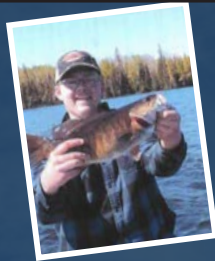

Some water users to see "substantial" bill increases

TEMISKAMING SHORES – After almost a decade of discussions and prep, the tap is about to open for a new water metering and billing system for many Temiskaming Shores water users.

Water consumption meters have now been installed in almost all of the city's industrial, commercial and institutional properties, as well as multi-residential buildings with three or more units.

When the new system becomes operational in July, water bills will rise for about 140 establishments, with some seeing a "substantial" increase, said Steve Burnett, the city's manager of environmental services, last week.

Bills will drop for about 340 establishments, Burnett told city council at its committee-of-the-whole meeting January 21.

Revenues for the city will remain essentially the same, he said.

Kidney Disease – Early Detection and Prevention

Kidney disease usually progresses silently, often destroying most of the kidney function before causing any symptoms. There are two key tests used to detect kidney damage and to assess how well your kidneys are working.

Blood Test:

A blood test is used to measure your serum creatinine level. This helps to identify how well the kidneys are filtering the blood. Creatinine is a waste product made from muscle use and the breakdown of the protein you eat.

Urinalysis

Simple lab tests such as urinalysis (a urine dipstick), which looks for blood and a protein called albumin in the urine, are also useful in detecting kidney damage at an early stage. The filters of the kidney do not normally allow protein (albumin) in the urine so if protein is detected, it is a sign that the filters of the kidney are being damaged.

Symptoms

Uremia is a Greek word that means "urine in the blood". Uremia develops as the kidneys fail. Signs and symptoms that may occur with uremia:

Steps to Help Prevent Kidney Disease

- Have your blood pressure checked regularly. Uncontrolled high blood pressure can speed up the natural course of any underlying kidney disease.
- If you suffer from diabetes, make sure that it is under control. A growing number of kidney patients are people with diabetes.
- Be very careful about taking non-prescription medications, particularly pain killers. Discuss all over-the-counter medications with your health care provider or pharmacist before taking them.

EDITORIAL

Services are needed now

A growing concern is gripping the communities of Northern Ontario. It is the alarming rise of opioid usage and overdose deaths, which has reached epic levels. The urgent need for action and support for the opioid crisis in our communities

cannot be overstated. Research from the Ontario Drug Policy Research Network and Public Health Ontario report that overdose deaths in Northern Ontario by a single substance increased by 75 per cent from 2018 to 2022.

The percentage of deaths goes much higher if two or more substances are involved.

In total, 12,115 accidental overdose deaths across Ontario in that timeframe were a result of a mix of opioids, stimulants, alcohol, and benzodiazepines.

The most significant finding is that illicit opioids are responsible for 84 per cent of the drug toxicity deaths.

That means drug dealers

are peddling drugs cut with substances that are causing unnecessary deaths.

Numbers on a page may not mean much to us, but the harsh reality is the deaths represent our friends, family members, coworkers and others.

The report found about one third of those who died from an overdose had some interaction with a health-care outlet, either a hospital or doctor's office prior to their deaths.

We need emergency departments to be able to handle the complexities of addiction and quite often they are not up to delivering mental health and addiction services.

We need a province-wide

rollout of addiction and mental health consulting services along with community based services easily accessed by those in crisis.

Over 2,600 Ontarians fell victim from opioid-related deaths in 2023 alone.

We know harm reduction services across the North are limited and perhaps non-existent in some communities.

The North needs immediate support and investment in addiction and mental health services, not millions spent on a provincial election that, by all accounts, will see the same outcome as before.

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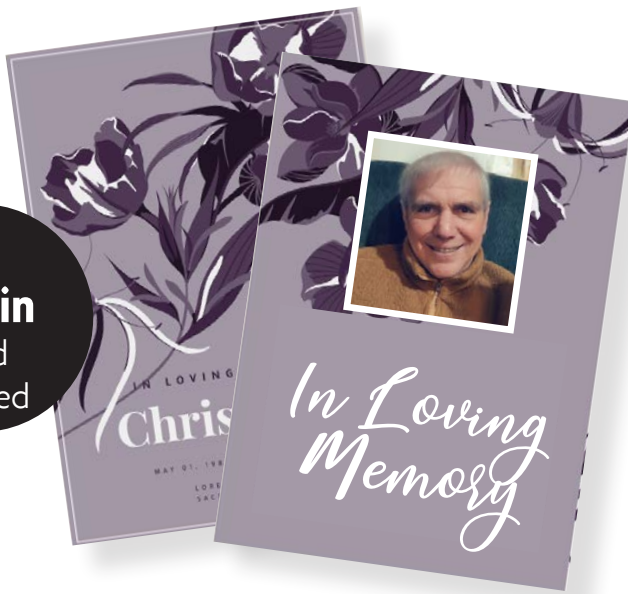
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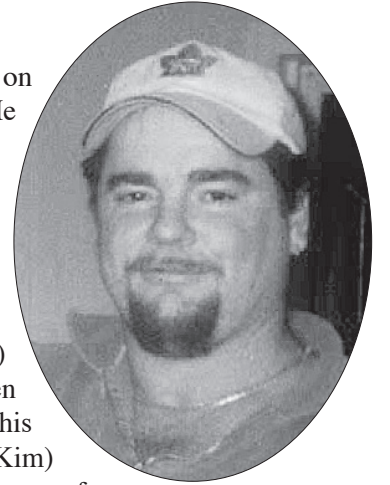


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OBITUARY

Work began in 2016 on harmonizing water billing practices in the three former municipalities of New Liskeard, Haileybury and Dymond.

“What’s important is that it’s fair throughout the municipality,” said Mayor Jeff Laferriere in an interview after the meeting.

“There’s been folks who have benefitted from the lack of consistency throughout the municipality for a number of years, and that’s why we’re looking at this and making sure that it was fair and equitable,” he said.

“Now it’s time to implement it.”

He considered communication with affected users to be critical.

Burnett outlined the communications plan to council last week.

Letters are being prepared that will de-

tail a property’s water consumption and what it would have been charged in 2024, had the new system been in operation.

In April, properties will receive a mock bill for the first three months of this year, outlining what their charges would have been for the first quarter of 2025.

A public meeting will be held in May to answer any questions.

A second mock bill will be distributed in July detailing their consumption and charges for April through June.

The first real bill will be issued in October, and cover the months of July, August and September.

By delaying implementation until mid-way through this year, Burnett said properties will have an opportunity to adjust water consumption and their own pricing.

Union not expecting layoffs of full-time faculty

TEMISKAMING SPEAKER – The union representing full-time faculty at Northern College has received no notification of pending layoffs of its members.

Nor does it see the need to lay off full-time faculty, says the president of Ontario Public Service Employees Union CAAT-A Local 653.

“We are already at the numbers that we were at 10 years ago before we had any international students to speak of,” said Local 653 president Neal McNair in a telephone interview late last week.

“There shouldn’t be any real change,” he said.

VIABILITY

McNair’s comments came one week after Northern College announced that it

will have to reduce its staff complement as well as cut expenses and increase operational efficiencies in order to remain viable.

The college cited federal restrictions on international student permit eligibility and post-graduate work permit eligibility.

It said the changes immediately impacted enrolment of international students, leaving it with projected operational deficits of \$6 million in 2025-26 and \$12 million the next year.

The college has a partnership with Pures College of Technology, a private college in Scarborough, which focuses on international students’ education. The partnership is credited with \$30 million in revenue to Northern College annually, equivalent to one-third of its budget.

In a news release earlier this month, the college cit-

ed funding models, reduced international student recruitment numbers and inflation-related costs for the decision to reduce staff.

It said it has developed incentive packages for early retirements and voluntary exits, and will be issuing layoff notices as required.

The college has released no further details.

It’s never good news to hear talk of layoffs, McNair said.

At a meeting with the union last fall, he said the college indicated that federal immigration changes could mean layoffs. It signalled it would not be looking at faculty, but more likely at support staff and administration.

He said there was no further update until the announcement in mid-January.

The local represents about 80 full-time faculty as well as some instructors with partial teaching loads.

As the college’s enrolment increased, McNair said additional faculty had been hired on contract as occasional teachers.

He said the number of those non-union teachers has already decreased, and expected it will continue to drop as contracts are not renewed.

FUNDING

With the loss of international students, the college’s revenue is also expected to drop.

The situation isn’t good, said McNair, but he hoped the government will recognize that something must be done.

If the province wants to maintain colleges in remote areas without large populations to draw students from, he said there must be more subsidization.

Ontario, he said, has the lowest per-capita funding for post-secondary education in

all of Canada in a trend that began under the previous provincial government and has continued.

Colleges were forced to find other revenues “but there is a price to pay for that, and the price in my opinion has been the quality of education,” he said.

“Public colleges do a valuable service for the province. We’re training the people that industry rely on to come and work, and they’re ready to work when they get there,” he said.

“If you let that degrade from underfunding, it’s going to impact the economy going forward and we’re not going to have the trained workforce that our economy needs.”

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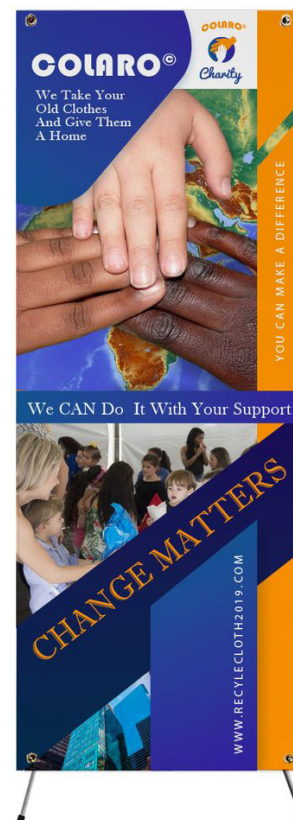
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Haileybury Legion celebrates Robbie Burns day

TEMISKAMING SHORES — The kilts were swaying and bagpipes were playing in celebration of the famous Scottish poet, Robbie Burns, at the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 54 in Haileybury Saturday night.

Scotland's most well-known and beloved 18th century bard was celebrated on January 25 during Robbie Burns Day, with a special dinner hosted by Branch 54.

Most people may be aware of Burns' most famous poem, traditionally sung at the dawn of a New Year, Auld Lang Syne.

Over the course of the evening traditional Robbie Burns Day events included a roast beef dinner, the addressing of the haggis completed by David Robson, who replaced Irene Locke this year, bagpipe music, traditional toasts and merriment.

Master of Ceremonies for the evening, Jody Currie, told the crowd he estimated it was the 266th Robbie Burns Day celebration since the poet's death when a group of Burns friends decided to celebrate his lit-

erary and social graces on the eve of his birthday.

With the celebration comes haggis, a meaty, spicy dish treasured by the Scots.

Haggis can have ingredients of pre-cooked oats, beef liver, onion and spices stuffed inside an animal's intestine or stomach. It is shaped into a ball and cooked for an hour or so and then it is broken open and served.

The haggis was piped in with great ceremony and held on a platter by Temiskaming and District Pipes and Drums members Carter Walton and Lola Angus, for the address to the haggis.

Politicians attending the event spoke, including Timmins-James Bay MP Charlie Angus and Cochrane-Timiskaming MPP John Vanthof.

After the dinner, patrons were encouraged by Branch 54 president Don Martin to go upstairs to the newly renovated Sgt. Martin Goudreault Lounge to enjoy the singing of Carl Falls.

Robson was awarded a lifetime membership to the Legion recognizing his dedication and volunteerism to Branch 54 over the years.
