste Recycling Program" that reduces food waste to nutrient rich soil that can be added to plants or gardens. The goal is to reduce the amount of food waste that is deposited in the landfill.

You can sign up for a FoodCycler unit by contacting the Township Office. There are two sizes available; a 2.5 litre model for \$150 and a 5 litre model for \$300 plus applicable taxes.

Participants will be asked to track their weekly usage for a period of 12 weeks. At the end of the pilot program there will be a survey to assist the Township with the collection of waste management data.

Stroke survivor advocating for improved services

ENGLEHART – On December 23, 2019, Linda Kirwin’s life changed dramatically.

On that date, the Englehart resident woke up feeling extremely tired and weak on her right side. She returned to bed and, when she woke 15 hours later, found she couldn’t move her legs, torso and right arm.

She’d suffered a stroke, more specifically a left temporal cerebrovascular accident.

Almost five years later, she continues to rebuild her strength and mobility.

She has regained her speech, and can walk short distances using a walker or other device. She’s taught herself to use her left hand, and has regained some use of her right hand.

Recovery from stroke is not a one- or two-month process, she said.

“It will be lifelong for me,” said Kirwin in a recent interview.

As a result of her experience, she’s become an advocate for stroke survivors and is pressing for improved ser-

vices in Northern Ontario.

October 29 is also a significant date for Kirwin.

It’s designated World Stroke Day, with a focus on raising awareness of stroke, its symptoms, its prevention, and the needs of stroke survivors.

A stroke occurs when blood stops flowing to any part of the brain, either through a blood vessel blockage or rupture, leaving brain cells damaged. The effects of a stroke depend on the part of the brain that has been damaged and the extent of the damage.

More than 878,000 Canadians aged 20 and older have experienced a stroke.

FAST

Kirwin is urging the public to think FAST to identify if someone is having a stroke.

FAST is the acronym for Face, Arms, Speech and Time.

Observers should check if the person can smile, or if their face, mouth or eyes have drooped; if they can raise both their arms; and if they speak clearly and understand what is said.

The “T” is for time.

A quick response is imperative, she

said, and urged that 911 be called immediately.

As a result of her stroke, Kirwin said she suffered no cognitive impairment. But she was initially left with very little speech capability and had lost mobility on her right side.

She was admitted to Kirkland and District Hospital and, in late February 2020, to the stroke centre at Timmins and District Hospital when a bed became available for four weeks of therapy.

She said she discharged herself, just as the COVID-19 pandemic was declared and knowing that lockdowns loomed.

The pandemic made in-person services unavailable, she said.

Kirwin drew on her own background in health care, education and other fields to research online resources.

At one point, she was participating in four virtual sessions a day hosted at sites across the country that enabled her to consult with experts and engage in a variety of programs.

She reached out to March of Dimes Canada for support. She received help remotely in speech recovery from the Halton-Peel Community Aphasia Pro-

grams, and now sits on the board of the organization overseeing the programs.

She’s compiled a list of programs and contacts who can help with everything from disability tax credits and mobility devices to meal services and home modifications.

She both takes part in peer support groups and leads them.

“That way is my health journey to getting better,” she said.

Kirwin praised local health care and support services. But she has identified gaps in the system.

While she’s comfortable using online services, for example, she knows that not all people are.

And given internet limitations in parts of Northern Ontario, she said some people can’t access online services where they live.

Distance is also a factor, because specialized care and assessments may be located in larger centres. Cost rules out some stroke survivors’ ability to get services, she said.

She is urging policy-makers to ensure a consistent level of care for stroke survivors, no matter where they live.

October is BREAST CANCER Awareness Month



CHECK YOURSELF, PROTECT YOURSELF

Do you know the risk factors associated with breast cancer?

October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month across Canada. Even though this disease has many causes, several factors can increase the risk of contracting it. Here's an overview of some of those risk factors.

1. Previous conditions. You're more vulnerable to developing breast cancer if abnormal cells have been detected in your breasts in the past or if you've had previous abnormalities.
2. Age. More than 80 per cent of cases in Canada occur in women over the age of 50.
3. Alcohol. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), drinking one beer or one glass of wine per day is enough to increase your risk significantly.
4. Menstrual cycle. Early menstruation and late menopause are linked to the possibility of developing the disease.
5. Family history. Your risk of getting the disease is higher if your mother, sister or daughter has been diagnosed with breast cancer, especially if it was before menopause.
6. Pregnancy complications. Your risk increases if you've never carried a pregnancy to full term or if you've been pregnant after the age of 30.
7. Body weight. People who are obese have a higher statistical likelihood of getting breast cancer.
8. Taking hormones. Undergoing hormone replacement therapy for more than five years is associated with the onset of this type of cancer.
9. Physical inactivity. A sedentary lifestyle increases the likelihood of a breast cancer diagnosis.

THS offering post-stroke transitional care

TEMISKAMING SHORES – A variety of programs are available through Timiskaming Home Support (THS) to help stroke survivors continue living at home.

Its post-stroke transitional care program was launched in 2016.

“This program is designed to support stroke survivors through a range of rehabilitation services and resources,” said Csilla Szabo, stroke community navigator, in an email.

Among the key features of the program highlighted by Szabo are its physical activity sessions.

They’re provided at varying levels to meet an individual’s specific needs, with supervision by qualified instructors and periodic assessments by a registered physiotherapist.

Accessible gyms equipped for rehabilitation exercises tailored to stroke recovery are available in Haileybury, Englehart and Kirkland Lake.

Specialized programs focused on cognitive remediation and exercises for hand, arm and shoulder, with assessments by occupational therapists, are offered.

Monthly support groups for stroke survivors, life skills courses in individual clients’ homes, and help navigating other services are also part of the program.

Transportation costs are not covered, but low-cost accessible transportation can be arranged through Timiskaming Home Support.

The program is free for all participants, and referrals can be made by clients themselves as well as health care providers and family members.

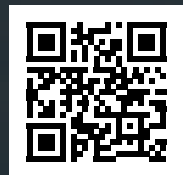
