Coleman introducing new recycling program on **April 1**

COLEMAN TOWNSHIP — Because of provincial government changes to recycling programs in Ontario, Coleman Township is transitioning to a new recycling program effective April 1, 2025.

The new program will involve the use of large 95-gallon blue bins, similar to the ones used in Temiskaming Shores, said Coleman Township Chief Administrative Officer Chris Oslund.

At the regularly scheduled November 25 meeting of council, Oslund outlined the changes to the new recycling program, mandated by the province.

By December 2025, all municipalities in Ontario will switch to the new producer-led recycling program.

The new provider is GFL Environmental.

The aim of the new recycling programs is to shift the cost of recycling away from municipalities onto companies that make and

Crohn's and Colitis Awareness (Irritable Bowel Disease)

Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis are diseases that inflame the lining of the gastrointestinal tract and disrupt your body's ability to digest food, absorb nutrition and eliminate waste in a healthy way. In 2021, more than 300,000 Canadians were believed to be living with IBD. By 2030, this figure is expected to reach 403,000 (or 1 in 100 people).

The causes of irritable bowel disease (IBD) are very complex. They are believed to be due to a **genetic tendency** (predisposition) and an environmental trigger that combine to cause intestinal inflammation.

What are the symptoms?

- Abdominal pain and cramping
- Diarrhea (severe and bloody stools with colitis)
- Rectal bleeding (common with colitis)
- Nausea and vomiting
- · Diminished appetite and weight loss
- · Gas or flatulence
- Bloating
- Fever
- Anemia
- Fatigue

Fast Facts:

- Canada has among the highest rates in the world.
- · Crohn's and colitis can be diagnosed at any age, but people are more often diagnosed before the age of 30.
- The number of new cases of Crohn's disease in Canadian children has almost doubled since 1995.
- · Males and females are equally affected.
- Crohn's and colitis can affect any race or ethnic group
- There is no special diet for people with Crohn's or colitis.

It's not always possible to tell from symptoms alone whether you have Crohn's disease or colitis. That's why it's important to visit your health care provider for a diagnosis. If you're experiencing symptoms and think you may have Crohn's or colitis, schedule an appointment with your health care provider to find out for sure.

FOODCYCLER PILOT PROGRAM

The Township of Coleman is seeking interest in a "Food Waste Recycling Program" that reduces
food waste to nutrient rich soil that can be added to plants or gardens. The goal is to reduce the amount of food waste that is deposited in the landfill.

You can sign up for a FoodCycler unit by contacting the Township Office. There are two sizes available; a 2.5 litre model for \$150 and a 5 litre model for \$300 plus applicable taxes.

Participants will be asked to track their weekly usage for a period of 12 weeks. At the end of the pilot program there will be a survey to assist the Township with the collection of waste management data.

GARBAGE COLLECTION

We collect regular household waste through weekly curbside collection every Tuesday. Please ensure your waste is out by 7am and is easily and safely accessible for collectors at a maximum distance of one meter from the curb. Maximum of three (3) bags per week.



sell products.

Oslund said Coleman is not aware of who will pick up the recycling bins as of yet, but he noted there will still be a recycling bin at the Coleman landfill for some hazardous items after a question from a resident about the new program.

Some hazardous waste products are currently collected at the Coleman landfill such as paint cans, fluorescent light bulbs and they are transferred once a year to the region's hazardous waste collection event held in Temiskaming

Oslund said the new program will "save us money as we will not be responsible for collecting recycling."

Mayor Dan Cleroux asked how these changes affected Eco Logix, the current recycling collection agency and Oslund did not know who the new contractor would be.

The recycling program will take place every second Thursday beginning April 1, 2025, with garbage pickup on Tuesdays in Coleman.

"Before we know it April will be here and the program will start so we want people to be aware of the changes," noted Oslund.

FOODCYCLER PROGRAM

He also mentioned the township needs two more people to take part in the Food Waste Recycling Program, which benefits the township by keeping food waste from the landfill.

"We are still trying to get that going."

There are two sizes of FoodCycler units available, the 2.5 litre model for \$150 and the five-litre model for \$300 plus applicable taxes.

Participants will be asked to track their weekly usage for a period of 12 weeks. At the end of the 12 weeks participants will be asked to fill out a survey to assist the township with the collection of waste management data.

Cobalt mayor advocating for bail reform

COBALT - Cobalt council will be asked at its next meeting council December 10 to approve a resolution to add its voice to the call for improvements to the court bail system.

The objective is to keep repeat offenders, and those who have committed violent crimes, in custody rather than immediately releasing them back into the community.

The issue is being brought

federal government for an amendment to the Criminal Code to make it more difficult to be released from secure custody.

Cobalt Mayor Angela Adshead said in a telephone interview that a letter is being drafted at this time to be presented to Cobalt council for resolution to call on the federal government and the Attorney General "to change the laws on bail - the catch and release specifically, because a lot of time it's the same people that they're arresting over and over again.

> Cobalt residents and others on a bus November 3 were witnesses to an attack on a 16-year-old Cobalt girl who had just disembarked from a bus. On October 29, the accused had been in court on a charge of assault and had been sentenced to house arrest.

Adshead said she has been in discussion with municipal leaders locally and in Southern Ontario.

"I'm seeing it on the rise all across Ontario," she said of crimes being committed by people who have previously been in the court system.

"They're all saying the same thing - that something has to change, because they're seeing the same thing and it's the same people over and over and over again."

DRIVING UP POLICING COSTS

Adshead said she has also been in touch with the Ontario Solicitor General's office over rising police costs.

She said that it is her opinion that repeat offenders being released immediately back into the community is what is driving up policing costs.

"The change has to come from the federal level because this problem is just going to continue because the people that are breaking the laws know that they're going to be right back out. They're going to be back out the next day or the day after. There are no consequences for their actions."

Adshead expressed her opinion that serving time in custody "in some cases, maybe, would give them time to realize they need help to get at what is at the bottom of their issue."

in the North are something can tackle together," said Dr. Michael Green, the university's president, vicechancellor, dean and CEO, in a news release.

Helping to offset the tuition of a deserving student "will help to strengthen the health care workforce in the North and, over time, improve access to care for all," Green

The university offered some statistics about its work:

- Since its inception in 2005, 91 per cent of its MD students, on average, have come from Northern Ontario.
- · As of June 2024, NOSM University has graduated 971 doctors of medicine. Eighty are Indigenous and 198 are francophone. More than half have stayed in Northern Ontario.
- On average, almost 53 per cent of its grads select family medicine as their first choice residency, compared to about 38 per cent of all Canadian applicants.
- Its graduates have about twice the debt load of their counterparts from medical schools in Canada.

The university states:

"This is not because education here costs more; rather, it is because many ... Northern MD students at NOSM University do not have access to the same financial and social means as students in the South."

- About 90 per cent of NOSM University medical students complete both their degree undergraduate and residency training in Northern Ontario stay in the region to practise medicine.
- estimated 400.000 Northern Ontario residents - or

about half the region's population - have been helped by a NOSM University grad.

• It has to date graduated 207 learners who have gone on to become registered dieticians. Three-quarters of the graduates from the past three classes are practising in Northern Ontario.
