City urges rollback of alcohol retail sale expansion

TEMISKAMING SHORES – City council is calling on the province to reverse the recent expansion of alcohol sales to more retail outlets.

Temiskaming Shores council has also endorsed several recommendations that would limit where alcohol is sold.

It's also asking that some of the revenue the province derives from alcohol sales be used to address alcohol-related harms.

The measures were in a resolution proposed by Councillor Mark Wilson last month and considered by council September 17.

In the resolution, the city listed the detrimental impacts of alcohol on health and road safety, and its role in domestic violence, sexual assaults and physical assaults.

Alcohol-related harms, it said, cost the Ontario economy \$7 billion a year.

In Temiskaming, it noted more than a third of students in grades 10 and 11 report consuming alcohol at age 13 or younger, and almost half say they've been drunk at least once in their life.


Most of the tax revenue from the sale of alcohol goes to the province, "yet the costs Continued on page 7

Prostate Cancer Awareness

Did you know?

- Prostate cancer is the most common cancer to affect Canadian men;
- One in eight men will be diagnosed with the disease in their lifetime;
- Over 90% of prostate cancer cases are curable if detected and treated in their earliest stages

Signs and Symptoms of Prostate Cancer

- Difficulty urinating
- Urgent need to urinate
- Frequent urination, especially at night
- Burning or pain when urinating
- Inability to urinate or difficulty starting or stopping urine flow
- Painful ejaculation
- Blood in the urine or semen

Risk Factors

While any man can develop prostate cancer, you may be at a higher risk if you are...

- **Over 50:** Age is the strongest risk factor for prostate cancer. Your risk increases starting at age 50, and most cases are diagnosed in men over age 65. Depending on your risk, your health care provider may recommend that you think about testing at an earlier age - as young as 40.
- Have a family history of prostate cancer: Your risk is higher if a first-degree relative (father or brother) has had prostate cancer. Your risk increases with each additional first-degree relative who has the disease.
- African or Caribbean: Prostate cancer is more common among men in these ethnic groups. (Men of Asian descent have lower risk.)

Don't Ignore Symptoms

The sooner symptoms are reported to your health care provider, the sooner testing to help diagnose and treat the problem can begin. Symptoms may be caused by prostate cancer or by another health problem.

Symptoms are not always present especially in the early stages of prostate cancer. If detected and treated in its earliest stages, the chances of survival are greatly increased. If you have questions about whether or not you should have a PSA test, talk to your doctor or nurse practitioner. Early detection is key!

Flooding revisited

The September Weekender editorial, A Flood of Concerns,

13 talked about flooding in Temiskaming Shores that occurred near the end of August after an especially heavy summer storm.

It said a lot of rainfall in a short time "caused flooding to several businesses and homes around Temiskaming Shores, in particular the businesses located near the mall."

The editorial asked: "So when will the city adequately address the issue of more potential flooding in that business-heavy location?"

Well, we got it wrong. In an email, a city official pointed out that "the flooding of parking lots along Highway 65 is an MTO and private business issue as we do not own land or maintain in this area. This topic has been raised to them over the years. City storm infrastructure outlets to an approved ditch system and private systems in this area."

While the original editorial may have made some good points about infrastructure and drainage and how trees may mitigate some of the

problems by absorbing water, it was unfair of the editorial to lay the blame at the feet of the city.

We should have asked the city about its responsibilities before making such blanket statements.

The city official noted, "I'm not saying we are perfect," and that certainly applies to us here at The Weekender and at The Speaker as well. We're not perfect either, but we can and will strive to do better.

and harms that are alcohol related are borne by the municipalities in the form of policing and social services and public health issues," it said.

The resolution urged the Ontario government to permit municipalities to opt out of retail alcohol expansion, and to grant them the power to use zoning to determine where new retail locations would be acceptable.

It also called for alcohol sales to be prohibited at gas stations and within 150 metres of schools, daycares and substance use facilities.

The only reservation was expressed by Mayor Jeff Laferriere, who was concerned over a provision that would allow municipalities to opt out of the recent expansion of sale outlets.

If one municipality opts out but the neighbouring community does not, he said health and safety risks could rise as people drive to locations to buy alcohol.

"I think we need to make sure this is consistent and across the board," he said.

CASE AGAINST EXPANSION

The discussion followed an earlier presentation by Walter Humeniuk, a research, planning and policy analyst at the Timiskaming Health Unit.

"Alcohol is not a harmless substance, and if we are going to reduce alcohol-related harms and encourage healthy choices, we need to consider the environment that we're creating and the policies that help shape that environment," he told

council.

Ontario's alcohol-related costs in health care, the justice system, lost productivity and other areas surpass those linked to tobacco, opioids or cannabis, he said.

Alcohol, he said, is the leading risk factor for death and disability among Canadians aged 15 to 49, and the direct cause of more than 60 chronic diseases and at least seven types of cancer.

"Some studies show that less than half of Canadians know that alcohol causes cancer. In fact, alcohol consumption is the third leading cause of preventable cancer, and it doesn't have to be consumed in large quantities to do so."

The latest research, he said, shows there is no safe level of alcohol consumption.

In Ontario each year, he said about 4,300 deaths, 22,000 hospitalizations and 195,000 emergency visits are entirely attributable to alcohol.

One year after the introduction of alcohol sales to grocery stores, he said the number of alcohol-caused emergency department visits in Ontario increased 18 per cent

Health and policy experts expect those numbers to rise as alcohol is available at more retail outlets, he said.

"Convenience comes with a price," he said.

In Temiskaming, he said the rate of hospitalization attributable to alcohol is already "significantly higher" than the provincial average.

Humeniuk said 17.3 per cent of the district's population reports engaging in heavy drinking, which is defined as five or more standard drinks on a single occasion.

"That's almost 5,000 people," he said.

Just over 15 per cent report consuming seven or more drinks in the past week, increasing their risk of acute and chronic harms, he said.

The numbers are probably higher, he said, because the statistics rely on individuals reporting their own consumption.

He said a coalition of health care providers recently put a ten-point plan to the province to help mitigate alcoholrelated harms.

"The province has been resistant to implementing any of these suggestions so far," he said.

Municipalities can act on their own, he said, through zoning bylaws, the licensing of outdoor patios, and regulating the sale and marketing of alcohol at events on municipal property.

Councillor Danny Whalen described the recent expansion of retail sales outlets as another form of provincial downloading to municipalities through, as an example, increased policing costs.

One concern that has not been raised, he said, is the impact on already rising insurance rates.

He worried that the number of alcohol retail outlets in a specific area will factor into premiums.

Whalen urged that the data presented by Humeniuk be updated in 12 to 24 months in order to assess the impact of its increased availability.

Humeniuk said he's finalizing a document that the health unit will be sharing with municipalities about to not just alcohol but also addressing harms related tobacco and cannabis.

He is also involved with Camp Jeunesse en Marche where he is a board member.


"Just recently I joined the Fondation Communautaire du Temiskaming," he noted.


