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One Light event supporting family in need

TEMISKAMING SHORES - A December 27 gathering is raising money for a family facing medical expenses for their newborn daughter, who has challenging health concerns.

One Light Diversity Centre is hosting what it dubs a Winter ONE-derland Celebration at Riverside Place, beginning at 6 p.m.

It'll offer children's activities and face painting, food from local restaurants, and draws.

A \$5 donation for admission to the event will go towards the family, said Rammy Bining, the centre's executive lead. Donations will also be accepted.

In an email, Bining said the newcomer family does not currently have Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) coverage, and is in urgent need of financial assistance after the birth of their baby.

"They are not in a financial position to cover the costs, and at this time, they are unable to access programs or resources that could alleviate the financial burden," Bining said.

She's not disclosing the identity of the family to respect their wishes. They've requested not to be identified at this time, she said, due to cultural reasons and to protect their child from any potential negative impact of

publicity.

One Light hopes to raise \$10,000.

CARE ELIGIBILITY

Who qualifies for OHIP coverage, and when, is a complex issue.

In an email, Bining highlighted some of the guidelines provided by the Ontario Ministry of Health and ServiceOntario.

In general in Ontario, newcomers who are not yet permanent residents or citizens can apply for OHIP once they've been living in the province for at least 153 days within a 12-month period.

Children born in Ontario to parents who do not have per-

Good news

Is Doug Ford playing Santa Claus these days for the north?

It certainly would appear

so as the Ford-led Conservative government of Ontario gets a big high five from us this week.

of legislation to provide an additional \$77 million to small municipalities to offset municipal policing costs.

Previously the government said it would increase the Ontario Municipal Partnership Fund (OMPF) to help smaller municipalities offset rising costs such as policing.

But, for example, the proposed OMPF increase for Cobalt would not cover the total rise in policing costs of \$110,704.

So the government did the right thing and is providing financial relief to offset the costs of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP).

Thanks to our Timiskaming-Cochrane MPP John Vanthof for standing up at Queen's Park and speaking about the impact of those policing costs for small rural municipalities.

The OPP provide policing services to 330 communities in Ontario and those costs rose significantly for 2025 with Kirkland Lake receiving an increase in their costs of \$700,000.

With small municipalities struggling to balance budgets and keep tax increases to a minimum, this is welcome news.

We applaud this action and further applaud the government's action on increases to the Northern Ontario Travel Grant.

Over the next three years, the province is investing \$45 million to ex-

pand the Northern Health Travel Grant program to help people in Northern Ontario connect to specialized care and medical services they need.

The program will offer increased overnight allowances for accommodation while lowering distance requirement eligibility for the travel grant from 200 kilometres to 100.

The application process will be sped up as well and more healthcare providers will be included in the travel grant parameters.


The people of Northern Ontario are no doubt grateful for these changes.

manent resident status typically face a three-month waiting period before becoming eligible for OHIP.

Under certain conditions, that waiting period can be waived if parents gain permanent resident status soon after birth.

Maternity costs can be hiah.

Bining cites data that, without provincial health coverage, the cost of a birth in Canada can range from \$10,000 to \$15,000 and higher still for a Caesarean section.

Newcomers who are not yet eligible for public health coverage often must pay for health services on their own or through private insurance.

But private insurance can be costly, and coverage may not be comprehensive, she



CMHA Cochrane-Timiskaming calling for more funding

TIMMINS (Special) – More funding is needed to meet surging demand for services and retain qualified staff, says the Canadian Mental Health Association (CMHA) Cochrane-Timiskaming.

"The community mental health and addictions sector is an integral part of Ontario's broader health care infrastructure," said CMHA Cochrane-Timiskaming executive director Paul Jalbert in a recent news release.

"Our sector must be adequately funded and resourced so we and the rest of the health care system can operate efficiently and effectively, and provide care to

they need it."

His comments came earlier this month as the organization made a presentation to the Ontario government at a pre-budget consultation in Timmins.

organization said Ontario is experiencing a drug-poisoning crisis, a homelessness crisis, increasing food insecurity, and more issues related to mental health and addictions.

It said underfunding has created challenges in keeping qualified staff to support people living through these

In the past 11 years at least,

Ontarians where and when it said the community-based sector has received only one increase in its base funding, while inflation has grown more than 30 per cent.

> The CMHA is asking for an additional \$133 million in 2025-26 for its 27 branches across the province.

> The additional funding would include \$33 million to stabilize the branches' operating costs and \$20 million to expand crisis services, including new crisis hubs.

> As part of the package, it's also asking for \$60 million in each of the next two years to run an additional 5,000 supportive housing units.



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From the January 5 issue: COLEMAN WILL CONTINUE TO DEVELOP IN 2024

COLEMAN TOWNSHIP — "We are quite happy with how things are unfolding in the township and we are excited for what will occur in 2024," said Coleman Township Mayor Dan Cleroux in a recent interview with The Temiskaming Speaker.

Coleman is in its second year of the four-year term of council, recently adding a new council member in Patrick Rieux after a council resignation was accepted.

Cleroux said there are lots of new developments happening in the two-billion square footage area that makes up Coleman and the township is seeing more applications for building permits.

"The short Portage Bay Road has some homes going up and that area has quickly developed."

He said continuing with lot development, the township will make lots available in 2024 on Girl Guide Road, located on Gillies Lake North.

"Staff will prepare a report that will come to council and then we will begin to market the lots. We will likely hire a real estate agent for that work."

CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT TAKES FLIGHT AT HMREC

HILLIARDTON — About 60 adults and children attended the annual Christmas Bird Count at the Hilliardton Marsh Research and Education Centre (HMREC) on December 30

The count has been one of the premier events in the birding calendar across North America since 1900.

It is one of the largest wildlife surveys providing

data to conservationists, naturalists and scientists about bird populations and behaviour.

It is citizen led, which means it is called citizen science in action as birders all over North America report the numbers of birds they are seeing at backyard feeders and in the wild.

From the January 19 issue: PRELIMINARY ROADS PROGRAM ACCELERATES

TEMISKAMING SHORES (Staff)

– Which city roads will be upgraded this year, and at

what cost?

Temiskaming Shores is releasing a tender for its 2024 roads program, which envisions rehabilitating almost three lane kilometres of roads at a cost of \$385,000.

At city council's committeeof-the-whole meeting earlier this week, transportation services manager Mitch McCrank listed specific roads on the proposed work list.

But he cautioned that plan could change, depending on pricing and unforeseen circumstances that crop up during the work itself.

Selecting the roads for upgrading "is always a challenge," said Mayor Jeff Laferriere after council met.

But Laferriere said the city's asset management plan helps it prioritize road work.

"We're going to continue to do as many as we can," he said. "There's always financial constraints, but living within the budget we're going to try and get as many of those roads done and as quickly as possible."

The list at this time include three projects in New Liskeard – 312 metres of Golding Street, between Whitewood and Broadwood; 210 metres of Wellington Street, between Cedar and Whitewood; and 300 metres of Market Street.

In Haileybury, rehabilitation is proposed for 152 metres on Amwell Street, between Rorke and Georgina.

The list includes the addition of a walking path on Wilson Avenue between Grant Drive and Hwy. 65 and single-lift surface treatment on some existing roads.

Also to be completed this year is Albert Street in Haileybury and some paving in the Dymond Industrial

BOHEMIAN WAXWINGS FLOCK TO TEMISKAMING REGION

TEMISKAMING SHORES — Large flocks of Bohemian waxwings are being spotted in Temiskaming Shores of late as upwards of 300 or more birds in a flock are descending on area fruit trees with a vengeance.

These medium sized songbirds are feasting on hawthorn and mountain ash berries, wild grapes,

crabapples and juniper berries found across the region.

Sometimes when large numbers of birds appear in an area it is called an irruption.

An irruption is not the same as a migration pattern for birds. It means that birds are moving from one area to another area, usually due to a lack of food sources.
